Dear Alex,

Angelenos face an unprecedent health crisis. Our public education system is being called on to meet families' most basic needs, while pivoting to ensure every child continues to learn under challenging circumstances. Students, parents, teachers, and staff alike are working selflessly to build some sense of normalcy in education as all of our lives are upended. Our children need their basic food security needs met. But just as important, our children need to stay connected to some of the most important adults in their lives, their teachers and principals, to give them the confidence that together we will overcome this crisis, and to stay anchored to the important relationships in their lives. On a daily basis we are witnessing the best of our community's generosity and compassion, and like Governor Newsom has implored us, many are meeting the moment. But, we also know our community is rightfully scared, shaken, and in desperate need of support and compassion.

Yesterday, in the midst of a worldwide pandemic, you chose to spend your time drafting a letter to elected leaders that targets and demeans charter families instead of showing compassion. You demanded the eviction of charter students and teachers from the learning space provided to them by voter-approved law when they need your support. And, you resurrected your endless demands for a charter school ban. You labeled charter students, families, and staff as unique hazards to public health, stoking perverse and unfounded division. These tactics are shameful, dangerous, dehumanizing and frankly, Trumpian. When you harass families on sidewalks and call our children "invaders" (as you were doing right up until the moment schools were ordered closed) you inflame and divide, and educators would agree such behavior would be roundly condemned in a schoolyard. I am disappointed that instead of uniting our shared community in the best interest of all kids, you chose to use COVID-19 to advance your political agenda.

We are just two weeks into this crisis, and we already see that a million Californians are unemployed, with that number rising by the day. Families are lining up by the thousands to access food from both charters and district grab-and-go distribution centers across this city. High school juniors and seniors from Pacoima to Carson are sick at home worrying whether COVID-19 will shatter their college dreams.

In this time of extraordinary need, Angelenos are better together. That includes you, me, and every member of our public education system. We must use every ounce of skill, talent,

courage, empathy, and love we have to better support the families we serve. We should be working tirelessly to solve the acute problems before us: feeding all families, supporting all teachers as we transition to distance learning with all due haste, and ensuring every child, including Students with Disabilities, English Learners, and students struggling with a digital divide are not forgotten in this crisis.

Last year, I wrote to you asking if you would stand with us where we find common ground, rather than pitting schools and families against each other. Evicting students and banning schools is more of the same. Farmworkers are hard at work tending the fields that feed our state; grocery workers are the new frontline, and health workers are giving their all to help us weather this pandemic. Their children need you now to lead, not demean. This is what being in an essential sector means: we roll up our sleeves and put our common humanity first. We have a unique opportunity to lift Los Angeles up and support our city in the face of crisis. Let's focus on kids and families, instead of politics as usual, so we can meet this moment together.

Dear Superintendent Beutner and LAUSD School Board Members:

On behalf of the 34,000 members of United Teachers Los Angeles, I write to you to demand that LAUSD halt all new proposed charter co-locations for the 2020-21 school year.

Moreover, we demand a moratorium on the approval of any new charter schools until such time that our communities affected by COVID-19 have been cleared by the California Department of Health Services (CDPH) to safely participate in public meetings, per the Brown Act, that discuss any consideration of new charter school approvals.

The COVID-19 pandemic has already caused our schools to close and we still do not know with any certainty when schools will re-open. However, we do know that once there is a set return date, each school will have to rapidly learn and adopt to new standards to keep students, educators and families safe. Given the seriousness of this COVID-19 outbreak, the complexity of new public health standards to be implemented, and how quickly schools will have to adjust, there is simply not enough time for any new co-location or new charter approvals to be established in a healthy and safe way.

On the issue of co-location, students, staff and parents at currently co-located schools could face health risks and will have to work diligently to establish new norms and practices to ensure a healthy environment once school campuses re-open. For every currently co-located school campus scheduled for continued co-location next school year, we demand that the entire campus be assessed for safety protocols and guaranteed enough resources and staff (i.e. nursing and custodial) to ensure a clean, safe and healthy school environment. Moreover, charter operators that are currently scheduled to continue with existing co-locations next year must have their health and safety practices vigorously reviewed by LAUSD and the State immediately. If these charter entities are found to be lacking in health and safety protocols, they should immediately have their co-locations discontinued.

Additionally, at currently co-located schools, Shared Use Agreements must be reassessed and adjusted accordingly to appropriately reflect space needs based on actual ADA. Often charters over-project ADA and are approved more space than they actually qualify for, compromising valuable classroom space for the host District school. With this health crisis it is quite probable that many projected charter ADA's will be vastly inaccurate. Additionally, joint co-location committees should be assessed and supported to ensure ongoing dialogue and collaboration. And, it goes without saying that charter operators that are currently co-located cannot use this crisis as a time to take additional space from district schools.

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ARLENE INOUYE Secretary To re-iterate, any effort to push new co-locations at this time would require that the public school and the charter school work together to develop a Shared Use Agreement, adjust to having multiple schools at one campus, and learn how to keep all students safe. District schools and charter schools working together effectively on one campus has already, before this crisis, been a challenge at almost every currently co-located facility. There is no way, in the current context, that a newly co-located District school community would have enough time to collaborate with a charter, implement new safety procedures and manage another school on their campus. Fundamentally, in this context, authorizing new charter co-locations for the 2020-21 school year would be irresponsible and jeopardize the health of students, parents, and educators. LAUSD must take immediate steps to ensure the ability of schools to operate safely once reopened, and immediately halt the process of approving any new charter co-locations for the 2020-21 school year.

Just as important, we urge LAUSD to impose a moratorium on the approval of any new charter schools within District boundaries. There simply is not enough time or resources to adequately ensure that any new charter school adheres to health and safety protocols in the context of this public health crisis. In addition, in this time when all of our resources are critical to safeguarding the health and safety of our school communities and ensuring appropriate staffing, it doesn't make sense to continue to approve new charters within District boundaries. Los Angeles is already over-saturated with charter schools and loses over \$600 million/year in resources to unregulated charter growth. It is time to stop the bleeding and ensure that our existing classrooms and students are appropriately funded and protected.

Executive Administrator's Report March 26, 2019

The mission of the YPI Charter Schools (YPICS) is to prepare students for academic success in high school, as well as post-secondary education; prepare students to be responsible and active participants in their community; and enable students to become lifelong learners. Students at YPI Charter Schools will become active citizens who characterize the ideals of a diverse and democratic society. Students will provide service to their community, take responsibility for their own learning, and develop the habits of mind and body that will empower them to be successful in high school and beyond.

How is BCCS managing the shift to online instruction and virtual communication during the COVID-19 epidemic.

