Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of El Camino Real Charter High School (a nonprofit organization), which comprise the statement of financial position as of June 30, 2013, and the related statements of activities and cash flows for the year then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditors' Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America; the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States; and *Standards and Procedures for Audits of California K-12 Local Educational Agencies 2012-13*, issued by the California Education Audit Appeals Panel. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditors' judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the information is fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the financial statements taken as a whole.

Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards

MANAGEMENT'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS For the Year Ended June 30, 2013

The Management Discussion and Analysis section of El Camino Real Charter High School's (the School) financial report presents an overall review of the School's financial performance during the fiscal year that ended on June 30, 2013. Readers should also review the notes to the financial statements to enhance their understanding of the School's financial performance.

FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS

- Net assets increased \$3,369,334 or 101.0 percent over the course of the year.
- Total revenues received were \$28,325,638 for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2013.
- The School incurred \$24,956,304 in expenses for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2013.

OVERVIEW OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

This annual report consists of three parts – Management's Discussion and Analysis (this section), the basic financial statements, and the required supplementary information. The financial statements also include *notes* that explain some of the statements and provide more detailed data. The statements are followed by a section of *required supplementary information* that further explains and supports the financial statements.

FINANCIAL ANALYSIS OF THE SCHOOL

Net assets. The School's net assets of \$6,704,829 were greater on June 30, 2013 than they were the prior year, increasing by \$3,369,334 or 101.0 percent (See Table 1.) Table 1 provides a summary of the School's net assets for the fiscal years ended 2013 and 2012.

Net assets continued. Total assets were \$11,129,390, 4.0 percent in cash in banks and held in trust, 89.5 percent in accounts receivable, 2.9 percent in property and equipment, and 3.6 percent in prepaid expenses and deposits. Total liabilities were \$4,424,561. Current liabilities account for 100.0 percent of the total liabilities and consist of 11.2 percent in accounts payable, 1.8 percent in accrued payroll and payroll liabilities, 73.5 percent line of credit, 8.4 percent in deferred revenue and 5.1 percent in other current liabilities. Of the School's \$6,704,829 net assets, 100.0 percent were unrestricted.

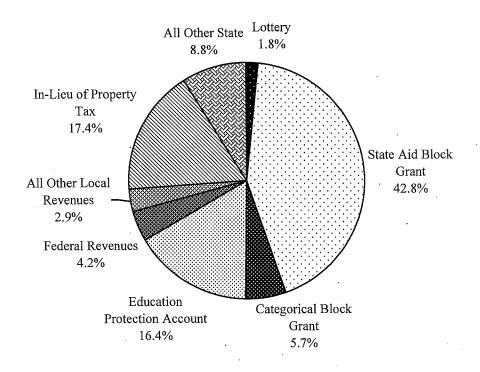
Governmental Activities

By the end of the fiscal year, the revenues for the School's activities totaled \$28,325,638. 42.8 percent was derived from state aid portion of general-purpose block grant, 16.4 percent from education protection account and 5.7 percent from categorical block grant. 17.4 percent was derived from cash in-lieu of property taxes and 1.8 percent from state lottery funds. 4.2 percent was derived from federal funds. The remaining 11.7 percent was from all other revenue sources.

El Camino Real Charter High School's Revenues for Fiscal Year 2013

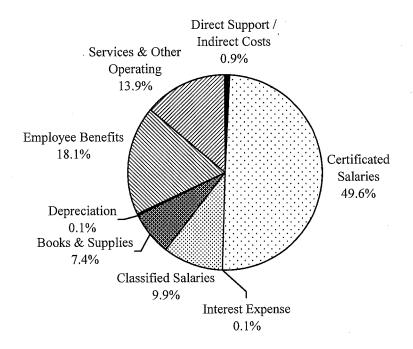
Analysis of Revenue Sources

The cost of all the School's major activities: Instruction, guidance, counseling, evaluation, school leadership, administration, maintenance and operations was \$24,956,304. \$20,158,058 or 80.8 percent were program service expenses, while \$4,798,246 or 19.2 percent were management and administrative support and fundraising expenses.

