

Budget Overview for the 2023-24 School Year







Plan Summary [2023-24]

General Information

A description of the LEA, its schools, and its students in grades transitional kindergarten-12, as applicable to the LEA.

Ánimo Ralph Bunche Charter High School (ARB) is a public charter school located in the 90011 zip code of South Los Angeles. The surrounding neighborhood is known for a variety of factors: dense population, high-poverty, low income jobs, multiple factories, and an increasing homeless population. The median income for 90011 is \$47,126 which is far below Los County average of \$91,000. The neighborhood demographics are 90.2% Latino, 8.1% African American, 0.6% Caucasian, and 1.1% other. The majority of adult education level is no high school (32.2%) or some high school (44.8%). Even though these descriptive factors can serve as a barrier to education, our school community is resilient in overcoming these challenges. We remain committed to our mission of preparing all students for college, leadership, and life.

ARB opened in 2006 as one of five Green Dot Public Schools high schools known as the Jefferson Transformation Project. The intention of this project was to significantly improve education outcomes for students in this part of the city. Jefferson High School (a Los Angeles Unified School District school located only a few blocks from ARB) has a history of significant drop out rates. Our namesake, Dr. Ralph Bunche, was a graduate of Jefferson High School and we are proud to honor his legacy by serving students from his home community. Our school model is built around the fundamental philosophy that small schools can offer the supportive environment needed to help students overcome barriers to education. Our grades 9-12 high school has approximately 600 students enrolled each year, with a range of 145-165 students in each grade. Our first graduating class was the Class of 2010 and since then we have celebrated a total of twelve graduating classes.

ARB is one of the 18 public charter schools operated by Green Dot Public Schools California. We currently serve approximately 600 students, 99% of which are Latinos and 1% African American students. ARB is open to all students, including students with special needs and English Learners. 14% of our current school population are identified as students with special needs. Our current population of English Learners is 17%. The families that send their students to ARB struggle economically with 99% of our students classifying as socioeconomically disadvantaged.

One of the key components of ARB's model is a strong advisory program. Students meet with their advisory class every day for 40 minutes. Teachers serve as advisors and loop with their students each year, meaning a 9th grade advisor has the opportunity to advise their class for four years and see them graduate. This environment creates a family-like environment where students are supported and encouraged to do their best academically. Advisors are able to employ a variety of curriculum, such as Get Focused Stay Focused (career readiness) and lessons based on social emotional learning such as empathy. Advisory culminates each year with a grade level portfolio and at the end of the four year portfolio, there is a Senior Presentation and exit interview where students reflect on their growth over their four years at ARB. This powerful experience is a flagship aspect of the school culture.

Reflections: Successes

Ánimo Ralph Bunche earned a rating of "high" for graduation and a rating of "low" for suspension rates on the 2022 California Dashboard report. Ánimo Ralph Bunche's main priorities this school year have been academic excellence, school culture and connectedness, and attendance. Ánimo Ralph Bunche has been successful with a low suspension rate and high graduation rates. This is greatly attributed to our advisory program, and a culture of restorative practices and increased SEL and mental health supports. Our advisory program helps students remain connected to their teachers, classmates, and school. Counselors conduct frequent parent meetings and grade checks to help keep parents informed about graduation progress.

Reflections: Identified Need

A description of any areas that need significant improvement based on a review of Dashboard and local data, including any areas of low performance and significant performance gaps among student groups on Dashboard indicators, and any steps taken to address those areas.

On the 2022 California Dashboard, Ánimo Ralph Bunche earned a rating of "low" for ELA, which is on par with the state's rating of "low". For Math, the school earned a rating of "very low", which is lower than the state's rating of "low." For Ánimo Ralph Bunche, some of the biggest identified needs are increasing student achievement in the areas of ELA and Math. These are some of the steps we are taking to address these needs: ongoing coaching and feedback, more regular and rigorous professional development, increased walkthroughs, and data analysis on different levels. We have hired additional instructional aides in SPED and EL departments to support these students and other needing students in the classrooms.

For the 2022 CA Dashboard, the school received a status of "Not Met" for all 5 local indicators. The school presented its findings regarding the local indicators to the public and Green Dot's governing board. The local indicators were approved, along with the LCAP, by the Green

Dot board on June 24, 2022. The school did not submit the local indicators by CDE deadline, therefore receiving a status level of "Not Met." The school is continuously working to meet the local indicators of basic: teachers, instructional, materials facilities; implementation of academic standards; parent and family engagement; local climate survey; and access to broad course of study.

LCAP Highlights

A brief overview of the LCAP, including any key features that should be emphasized.

The LCAP for Ánimo Ralph Bunche shows that the school is currently successful in providing all basic services in Goal 1 giving the students and families a solid foundation to build on with quality teachers, access to a variety of courses, and a safe and maintained building. Our advisory program and staff relationships with students and families keeps students throughout their four years at ARB and help get students to graduation. Our AP pass rate has improved from the 20-21 school year to the 21-22 year and continued efforts are happening to keep the trajectory of improvement. ARB's suspension and expulsion rate is extremely low and that is due to strong student and staff culture, advisory programs, and increased mental health supports, and a restorative justice lens to support the student and community. And lastly, ARB gives parents multiple opportunities throughout the year to be authentically engaged with the school, and creating a safe environment that parents would recommend to their family and friends.

ARB identifies that the most pressing areas of growth are improving achievement on the ELA and Math SBAC for all students, CAST scores, increasing college and career readiness for all students, lowering chronic absenteeism, and increasing A-G eligibility for all students, all the while keeping an eye on our subpopulations of SWD, ELs, Foster Youth, and Homeless Youth. We allocate funding for additional staff and professional development in ways to directly support these needs and continue the efforts that are already yielding positive outcomes.