1. Health and Safety -

BCCS staff is working from home following the "stay home" order set forth by the CDC and Governor Newsom. Only essential employees are going to campus for maintenance, and computer distribution to students. We are planning our 3rd computer distribution on April 3rd. When on campus we are following best practices to ensure that our staff is safe.

2. Communication (families and operations)-

BCCS tutors and other support staff have been assigned a group of students to support. Staff make daily calls to parents and students who have not been checking into their online classes or completing assignments. During the calls, staff identify any gaps that may exist and provide the academic support that each student and family may need. Calls have been very positive and teachers are starting to notice more student participation in meets and completion of work. An important note is that the overwhelming majority of the parents are welcoming of the calls, and supporting us at home to ensure students are participating in our online learning program. We do have a group of families that we have not been able to reach or not being supportive. The BCCS Director of Operations will be reaching out to these families to see if we can work through any challenges the family may be talking. BCCS is using Remind for mass communication to families.

3. Teaching and Learning

The BCCS Team is making a herculean effort to ensure our students are learning. Staff is working together to learn how to do distance learning well. The pressure on our team is intense as we build a new Bert Corona Charter School.

• Technology and Connectivity - We have approximately 50 families that still do not have access to the technology that they need for distance learning. They do not have a computer or internet access. The Coordinator of School Culture and Climate and our Technology Assistant have already coordinated two computer distribution days and are now planning the 3rd day. Staff has set up a call number and email so that we can support students with technology needs.

• Curriculum - Staff is working with students in the Google Classroom platform. The team continues to use iReady Math and ELA, Khan Academy (math), and Achieve 3000 (reading), in addition to other online content.

• Instruction- Teachers and support staff are meeting with students Tuesday through Friday in large and small groups between 9:00 am and 2:30 pm. We are tracking attendance and participation daily using Google tools. Some of the instructional guidance is being provided by online videos that the staff has created, some through live Google Meets, and some through google-doc chats. Teachers are also leveraging the myriad of tutorial videos already available online for anyone to access. Students are following up with email messages and participating in Google meets support sessions with staff to receive support with learning. Mondays are reserved for Staff PD, planning and collaboration.

• Support for Special Education- The Sped Team is pushing into online classes and setting up small group support sessions for students with IEPs. The team is working with our support providers to ensure that as many services as possible are being delivered. We are currently focusing on counseling services. Staff has completed two IEP meetings virtually.

4. Professional Development and Team Communication

The staff has been communicating using Google Meets and Slack. We have moved away from two a day meetings to one per day. Meetings are 30 minutes long and are focused on keeping staff informed and supported.

For professional development, we are using the same tools teachers are using for instruction. The Google suite tools are our lifeline for student and adult learning. On Monday staff shared their best practices with their colleagues. Topics included:

- Recording and Editing Video Tutorials
- Google Forms and Google Classroom
- Hosting Google Meets

I. Distance Learning Update

MORCS has been providing distance learning for all students since Tuesday, March 17th, and will continue to provide distance learning until the school campus re-opens. Teachers and students observe the following weekly schedule, primarily using Google Classroom and Google Meet to communicate learning activities with students, to provide interactive online lessons, and to provide face-to-face student support.

Guidelines and expectations for all students:

- 1. While the MORCS campus is closed, academics will continue online for all students. Students should be checking their email and google classroom daily.
- 2. The common schedule above is designed so that students have a clear focus for each day / time.
- 3. Students will complete and submit assignments and assessments which will be recorded in the gradebook.
- 4. Teachers, administrators, and all other support staff will be available via email as well as other platforms such as Google Meet to ensure the continuation of student learning.

Teachers also employ online instructional tools such as iReady, Achieve 3000, Khan Academy, Kahoot, Quizizz, padlet, Google Jam, Google Docs, Screencastify, and many more resources to keep students engaged with distance learning.

II. Technology Access for all Students

125 students and families surveyed (out of 360 total) did not have access to technology at home. For these students, we have sent home printed packets for students to work on, with our Instructional Aides making phone calls to each of these students to ensure that the packets have been received and to provide support in

completing the learning activities. The packets focus on grade-level English and Math standards, but also include learning activities from Science, History, P.E., and Elective classes.

On campus, we have a 1-to-1 ratio of computers to students, specifically Macbook Airs. However, these machines are arranged in computer carts of 30 in each classroom and are not easily made mobile since the chargers are embedded into the computer cart. Instead, we are placing an order for 102 chromebooks (in addition to 23 chromebooks already on site), that we intend to deploy to each household within the next 5-10 days, allowing us to ensure that our students and families have access to technology that they can use for distance learning. We have also provided families with information that will allow them to access two months of free wireless internet provided by Spectrum. We have also connected parents with vendors who can provide affordable internet access after the free period has ended.

III. Communication with Families

We are communicating with families primarily through the Remind system, which allows us to text all parents and also provide attachments such as pdf files and videos with important information regarding the school closure, distance learning, and how to access food pickup provided at nearby centers. The operations team is also making individual phone calls to families, targeting those whose students have not been attending the online sessions. As mentioned before, instructional aides are making individual support calls to students who reported not having technology access at home.

Early next week, we are preparing a mass mailout of report cards, updates regarding distance learning (including a printout of the schedule which they previously received electronically), and a second round of work packets for students without technology access, which should allow them to stay engaged in learning until we are able to deploy the chromebooks.

III. Staff Communication

Staff have been checking in on Google Meet three times a week. We discuss the successes and challenges of distance learning utilizing the same tools for our discussions that we employ with the students! Spirits are high as teachers are excited to utilize new tools and get students engaged in ways they have not been previously. Below is a "Google Jam" of teacher feedback from one of our check-ins last week:

EA Report BCCHS March 26, 2020

How the High School Team is managing the shift to online instruction and virtual communication during the COVID-19 epidemic.

1. Health and Safety - The HS team is following the "stay home" best practices set forth by the CDC and mandated by Governor Newsom. The Operations Team is coordinating communication with parents and students from home, and teachers are working from home. The only staff member who is present regularly in the building is Mr. Rothenay, who returns weekly to care for the many animals he raises and shares with our students. I (Mr. Simonsen) have returned to distribute laptops for students or staff who's machines have failed, as well as book-and-paper curriculum to the 1 student we have not yet managed to get online. There are **no** reported cases of the Coronavirus amongst our staff.

2. Communication (families and operations)-

The BCCHS Ops team has been making daily calls to parents and students who have not been checking into their online classes. We (Fuentes and team) have divided the student list and each have a regular list of students that we connect with weekly, reaching out to parents for support and clarification of expectations. Calls have been very positive and teachers are starting to notice more student participation. An important note is that parents are welcoming of the calls, and supporting us at home to ensure students are participating in our online learning program. The Ops team is also communicating to parents that the 10 week report cards will be electronically mailed to them. In the process of these daily calls, we are also updating parent emails or cell phones. Both Remind and OneCall are being used for mass communication.



