#### Proposed Board Recommendation

I move that the board directs staff to take the necessary actions to close MSA Santa Clara by June 30, 2016 due to our inability to find facilities in close proximity to our student population.

#### Background

In June 2015, the Santa Clara Unified School District chose not to renew the lease Magnolia had of its school site. Magnolia had been searching for a new site during the previous year but had been unable to locate a site. In August 2015, Magnolia was able to secure a temporary location 13 miles from its previous site and kept the school open at a considerable loss that has been previously discussed. Unfortunately, the staff remained unable to find a new site and the enrollment generated at the temporary location is insufficient for the school to remain open. In May 2016, the board considered closing the school; however, at the urging of students and families, they extended the time to find a site. Since then, two potential sites have been sought but not come through.

As the Board of Directors prepares to make a determination on the future of Magnolia Science Academy-Santa Clara (MSA-Santa Clara), the proper steps need to be addressed and taken to ensure Magnolia Schools meet all requirements – both to our students and families, authorizers and the State of California. All legal, communications, and financial requirements are detailed in the action plan below.

# The goal of this memo is to provide clear steps to ensure a smooth transition should the board decide to permanently close MSA-Santa Clara.

#### **Communications**

The Outreach and Communications Team will spearhead the communications effort with the support of Larson Communications. We sent out letters to parents and staff, as well as held a teleconference call with parents and staff on Saturday, June 11, at 9am. As soon as the MPS board makes a decision we will send follow-up correspondence on Monday, June 13, at 9am. In addition, Alfredo will ensure that all internal and external partners are communicated with concerning this matter.

# MAGNOLIA PUBLIC SCHOOLS

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#### Financial

The Finance team will handle all communication with external auditors to properly explain the decision to close the school and what the overall financial impact will be to Magnolia Public Schools.

#### Facilities

The Facilities team will be in charge of all MSA-SC facility inventory, including ensuring that all furniture is transferred to the MPS storage warehouse.

#### Human Resources

The Human Resources team will speak with all staff members the week of June 13 regarding all options moving forward.

#### **Operations and Technology**

The Operations team will handle all aspects of technology and operations, which include working with the CDE on timely Calpads reporting, transfer of student records, among other things.

#### Legal

Our legal team will work closely with our Board of Directors and Home Office staff to ensure that all local, state, and federal regulatory laws are adhered to in alignment with our MSA-Santa Clara petition.

**Budget Implications:** 

The MSA-SC financial projections estimates an operating loss for the year totaling \$1.45 million primarily due to the decrease of revenues relating to low student enrollment, and a revenue write-off of \$406k of In-Lieu receivables based on the recommendation of our external auditors. MPS will continue to actively collect the In-Lieu of property taxes and will reflect the revenue as soon as the amounts are received.

#### Intra-Company Loan

In addition, MSA-SC incurred additional expenses to support the academic program and the Home Office provided operational loans totaling \$453.8k (as of April 30, 2016) and by waiving the CMO fees for fiscal year 2015-16.

Based on the current MSA-SC projections the school will require an additional capital infusion of \$438.9k to meet all remaining commitments relating to the equipment financing, reimbursement in State Aid overpayments, and other current liabilities. Additional expected liabilities are as follows:

Based on our current projections, the total MSA-SC intra-company loan is estimated to be at year end \$892.7k.

#### Impact of Closure on the Organization:

Based on a preliminary conversation with our external auditors, MSA-SC charter will need to close on or before June 30, 2016 in order to avoid a Going Concern Opinion. MPS' management is working closely with Vavrinek, Trine, Day, LLP in order to ensure that all closure requirements are met before the June 30<sup>th</sup> deadline if the Board of Directors approves the closure of MSA-SC. Our external auditors will be in the call to answer questions relating to the financial impact to the organization.

Question: Why did you need to overspend to exceed your budget for MSA-SC?

Many factors led to the overspending at Magnolia Science Academy-Santa Clara during the 2015-2016 school year as outlined below.

#### Overview

The Santa Clara Unified School District ("SCUSD") did not renew the lease for the school facility at Central Park Elementary School where MSA SC was located for the previous three (3) years. The lease included onerous provisions including a non-renewal clause and a waiver of Proposition 39 rights for a total of seven (7) years from lease inception.

Due to provisions within the executed lease, Magnolia did not file a request for Proposition 39 facilities for the 15-16 school year (by the deadline in November 2014), even though it is highly likely that the Prop. 39 waiver provision would have been deemed illegal by a court of law in the State of California, according to an analysis by YMC. This left MSA SC with very few facilities options.

#### Enrollment Decrease

During the Spring 2015 semester, school administrators sent out intent to return forms to the families of existing students in order to understand how many students would be returning to the school in the upcoming 15-16 school year. Approximately 175 'yes' responses were received from the 484 students enrolled at the time. It was anticipated that at least that many students would enroll at MSA SC during the 15-16 school year at a new site.