Engaging Educational Partners

During the 2022-23 school year, the school used several outreach strategies to engage with educational partners on the LCAP. The School Advisory Council ("SAC") has reviewed the LCAP goals, outcomes data, and expenditures data at multiple points throughout the year. The SAC is comprised of administrators, teachers, counselors, classified staff members, parents and students. In February 2023, the SAC had the opportunity to provide specific feedback on the various elements of the LCAP and identify areas of success and challenge to focus on in the coming year. The District English Learner Advisory Committee ("DELAC") has also reviewed the documents in Spring of 2023, both to provide feedback and final approval of the document. The DELAC is similarly comprised of diverse members of the school community, but parents or guardians of English Learners constitute the majority membership (51 percent or more) of the committee. In addition to discussion within these two committees, the LCAP documents were shared with the public during a public hearing of the Board before approval at a subsequent board meeting. The school further engages parents and family through student orientation, Coffee with the Principal, parent conferences, and/or meaningful two-way conversations between schools and parents in the parents' home language. This engagement included parents with limited English proficiencies, parents of migrant students, English Learners, and Students with Disabilities. In conjunction with the different educational partner groups, the Green Dot Home Office worked with School Leadership to update this LCAP, taking into account the progress identified in the Goal Analysis sections, revisions to actions/services, and updates to future expenditures. The Green Dot Home Office reviewed the SAC and DELAC feedback across all Green Dot schools to identify trends, achievements, and areas for improvement.

A summary of the feedback provided by specific educational partners.

Educational partners provided feedback through SAC and DELAC meetings as well as internal surveys from Coffee with the Principal. These groups cover the representation of all educational partners on campus.

Parents appreciate and want to see the continuing practice of calls to inform them of their student's absences. Parents have expressed a desire for extra support with academics and improved communication through personal phone calls or messages through the Remind app from their child's teachers. Parents want to see increased academic supports and increased socio-emotional supports. In Coffee with the principal parents have expressed their concern for the cleanliness of the areas surrounding the school as well as safety of the students to and from school.

Our LCAP plan includes our approach to using standards aligned and Green Dot vetted curriculum, professional development, and monthly observation and feedback as ways to support teachers in boosting student achievement, which ultimately affects A-G and graduation rates.

The LCAP also includes our plans for credit recovery which supports students making up classes as needed before and after school, during the school day, and on Saturdays. Funding has been used to increase our counseling team to three and the newest member is focused on students support and well-being as well as supporting academically. This year there is also an addition of parent classes that teach parents how to navigate and support their students in all the various educational systems. The school continues to use funding to provide additional resources. There is an increase of community events at ARB which empower the parents and families to use their voice and resources to address the issues around the school.

Goal Analysis [2022-23]

An analysis of how this goal was carried out in the previous year. A description of any substantive differences in planned actions and actual implementation of these actions.

Ánimo Ralph Bunche was extremely effective in implementing the actions and services to meet the goal of providing basic services to students as described above. We were able to meet all the criteria of our goal with a 100% performance rate in terms of having fully credentialed teachers and giving students a broad course of study. We work closely with the district Human Capital team to ensure we only interview quality candidates with appropriate credentials. Additionally, students have access to standards-aligned materials in all core classes, including district-wide curriculum in ELA and math. All students take one year of Physical Education, visual and performing arts elective, as well as access to Spanish, Creative Writing, College Readiness, and other electives offered in dual enrollment with a local community college. Also as it pertains to facilities, work repairs that are needed are accomplished fairly quickly which keeps our performance rate at 98%.

ARB works closely with our human capital team to ensure that 100% of our teachers are appropriately credentialed. Human capital screens each applicant and conducts an initial interview so that only high quality candidates make it to the schools site for an interview. Our facilities are kept in good shape due to monthly facility walk-throughs by the principal and School Operations Manager. In addition there is regular communication with our head custodian and our School Operations Manager as facility issues arise. After these walk-throughs or communications of issues, all repairs and work orders are submitted to Green Dot's facilities team to ensure that they are taken care of.

With regards to all of Goal 1, we are not intending to make any changes to our programs and supports to meet this goal. We are experiencing success in these areas and intend to continue our work in order to maintain our success rate.

Goal Analysis [2022-23]

An analysis of how this goal was carried out in the previous year.

A description of any substantive differences in planned actions and actual implementation of these actions.

Ánimo Ralph Bunche met our SBAC ELA growth goals for three subgroups: EL, Foster Youth, and Homeless Youth. The Homeless Youth subgroup was particularly impressive with a performance of 20%, 17% higher than the targeted growth goal. Our SWD subgroup almost met their goal, only missing it by 0.1% (Growth goal was 10.1% and performance was 10%). This year there was more intensive exposure to the SBAC for the 11th grade teachers in the form of pull outs and support from ELA and ELD curriculum specialists.

Ánimo Ralph Bunche CHS met our SBAC Math growth goals for two subgroups: EL and Homeless Youth. Both were highlights as we outpaced our 3% growth goal target and performed at 10%. While this is progress, we know that there is room for improvements and growth to be made with students meeting proficiency. ARB did not meet targeted growth goals for three subgroups: All Students, SED, and Latinx. As a district, the same subgroups struggled with this metric across the board. This year there was more intensive exposure to the SBAC for the 11th grade teachers in the form of pull outs and support from MATH curriculum specialists.