3. Teaching and Learning.

While this crisis is truly unprecedented, as is the pressure put on schools and families to make educationally meaningful use of the time we must live in isolation, the BCCHS team has responded phenomenally well.

- Technology Every student in the organization had a working Chromebook with them on Friday, March 13th, the day it was decided to shut down the schools. I (Simonsen), in light of the loss of our Tech Support Personnel a week prior, personally worked my way through our Chromebook inventory to test machines and chargers so as to swap out failing computers and chargers with students before they went home that day. Only 2 students have had to come for additional tech support since the shutdown, and those machines were in their 5th year of service.
- **Connectivity** All but 1 student (validated as of 3/25) has found a way to secure internet access at home. I am printing materials, gathering novels and textbooks, and providing them to the student's mother so as to minimize contact between staff and families. We have several families (less than 5) who have been out of communication since the shutdown started, so we cannot determine their situation until this communication is restored, and the Ops team is working on this daily.
- Curriculum All students are working from the Google Classroom platform. It is comprehensive in it's design, so that new material may be introduced via attached articles, specifically designated textbook or literature reading assignments, videos, or links to online content. The team continues to use Achieve 3000 (reading), IXL and Khan Academy (math), PhET and Gizmos (Biology and Chemistry), DuoLingo (Spanish), Quizizz (all content areas), and SFA (EL Reading), in addition to many, many other creative, rigorous, and robust content delivery formats.
- Instruction- Teachers are meeting with students between the normally scheduled school day time-bookends (8:00 a.m. to 2:10 p.m. on Monday, and 8:00 a.m. to 3:45 p.m. Tuesday through Friday). "Attendance" is taken through a daily Google Sheets tracker. Some of the instructional guidance is being provided by online videos that the staff has created, some through live Google Meets, and some through google-doc chats. Teachers are also leveraging the myriad of tutorial videos already available online for anyone to access. Students are following up with email messages asking for clarification and assistance.

Today went well. Many students checked in and many submitted their Algebra midterm (now just looking over them to see what students made improvements on some of the learning outcomes from this first half of the semester) and many replied to a Google Meet Survey where I asked about day/time preferences for Meets and on what works most during those. Through a Google Meet I was able to assess a student who didn't show enough evidence of improvement on the midterm for a specific learning outcome but was able to do so after clarifying questions during that Meet. Today was good. I tried using Quizizz as the Do Now and I had 86% of students successfully get on (Quizizz.com tells me how many actually did it). Sent some emails to those who were confused about this transition. Lastly, i'm in the works of making that skit-style video of Dos and Donts of Online Learning.

• Assessment - Reliably assessing students for their true understanding is hard enough when we are WITH us, in the room. Trying to do so in a 100% online format is doubly challenging. However, teachers are responding quickly and effectively to students, offering feedback and the opportunity to "try again" if they are not demonstrating independent mastery of a topic. Essays, quick-writes, quizzes, Meet conversations, problem sets, video recordings, and exams are all being used as forms of valid assessment of student learning. My (Simonsen) consistent request of the staff is that students understand that they are being assessed for *mastery* and *not* compliance. Grades should reflect independent academic competence, not the ability to meet deadlines and be present in class. Here is a quick exchange I had with a teacher to check in on her support of this practice:

Thank you for this, Veronique. Nestor had mentioned that he was following up on missed test questions with Meet conversations so he could look/listen for mastery in a different way. I noticed you have Meets scheduled already.

I (Simonsen) sent an email to students this week that dispels the rumor that 2nd semester is "not going to count." It is my opinion that this rumor is pervasive and has taken hold, just based on the feedback from Ops team conversations with students and families. Our team is doing everything in its power, given current limitations, to "sound the alarm" to every family that *school is in session*, and that *grades will post*, and that *high school graduation and college acceptance are dependent upon passing grades*. BCCHS finished its 2nd iReady periodic assessment in December (the original window for test 2 was November through January), and that data was shared with you at a previous board meeting in the last BCCHS EA report.



• Support for Special Education

Ms. Castañeda, the lead for Special Education at BCCHS, has created a daily schedule for all of the students on the SpEd roster at BCCHS. It is incredibly helpful for building independence in students and helping them stay rooted in a routine. The viewable document is here:

4. Professional Development and Team Communication

The staff has been communicating seamlessly through Slack. It is our lifeline to each other. It really has been very uplifting in a sad and scary time to see people share picture, videos, and anecdotes in addition to their important messages. When people need help with technology, we can jump on and help one another right away.

For professional development, we are using a combination of Slack, Google Meets, Google Docs, and Google Jamboard. This suite of tools, in combination and operating simultaneously, allows for pretty smooth communication during all-staff meetings (We've only had a few, but they have gone well). For PD, we are dividing into smaller Meets to discuss the driving questions, and then joining an all-team Meet to share out the results of those conversations, as well as answer questions and speak to concerns.

5. Hotspots and Troubleshooting -

Some Issues we've had to troubleshoot:

- Students avoiding us, families not responding by phone. We only have a few holdouts.
- Students being deceptive with parents about their attentiveness to turning in assignments and being present online. The Ops team is relentless about calling every day.
- Assessment pile-on: accidentally scheduling exam times and due dates at the same time for multiple classes because we haven't communicated



these things to one another before establishing them individually. We've since begun communicating these dates and times.

 Students being unclear about our availability. We had to create a weekly schedule of "office hours" and advise students regarding how to access "office hours drop in" in google Meets so as to get the help they need, when needed.

*An extra note: When I (Simonsen) came to YPICS to help start the HS, Mr. Dueñas allowed me to move in the direction of 1 to 1 Chromebooks that would travel with students. This was against the grain for the org at the time, but 5 years later, it is the primary reason we were able to get such a jump on this transition to online learning.

"2020—21 State Budget Trailer Bill-Special Education Funding Formula"

posted february 19, 2020

The much-anticipated proposed new special education funding formula language was released on Friday, February 14, 2020. As summarized by the Administration on January 10, the proposal would create a new special education funding formula based on a three-year rolling average of average daily attendance (ADA) at the local educational agency (LEA) level, while continuing the distribution method of sending special education funds through Special Education Local Plan Areas (SELPAs).

The proposed trailer bill:

- 1. Sunsets the Education Code sections often referred to as Assembly Bill (AB) 602, ending its operation on July 1, 2020
- 2. Replaces it with a new two-prong calculation similar to this year's calculation that equalized two-thirds of S LPAs to the statewide target rate

Each UA's (district, charter, and/or county office of education) funding per ADA will be applied at the higher of the two scenarios:

- 1. \$660 per second principal apportionment ADA average of the current and past two years
- 2. Per-ADA amount in the 2019-20 fiscal year based on the LEA's SELPA AB 602 rate, plus the cost-of-living adjustment (COLA)
- For those LEAs that would be funded at the proposed \$660 rate, a COLA would be applied in future years

• For those LEAs that are funded at their historic, "hold harmless" rate, no COLA is provided—a "hold harmless" UA leaves its current SELPA, it defaults to the \$660 rate as under current law, SELPA Funding Allocation Plans vary widely and will determine the use of the additional funds as agreed upon by the local SELPA governance councils.

