Valerie Chapman.




Brewer Student Artists Shine at School Holiday Craft Fair



In December, Edna Brewer Middle School held its much-anticipated Holiday Craft Fair, bringing together artisans from across the Bay Area to celebrate the talent and entrepreneurial spirit of Brewer students.

With more than 100 attendees, the fair buzzed with community spirit. Many students shared products crafted with their families. Additionally, proceeds from many of the vendors will directly benefit student-led projects such as the school's music program and the 8th grade trip to Costa Rica. "It's great for the whole school, but it's really wonderful for the students," said one participant. "They have the chance to express themselves and share their talents with the whole community, and maybe you'll find the perfect gift."

Frequent Assessments Key to Supporting Student Growth



In OUSD, our teaching is responsive to each student's needs. One way to accomplish this is through embedded assessments in both literacy and math for every student.

In the first six weeks of literacy instruction, for example, 4th graders - like those at **Garfield Elementary** pictured at left - engage in diverse activities to demonstrate their learning. Everything from writing informational paragraphs analyzing a central text to biographical essays on famous poets to original poetry is covered. Teachers then analyze all of this student writing to understand what they are learning and where they might need more support.



Attendance Update

Student Attendance Remains a Priority in OUSD Every Second Counts!

We are at an all time high rate of attendance completion at 99.60%, from 99.48% two weeks prior, districtwide. Over the last two weeks, student attendance completion continues to improve across our district with a total of **54 sites with 100% attendance completed by teachers, since the start of school (6 additional sites since our last update - Yay!)**

Highlighting **Burckhalter Elementary School** as one of our schools that continues to maintain **100% attendance completion, since 8/7/23-current**. Our highly skilled attendance specialist **Ivette Clark**, works diligently with **Principal Carin Geathers** to ensure that every student is counted and every second counts!

Best Practices & Areas of Improvement

Best Practices

- Teams drilling down on “Watch Lists” to track focal students on weekly/bi-weekly cycles.
- Sharing Family engagement duties amongst Attendance team members.
- Family Engagement Workshop to learn about importance of attendance on learning.
- Attendance Teams documenting attendance interventions in real-time during team meetings, or while meeting with families.
- Finding wins to celebrate our parents/families that currently have a higher attendance rate as compared to last year’s data.

Areas of Improvement

- Strengthen process to enter & monitor attendance interventions.
- Improve support & professional learning of Case Managers (in Secondary) to strategically support interventions.
- Improved system to clear unverified absences.
- 19% of students applying to Home Hospital are due to School Avoidance (Chronic Absenteeism).


- 120 Staff attended our attendance team summit - with time to reflect on their attendance goals, and make plans to finish the year strong.



Prevention Updates

- Partnering with City of Oakland Department of Violence Prevention (DVP) Grantees to increase and align partnerships to support violence prevention at 7 high schools, mentorship programming in middle schools, and create a pathway for support requests for all OUSD secondary students and families. Recently awarded grant to expand full-time staffing at current high schools.
- Collaborating with DVP, Newcomer Wellness Initiative, Human Trafficking Prevention, and Alameda County Department of Probation to build capacity for Violence Prevention support for Newcomer students
- Partnering with various organizations to provide Mental Health First Aid for educators to support with addressing student needs.
- Creating a relationship with the Alameda County Community Assessment and Transportation Team (CATT) for mental health de-escalation and assessment within the district.
- Coordinating with DVP to support OUSD students who have been released from the Juvenile Justice System with Life Coaches.
- Added Credible Messengers into select high Schools for intensive intervention with identified youth.





*Students can enroll in OUSD schools any time throughout the year, this is for budget and planning purposes.



Final Enrollment Established 2022-23


On the first Wednesday of October, OUSD finalizes it's enrollment count that will be used for projections for the following year.

Enrollment Projections Created for 2023-24

OUSD uses the enrollment from the previous year to set the enrollment projects for the following year based on demographic information and cohort progression modeling

Determining Students Attending 2023-24

During the first 4 weeks of school, on the 2nd, 5th, 10th, 15th and 20th day, OUSD schools count the number of students that have attended school and drop "no-shows". Classes are balanced and staffing levels are shifted depending on available seats.



Enrollment Cycle

Students are Assigned to Schools

Based on these projections and community applications, the Enrollment Office assigns students to schools and grade levels based on the number of "seats" available at each grade level. Students who don't get an initial offer are placed on a waitlist.

Families Confirm Enrollment in Schools

Families "Confirm" that student/s will attend the assigned school. For families that decide to not take the assigned seat, another students is moved into the "seat" from the waitlist.