Ánimo Ralph Bunche CHS met our CAST proficiency goal for our SWD subgroup. Our 2% performance was double our 1% growth goal. While this still meets the growth goal, we are continuously working to improve these for next year. While ARB did not meet for All, SED, Latinx, or EL, we were close with three of those subgroups:

All: 16% vs 17.8%. Missed by 1.8%

SED: 16% vs 17.8%. Missed by 1.8%

Latinx: 16% vs 17.3%. Missed by 1.3%

Across those 3 subgroups, we missed our performance goals by less than 2%. Ánimo Ralph Bunche did not have enough data for three subgroups: AA, SWD, and Foster. In addition, this last year the students that took it were both in the 11th and 12th grade. The 12th graders did not have adequate exposure or understanding of this test which impacted our overall scores.

Ánimo Ralph Bunche CHS has no current data for this metric of reclassifying EL students. But in the baseline year of 2019-20, the ELPAC was still new to many and the ELPAC rigor compared to the previous CELDT test was a significant increase. This impacted our reclassification rates as students and ELD teachers adjusted. With adjustment in instruction and increased exposure to ELPAC stems and formats, we are hoping to exceed this next years goal of increasing by 3%.

Ánimo Ralph Bunche managed to be at a rate above the local district rate for ELPI levels. Last year, our designated ELD classes were able to do more ELPAC prep in their classes. Students analyzed their scores and set goals for themselves. Teachers used released materials to review with the students to familiarize them with the test and materials and prepare them mentally as well as academically.

Ánimo Ralph Bunche CHS had no current data for either the CORE SGP ELA or MATH but did meet the metric goals in our baseline year of 2018-19. For ARB, the CORE ELA score sat at 74% versus the 50% goal and with CORE MATH we performed at 54% over the 50% goal. This year we have focused on overall student engagement and discourse in all their classes, the lack of engagement a symptom from the almost two years of distance learning. This is something that we hope would impact these numbers.

An explanation of material differences between Budgeted Expenditures and Estimated Actual Expenditures and/or Planned Percentages of Improved Services and Estimated Actual Percentages of Improved Services.

There were no material differences between the budgeted expenditures and estimated actual expenditures for this goal.

An explanation of how effective the specific actions were in making progress toward the goal.

Ánimo Ralph Bunche CHS had some successes with the EL, Foster Youth, and Homeless Youth subpopulations in the SBAC ELA but the overall performance was a decrease of 10% from the previous year. While there were efforts to increase exposure of SBAC to teachers and students this was not enough to match our rates to previous years nor the district. While we will celebrate our improvements, there is still a lot of work to be done to get students back on track to proficiency.

Ánimo Ralph Bunche CHS had some successes with the EL and Homeless subpopulations and we outpaced growth goals by 7%, there is still an overall decrease by 4% for the whole of the grade level. ARB did not meet growth goals for three subgroups: All, SED, and Latinx. This year there was more intensive exposure to the SBAC for the 11th grade teachers in the form of pull outs and support from MATH curriculum specialists but this was not enough to meet our growth goal.

Ánimo Ralph Bunche CHS met our CAST proficiency goal for our SWD subgroup and our 1% growth goal. Overall the CAST test is overshadowed by the SBAC ELA and MATH. This year we needed to do a deeper dive into this test to unpack it the way we have done with other standardized tests. While this is the case, our students still were relatively close to meeting their goals. With further understanding and exposure to the CAST, the teachers and students will be more prepared this upcoming year.

Ánimo Ralph Bunche CHS has no current data for the metric of reclassifying EL students as of the writing of this LCAP narrative. This last year there was an increase in reclassification through the IEP process which have yet to be reflected in the numbers. As the final numbers surface, we are hopeful that this last year there we were able to meet the growth goal but that is yet to be determined.

Ánimo Ralph Bunche CHS is working to increase EL proficiency and growing ELPI levels. This year we were not able to improve our EL performance to maintain the same distance from the LAUSD baseline of 6% back in 2018-19. Our efforts to increase designated supports and increased exposure to ELPAC formats and materials, need to be ramped up to improve our ELPI levels. Again, like so many other things post pandemic, student capacity and engagement are still a focus and we hope these continued efforts will pay off.

Ánimo Ralph Bunche CHS has focused on overall student engagement and discourse in all their classes and the hope is that an increase in engagement along with standards aligned lessons will increase the CORE growth percentile in ELA and MATH.

A description of any changes made to the planned goal, metrics, desired outcomes, or actions for the coming year that resulted from reflections on prior practice.

At Ánimo Ralph Bunche there are many intentional adjustments that will be made as a result of reflecting on our current and prior practices. There will be a big shift in how we expose our entire staff to the SBAC as this test is a reflection of all the classes in the previous grades and not just the 11th grade teachers. Staff will work on articulating the vertical alignment of content and soft skills in 9th and 10th grade as it leads to their 11th grade SBAC year. In 11th grade, the intentional and regular exposure and weaving in of SBAC skills earlier in the 11th grade year will better prepare students. ARB's instructional PD's will be focused on better backwards planning from standards aligned assessments, increased focus on classroom data to inform the teacher's practice, and increased student engagement and discourse. To support our SWDs there will be increased support from the Home Office and more frequent check-in with the department to address their needs and progress. As for EL's, we will plan for increased Home Office support to utilize the expertise of our EB coordinator to improve our designated teachers practice and understanding of the ELPAC. Our hopes are that with these intentional shifts and instruction and rigor, it will improve this category, across-the-board.