The proposal is able to significantly raise the per-ADA special education funding rate due to the repurposing of this year's two pots of funds: \$152 million in AB 602 equalization And \$493 million to districts based on preschoolers with disabilities counts.

As a reminder, the Administration also proposes to provide a second year of one-time funding to districts based on preschooler's with disabilities, which is at a total of \$250 million statewide this year.

"LAO Analyzes Governor's Education Proposals"

On February 24, 2020, the Legislative Analyst's Office (LAO) released its annual report that evaluates Governor Gavin Newsom's major education spending proposals. Generally, the LAO supports Governor Newsom's overall approach to the education budget— that is, it appreciates how he balances ongoing spending with one-time investments. This approach, the LAO suggests, cushions lawmakers from having to make future cuts in the event that the estimated Proposition 98 minimum guarantee does not materialize, which is particularly sensitive given the risks to the state and national economies—the most recent of which is the effect of the global pandemic of the coronavirus and its impact on production and trade.

LAO Recommends Using One-Time Investments to Relieve Local Fiscal Pressures

Although the LAO applauds the Governor's overall spending approach, it recognizes that many of his proposals for one-time spending (approximately \$1.7 billion) are for programs that offer no relief to the pressures that local educational agencies (LEAs) continue to face. These pressures include increased employer contribution rates for employee retirement programs, demands for higher compensation, and increased costs associated with serving students with disabilities.

In lieu of using new resources to fund workforce programs, special models that integrate academic and non-academic student support programs, and programs aimed at addressing the achievement gap, the LAO recommends that the Legislature use the funds to provide immediate or long-term relief to local general funds. Most notably, the LAO suggests that a supplemental payment to the California State Teachers' Retirement System (CalSTRS) and the California Public Employees' Retirement System unfunded liabilities on behalf of LEAs could have long-term financial benefits. They estimate that a \$1 billion supplement payment could result in savings ranging front \$1 billion to \$3.3 billion in the long run. The LAO also offers that lawmakers could also consider buying down planned increases to employer contribution rates for the budget year, including a special buy down for CalSTRS to help smooth out rate increases through 2021-22.

LAO Supports Governor's Increase to LCFF

With respect to the Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF), the LAO notes that the Governor's 2.29% cost-of-living-adjustment (COLA) is modestly higher than its estimated COLA of 2.14%. Though LEAs used a 3.0% estimated COLA to begin planning their budgets for 2020-21 last summer', the LAO does not recommend using new Proposition 98 funding to increase the LCFF to achieve a 3% investment, or even to reflect the overall growth in Proposition 98, approximately 2.9%. Powered by BoardOnTrack

The LAO reminds the Legislature that the 2019—20 Budget Act contained a provision allowing the state to reduce the LCFF COLA "to fit within the guarantee" in years that the Proposition 98 minimum guarantee is insufficient to fund the full statutory COLA. Essentially, this automatic reduction in the LCFF COLA allows the state to reduce in—12 education's largest funding stream without creating a "deficit factor," which the field used to track what the state would have otherwise owed when the state wasn't funding full COLA and reducing revenue limits during the Great Recession.

LAO Makes Mixed Recommendations on Special Education

As you know, the Governor proposes a multiyear approach to reforming how the state resources and serves students with disabilities, beginning with increasing and changing the base rate formula in 2020-21. Additionally, the Governor proposes using \$250 million to provide one-time funding to LEAs serving preschoolers with disabilities with the requirement to increase or improve services to them. This proposal is similar to last year's \$493 million investment.

The LAO recommends adopting the Governor's base funding formula that would increase the perstudent base rate to \$660 for most Special Education Local Plan Areas with those above the new rate being held harmless, including using a three-year rolling average daily attendance to reduce funding volatility as LEAs experience historic declines in enrollment.

In addition, the LAO recommends making funding to support preschoolers with disabilities ongoing as an augmentation to the new base formula. To account for the lack of preschool attendance data, the LAO suggests double counting kindergarten attendance as a proxy. Although LEAs have raised issues with the disproportionately high costs associated with students with moderate to severe disabilities or those who require multiple therapies/services, neither the Governor nor the LAO recommend a proposal to provide funding to address it.

The legislative budget committees responsible for the education budget are slated to begin hearing the Governor's K—12 proposals next week. Budget discussions and negotiations will continue through late spring.

"A Deep Dive into Governor Newsom's 2020-21 Proposition 98 Education Proposals" By Sara C. Bachez and Elizabeth Esquivel, Governmental Relations

Last month, Governor Newsom released the proposed statutory changes that conform with his January budget proposals, known as trailer bill language. This article provides an in-depth analysis of the major education proposals and highlights Recommendations made by the Legislative Analyst's Office.

Overview of Proposition 98 Spending

Governor Newsom's January budget package proposes \$84 billion in Proposition 98 binding, an increase of 3.8 percent from the 2019-20 fiscal vear. In IN-12 education spending, the Administration Powered by BoardOnTrack

commits \$2 billion in one-time spending and \$1.4 billion in on-going support dedicated to fund a 2.29 percent cost of living adjustment for the Local Control Funding Formula and various categoricals, as detailed below.

The Legislative Analyst's Office recommends the Legislature adopt a budget plan that supports a balanced approach of ongoing and one-time spending in order to avoid cuts to ongoing C-12 programs should the Proposition 98 guarantee fall below projections, and free up a portion of one-time funding to pay down school districts' unfunded pension liabilities.

Early Education

State Preschool. The Governor proposes \$32 million General Fund to support 10,000 additional full-day State Preschool slots for non-school based agencies, beginning April 1, 2021. The LAO recommends a reduced amount of slots due to unspent funding from the 2019-20 fiscal year and a streamlined application process for current preschool providers interested in expanding their programs.

Department of Early Childhood Development. The Governor proposes to establish the Department of Early Childhood Development under the California Health and Human Services Agency with \$6.8 million for 26 positions in 2020-21 and \$10.4 million ongoing General Fund for 52 positions in 2021-22. The department would begin administering the state's childcare programs. The LAO recommends the Legislature reject this proposal, as it lacks necessary information on the structure and effectiveness of the new agency to streamline programs and services.

Inclusive Early Education Expansion Program. The Governor proposes \$75 million one-time Proposition 98 General Fund to the Inclusive Early Education Program, in order to increase access to childcare and preschool services for students with disabilities. The LAO recommends the Legislature reject this proposal.

