Foxborough Regional Charter School A Year in Review 2019-2020

Achievements, Academic Accomplishments, and Highlights from our School Year

2019 MCAS results continue to show tremendous student achievement and growth!

As is the FRCS tradition, our high school students performed extremely well in their statewide assessments, continuing to achieve tremendous progress and proficiency across the various grades and subjects. Demonstrating the success of our K-12 programming, historically culminating in strong high school MCAS results, I am pleased to provide a summary:

High School

High school students continued to demonstrate strong progress and proficiency across the various grades and subjects.

10th graders demonstrated exceptional proficiency and growth, as evidenced by high achievement levels measured by the state's Composite Performance Indices (CPI – scores out of 100) in ELA (100.0), Math (97.2), and Science, Technology, and Engineering (91.7), all far outpacing the state results.



• All significant subgroups (all races, English language learners, economically disadvantaged, disabled, and high needs) achieved at high levels, demonstrated growth, and met/exceeded state targets.

100% of 10th graders passed English Language Arts (ELA). All but one student passed Math. 100% of 9th and 10th graders passed their Science, Technology, and Engineering exams.

Elementary/Middle School

Our Elementary and Middle School results mirror the state averages, on the whole, with strong performances in some grades and subjects

- In ELA, our students demonstrated higher growth and performance across the grades compared to 2018 results. All student subgroups met or exceeded targets established by the state.
- There was also a narrowing of many previously seen achievement gaps.
- In Math, there was demonstrated growth yet at a slower pace and with a slight decline in performance compared to 2018.
- Gaps likewise were narrowed across many subgroups.

We have been analyzing the results in greater detail, including how our students performed on individual standards, test items, and across subgroups. We have begun using these data to develop a strategic plan to align with our professional development program and curriculum revisions, including targeting any specific supports for individuals and small groups of students.

Strong showing by students earning Honors, High Honors, or Distinguished Scholar achievement all three terms last year (2018-2019)

Thanks to an incredible partnership, all K-1 children attending the Foxborough Regional Charter School can receive FREE swim lessons as part of the SPLASH program at the Invensys Foxboro

YMCA! Through the incredible generosity of the Spier Family Foundation, SPLASH combines the love of swimming with the critical importance of teaching water safety skills.

A basic overview of SPLASH includes:

- The SPLASH program located only at the Invensys Foxboro YMCA will give the opportunity for K-1st graders to receive FREE swim lessons (up to 8 weeks).
- SPLASH will run 5x a school year starting in September and concluding the beginning of June.
 - o Parents must provide the flyer at time of sign up.
 - Sign-ups for SPLASH must be done in person at the YMCA.
 - Those currently or previously enrolled in YMCA swim programs can participate.
 - SPLASH is not a specific class. Children will still take classes based upon their level and time availability.
- SPLASH is funded 100% by the Spier Family Foundation geared to having all children of all means take FREE swim lessons.
- SPLASH is only offered and applicable at the Invensys Foxboro YMCA.



Working with such amazing community partners as the Spier Family Foundation and the Hockomock Area YMCA helps to provide our students wonderful experiences and life-long skills!

Keeping safety and security at the forefront of our learning environment.

We take the safety and security of our entire school community extremely seriously. In fact, it is our primary job.

Over the years, we have worked with a dynamic team of security professionals to create a comprehensive Emergency Management and Multi-Hazard Plan. Specifically, we have also focused significant attention on our training and response in the case of an intruder. While incidents such as these are rare, they are also unfortunately real, and it is essential we are vigilant and prepare. This has resulted in moving toward a Run, Hide, React model rather than just a hide/lockout down approach. Research and lessons learned over the years demonstrate a clear need to provide options based upon specific situations.

Of course, training for those options and appropriate responses is critical. Over the past four years, we held lecture and interactive training sessions with all our staff. We initially practiced Hide/Lockdown drills, and then progressed to introduce the Run and React components. This is based upon responding to the best information available at the time, including both an immediate Run/ Evacuation and a Run/Evacuation after going into a Hide response (a threat is no longer in the immediate area).

Both local and state tactical law enforcement are knowledgeable about our campus, areas of egress, and facility operations. They worked with us on a comprehensive response and reunification plan and have virtual maps of our campus. In addition, K-9 units are included in our training and response plans, and we provide opportunities for these partners to train at FRCS.