There was a change made to Action 2.3 – Special Education. During the pandemic, students with disabilities had access to transportation in order to provide services per their Individualized Education Plan (IEP). Transportation was provided for students with disabilities because in SY 2020-21, distance learning was in full effect, and these students needed access to IEP services. Since the pandemic, SY2021-22 was the first full year of in-person instruction and IEP services were provided on campus.

Goal Analysis [2022-23]

An analysis of how this goal was carried out in the previous year. A description of any substantive differences in planned actions and actual implementation of these actions.

A strength for Ánimo Ralph Bunche CHS is with our Low Cohort Dropout rate. We met our cohort dropout rate for the four subgroups where we had data: All (1%), SED (1%), Latinx (0%), and EL (0%).

Ánimo Ralph Bunche CHS exceeded cohort graduation growth rates for our subgroups. The numbers surpassed the targets by 9-10%. All Students, SED and Latinx subgroups surpassed the targeted growth rate of 85%. They achieved rates of 94% (All Students), 94%(SED) and 95% (Latinx). The EL subgroup also posted a strong 92% rate versus their 83% targeted rate. Ánimo Ralph Bunche is above the district's average for all of these subgroups. Ánimo Ralph Bunche did not have enough data for four subgroups: AA, SWD, Homeless, or Foster.

Ánimo Ralph Bunche struggled with the A-G completion metric. We did not meet our A-G completion growth goals for any of our subgroups. However, we missed the mark by 9% for All Students, SED, and Latinx subgroups. We have created initiatives to improve this for next year. The performance of SED and Latinx subgroups at Ánimo Ralph Bunche were both slightly higher than the district's averages.

Ánimo Ralph Bunche CHS met the AP passage rate for the three subgroups: All Students, SED, and Latinx. This is a bright spot with our performance, surpassing our targeted goals by double: All StudentsI: 49% vs 24% SED: 49% vs 22% Latinx: 49% vs 22%

ARB did not perform very well the year of distance learning, but upon return, our AP numbers were able to increase. Our most successful AP class was AP Spanish.

Ánimo Ralph Bunche did not have enough data in the College/Career Indicator metric from the last two years. However, during our baseline year, ARB's data was slightly above the baseline data for LAUSD by 2-3%.

An explanation of material differences between Budgeted Expenditures and Estimated Actual Expenditures and/or Planned Percentages of Improved Services and Estimated Actual Percentages of Improved Services.

There were no material differences between the budgeted expenditures and estimated actual expenditures for this goal.

An explanation of how effective the specific actions were in making progress toward the goal.

Ánimo Ralph Bunche has been successful with a low cohort dropout rate and graduation growth rates. This is greatly attributed to our advisory program, and a culture of restorative practices and increased SEL and mental health supports.

Ánimo Ralph Bunche has struggled with the A-G completion largely due to combating the impact of distance learning. Many students found themselves struggling and unsuccessful during distance-learning. Upon our return to school last year, we had to deal with the effects of distance learning, such as lack of participation, decrease in passing grades, and gaps in learning.

Ánimo Ralph Bunche has success in the AP passage rate largely because of our AP Spanish cohorts. This is something that is not reflected in the data, however, our goal is to increase AP passage rates in all of the other AP courses that we offer.

Ánimo Ralph Bunch's college/career indicator data is not available as this narrative is being written, however, our efforts to increase our AP scores, graduation rates, SBAC scores, and an overall focus of increased rigor should yield positive percentages in our performance.

A description of any changes made to the planned goal, metrics, desired outcomes, or actions for the coming year that resulted from reflections on prior practice.

At Ánimo Ralph Bunche, there will be intentional adjustments made as a result of reflecting on our current practices. We will maintain with our practices that have yielded results and there will be an increased focus on mental health supports to continue to combat the impacts of the pandemic, increased rigor in the classroom through stronger backwards planning, administering mock AP exams, and SBAC vertical alignment, will support our improvements in this category. ARB intends to implement all the necessary teaching strategies, programs, interventions and supports to increase our overall proficiency and effectiveness.

Metrics 3F – CTE, 3G– CTE & A-G, and 3H – EAP, were added to be aligned with state requirements. The metrics were not added the year before because there is no data available for Metrics 3F and 3G. Currently, there is no data available because the school does not offer an approved CTE pathway. As for Metric 3H – EAP, there is no data available for SY20-21 and SY21-22 because the graduating classes of 2021 and 2022 did not test in the 11th grade due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The class of 2020 was the last class to have tested in the 11th grade. The data for the 2020 class was used as the baseline for the metric 3H – EAP.

Goal Analysis [2022-23]

An analysis of how this goal was carried out in the previous year. A description of any substantive differences in planned actions and actual implementation of these actions.

Ánimo Ralph Bunche CHS did not meet the ADA goal for any of the subgroups. Despite not meeting our goal, we were extremely close with six of our subgroups: EL and SWD both achieved 87% ADA, just 3% off the targeted goal of 90%; All Students and SED both achieved 88% ADA, just 2% off the targeted goal of 90%; Latinx and Homeless Youth both achieved 89% ADA, just 1% off the targeted goal of 90%. The trends at Ánimo Ralph Bunche aligned with those of other high schools in the district, with a majority of those campuses (between 60-80%) not meeting targeted goals for each metric. This is undoubtedly a result of distance learning and the pandemic. Students staying home because of COVID, being in close contact and quarantining, being fearful of getting COVID, or being a little sick and staying home for precaution has impacted our ADA. A lack of motivation or being credit deficient due to distance learning has also been a factor.