General Budgetary Highlights

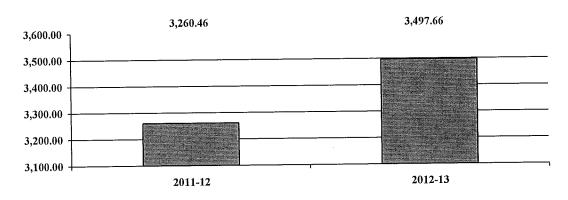

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

NOTE 1 – SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Nature of Activities - El Camino Real Charter High School (the School) is a California non-profit public benefit corporation and is organized to manage and operate a public charter school, serving students in grades nine through twelve. The School is funded principally through State of California public education monies received through the California Department of Education and the Los Angeles Unified School District.

The Los Angeles Unified School District (the District) is the chartering authority for the School. California Education Code section 47604(c) states that the District shall not be liable for the debts or obligations of the charter school. The District granted the School its first charter in May 2011. The current charter granted is for the period from August 15, 2011 to June 30, 2016.

Charters may be revoked by the District for material violations of the charter, failure to meet pupil outcomes identified in the charter, failure to meet generally accepted standards of fiscal management, or violation of any provision of the law.

Basis of Accounting - The financial statements of the School have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting and accordingly reflect all significant receivables, payables, and other liabilities.

Basis of Presentation - The School presents its financial statements as a California Non-Profit Public Benefit Corporation in accordance with Financial Accounting Standards which govern generally accepted accounting principles for non-profit organizations.

The School is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets: unrestricted net assets, temporarily restricted net assets, and permanently restricted net assets.

Net assets of the School consist of the following:

- Unrestricted: All resources over which the governing board has discretionary control to use in carrying on the general operations of the School.
- Temporarily restricted: These net assets are restricted by donors to be used for specific purposes. The School does not currently have any temporarily restricted net assets.
- Permanently restricted: These net assets are permanently restricted by donors and cannot be used by the School. The School does not currently have any permanently restricted net assets.

Revenue Recognition - Amounts received from the California Department of Education are recognized as revenue by the School based on the average daily attendance (ADA) of students. Grant revenues are recognized as related grant expenses are incurred.

NOTE 1 – SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

Cash and Cash Equivalents - For purposes of the Statement of Cash Flows, the School considers all highly liquid investments with an initial maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents. The School has established a trust account for the activities of its Associated Student Body (ASB). The account is maintained by the School with an offsetting liability for those funds.

Receivables - Accounts receivable consists primarily of amounts due from state, federal and local governments. Management believes all of these amounts are collectible; therefore, no provisions for uncollectible accounts were recorded.

Deferred Revenue – Deferred revenue results from the School's foreign exchange student program recognizing the revenue in the period in which the related educational instruction is performed. Accordingly, revenues received for the next school year are deferred until the instruction commences.

Property and Equipment - Property and equipment are stated at cost if purchased or estimated fair value at date of donation. Depreciation is provided using the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the assets. Additions and betterments of \$1,000 or more are capitalized, while maintenance and repairs that do not improve or extend the useful lives of the respective assets are expensed currently. For additional information, see Note 6.

Use of Estimates - Management uses estimates and assumptions in preparing financial statements. Those estimates and assumptions affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, the disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities, and the reported revenues and expenses. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Functional Allocation of Expenses - The cost of providing various programs and other activities have been summarized on a functional basis in the Statement of Activities. Accordingly, certain costs have been allocated among the programs and supporting services benefited.

Contributions and Grants – All contributions are considered to be available for unrestricted use unless specifically restricted by the donor. Amounts received that are designated for specific use in future periods are reported as temporarily restricted. When the restriction expires, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets for expenditure. The School also receives a portion of its total revenue and support under various grants which pay the School based on reimbursable costs as defined by the grants. Reimbursements recorded under these grants are subject to audit by the granting agency. Management believes that no material adjustments will result from subsequent audits of costs reflected in the accompanying financial statements.

NOTE 1 – SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

Income Taxes - The School is exempt from federal and state income tax under 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code and Section 23701(d) of the California Revenue and Taxation Code. However, income from certain activities not directly related to the School's tax-exempt purpose is subject to taxation as unrelated business income. In addition, the School qualifies for the charitable contribution deduction under Section 170(b)(1)(A) and has been classified as an organization other than a private foundation under Section 590(a)(2). Accordingly, no provision for income taxes has been reflected in these financial statements.

