In order to remain in compliance with state class size requirements for special education services, the addition of one full-time special education teacher at the middle campus for the remainder of the 2015-16 school year is necessary. The increase in student FTEs has a corresponding increase in our funding allocation which will offset some of the costs of adding this position.

Date: January 15, 2016

The finance committee report this month reflects adjusted budget amounts that were agreed upon at the December board meeting. As expected most of the variances from previous months have been corrected with the budget adjustments. The budget variances that exist are explained below.

Professional Development: Title 2 funding was received this year which has allowed us to send several teachers to conferences that were not in the budget. Teachers were able to attend the School Reform conference in Miami and a Learning and the Brain conference in Boston. The expenses of these trips will be covered by Title 2 funding and Create funds.

Building and Grounds: This item is under budget as a large portion of this line item is for flooring repair at the middle campus. That work will not begin until May.

Fixed Asset expenditures: There will be approximately \$30k in bills coming through next month as expenses related to middle campus work that was completed over the winter break. We completed painting in the kitchen and upstairs walls doors and trim. The bathrooms were also renovated with the upgraded flooring, new fixtures and stalls.

Contingency funds: Contingency funds will begin being funded in January. In order to fully fund each of the contingency funds the budgeted amounts will be funded in 6 payments over the next 6 months.

Cash position

Cash balance is at \$1,433,188. As additional funds are added to the contingency funds they will be held in the Self Help Credit union account.

Georgia Milestones - Background

- Georgia one of many states to receive federal Race to the Top (RttT) funding
- As one condition of RttT, states had to develop tests tied to "college and career learning standards", a.k.a. Common Core
- Georgia chose not to participate in national consortium with common test and instead developed its own tests—the Milestones—which replace CRCT and high school tests
- All students in grades 3-12 took Milestones for first time in spring 2015
- Milestones data factors into schools' CCRPI scores; beginning this year, per state law, scores used for student promotion in grades 3, 5, & 8 and as factor in teacher and school leader evaluations

Georgia Milestones – 2015 Results

- Spring 2015 administration took place in April
- State released state-level scores in late September
- School-level scores publicly released week of November 16


Georgia Milestones – School Level Results

Students at ANCS...

- Exceeded state averages for students above "Beginning" level in all areas at all grade levels (statistically equal to state average for 6th & 7th grade social studies tests)
- Compared to state had greater percentage of students at the highest performance level—"Distinguished"—on ELA and Math on 16 out of 18 tests
- Were better prepared for the demands of the new standards and assessment when you consider:
 - The average percentage of students at "Distinguished" level: ANCS 15%, GA 9%
 - The average increase in the percentage of students *not passing* more rigorous 2015 Milestones as compared to 2014 CRCT in ELA and Math:
 - Grades 3-5: Avg increase ELA: ANCS 6%, GA 21%; Avg increase Math: ANCS 6%, GA 7%
 - Grades 6-8: Avg increase ELA: ANCS 11%, GA 22%; Avg increase Math: ANCS 8%, GA 10%

School Achievement Comparison - Grades 3-5


Georgia Milestones 2015 End of Grade Results School Achievement Comparison



School Achievement Comparison - Grades 6-8













State Percentile over Time



2015 Milestones State Percentile by Grade and Subject












State Percentile over Time

Other Student Level Data Trends

Students with IEPs or 504 plans

- •In math and ELA at several grade levels, percentage of students with IEPs or 504 plans passing Milestones approximately the same as grade level as a whole
- Percentage of ANCS students with IEPs or 504 plans passing Milestones test
 29% higher on average than average percentage of students with IEPs or 504 plans statewide

Students at ANCS for multiple years

•Students enrolled at ANCS for 2 or more years had higher passing rates on all tests than students new to the school (except for 7th grade math) and on average

Takeaways from School & Student Level Milestones Data

- •Jumps in ANCS state percentile rank when many other schools were flat or dropped suggest our program alignment with new tests
- •Across the board, ELA skills emerge as a strength, while there appears to be room for improvement in math skills at some grade levels
- •ANCS remains in top bracket of district performance for passing rate in ELA and math, but could see growth in percentage of students in Distinguished category on those tests
- Data suggests more focused attention needs to be given to skills development of some students who are new to ANCS and/or in meeting the learning needs of some students who come from poverty
- •Data suggest students with disabilities receive instruction and supports helping them to perform as well as other ANCS classmates and better than peers with disabilities at other schools

- Collaborating with KIPP Metro Atlanta Schools for comparative analysis of 2015
 MAP data at our schools for correlation with 2015 Milestones data and predictive information about 2016 Milestones

- Using collaboration time to tune our own student assessment rubrics so that students can be more appropriately challenged or supported
- •Continuing to give attention to the arts, social-emotional development, research skills, physical wellness, and other areas ANCS considers important that are not captured by Milestones, MAP, or other standardized tests

New Activities:
