I. Opening Items

A. Record Attendance

B. Call the Meeting to Order

M. Dudgeon called a meeting of the board of directors of State Charter Schools Commission of Georgia to order on Wednesday Jul 30, 2025 at 10:00 AM.

C. Approve Minutes

Motion to approve the minutes from June Board Meeting on 06-25-25. The board **VOTED** unanimously to approve the motion.

II. Division Reports

A. Executive Director

The Executive Director announced recent local charter school approvals for Richmond County and Clayton County.

In addition, the Executive Director highlighted the impact of Senate Bill 82 and noted that it makes \$250K incentive funding available to local boards that approve new charter schools. Further, he noted that the SCSC and the State Board of Education would be collaborating to establish rules to implement Senate Bill 82.

The Executive Director congratulated the new state charter schools opening this year and thanked the SCSC summer interns for their service and support of the agency.

B. SCSC Operations

The Deputy Executive Director and Chief Operating Officer shared information about the SCSC 's implementation of the new Epicenter platform and explained that email communications are forthcoming for schools about setting up their Epicenter profile. She also confirmed that the application to transfer the CSP grant from the State Charter Schools Foundation to the SCSC is pending review by the U.S. Department of Education.

C. New Schools Division

The Director of New Schools noted that there are 2 schools from this petition cycle for which we are awaiting a local decision. Those decisions are scheduled to be made by August 13, at which time the SCSC will know whether it will need to take action on these

petitions during its August meeting or whether no action will be taken because the schools were approved locally.

In addition, she announced that pre-opening planning with the schools approved today, if that occurs, will begin immediately after the meeting.

D. Legal Division

The Senior Associate General Counsel announced the dates and deadlines for this year's monitoring cycle. For additional questions about state charter school monitoring, contact Tiffany Leach directly.

E. School Support & Outreach Division

The Senior Director for School Support & Outreach updated us on the total amount of CSP funds granted this year (\$16.9M) and participation in various CSP cohort programs. She noted that participants for this year will be announced at the August SCSC meeting. She also responded to questions from the Chairman about how schools are using CSP funds.

She also noted that CSP monitoring is now underway.

F. Finance Division

The Senior Director of Finance reported that all but two schools selected auditors from the SCSC's Independent Auditor program and that related contracts have been finalized. She also announced that the Finance Division will check in with auditors this year to understand any challenges they are experiencing in receiving documents and information from state charter schools.

The Senior Director provided updates on the State Board of Education's approval of federal Title funds and noted that the Finance team is working on calculating the state charter school administrative withhold return amount.

The Chairman emphasized the importance of completing audits in a timely manner and noted that the SCSC will be considering how to address the trend of late audit submissions.

III. Action Items

A. Petition Approval Recommendation - The Meliora School

- S. Sweeney made a motion to approve to staff recommendation.
- B. Brockway seconded the motion.

The Board Chair and School Leader for The Meliora School expressed gratitude for the staff recommendation and for the opportunity to expand opportunities for Georgia students and the Gwinnett community.

Commissioner Sweeny noted how challenging it is to develop a new charter school. Commissioner Brockway added that he is excited to see this school become operational and urged school representatives to keep their focus on students.

The board **VOTED** unanimously to approve the motion.

B. Petition Approval Recommendation - Northwest Georgia Charter Academy

- B. Brockway made a motion to accept the staff recommendation.
- S. Sweeney seconded the motion.

The Founder and School Leader of Northwest Georgia Charter Academy thanked the SCSC board and staff for reviewing and recommending the petition and the consultants and teams that helped the school get to this point. The School Leader explained that the school will offer a strong, evidence-based, student-centered educational option that will earn the trust and confidence of its stakeholders.

Commissioner Brockway discussed the value of public school choice throughout the state and expressed excitement about the school's location outside of metro Atlanta.

Commissioner Sweeny described circumstances where parents have to move to find options to serve the needs of unique students and the value this approval will add. The board **VOTED** unanimously to approve the motion.

C. Petition Denial Recommendation - Harvest Academy

- B. Brockway made a motion to approve the staff recommendation.
- S. Sweeney seconded the motion.

School representatives discussed their support for Harvest Academy, congratulated the schools that earned approval votes from the commission, and shared their individual experiences with charter schools. Both speakers asked the commission to reconsider Harvest Academy for authorization.

Chairman Dudgeon noted that the petition did not establish community engagement and excitement around the community the school will serve.

Commissioner Brockway urged Harvest Academy to take the feedback received from this process to refine and improve their petition if they choose to submit another petition. Commissioner Brockway acknowledged the need for these schools. The demand for charter schools is evidence. While this is a no for now, there could be a yes next time. He encouraged the school to keep working towards its goal.

The board **VOTED** unanimously to approve the motion.

IV. Closing Items

A. Adjourn Meeting











Academic CPF Designations



Average CCRPI Trends



- SCSC schools, on average, continued to outperform comparisons across CCRPI measures and grade bands.
- The magnitude of average outperformance shrank from ~5 to ~1 point.

SCSC staff have identified several factors, most of which fall into two broad themes:

- New Schools struggled
- State Charters struggled in Math




New Schools

Four (4) of the seven (7) schools that did not meet standards were first-year schools

- Across all CCRPI CPF measures, these four schools averaged a 16-point underperformance.
- The remaining cohort of SCSC schools averaged a 1.5-point outperformance.

Limited scores and tested grades obscure a holistic assessment

- Two (2) of the four (4) underperforming new schools only had two tested grades: 3rd and 4th. These students were in grades K and 1 during the pandemic.
- These two schools did not receive Progress scores.





New Schools – 2025 Milestones Update


• In their second year, all four schools not meeting standards saw Milestones improvement.