Ánimo Ralph Bunche CHS did not meet our Chronic Absenteeism goals for the majority of subgroups. The exception was Foster Youth, where we were proud to have a 0% Chronic Absenteeism rate. Ánimo Ralph Bunche was close to meeting its goal with two subgroups: EL had a 34% chronic absenteeism rate which represents good progress toward the 23.2% targeted rate; AA had a 67% chronic absenteeism rate, nearly meeting their 63.7% targeted rate. In addition to Ánimo Ralph Bunche, other high schools in our district also struggled with chronic absenteeism. This is undoubtedly a result of distance learning and the pandemic. Students staying home because of having COVID, being a close contact and quarantining, being fearful of getting COVID, or being a little sick and staying home out of precaution has impacted our chronic absenteeism rate. A lack of motivation or being credit deficient due to distance learning has also been a factor.

Ánimo Ralph Bunche CHS is proud of our decrease in suspension rate rate. Our performance was significantly better than our targeted goal for all of our subgroups. Four subgroups (All, SED, Latinx and EL) had a suspension rate of 1%, well below the 5% goal. And two subgroups (SWD and Homeless) had a suspension rate of 0%.

Ánimo Ralph Bunche CHS performed well in maintaining a low expulsion rate as well, meeting our goal with a 0% expulsion rate across all subgroups.

An explanation of material differences between Budgeted Expenditures and Estimated Actual Expenditures and/or Planned Percentages of Improved Services and Estimated Actual Percentages of Improved Services.

There were no material differences between the budgeted expenditures and estimated actual expenditures for this goal.

An explanation of how effective the specific actions were in making progress toward the goal.

Ánimo Ralph Bunche struggled with both ADA and chronic absenteeism. However, our ADA was not too far off being 1 to 2% off the targeted goal for our categories. For chronic absenteeism, there is a lot of room for growth, given that we didn't meet our goal for a majority of our sub

groups. In order to address chronic absenteeism and average daily attendance, we need to diversify our efforts and come together to create a more comprehensive plan. While we did add an additional counselor to our team and increased reach outs to students and families, we still have room for improvement.

As for Ánimo Ralph Bunche's low suspension rates and low expulsion rates, this is largely attributed to our strong advisory program and restorative practices. We have invested in different programs and resources to diversify our responses to misbehaviors, infractions, and various SEL needs. As a school, we have devoted a lot of time and effort to create and refine a discipline matrix that helps teachers understand their responsibilities in the classroom and their options outside of the classroom to respond to and get support around a student's behavior. Our staff also prides itself in the connections that they have built with their students in advisory, in the classroom, and in extracurriculars.

A description of any changes made to the planned goal, metrics, desired outcomes, or actions for the coming year that resulted from reflections on prior practice.

Ánimo Ralph Bunche will make changes around increasing our ADA and decreasing our chronic absenteeism through combined efforts through all educational partners. As we begin to rebuild our connections with community based organizations and our parents are finding themselves with more opportunities to be on campus, our success will be largely based on our ability to involve different educational partners in this matter. We can bring these challenges to Coffee with the Principal, brainstorm with our staff to come up with systems of support and incentives, and bring in CBO's who have had success with case management or bringing creative solutions to issues of attendance. As a school staff, we will continue with our advisory programs and strengthen student relationships, but we will work on building stronger relationships with parents and organizations that can help support student and family needs.

An analysis of how this goal was carried out in the previous year. A description of any substantive differences in planned actions and actual implementation of these actions.

Ánimo Ralph Bunche met the target goal of hosting 4 SAC meetings and 2 DELAC meetings during the school year.

97% would recommend Ánimo Ralph Bunche to a friend. This metric speaks volumes about how positively our families view our school. Not only is this number well above the 80% goal, but it also continues an upward trend over the last 3 years.

The perception of the staff at Ánimo Ralph Bunche CHS was nearly as favorable as that of our families. In their survey, 93% of staff gave a positive rating about their feelings of success, professional development, student growth, and enjoyment levels on the job. Again, this number is comfortably in front of the 80% goal.

An explanation of material differences between Budgeted Expenditures and Estimated Actual Expenditures and/or Planned Percentages of Improved Services and Estimated Actual Percentages of Improved Services.

There were no material differences between the budgeted expenditures and estimated actual expenditures for this goal.

An explanation of how effective the specific actions were in making progress toward the goal.

Ánimo Ralph Bunche met the target goals for the SAC and DELAC meetings due the regularity of those meetings. As a school we work really hard to maintain positive parent relationships and give multiple opportunities for parents to engage in school decision making.

Ánimo Ralph Bunche has always been a beacon to the neighborhood, inviting parents on campus for various community events and this last year we have been able to return to some of those events. Our educational partners are very important to us and our success; and we will continue to use the strengths of our staff to stay connected.

Ánimo Ralph Bunche has a strong staff culture. The staff as a whole have been supportive of one another through the pandemic and definitely upon return. Our strength as a school lies with the belief in the strength of the collective and that we cannot do this job alone.

A description of any changes made to the planned goal, metrics, desired outcomes, or actions for the coming year that resulted from reflections on prior practice.

We will continue to do many of the things that we have been doing. The main adjustment to the coming year is to increase community events to bring together the surrounding community based organizations, politicians, resources, families, to create a stronger sense of a neighborhood school.

