2. Purpose:

It is imperative that we share authorizer oversight reports with our Board, highlight any findings, and discuss possible next steps for actions that should be taken based on the feedback provided by the authorizers.

3. Background:

Oversight Visits Overview

Per the Education Code, charter authorizers need to conduct at least one annual oversight visit to their authorized schools. During an oversight visit authorizers meet with the school leadership, visit classrooms, conduct interviews with staff, parents, and students, check student and staff records, interview some staff (for segregation of duties, etc.), and review a list of documents that our schools provide in physical and electronic binders. The Home Office supports the schools in preparation for the oversight visits through mock visits, document review, and attendance to the visits.

4. Analysis:

The summary and recommendations from LAUSD, LACOE, and the CDE were presented to the Board at prior meetings. This agenda is about SDUSD's oversight visit report. The full report is attached. Following are excerpts of the summary and recommendations from the report.

Students With Disabilities

The tables below provide an overview of Magnolia enrollment as grouped by the California Department of Education ("CDE"). Magnolia has increased its schoolwide enrollment percentage of Students with Disabilities for the past five school years.

Finance Part Two

Per the FY21-22 Second Interim Report, Magnolia Science Academy San Diego, ("Magnolia") met most of the district's criteria of financial stability and sustainability with the exception of projecting to end the year with operating income. The school is projected to end FY21-22 with an operating deficit of (\$118,978), however, the projected ending fund balance of \$1,321,478 met the district's minimum reserve requirement.

Per Magnolia's leadership, the reason for the deficit is due to additional resources above the one time funding that were needed in the classroom that were not originally anticipated to accommodate students, such as mental health, school psychologist, special education instructional aide, and having students acclimate back in the classroom. The school also did not expect ADA to be as low as it was, or for the additionally high substitute teacher expenses. Magnolia has been closely monitoring expenses, and advocating for SB579 to be held harmless which would be retroactive for this fiscal year. The school is anticipating additional revenues with the May Revise and COLA & SELPA increase to offset some of the deficit.

Per the FY20-21 Audit Report, Magnolia met the district's criteria of financial stability and sustainability.

There were no findings and questioned costs related to the basic financial statements, or state awards during FY20-21. The prior year finding has been implemented.

Article XIII, Section 36, Subdivision (e), Paragraph (6) of the California Constitution requires all districts, counties and charter schools to report on their websites an accounting of how much money was received from the Education Protection Account ("EPA") and how that money was spent. Magnolia was informed of the requirement to include their Board-approved fiscal year 2021-22 estimated expenditure plan and 2020-21 actual expenditures on their website. Following the site visit, the school provided updated links to the plans on their website.

COVID 19 one-time relief funds were recorded under the correct resource codes as reflected in the school's FY20-21 and FY21-22 general ledger reports.

Multiple entries in the fiscal year 2021-22 GL have descriptions that contain only the vendor's name and account description. District requests that transactions entered into the GL contain a more detailed description of the items and/or services purchased.

The Magnolia March 2022 Bank Reconciliation of Citibank Account ending x6494 showed two checks over six months old that had not cleared the bank. The District asked what policies or procedures are in place for clearing checks outstanding over six months. Per Magnolia's representative, after 120 days, the check is record as a stale check liability, and the school communicates with the related party to let them know the check is uncashed and after a 1-year period, the check is sent to the State.

Magnolia Educational & Research Foundation and Subsidiaries applied for and received loan forgiveness from the SBA on their Paycheck Protection Program ("PPP") loan for \$5,461,600 for the year ending June 30, 2021. Of this \$418,151 was for Magnolia Science Academy of San Diego.





Charter School's Response (Optional):

On page two it states that the mental health notifications were not sent. The first communication was actually sent on October 18,2021 as part of the student/parent hand book and two more sent on 5/5/22 and 5/23/22.

MPS is operated by the nonprofit public benefit corporation Magnolia Educational & Research Foundation ("MERF"). The current charter term began on July 1, 2020, and ends June 30, 2027, based on the two-year extension in Education Code section 47607.4. Magnolia serves grades 6-8 at a District facility located at 6525 Estrella Avenue 92120.

Gokhan Serce is the School Principal of Magnolia, and Alfredo Rubalcava is the CEO of MPS. The administrative team also includes the Dean of Academics Megan Craig, the Dean of Students Neil Egasani, and the Dean of Culture Halil Akdeniz.

Magnolia was informed of the requirement to include their Board-approved fiscal year 2021-22 estimated expenditure plan and 2020-21 actual expenditures on their website. Following the site visit, the school provided updated links to the plans on their website.

COVID 19 one-time relief funds were recorded under the correct resource codes as reflected in the school's FY20-21 and FY21-22 general ledger reports.

Multiple entries in the fiscal year 2021-22 GL have descriptions that contain only the vendor's name and account description. District requests that transactions entered into the GL contain a more detailed description of the items and/or services purchased.

The Magnolia March 2022 Bank Reconciliation of Citibank Account ending x6494 showed two checks over six months old that had not cleared the bank. The District asked what policies or procedures are in place for clearing checks outstanding over six months. Per Magnolia's representative, after 120 days, the check is record as a stale check liability, and the school communicates with the related party to let them know the check is uncashed and after a 1-year period, the check is sent to the State.

Magnolia Educational & Research Foundation and Subsidiaries applied for and received loan forgiveness from the SBA on their Paycheck Protection Program ("PPP") loan for \$5,461,600 for the year ending June 30, 2021. Of this \$418,151 was for Magnolia Science Academy of San Diego.

<u>Charter School's Response</u> (Optional):

On page two it states that the mental health notifications were not sent. The first communication was actually sent on October 18,2021 as part of the student/parent hand book and two more sent on 5/5/22 and 5/23/22.