Preschool Facilities Funding. The Governor proposes to redirect \$150 million General Fund from last year's Kindergarten Facility Grant Program to support construction and renovation of preschool facilities on LEA campuses. The LAO recommends the Legislature use the \$75 million from the Inclusive Early Education Expansion Program to support this proposal.

Special Education

Governor Newsom proposes a multi-layer approach to restructuring the special education funding formula, which would sequence changes over a period of years.

- 1. *Modify base rates.* In 2020-21, the Governor proposes \$645 million to increase the base rate for most special education local plan areas (SELPAs) to \$660 per student. SELPAs with higher rates will be held harmless and receive only a COLA the first year.
- 2. *Changes to base rate calculation.* Beginning in 2020-21, base rates would use a three-year rolling average of student attendance, rather than the greater of the current year or prior year. Funding would continue to be allocated to SELPAs, with the average of student attendance calculated for each local educational agency.
- 3. *Categorical programs & SELPA membership frozen until a new* funding *formula is set*. Categorical programs and SELPA membership would be frozen at 2019-20 finding levels, with cost of living adjustments, and modified until a final funding system is established. School districts would be prohibited from opting out of their current SELPA to establish its own for the time period.
- 4. *Establish three working groups to develop reforms*. The Governor proposes \$1.1 million to establish three working groups to focus on:
 - o \$500,000 to study governance and accountability to improve services and student outcomes.
 - o \$350,000 to develop a standardized Individualized Education Plan (IEP) template and a potential IEP reporting system.
 - o \$250,000 to develop pathways for students with disabilities to attain a high school diploma.
- 5. *Preschool services*. The Governor proposes \$250 million in one-time support based on the number of preschool-aged students with disabilities for LEAs to increase and improve programs and services.
- 6. *Dyslexia Initiative.* The Governor proposes \$4 million to promote best practices for educating and identifying students with dyslexia. The proposal would create professional development opportunities and host a statewide conference at the end of 2020.

LAO Recommendation. The Legislative Analyst's Office recommends that the Legislature: 1) adopt the Governor's base funding increases to address historical inequities and redirect the preschool funding for an ongoing base increase and incorporate preschool-aged children using kindergarten data information as a proxy to count these students into the base formula.

Teacher Recruitment & Workforce Programs

Education Warkforce Investment Grant. The Governor proposes \$350 million for professional development in STEM and computer science (\$100 million); literacy training (\$75 million); school climate and mental health (\$75 million); special education (\$50 million); and English Language learner's training (\$50 million).

The California Department of Education would administer the funds that would require the eligible entities (school districts, county offices of education, charter schools and regional occupational center's) to collaborate with state agencies and higher education institutions.

Workforce Development Grant Program. The Governor proposes \$193 million to recruit staff to provide counseling and student support services in areas of high-need and facing shortages. Of these funds, \$20 million would support planning grants for at least 100 LEAs or consortiums and \$100 million for implementation grants. The lead agency that administers the program would receive about \$3 million for

administrative purposes.

The California Department of Education would select a county office of education to administer the program. School districts, county offices of education, charter schools, and state schools that serve students with disabilities would be eligible to apply for this giant.

Teacher Residency Grant Program. The Governor proposes \$175 million to expand or establish residency programs in special education, bilingual education, science, engineering, and math. The program would provide \$20,000 per candidate with a \$1 for \$1 matching requirement.

The California Commission on Teacher Credentialing would administer the program with eligibility for school districts, county Offices of education, charter schools, regional occupational centers, and nonsectarian private schools with priority for entities serving over 50 percent of students that qualify for free and reduced price meal and rural or dense regions.

California Teacher Credentialing Award Program. The Governor proposes \$100 million to offer stipends to new teachers with high-need subjects and that work in disadvantaged communities facing teacher shortages.

The California Commission on Teacher Credentialing would administer the program that would award eligible teachers \$5,000 a year for four years. School districts, county offices of education, and state schools for students with disabilities would be eligible to apply.

Classified School Employee Teaching Credentialing Program. The Governor proposes \$64.1 million to continue to support this program, which was established in the 2016-17 fiscal year. The program provides financial support to candidates to complete their bachelor's degree and teaching credential.

The Commission on Teacher Credentialing would administer the program that provides eligible candidates \$4,000 a year for up to five years. School districts, county offices of education, and charter schools would be eligible to apply.

LAO Recommendation. The Legislative Analyst's Office recommends that the Legislature reject the Educator' Workforce Investment Grant, Workforce Development Grant Program, and California Teacher Credentialing Award Program proposals as these programs do not address root causes in teacher shortages and does not allow sufficient time for the Legislature to evaluate the current programs' performance. The LAO recommends providing \$29 million for the Teacher Residency Grant Program and reject program changes as the current structure targets high-need areas. The only proposal that the LAO recommends full adoption without modifications is the Classified School Employee Teaching Credential Program.

School Improvement Programs

Opportunity Grants. The Governor proposes \$270 million to provide grants and technical assistance to low-performing districts and schools where at least 90 percent of students are low-income. The funding could be utilized for wrap-around services, staff hiring and retention strategies, and new instructional materials. Recipients could be a school or consortia of schools within a district, a school district or county office of education with numerous high-poverty schools in its jurisdiction or a charter school.

The California Collaborative for Educational Excellence (CCEE) would receive an additional \$30 million to administer this program. The CCEE in collaboration with the Department of Education, and with final

approval by the State Board of Education, would be responsible for determining the size of grants, eligibility criteria, and program requirements.

California Community Schools Partnership Grants. The Governor proposes \$300 million to create a program that would provide start-up funding to implement the community schools model. The grant amounts are to be determined by the administering agency.

The California Department of Education would administer the program and develop an application process, with final approval by the State Board of Education. Grants would be distributed in a competitive manner and eligibility is based on school districts, county offices of education, and charter schools that educate at least 90 percent of low-income students.

County Outreach Funding. The Governor proposes \$18 million to be administered by the California Collaborative for Educational Excellence to provide county offices of education with grants to improve coordination and access of wrap around services. The size of each award would be determined by CCEE.

LAO Recommendation. The Legislative Analyst's Office recommends that the Legislature: 1) reject the Opportunity Giants proposal and consider a smaller augmentation for intense technical assistance for specific school districts; 2) fund a smaller community schools pilot program; and 3) reject the county outreach funding.

Child Nutrition. The Governor's budget proposes \$60 million in ongoing support for a rate increase for the free and reduced price meals served to eligible students and \$10 million in one-time funding to train food service staff on three topics: 1) food preparation, 2) healthy food marketing, and 3) changing a school lunch environment.