We added metric 5E-Parent Participation to capture the participation of all parents, including parents of our unduplicated students. Parents are engaged through various activities such as SAC, DELAC, Coffee with the Principal, Back to School Nights, Open House, Parent Conferences, Professional Developments and other school activities. For this metric, the school did not meet the goal. COVID-19 had a tremendous impact on social gatherings. Since our return to in-person instruction and meetings, parents have been hesitant to participate in meetings due to the fear of COVID. The school is currently exploring hybrid avenues for parent meetings. The school wants to provide parents with the opportunity to join meetings in-person and online. Also, the school is exploring tools to centralize parent sign-in for meetings. The school currently uses a mixture of online forms and paper-forms to capture parent sign-in. The school will continue to explore tools and programs that can centralize parent participation data. The school is committed to improving and capturing its parent participation in school activities.

For the goal of not meeting 80% for parents who would recommend the school to a friend, we did not send out the survey to families and that is why we received 0%. This upcoming school year, we plan to send it out to families so that we can reach our goal and gain insightful feedback from parents.

Required Descriptions

For each action being provided to an entire school, or across the entire school district or county office of education (COE), an explanation of (1) how the needs of foster youth, English learners, and low-income students were considered first, and (2) how these actions are effective in meeting the goals for these students.

Given the high percentage of unduplicated pupils at the school, the funds will be spent on improving the charter-wide educational program and meeting the academic goals specified earlier in the LCAP. The needs of low-income students are largely met based on the charter-wide educational model, with additional services provided for foster youth and Emergent Bilinguals. In order to meet the needs of its diverse student population the school will implement Green Dot's academic model with fidelity.

The model outlines the framework that allows Green Dot teachers and administrators to be successful and focuses on four key elements: 1) Ensuring Quality Teaching and Instruction, 2) Cultivating a College-going Culture, 3) Eliminating Barriers to Learning, and 4) Promoting Leadership and Life Skills. Implementation strategies are provided in the areas of curriculum, student intervention, professional development, parent participation and school operations to help principals and teachers make the most informed decisions for their schools.

1. Ensuring Quality Teaching & Instruction: Dedicated, effective teachers with a passion for their work and their students are at the heart of the Green Dot model. Green Dot ensures high quality teaching and instruction in every classroom through its research-based methods of instruction, teacher effectiveness initiatives and robust professional development and support. The College-Ready Teaching Framework

("CRTF") – a rubric that defines the core competencies expected of all Green Dot teachers is the foundation of the evaluation system. In addition, teachers will be able to pursue professional development and coaching support from the Instructional Coaches as well as from the Green Dot Home Office Education Team.

2. Cultivating a College-going Culture: Green Dot strives to attain high college acceptance rates by creating a culture of college-for-certain. School leaders create systems for ongoing academic counseling with counselors and advisors and offering college tours at every grade level. In addition, the school master schedule offers elective courses that support core content development (i.e., drama), as well as pre-AP pathways (i.e., honors courses in high school). Courses are structured to build students' key cognitive strategies: intellectual openness, analysis, reasoning, accuracy and precision, and interpretation. School classrooms demonstrate the successful implementation of behavior management strategies. Support is provided to build key behaviors necessary for success in high school and college, such as self-monitoring, persistence, independent preparation abilities, and college-level study skills. Lastly, all Green Dot schools provide support to build students' contextual awareness of college systems and culture.

3. Eliminating Barriers to Learning: Students come to Green Dot from a variety of backgrounds. Academically, many are far behind gradelevel. Socially and emotionally, many require emotional guidance in order to be able to succeed academically. Green Dot strives to provide the academic intervention, counseling and clinical services necessary to break down these barriers. Green Dot school leaders successfully implement all three tiers of the Multi-Tiered System of Supports by appropriately providing intervention in Literacy, Math, English Language Development and Special Education. Green Dot schools offer an Advisory program that provides academic guidance, school culture & safety; college and career; and personal development. Additionally, each school provides a menu of wrap-around services: mental health supports and psychological services; counseling groups; mentoring programs; supports for foster youth and students experiencing homelessness; and links to community partners for health and wellness programs.

4. Promoting Leadership & Life Skills: Green Dot aims to provide students with a broad set of tools, behaviors and skills to prepare them for college and beyond. Systems for student leadership such as student government, student ambassador program, student mentorship, and the Principal's Advisory Committee give students internal leadership experience. External experience is available through partnerships with community programs, including public speaking opportunities, job shadowing, volunteer work, mentorships, and summer internships. Advisory programs teach and promote life skills and help to reduce dropouts, foster youth development, enhance academic achievement, and promote whole-being development.

A description of how services for foster youth, English learners, and low-income students are being increased or improved by the percentage required.

"The schools' educational program will successfully meet the needs of its foster youth, Emergent Bilinguals and low-income student population. Examples of theses supports include:

- Implementation of all three tiers of the Multi-Tiered System of Supports in Literacy, Math, English Language Development and Special Education
- Intensive interventions for students requiring additional enrichment and support, including Literacy Enrichment, Math Foundations, individualized tutoring, classroom push-in and co-teaching models and small strategic groupings
- An Advisory program for all students to prepare them with the tools and behaviors to succeed in high school, college, leadership and life – covering topics such as: academic preparation, promotion of college awareness, developing strong peer relationships, developing life skills in areas such as resilience/grit, growth mindset, organization, communication, health/nutrition and personal finance
- Integrated wraparound services to help address social and non-academic barriers to student learning including small group counseling and individual student counseling. Foster youth and students experiencing homelessness are provided services and supports tailored to their individualized needs including uniform and transportation assistance and navigation to community resources such as housing, food, and mental health services.
- Proactive and positive student behavior management, including various alternatives to suspension
- Opportunities for students to explore student leadership and other interests through participation in elective courses, student government, after-school programs and clubs
- Special education programs that cultivate collaboration between general and special education teachers to guarantee that students with disabilities are integrated into the school to the maximum extent possible to allow them full access to all programs.

