


Update for October Board Meeting

We have continued to develop and align three key professional learning systems in service of these two priorities (see slides 4&5 for details)

- We have hired Shannon Wheatley, Lane 9 Consulting, to conduct Black student and staff focus groups, classroom walkthroughs, and to design a series of professional learning experiences to support our staff to better understand and take action on both of these priorities.
- Professional Learning Communities (PLCs) have been launched in both US and LS. We will use these learning structures to better understand and align curriculum, instruction, and assessments to the standards...and to explicitly examine and improve our instructional practices focused on African American students.
- Staff have begun to read and discuss [The Opportunity Myth](#), which lays an important foundation for understanding the importance of rigor and vertical alignment to the standards and, particularly, in relation to serving our African American students.
- Our upcoming Intercession PD arc will include sessions focused on looking at student data disaggregated by race; discussing [The Opportunity Myth](#), understanding identity and examining biases; and refining our equity problems of practice for 22-23. Thursday's session, led by the Curriculum Design Team, is focused on unpacking standards to improve writing across the curriculum in ELA, History Math, Science.
- We have updated and launched a new Teacher Coaching and Support system that includes the use of the [TNTP CORE Teaching Rubric](#), which explicitly looks for rigor in student work and student engagement. The administrative team will receive 6 training and coaching sessions from TNTP to support their coaching and support practices.




Our Students This Year - By Race




MAP Testing

MAP Fall 2022: Reading Quintile Achievement by Race




Reading: Achievement Quintile - By Race

■ High ■ High Average ■ Average ■ Low Average ■ Low


MAP Testing: Reading - Key Take Aways

- 50% of 6th grade and 54% of 10th grade students represent the top range of high average to high achievement levels.
- 29% of 8th grade and 42% of 12th grade students represent the bottom range low achievement levels.
- 31% of Black and 35% of Latino students fall within the range of low achievement levels as compared to 7% of white students.

Reading: Achievement Quintile - By Race

MAP Testing: Math - Key Take Aways

- The 6th grade represents the most equal distribution of scores across the range of quintile levels.
- 20% of 6th grade and 26% of 11th grade students represent the top range of high achievement levels.
- 33% of 9th grade and 40% of 12th grade students represent the bottom range low achievement levels.
- 36% of Black and 40% of Latino students fall within the range of low achievement levels as compared to 9% of white students.