Math Performance: Elementary and Middle

- SCSC schools have struggled to improve students' math scores relative to their comparisons.
 - New Math standards in the 2023-2024 school year may have had a disparate effect on state charter schools.





Math Performance: End-of-Course Tests



- 2023-24 SY High School CCRI Progress Scores only included Algebra since the pandemic.
- Once American Lit is included in this measure again, high school progress scores will likely increase for state charter schools.

Identified Issues Summary



SCSC schools continued to outperform CPF comparisons on average, but the margin of outperformance shrank in the 2023-2024 school year. Areas of struggle for state charter schools were:

- New Schools
 - In their second year, the formerly new schools that did not meet academic standards improved in Milestones scale score across grade bands and subjects.
- Math
 - SCSC schools improved in math on average, though the state average also increased.




Milestones Trends Over Time



- Charts on the next several slides examine Milestones performance recovery post-COVID
- Compares the recovery of SCSC schools to the Statewide average.
- The percentage of students scoring at the Developing Learner level and Above is used as the measure of interest.

State Charter Schools had a slightly lower share of students in the Developing & Above range than the State average for grades 3, 4, and 5.

State Charter schools saw improvement in grades 3 and 5 in 2025.



Georgia Milestones Math End of Grade % Developing & Above




State Charter Schools had a slightly lower share of students in the Developing & Above range than the State average for grades 6, 7, and 8.

State Charters saw improvements in each of these grades for 2025.

State Charter Schools share of students in the Developing & Above range increased and was slightly higher than the State average for American Literature and Algebra.

State Charters share of students in the Developing & Above range fell slightly in Biology and US History



Geographic District Comparisons

A majority of state charter schools are outperforming the district in which they are located.

- 25 of 41 (61%) state charter schools serving elementary grades had a higher share of students scoring at developing learner and above across ELA and Math.
- 22 of 37 (59%) of state charter schools serving middle grades had a higher share of students scoring at developing learner and above across ELA and Math.
- 9 of 9 (100%) of state charter schools offering American Literature had a higher share of students scoring at developing learner and above. For Algebra, this figure was 11 of 18 (61%).
- Schools with no reported GMAS scores due to Too Few Students (TFS) could not be included in the figures above.

 - Challenging Student Population
- Major themes of solutions:
 - New Leadership and Organizational Adjustments
 - Training for Instructional Staff
 - Re-evaluation of Assessment Tools



Future Support for State Charter Schools

- Scholarship to GCSA Maximizing Student Success conference
 - Academic-focused sessions cover key skills and offer practical tips in school leadership and classroom instruction.
- Conducting Ongoing Academic Progress Monitoring
 - Existing process formalized and documented on website
 - Employed when signs of significant academic distress present themselves
- Exploring ways to offer future targeted supports for schools



Recommendation

SCSC staff recommend that the SCSC initiate the 2025-2026 renewal cycle by approving the renewal calendar as presented.

Rationale

Four state charter schools' contracts end on June 30, 2025, and thus these schools are eligible to submit a renewal application. Those schools are:

- Atlanta SMART Academy
- Liberty Tech Charter School
- Northwest Classical Academy
- SLAM Academy of Atlanta

The renewal cycle timeline mirrors that of previous years. The specific dates are as follows:

- September October 2025 Renewal Site Visits
- November 1, 2025 School Independent Financial Audits Due
- November 4, 2025 Renewal Application Released
- December 2025 GaDOE 2025-2026 School Year CCRPI Scores Released
- January 6, 2026

 Applications Due*
- January 27 29, 2026 Renewal Interviews
- February 11, 2026 Recommendations Letters Sent to Schools
- February 18, 2026 Recommendations Posted
- February 25, 2026 Commission Votes on Recommendations

Adoption of the FY26 Petition Timeline & Start- Up Petition Priorities

Recommendation

SCSC staff recommend that the State Charter School Commission Board of Commissioners vote to initiate the FY26 start-up petition cycle by approving the start-up and replication timeline and start-up petition priorities as presented.

Rationale

SCSC staff recommend that the SCSC approve the FY26 start-up and replication petition cycles as follows:

- Letter of Intent Available: October 1, 2025
- Petition Portal Opens: November 3, 2025
- Letter of Intent Deadline: December 31, 2025
- Petition Portal Closes (Submission Deadline): March 13, 2026 by 5:00 p.m.
- Interviews Begin: June 1, 2026
- Recommendation: Beginning at the July 2026 SCSC Commission Meeting

Additionally, SCSC staff recommend that the SCSC approve the FY26 start-up petition priorities as follows:

"Priority Area" is a location more than five miles from any operational charter school authorized to serve all or some of the same grade band(s) as the petitioner's proposed school, calculated as the most direct route measured in a straight line. If approved, a petition that plans to locate a charter school in a Priority Area must locate and serve students within a Priority Area during its first operational school year.

Approval of State Charter School Petition for The Academy for Innovation in Medicine (AIM).

Recommendation

SCSC staff recommend that the SCSC Board of Commissioners approve the petition for The Academy for Innovation in Medicine (AIM), authorizing the SCSC Chair to execute a charter contract for the operation of a state charter school for an initial term of five (5) years starting with the 2026-2027 school year.

Rationale

The petition and information provided by The Academy for Innovation in Medicine (AIM) meet all requirements of rule and law and indicate that the school can operate as a high-quality charter school consistent with the SCSC's mission and the education goals of Georgia. The petition demonstrated the school's ability to operate as an LEA and the governing board's capacity to oversee the school's LEA obligations. The proposed budget demonstrates fiscal feasibility. If approved, the school will be authorized to serve students in grades 6-12.