The school has developed a research-based curriculum appropriate to the student demographics it serves that includes the following: course offerings, textbooks, curriculum maps, pacing guides, sample lesson plans, interim assessments and intervention programs. The model is derived from the following continuum of research-based practices:

• Planning and Preparation: Based on Essential Elements of Effective Instruction by Madeline Hunter. Madeline Hunter developed the teacher "decision-making model" for planning instruction known as Instructional Theory in Practice ("ITIP"). This approach to

teaching uses Direct Instruction ("DI") as the framework for planning. DI refers to a rigorously developed, highly scripted method that is fast-paced and provides constant interaction with students.

- Assessment and Learning: Based on Understanding by Design: Backwards Design by Jay McTighe and Grant Wiggins. The emphasis of Understanding by Design ("UbD") is on ""backward design,"" the practice of identifying the desired outcomes in order to design curriculum units, performance assessments and classroom instruction that will enable students to achieve these outcomes. The backward design approach is developed in three stages. Stage 1 starts with educators identifying the desired results of their students by establishing the overall goal of the lessons by using content standards, common core or state standards. Stage 2 focuses on evidence of learning by assessment. Teachers plan performance tasks and evidence of understanding. Performance tasks determine what the students will demonstrate in the unit and what evidence will prove their understanding. This can include self-reflections and self-assessments on learning. Lastly, Stage 3 lists the learning activities that will lead students to the desired results.
- Instructional Techniques: Based on Teach Like a Champion by Doug Lemov. Teach Like a Champion offers effective teaching techniques to help teachers become champions in the classroom. Additional details provided in the section entitled "Instructional Design, Methods and Strategies."
- Classroom Environment: Based on "Safe and Civil Schools" by Randy Sprick. Safe & Civil provides high-quality programs and staff
 development services to help educators create proactive and positive behavior management strategies in schools. In addition, a
 focus on Restorative Practices provides schools with the resources to build community amongst staff and students. School site
 walk-throughs with administrators, teacher leaders and members of the Green Dot Home Office Education Team are scheduled
 regularly to observe discipline and school culture. Findings from these sessions are compiled to create school-specific professional
 development for teachers and the necessary support to create an environment where students can learn and where teachers can
 teach.
- Culturally Responsive Pedagogy: Green Dot Public Schools believes that culturally responsive pedagogy can increase student engagement, provide access to content, and as a result, bolster feelings of confidence and understanding in students. School leaders and teachers have read Zaretta Hammond's Culturally Responsive Teaching and the Brain and use her Ready for Rigor framework to work towards a culturally responsive classroom experience for all students.

Academic Support and Intervention is based on incoming student need and a schedule of intervention and acceleration courses will be available to students so that all students can complete the required courses:

- Summer Bridge: Summer Bridge is a recommended multi-week summer program that acclimates students to the culture of the school, high expectations and the development of a trusting community. During the Summer Bridge program, students will also be identified for special needs, English Learner levels, non-proficiency in standards and social-emotional supports, and staff will make the necessary adjustments to the master schedule to better accommodate them. Students receive standards-based instruction in Math and English Language Arts and are acclimated to the culture and expectations of the school. Students will engage in culture-building exercises that promote a positive community of trust and respect. Social and personal issues will also be surfaced in small group settings complemented with educational field trips.
- Literacy Intervention/Enrichment (Read 180): Literacy Intervention/Enrichment is a standards-aligned program for reading that is provided to students that test low in reading. Typically, this course is given to students through an elective class.
- Math Foundations: Students who are struggling in Math (not proficient and/or recommended by their Math teachers) will receive an additional period of Math support, where their teacher and tutors will work on skill building through their current curriculum, as well as remediation strategies to strengthen skills in group tutorial and one-on-one formats.
- Designated and Integrated English Language Development (ELD): Designated ELD classes are provided for all English Learner students and Integrated ELD is provided in all other content classes throughout the school day for Emergent Bilinguals. Designated ELD focuses on listening, speaking, reading and writing skills in English with the CA ELD Standards and Features of Designated ELD driving instruction. Integrated ELD focuses on academic content and English language skills in tandem so that Emergent Bilinguals practice English language skills with academic content in all classes.
- Special Needs/Academic Success: Designated SPED students will be provided extra support to reflect the needs outlined in the Individualized Education Plan (IEP) and in all of their academic courses through one-on-one instruction, group support and guided instruction.
- Homework Club: Students who are struggling with a particular class or want more support in a subject can attend Homework Club, which is offered an hour every day after school and run by a credentialed teacher and/or college interns.
- Office Hours: Teachers hold office hours twice a week before and after school to provide additional support.
- After School Program: Students who are not achieving a satisfactory grade within a particular class or simply want more support in a subject can attend tutoring, which is offered for an hour every day after school.

Social and Life Skills Development is a key component of the school meeting the diverse needs of its student population including the establishment of an advisory course and clinical services available to all students.