LAO Recommendation. The Legislative Analyst's Office recommends that the Legislature consider alternative use for these available funds for other educational purposes, and if it adopts the rate increase they recommend to eliminate the Governor's proposed reporting requirement and expand the training fund for a broader set of expenses, including supplies.

District/YPICS:

AB 1505 will become a serious matter for all charter schools beginning on July 1st. YPICS' immediate focus will be on how to best position all our schools for renewal in the coming years (2022 for MORCS; 2024 for BCCS). All initiatives presented by the ED and EAs have been developed with the goal of realizing renewal for all YPICS.

MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING Between YPI Charter Schools And Think Together, Inc.

PURPOSE

The Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) that follows is a formal agreement to work together to provide expanded learning services funded through 21st Century Community Learning Centers (21st CCLC) program grants received from the California Department of Education (CDE) at school sites within the YPI Charter Schools (YPICS) network. The goal of Think Together programs is to provide the highest quality before- and after-school programming to students within YPICS to improve student outcomes.

SCOPE OF SERVICES

It is agreed that Think Together will serve as the fiscal and administrative agent, as well as the program provider for 21" CCLC programs previously operated by the Youth Policy Institute, as described in Attachment A. Think Together will be responsible for all grant deliverables and comply with all grant requirements established by the CDE. Think Together will provide before-school, after-school, and summer learning programs, as applicable to each school's 21" CCLC grant award. Think Together will hire, train, and supervise all staff members placed at school sites to operate these programs and will purchase all materials and supplies necessary to deliver the services. Think Together will ensure that all staff members meet the minimum qualifications set by Education Code, including §45125.1 with respect to fingerprinting employees for criminal background check, and requiring a negative test result for tuberculosis, Think Together will collaborate with YPICS to develop an evaluation plan, seek input from school administrators regarding program performance, and maintain ongoing communication regarding student needs and overall alignment with goals related to school climate and academic performance. Think Together will foster parent communication and involvement through parent orientations, providing families with a parent handbook outlining program policies and procedures in English and Spanish.

PARTNERSHIP STATUS

In accordance with Education Code §8484.8.(d), YPICS was eligible to receive a 21st CCLC award was contingent upon jointly submitting an application with a community-based organization. YPICS has selected Think Together to serve as its co-applicant and both parties will maintain this partnership for the duration of the Term of each grant, as described in Attachment A, except as provided in the Termination section below.

SCHOOL PARTNER RESPONSIBILITIES

YPICS will provide Think Together with access to and use of the schools' facilities as necessary to meet the terms of this MOU. To the extent possible, the YPICS shall provide one classroom for every twenty students enrolled in the program for use before- and/or after-school. YPICS shall provide daily nutritious snacks for all program participants, and a school breakfast for all students participating in before-school programming, through its National School Lunch Program grant. YPICS agrees to share with Think Together any student data reasonably necessary for the performance of Think Together's duties under this MOU.

This Memorandum of Understanding shall become effective immediately when signed by both parties and remain in effect for the duration of the Term of each grant as described in Attachment A.

TERMINATION

Unless otherwise terminated as provided below, this MOU shall continue in force during the Term, or until the services provided for herein have been fully and completely performed, whichever shall occur first, and shall thereupon terminate.

If YPICS makes a good faith, reasonable determination that Think Together is in default of its obligations under this MOU, YPICS must provide Think Together with a written request to cure the default. If YPICS reasonably believes that the default has not been cured within thirty (30) days of such written request to cure, then YPICS shall have the right to immediately terminate this MOU upon written notification to Think Together and the CDE.

If at any time during the performance of this MOU Think Together determines, at its sole discretion, to suspend indefinitely or abandon the work under this MOU, YPICS shall have the right to terminate the performance of services hereunder by giving sixty (60) days written notification to YPICS and CDE of its intention to terminate.

INDEMNIFICATION

Think Together shall indemnify, pay for the defense of, and hold harmless YPICS and its officers, agents, and employees of and from any and all liabilities, claims, debts, damages, demands, suits, actions, and causes of actions of whatsoever kind, nature or sort which may be incurred by reason of Think Together's negligent or willful acts and/or omissions in rendering any services hereunder. Think Together shall assume full responsibility for payments of federal, state and local taxes or contributions imposed or required under the social security, workers' compensation or income tax law, or any disability or unemployment law, or retirement contribution of any sort whatever, concerning Think Together or any employee of Think Together and shall further indemnify, pay for the defense of, and hold harmless YPICS of and from any such payment or liability arising out of or in any manner connected with Think Together's performance under this MOU.

YPICS shall indemnify, pay for the defense of, and hold harmless Think Together and its officers, agents and employees of and from any and all liabilities, claims, debts, damages, demands, suits, actions, and causes of actions of whatsoever kind, nature or sort which may be incurred by reason of YPICS's negligent or willful acts and/or omissions in relation to this MOU.

INSURANCE

During the entire Term of this MOU, Think Together shall procure, pay for and keep in full force and effect the following types of insurance:

• Comprehensive general liability insurance, including owned and non-owned automobile (vehicle) liability insurance with respect to the services provided by, or on behalf of, Think Together under this MOU. All insurance policies shall state the name of the insurance carrier and name YPICS as an additional insured. Liability insurance for death, bodily injury and property damage shall be for no less than one million dollars (\$1,000,000) per occurrence. Liability insurance for sexual abuse and molestation shall be for a minimum of one million dollars (\$1,000,000) per occurrence, and three million dollars (\$3,000,000) aggregate.

SUBCONTRACT AND ASSIGNMENT

Neither party shall assign its rights, duties, or privileges under this MOU, nor shall either party attempt to confer any of its rights, duties or privileges under this MOU on any third party, without the written consent of the other party.

INDEPENDENT CORPORATION STATUS

This MOU is by and between two independent entities and is not intended to and shall not be construed to create the relationship of agent, servant, employee, partnership, joint venture, or association.

CALIFORNIA LAW

This MOU shall be governed by and the rights, duties, and obligation of the parties shall be determined and enforced in accordance with the laws of the State of California.

AMENDMENT

This MOU may be amended only by written instrument signed by duly authorized representatives of YPICS and Think Together.

MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING Between YPI Charter Schools And Think Together, Inc.

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PURPOSE

The Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) that follows is a formal agreement to work together to provide expanded learning services funded through 21st Century Community Learning Centers (21st CCLC) program grants received from the California Department of Education (CDE) at school sites within the YPI Charter Schools (YPICS) network. The goal of Think Together programs is to provide the highest quality before- and after-school programming to students within YPICS to improve student outcomes.

