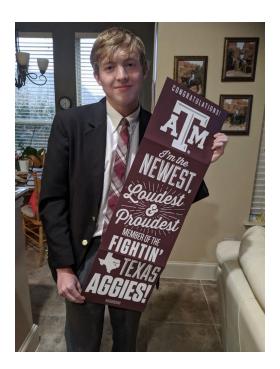


KSHS - Catherine Maclaine Marshall

KSHS - Chase Anderson

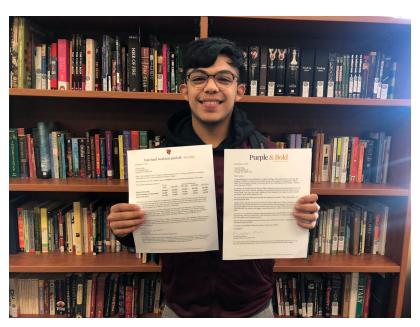