This year, we have continued to build upon previous lessons and scenarios to strengthen our individual and collective knowledge and abilities to respond appropriately. And as you know, we also have a full-time, dedicated School Resource Officer (SRO) on campus. SRO Monterroso has made an amazing difference in our hallways, cafeterias, and classrooms over the past year, and I look forward to his continuing positive impact across our school community.


While reactionary measures typically receive the most public attention, it is important to note that is only one aspect of our programming. We have a variety of formal, proactive, and

Celebrating the HSP – The End of a Very Special FRCS Journey



Foxborough Regional Charter School is celebrating the end of a very special journey!

What began as a 5th grade class enrichment project in my classroom in 2009, the Holocaust Stamps Project (HSP) has now officially 'graduated' as the kindergarten to grade 12 community service learning initiative that raised awareness of history, tolerance, and acceptance at Foxborough Regional Charter School. The stamps, and collages created by our students over the past decade have been donated to the

American Philatelic Society (APS) in Bellefonte, PA.

Representatives from the APS made the trek from Pennsylvania to Massachusetts to transfer the 18 original artworks and dozens of plastic tote boxes filled to the brim with donated stamps to the museum where they will soon be on display. We had so many stamps, that they had to make two trips to FRCS to collect them all!

In 2017, we reached our goal to collect 11 million postage stamps, one for every life snuffed out by hatred during the Holocaust. Over the past decade, students have completed 18 Holocaust-themed stamps collage artworks using 15,000-20,000 of the stamps that were donated from across the country and around the world. Every aspect of the HSP has provided educational opportunities for students, staff, community volunteers, and visitors, but until now there has been no way for the public to view and enjoy the project. We'll keep you posted on the progress of the APS display.

qualifying for the state championship. FRCS will host a tournament on Saturday, February 1st.


Kindergarten Completes Successful Pajama Drive





The keynote speaker of the Winter Conference was Rob Powers.



The Elementary School celebrated the accomplishment in style, with several different activities for students in grades K-4.


Kindergarten students participated in our annual 100 Days Parade! The students marched around the whole Elementary School and received high fives and cheers from the older kids.

Dan Currier: Hardie, go jump in a lake.


Hardie: Okay.

FRCS' own Dan Currier finished first in the Novice competition. In a rigorous five months of tournaments, 48 students earned a spot to compete in the tournament, including 12 FRCS students, Dan finished with an impressive 82 out of a possible 90 points. Only one other competitor had 82 points, but Dan beat her in a tie breaker. Who was the #2 Novice state debater? None other than FRCS' own Jill Martin!



To earn the top spot, Dan had to convince judges that:

- 2) Medicare-for-all is the worst proposal for healthcare in the U.S.; and
- 3) Physicians should not be required to have triennial evaluations

- -The team of Dan Currier and Thomas Silva finished second overall in the Novice tournament.
- -In the Varsity competition, the final results revealed one of the tightest finishes in recent league history, with the top 19 performers separated by only 4 points. - Assisting in school-wide behavior interventions



Our Middle and High School scientists had a fantastic showing at the Region III Science and Engineering Fair at Bristol Community College in Fall River on Saturday, March 7th.







Celebrating the Class of 2020



Advanced Placement:

- 90% of our graduating class has immersed themselves in at least 1 Advanced Placement course throughout their four years of high school, Impressive!

- 52% of our graduating class engaged in 3 or more AP courses during their Senior year.

Rosetta Stone, Dual Enrollment, VHS, Independent Study, and SIE:

- 35, over 56% of the class, have been invited into one or more Honors programs.
- 38 students received one or more merit financial awards from colleges or universities of at least \$10,000 per year (60% of the class).
 - o 18 received merit scholarships of \$20,000 or more
 - o 16 seniors received merit scholarships of over \$30,000 per year.
 - o Our Class of 2020, was awarded over 1.5 million Merit dollars in total.

As all families experience, another important step to higher education is figuring out the finances. Seniors can receive scholarships for a variety of academic and extracurricular achievements and they are an important way to meet the costs of college.

- 26 Seniors (41% of the class) were awarded the John & Abigail Adams scholarship, which is based on tenth grade MCAS scores, and provides full tuition at any Massachusetts State College or University.
 - This percentage is much higher (almost double) than the usual top 25% limit of our sending districts.
 - This is because more of our students score in the top 25% when compared with other students in their hometowns.