SCOPE OF SERVICES

It is agreed that Think Together will serve as the fiscal and administrative agent, as well as the program provider for 21st CCLC programs previously operated by the Youth Policy Institute, as described in Attachment A. Think Together will be responsible for all grant deliverables and comply with all grant requirements established by the CDE. Think Together will provide before-school, after-school, and summer learning programs, as applicable to each school's 21st CCLC grant award. Think Together will hire, train, and supervise all staff members placed at school sites to operate these programs and will purchase all materials and supplies necessary to deliver the services. Think Together will ensure that all staff members meet the minimum qualifications set by Education Code, including §45125.1 with respect to fingerprinting employees for criminal background check, and requiring a negative test result for tuberculosis, Think Together will collaborate with YPICS to develop an evaluation plan, seek input from school administrators regarding program performance, and maintain ongoing communication regarding student needs and overall alignment with goals related to school climate and academic performance. Think Together will foster parent communication and involvement through parent orientations, providing families with a parent handbook outlining program policies and procedures in English and Spanish.

PARTNERSHIP STATUS

In accordance with Education Code §8484.8.(d), YPICS was eligible to receive a 21st CCLC award was contingent upon jointly submitting an application with a community-based organization. YPICS has selected Think Together to serve as its co-applicant and both parties will maintain this partnership for the duration of the Term of each grant, as described in Attachment A, except as provided in the Termination section below.

SCHOOL PARTNER RESPONSIBILITIES

YPICS will provide Think Together with access to and use of the schools' facilities as necessary to meet the terms of this MOU. To the extent possible, the YPICS shall provide one classroom for every twenty students enrolled in the program for use before- and/or after-school. YPICS shall provide daily nutritious snacks for all program participants, and a school breakfast for all students participating in before-school programming, through its National School Lunch Program grant. YPICS agrees to share with Think Together any student data reasonably necessary for the performance of Think Together's duties under this MOU.

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TERM

This Memorandum of Understanding shall become effective immediately when signed by both parties and remain in effect for the duration of the Term of each grant as described in Attachment A.

TERMINATION

Unless otherwise terminated as provided below, this MOU shall continue in force during the Term, or until the services provided for herein have been fully and completely performed, whichever shall occur first, and shall thereupon terminate.

If YPICS makes a good faith, reasonable determination that Think Together is in default of its obligations under this MOU, YPICS must provide Think Together with a written request to cure the default. If YPICS reasonably believes that the default has not been cured within thirty (30) days of such written request to cure, then YPICS shall have the right to immediately terminate this MOU upon written notification to Think Together and the CDE.

If at any time during the performance of this MOU Think Together determines, at its sole discretion, to suspend indefinitely or abandon the work under this MOU, YPICS shall have the right to terminate the performance of services hereunder by giving sixty (60) days written notification to YPICS and CDE of its intention to terminate.

INDEMNIFICATION

Think Together shall indemnify, pay for the defense of, and hold harmless YPICS and its officers, agents, and employees of and from any and all liabilities, claims, debts, damages, demands, suits, actions, and causes of actions of whatsoever kind, nature or sort which may be incurred by reason of Think Together's negligent or willful acts and/or omissions in rendering any services hereunder. Think Together shall assume full responsibility for payments of federal, state and local taxes or contributions imposed or required under the social security, workers' compensation or income tax law, or any disability or unemployment law, or retirement contribution of any sort whatever, concerning Think Together or any employee of Think Together and shall further indemnify, pay for the defense of, and hold harmless YPICS of and from any such payment or liability arising out of or in any manner connected with Think Together's performance under this MOU.

YPICS shall indemnify, pay for the defense of, and hold harmless Think Together and its officers, agents and employees of and from any and all liabilities, claims, debts, damages, demands, suits, actions, and causes of actions of whatsoever kind, nature or sort which may be incurred by reason of YPICS's negligent or willful acts and/or omissions in relation to this MOU.

INSURANCE

During the entire Term of this MOU, Think Together shall procure, pay for and keep in full force and effect the following types of insurance:

Comprehensive general liability insurance, including owned and non-owned automobile (vehicle) liability insurance with respect to the services provided by, or on behalf of, Think Together under this MOU. All insurance policies shall state the name of the insurance carrier and name YPICS as an additional insured. Liability insurance for death, bodily injury and property damage shall be for no less than one million dollars (\$1,000,000) per occurrence. Liability insurance for sexual abuse and molestation shall be for a minimum of one million dollars (\$1,000,000) per occurrence, and three million dollars (\$3,000,000) aggregate.

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• Workers' compensation and employers' liability insurance for all Think Together employees and agents as required by law.

The policies of insurance described above shall be carried with responsible and solvent insurance companies authorized to do business in the State of California. True and correct copies of all certificates of insurance reflecting the coverage described above shall be provided to YPICS prior to the commencement of services under this MOU. Think Together agrees that it shall not cancel or change the coverage provided by the policies of insurance described above without first notifying YPICS. Should any such policy of insurance be canceled or changed, Think Together agrees to immediately provide YPICS true and correct copies of all new or revised certificates of insurance.

SUBCONTRACT AND ASSIGNMENT

Neither party shall assign its rights, duties, or privileges under this MOU, nor shall either party attempt to confer any of its rights, duties or privileges under this MOU on any third party, without the written consent of the other party.

INDEPENDENT CORPORATION STATUS

This MOU is by and between two independent entities and is not intended to and shall not be construed to create the relationship of agent, servant, employee, partnership, joint venture, or association.

CALIFORNIA LAW

This MOU shall be governed by and the rights, duties, and obligation of the parties shall be determined and enforced in accordance with the laws of the State of California.

AMENDMENT

This MOU may be amended only by written instrument signed by duly authorized representatives of YPICS and Think Together.

MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING Between YPI Charter Schools And Think Together, Inc.

PURPOSE

The Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) that follows is a formal agreement to work together to provide expanded learning services funded through 21st Century Community Learning Centers (21st CCLC) program grants received from the California Department of Education (CDE) at school sites within the YPI Charter Schools (YPICS) network. The goal of Think Together programs is to provide the highest quality before- and after-school programming to students within YPICS to improve student outcomes.

SCOPE OF SERVICES

It is agreed that Think Together will serve as the fiscal and administrative agent, as well as the program provider for 21st CCLC programs previously operated by the Youth Policy Institute, as described in Attachment A. Think Together will be responsible for all grant deliverables and comply with all grant requirements established by the CDE. Think Together will provide before-school, after-school, and summer learning programs, as applicable to each school's 21st CCLC grant award. Think Together will hire, train, and supervise all staff members placed at school sites to operate these programs and will purchase all materials and supplies necessary to deliver the services. Think Together will ensure that all staff members meet the minimum qualifications set by Education Code, including §45125.1 with respect to fingerprinting employees for criminal background check, and requiring a negative test result for tuberculosis, Think Together will collaborate with YPICS to develop an evaluation plan, seek input from school administrators regarding program performance, and maintain ongoing communication regarding student needs and overall alignment with goals related to school climate and academic performance. Think Together will foster parent communication and involvement through parent orientations, providing families with a parent handbook outlining program policies and procedures in English and Spanish.