Students will participate in an Advisory class with the same group of students for their school career to maintain a tighter sense of community. Advisory serves as a structured time and space for students to reflect on their learning and to discuss the connection between learning and life-long success. Advisory activities are organized around four pillars: 1) school culture and safety, 2) academics, 3) social life skills and 4) civic engagement. During Advisory, students will:

- Discuss issues related to the pressures of being a young adult including but not limited to puberty, relationships, mental health, family, substance abuse, etc.
- Acquire different study skill strategies, test-taking strategies and communication tools that will enable them to succeed in their academic career.
- Learn about the college process as they are encouraged to think beyond middle and high school in an effort to realize that the tools they gain today will be beneficial in the near future
- · Gain self-efficacy skills that will allow them to address the barriers of learning with resiliency

We have built an Advisory course into the master schedule to serve as a level 1 intervention using the Multi-Tiered System of Supports(MTSS). Using the MTSS, all students receive the core literacy and math courses as their Tier 1 instruction. In addition to the core courses, students who need more intensive intervention (Tier 2) and support with a lower student-to-teacher ratio are provided with math and literacy interventions classes. If the student continues to struggle, the Grade Level team will determine if there are specific individual interventions (Tier 3) necessary to address the student's needs or if a referral to the Student Success Team is required.

Our Clinical Services team provides individual, group and family therapy to the students and families, and serves as a Tier 2 and 3 intervention within the MTSS Framework. The main purpose of our clinical services program is to address the barriers to learning from the mental health perspective. In addition, we provide crisis intervention, parent consultation, teacher consultation, and case management which include providing resources and referrals to outside agencies.

In order to ensure services are provided free of charge, services are provided by pre- and post- graduate Marriage and Family Therapy, Psychology and Social Work interns who receive extensive training and supervision in exchange for their work. All services are supervised by one of our licensed Marriage and Family Therapists or Licensed Clinical Social Workers. Interns provide social and emotional counseling including small group and individual therapy.

The School Mental Health Services team uses a referral process for students to receive services. Once students and parents have consented to services, students will work with a School Mental Health Therapist or School Mental Health Intern (under the supervision of a Licensed Mental Health provider) that follows them through the process of services, and provides mental health services. Students are provided with assessments that measure symptoms of depression, anxiety, & trauma, along with other evidenced-based interventions during clinical psychotherapy. The School Mental Health Services team works with parents, staff, and students throughout the referral process to ensure they are aware of their options. School Mental Health Services provides a proactive approach to addressing the barriers of learning by utilizing prevention and wellness to enable our students to possess the necessary skills to navigate their academic and social skills.

The school will improve its entire educational program by investing in additional technology to increase its ratio of students to computers, additional special education services to support high needs students, and instructional material to increase support for classroom learning experience.

- The school will offer a spectrum of special education services that may include a resource program and special day program. The programs are designed to foster a high-quality program for students with special education needs. Additionally, our special education programs cultivate collaboration between general and special education teachers to guarantee that students with disabilities are integrated into the school to the maximum extent possible to allow them full access to all programs.
- The school will offer ELD courses to prepare Emergent Bilinguals recently arrived in the U.S. for success in English-medium instruction, including English Language Arts. Skills in all four strands of language listening, speaking, reading and writing are systematically developed. Students of mixed grade levels are grouped according to proficiency in English. Cultural knowledge needed for success in U.S. schools is integrated throughout. The Green Dot EL Master Plan includes the new CA ELD standards and a five step process for the identification of Emergent Bilinguals including: 1) Initial Identification, 2) EL Proficiency Assessment, 3) Primary Language Assessment, 4) Parent Notification, and 5) Program Placement. Green Dot schools provide on-going training for administrators and teachers on the identification process.
- All Emergent Bilinguals students are served in both Designated and Integrated ELD designed to meet their needs. Instruction is based on the CA ELD Standards and the Features of Designated and Integrated ELD. These programs are built into the school's

master schedule and take place within the school day. The school will work with the Human Resources (HR) Department to ensure appropriate staffing and authorizations for teachers in these courses.

• Technology is widely used at the school to drive higher levels of achievement and prepare students for the information driven economy of the 21st century. It is also used as a critical tool for gathering data for school management.

Technology investments will be made in the following areas:

- Increased computing devices (e.g., desktops, laptops, Chromebooks) that are available for student use;
- Each teacher is provided with a laptop and given training on effectively using technology in the classroom;
- · Courses often include web-based research projects and assignments;
- Technology elective classes are included in the recommended curriculum to train students on computers and different software programs; and
- A web-based student information and school management system is implemented at the school and used by parents, students and school staff "

A description of the plan for how the additional concentration grant add-on funding identified above will be used to increase the number of staff providing direct services to students at schools that have a high concentration (above 55 percent) of foster youth, English learners, and low-income students, as applicable.

The LEA received additional concentration grant funding due to its high percentage of unduplicated pupils, which is well above the 55% threshold for receiving these funds. The LEA has utilized the additional concentration grant add-on funding to hire and maintain staff at the school who provide direct services to students. We have used these funds to provide high impact tutoring services through the hiring of instructional aides, as well as to hire additional staff such as clinical supervisors, a homeless youth coordinator, attendance case managers, African American Support Specialists, push-in substitutes, and additional support staff to address the ongoing impact of COVID-19. Retention efforts for existing staff include increased mental health supports and additional professional development opportunities.

Goal 2, Actions 2.1, 2.2, 2.5 and 2.8 address this requirement, as well as Goal 3, Action 3.1, and Goal 4, Actions 4.1 and 4.2.

Goal N, Actions X, Y, and Z provide additional transportation and nutritional resources as well as a districtwide educational campaign on the benefits of high attendance rates. (Contributing Action[s])

These actions are being provided on an LEA-wide basis and we expect/hope that all students with less than a 100 percent attendance rate will benefit. However, because of the significantly lower attendance rate of low-income students, and because the actions meet needs most associated with the chronic stresses and experiences of a socio-economically disadvantaged status, we expect that the attendance rate for our low-income students will increase significantly more than the average attendance rate of all other students. (Measurable Outcomes [Effective In])