NOTE 2 – CONCENTRATION OF CREDIT RISK

Cash balances held in banks are insured up to \$250,000 by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC). The School maintains its cash in bank deposit accounts that at times may exceed federally insured limits. The School has not experienced any losses in such accounts. At June 30, 2013, deposits in excess of the FDIC limit amount to approximately \$185,000. Management believes the School is not exposed to any significant credit risk related to cash.

NOTE 3 – EMPLOYEE BENEFIT PLANS

Qualified employees are covered under multiple-employer defined benefit pension plans maintained by agencies of the State of California. Certificated employees are members of the State Teachers' Retirement System (STRS); classified employees are members of the California Public Employees' Retirement System (CalPERS).

State Teachers' Retirement System (STRS)

Plan Description

The School contributes to the State Teachers' Retirement Systems (STRS), a cost-sharing multiple-employer public employee retirement system defined benefit pension plan administered by STRS. The plan provides retirement, disability, and survivor benefits to beneficiaries. Benefit provisions are established by state statutes, as legislatively amended, within the State Teachers' Retirement Law. STRS issues a separate comprehensive annual financial report that includes financial statements and required supplementary information. Copies of the STRS annual financial report may be obtained from the STRS, 7667 Folsom Boulevard, Sacramento, California 95826.

Funding Policy

Active plan members are required to contribute 8.0 percent of their salary and the School is required to contribute an actuarially determined rate. The actuarial methods and assumptions used for determining the rate are those adopted by the STRS Teachers' Retirement Board. The required employer contribution rate for the fiscal year 2012-2013 was 8.25 percent of annual payroll. The contribution requirements of the plan members are established and may be amended

State Teachers' Retirement System (STRS) (Continued)

by State statute. The School's required contributions to STRS for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2013 and 2012 was \$986,764 and \$888,608 respectively, and equals 100 percent of the required contributions for the year.

California Public Employees' Retirement System (CalPERS)

Plan Description

The School contributes to the School Employer Pool under the California Public Employees' Retirement System (CalPERS), a cost-sharing multiple-employer public employee retirement system defined benefit pension plan administered by CalPERS. The plan provides retirement and disability benefits, annual cost-of-living adjustments, and death benefits to plan members and beneficiaries. Benefit provisions are established by State statutes, as legislatively amended, within the Public Employees' Retirement Law. CalPERS issues a separate comprehensive annual financial report that includes required supplementary information. Copies of the CalPERS' annual financial report may be obtained from the CalPERS Executive Office, 400 P Street, Sacramento, CA 95814.

Funding Policy

Active plan members are required to contribute 7.0 percent of their salary and the School is required to contribute an actuarially determined rate. The actuarial methods and assumptions used for determining the rate are those adopted by the CalPERS Board of Administration. The required employer contribution rate for the fiscal year 2012-2013 was 11.417 percent of annual payroll. The contribution requirements of the plan members are established and may be amended by State statute. The School's required contributions to CalPERS for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2013 and 2012 was \$284,871 and \$209,554 respectively, and equals 100 percent of the required contributions for the year.

NOTE 4 – COMMITMENTS

In October 2012, the School signed a sole occupant agreement with the Los Angeles Unified School District (the District) for use of property located at 5440 Valley Circle Blvd., Woodland Hills, California. The agreement carries a term that coincides with the School's charter. The agreement does not require the School to pay a lease amount for the use of the property, but instead, the Schools pays a Pro Rata Share Charge based on the square feet used. This Pro Rata Share Charge paid to the District for the School for the year ended June 30, 2013 was \$146,818.

NOTE 5 – REVOLVING LINE OF CREDIT

The School has a \$4,500,000 revolving line of credit with Pacific Western Bank (PWB), of which \$1,250,000 was unused at June 30, 2013. Bank advances on the credit line are payable on October 15, 2013 and carry an interest rate of 1.0 percent over PWB's Base Rate, with a minimum rate of 5.0 percent per annum. The credit line is secured by substantially all assets of the School.