PARTNERSHIP STATUS

In accordance with Education Code §8484.8.(d), YPICS was eligible to receive a 21st CCLC award was contingent upon jointly submitting an application with a community-based organization. YPICS has selected Think Together to serve as its co-applicant and both parties will maintain this partnership for the duration of the Term of each grant, as described in Attachment A, except as provided in the Termination section below.

YPICS will provide Think Together with access to and use of the schools' facilities as necessary to meet the terms of this MOU. To the extent possible, the YPICS shall provide one classroom for every twenty students enrolled in the program for use before- and/or after-school. YPICS shall provide daily nutritious snacks for all program participants, and a school breakfast for all students participating in before-school programming, through its National School Lunch Program grant. YPICS agrees to share with Think Together any student data reasonably necessary for the performance of Think Together's duties under this MOU.

Page 1

TERM

This Memorandum of Understanding shall become effective immediately when signed by both parties and remain in effect for the duration of the Term of each grant as described in Attachment A.

TERMINATION

Unless otherwise terminated as provided below, this MOU shall continue in force during the Term, or until the services provided for herein have been fully and completely performed, whichever shall occur first, and shall thereupon terminate.

If YPICS makes a good faith, reasonable determination that Think Together is in default of its obligations under this MOU, YPICS must provide Think Together with a written request to cure the default. If YPICS reasonably believes that the default has not been cured within thirty (30) days of such written request to cure, then YPICS shall have the right to immediately terminate this MOU upon written notification to Think Together and the CDE.

If at any time during the performance of this MOU Think Together determines, at its sole discretion, to suspend indefinitely or abandon the work under this MOU, YPICS shall have the right to terminate the performance of services hereunder by giving sixty (60) days written notification to YPICS and CDE of its intention to terminate.

INDEMNIFICATION

Think Together shall indemnify, pay for the defense of, and hold harmless YPICS and its officers, agents, and employees of and from any and all liabilities, claims, debts, damages, demands, suits, actions, and causes of actions of whatsoever kind, nature or sort which may be incurred by reason of Think Together's negligent or willful acts and/or omissions in rendering any services hereunder. Think Together shall assume full responsibility for payments of federal, state and local taxes or contributions imposed or required under the social security, workers' compensation or income tax law, or any disability or unemployment law, or retirement contribution of any sort whatever, concerning Think Together or any employee of Think Together and shall further indemnify, pay for the defense of, and hold harmless YPICS of and from any such payment or liability arising out of or in any manner connected with Think Together's performance under this MOU.

YPICS shall indemnify, pay for the defense of, and hold harmless Think Together and its officers, agents and employees of and from any and all liabilities, claims, debts, damages, demands, suits, actions, and causes of actions of whatsoever kind, nature or sort which may be incurred by reason of YPICS's negligent or willful acts and/or omissions in relation to this MOU.

INSURANCE

During the entire Term of this MOU, Think Together shall procure, pay for and keep in full force and effect the following types of insurance:

 Comprehensive general liability insurance, including owned and non-owned automobile (vehicle) liability insurance with respect to the services provided by, or on behalf of, Think Together under this MOU. All insurance policies shall state the name of the insurance carrier and name YPICS as an additional insured. Liability insurance for death, bodily injury and property damage shall be for no less than one million dollars (\$1,000,000) per occurrence. Liability insurance for sexual abuse and molestation shall be for a minimum of one million dollars (\$1,000,000) per occurrence, and three million dollars (\$3,000,000) aggregate.

• Workers' compensation and employers' liability insurance for all Think Together employees and agents as required by law.

The policies of insurance described above shall be carried with responsible and solvent insurance companies authorized to do business in the State of California. True and correct copies of all certificates of insurance reflecting the coverage described above shall be provided to YPICS prior to the commencement of services under this MOU. Think Together agrees that it shall not cancel or change the coverage provided by the policies of insurance described above without first notifying YPICS. Should any such policy of insurance be canceled or changed, Think Together agrees to immediately provide YPICS true and correct copies of all new or revised certificates of insurance.

SUBCONTRACT AND ASSIGNMENT

Neither party shall assign its rights, duties, or privileges under this MOU, nor shall either party attempt to confer any of its rights, duties or privileges under this MOU on any third party, without the written consent of the other party.

INDEPENDENT CORPORATION STATUS

This MOU is by and between two independent entities and is not intended to and shall not be construed to create the relationship of agent, servant, employee, partnership, joint venture, or association.

CALIFORNIA LAW

This MOU shall be governed by and the rights, duties, and obligation of the parties shall be determined and enforced in accordance with the laws of the State of California.

AMENDMENT

This MOU may be amended only by written instrument signed by duly authorized representatives of YPICS and Think Together.

NOTICES

Any notice required to be given by the terms of this document shall be deemed to have been given when the same is personally delivered, or sent by first-class mail, postage prepaid, addressed to the respective parties as follows:

RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS YOUTH POLICY INSTITUTE CHARTER SCHOOLS A California Public Benefit Corporation Board Resolution #2020-03

Authorizing the Executive Director To Take Actions Necessary to Protect the Health and Safety of Students and Staff

WHEREAS, the CDC is responding to an outbreak of a respiratory disease caused by a novel (new) coronavirus that was first detected in China and which has now been detected in more than 100 locations internationally, including in the United States;

WHEREAS, the virus has been named "SARS-CoV-2" and the disease it causes has been named "coronavirus disease 2019" (abbreviated "COVID-19");

WHEREAS, the virus that causes COVID-19 is infecting people and spreading easily from person-to-person with cases being detected in most countries worldwide and community spread is being detected in a growing number of countries;

WHEREAS, on March 11, 2020, the COVID-19 outbreak was characterized as a pandemic, a global outbreak of the disease, by the World Health Organization (WHO);

WHEREAS, the complete clinical picture with regard to COVID-19 is not fully known and much uncertainty remains causing high levels of concern among our' families and school communities;

WHEREAS, although no students, staff not family members have been reported to have contracted COVID-19, in an abundance of caution, the YPICA Board of Trustees authorizes the Executive Director to implement any decisions necessary to protect the health and safety of students and staff;

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED:

On recommendation of the Executive Director and the Board of Trustees of the YPI Charter Schools authorizes the continued closure of the three YPICS schools (Bert Corona Charter School, Bert Corona Charter High School and Monsenor Oscar Romero Charter School) through the end of the school year ending June 30, 2020 if needed. The schools will reopen when conditions allow, and with guidance from the Center for Disease Control (CDC), the State and District, the schools will reopen for students.

The Board will be regularly updated during the closure period.