#### **Timely Decisions**

In June 2015 a facility was located at the National Hispanic University ("NHU"), which is located 13 miles from the former site in Santa Clara. The lease was negotiated with the Lessors and brought forward for a vote by the board of directors and execution by the Superintendent, Dr. Caprice Young.

The execution of the lease was delayed to pursue another possible facility option that was identified by ACCORD. This process prolonged the lease execution and the announcement of the new location to former students and families, with the result being that a significant number of students decided to enroll at other district and charter schools due to the protracted uncertainty. As a result the school started the 2015-2016 school year with 102 students.

#### Expenditures

#### Staff:

In an effort to increase enrollment, the school hired a full time administrator to focus on recruitment as enrollment was below anticipated levels and far from the 250 students projected for the 16-17 school year. The school site also included a part-time administrator/part-time Spanish teacher familiar with the neighborhood and local community. The school administrators retained teachers and staff above the average staffing plan in order to keep strong and talented teachers with Magnolia. It was important to continue to have a strong educational program in order to attract students in future years in this new community. Some of this teacher overstaffing was made due to the requirement to provide the full A-G course loads to high school students. And, a part-time support person was hired to focus on collection of documents needed for prior year revenues.

#### Outreach:

Outreach efforts in the Spring included open houses, door to door knocking, fliers, postcards and as well as a \$25,000 contract for outreach and publicity with a local firm, Milagro Advertising, that was covered by the home office budget, but has now been appropriately charged back to the school. There were very few students from the east San Jose community that enrolled at MSA SC during the 15-16 school year. Possible reasons include timing of recruitment efforts, an inability to develop relationships with community leaders and organizations, as well as other factors such as unfamiliarity with the Magnolia Public Schools program and brand. We also heard from parents that they were uncomfortable committing to send their students to a school without a long term facility. It also seems to be the case that, despite low test scores, residents prefer their traditional public schools. Nearby San Jose Leadership Public School also closed down this year due to a lack of enrollment

#### Health Insurance:

Additionally, overpayment of health insurance premiums in the amount of \$78,676 also affected the school's budget. As soon as the overpayment was identified, Caprice met with the C-team to form an action plan and assign specific duties to assure policies and procedures were put in place to assure compliance and negotiate return of the overpaid funds. Since then we have received a credit of \$29,633 and we continue to work to recover additional funds.

#### Busses:

In an effort to retain students from Santa Clara and surrounding communities the school provided buses from Santa Clara to the new school facility in east San Jose. The buses costs \$118,000 for the 15-16 school year. The anticipated bump in enrollment did not happen, even with paid transportation.

#### Facilities:

Our lease included a location to accommodate 250 students, more than twice as many as we had. So, while our facilities expenses were not more than anticipated, they were expensive relative to the number of students we had. We had an opportunity to purchase

land just north of NHU; however, affording it would have required attracting 800+ students and taken 18 months for permitting and the build. It is possible this option could be resurrected, but the risks are significant.

#### Conclusion

The above named factors combined to put MSA SC in the current budgetary situation. For a detailed accounting of the school's expenditures, please see Exhibit A, MSA SC unaudited financials, attached hereto.

### **RESOLUTION OF THE MAGNOLIA EDUCATION AND RESEARCH FOUNDATION BOARD OF DIRECTORS**

(A California Non-Profit Public Benefit Corporation)

A RESOLUTION of the Magnolia Education and Research Foundation Board of Directors, a non-profit public benefit corporation, documenting closure of Magnolia Science Academy-Santa Clara, a countywide benefit charter school authorized by the Santa Clara County Board of Education.

WHEREAS, Magnolia Science Academy-Santa Clara ("MSA-Santa Clara") is a California public countywide benefit charter school operated by the Magnolia Education and Research Foundation ("MERF"), a nonprofit public benefit corporation, under the direction and management of the MERF Board of Directors ("Board") and vested with the authority necessary to implement and operate educational programs for the benefit of California schoolchildren;

WHEREAS, the Board has decided to voluntarily close MSA-Santa Clara at the end of the 2015-2016 school year; and

WHEREAS, the Board will follow the closure procedures as required under the MSA-Santa Clara charter, the Charter Schools Act, and Title 5 of the California Code of Regulations, Section 11962 et seq., as applicable; and

WHEREAS, the Board has appointed Dr. Caprice Young, CEO and Superintendent, Magnolia Education and Research Foundation as the person responsible for MSA-Santa Clara's closure-related activities; and

NOW THEREFORE, IT IS RESOLVED by the Board that MSA-Santa Clara shall close effective June 30, 2016.
