Don Parcell: Report stands as submitted.

Sara Margiotta: You mention eRate for wireless network upgrade. Is this new?

Don Parcell: No, it is the next recurrence of every 5-7 years to upgrade the infrastructure. This will cost us half of what it would normally cost.

Sara Margiotta: You mention using the one-time grant money. Will this be included in the survey?

Don Parcell: When the time comes, we will talk about how it will be funded. We will discuss that at that time.

I. Chief Business Officer (CBO) Report

Juan Pablo Herrera reviewed CBO report noting that Parent Square is a new system we are introducing and we are getting a 3 month free trial and will see if this is something our parents and families are interested in. We will bring this back to the March BoT meeting.

Karen Ellis: Is this replacing Schoology?

Juan Pablo Herrera: This will be used more for communication and surveys. We are also exploring NFHS, which will gives us streaming capabilities and access to live high school sports around the country. We have confirmed with the IT team that our infrastructure can support this. No major cost to the school.

Maggie Nance: We lost about 27 students recently and I am curious if we have exhausted our waitlist for 9th graders.

Juan Pablo Herrera: The Attendance Office has that data, I do not have it on-hand. The waitlist has been exhausted and the admissions and attendance team is working on recruiting students.

Maggie Nance: What is stopping us from looking at 10th and 11th graders?

Juan Pablo Herrera: It would create issues with the master schedule and the continuity of classes would be interrupted.

Maggie Nance: Are there big demographic changes for fewer kids in the future?

Dr. Pam Magee: This is a trend and the Attendance Office is working on ensuring enrollment is meeting expectations.

Juan Pablo Herrera: Other school districts are facing this issue and we are in a good place because we can take students from outside our school boundaries.

Melissa Schilling: This is also an issue in higher education.

Lisa Saxon: We are also getting children from outside the country.

J. Executive Director/Principal (EDP) Report

Dr. Pam Magee: Report stands as submitted. Everyone is working hard and we are happy to be wrapping up the semester and getting ready for 2023.

Sara Margiotta: Where is the campus mural going?

Dr. Pam Magee: The wall above the A building, facing the quad.

Sara Margiotta: Where are the funds coming from for that?

Sara Margiotta: The DataLinks updates have been very helpful, but I am wondering how are we going to put in place all of the recommendations?

Sara Margiotta: They are talking about the school going 1-1 with devices and we need to make sure the technology plan that is submitted is vettedby B&F and the BOT.

Dr. Pam Magee: We learned a lot of lessons and will not do that.

MGAC/Pool:

- Thank you to our lap swim community! Our "Support our Local Pool" Campaign raised ~\$10k and will be applied to pool repairs. Thank you all!
- Fiscal Status Q2 Revenue was \$121,000
- PCHS Water-Polo and Swim Team support ongoing
- 7 ARC FA/CPR/AED Classes Delivered Dec-Jan
- MGAC is conducting an ARC Lifeguard Certification in March. Contact bking@palihigh.org if interested.
- Safety Coordination provided for 1/18/22 Earthquake Evacuation Drill Thank you to the Los Angeles Department of Transportation (Special Events Unit) and LAPD SLO Espin for the additional support.
- MGAC is entering into our 14th year of operations and anticipate a major repair at our 15th year mark. We project this repair will require a 4 week closure (August month identified as target month).
 - 1. Re-Plaster Both Pools (~\$300k)
 - 2. Replace cantilever concrete, which is showing signs of deterioration (~\$450k)

Transportation/Buses:

- The PCHS School Bus Program & Schedule, as well as Special Ed, Late and Competition Buses, are all operating normally.
- The 2023-24 School Year Transportation Registration and Scholarship Application process is scheduled to open in conjunction with the Admission Enrollment process via OLR in early March.

Information Technology:

- 219 tickets were opened in the past month with 201 of them closed or waiting. Most ticket response
 times continue to be within 2 hours during the business day. Common ticket trends this period are
 printers/printing problems, consumable requests, followed by application/software issues and finally
 projection problems. The Tech Dept. has 664 devices currently checked out to students for the 202223 school year.
- Data synchronization between Infinite Campus and ParentSquare, a communication platform, was
 configured during the Winter Break. After training, a pilot group will be setup so the system can be
 tested and measured against PCHS's needs. If the pilot is deemed successful, ParentSquare could
 replace all methods currently used and centralize communication for all stakeholders.
- Round 1 of replacement staff laptops continue to be distributed while we wait for the Round 2
 laptops to arrive. If everything continues as planned and arrives/is distributed this year, the 2023-24
 SY staff device order will be 30-35 devices (final numbers will depend on not yet finalized staffing and
 any future breakdowns this semester).

Information Technology (Continued):

- Five of our ordered Eight Konica copier/printer machines have arrived. Two faculty/staff production
 machines in the copy room and three student devices are in place and in use. Currently there is no
 status on the other Three Konica machines, which will replace the copiers in the Main, Attendance,
 and AA offices. PIN code requirement has been reinstituted on the faculty/staff devices. The student
 devices are nearly ready to be rolled out, along with a remote print client for both staff and students.
- Continuing to support PRA requests/searches as needed.
- Work with the Deans continues in full swing. IT is supporting the Deans office with Bark reports, camera support, and IC reporting.
- Working with cafeteria vendor Chartwells and the CBO, we are planning a much-needed uplift of the
 cafeteria Point-of-Sale (POS) devices. The current devices are aged beyond support and have swollen
 batteries, screen breakage, or other issues that prevent them from being usable for service. New
 devices have arrived and been configured. We are waiting on mounting and security hardware before
 the devices can be put into production.
- Infinite Campus POS 2.0 has been released. We've been working with the cafeteria team to develop new menus for use with the new system and are planning to implement on the new POS hardware.
- 45 Promethean panels were deployed around campus. IT has attended an admin training and
 continues to work with the company to resolve issues. So far, the response to the panels is
 overwhelmingly positive from both faculty and students. We are now working with individual
 classroom teachers on mounting potential, locations, and one-on-one training sessions with IT. The
 expected funding availability for a Round 2 of orders is being discussed and planned.
- Working with data vendor on the creation of needed recurring reports from Infinite Campus.
- Ongoing facilitation/support of several EdTech digital classroom resources to ensure all applications are accounted for, accessible/usable and can be supported by IT.
- The Tech Team is continuing to update and create training materials for faculty and staff. The Schoology Palisades Technology Enthusiasts, which all staff are a member of, houses the first of these updates. Many more to come!
- As part of the server refresh, multiple servers were migrated to and consolidated on a new host, upgraded, and had additional resources applied to the machines. Of the servers that remain, one is still awaiting a Finance Department migration of QuickBooks licensing and data and the final server is waiting on an aged-out Permits Dept. Facilities Scheduling System (EMS) to be decommissioned and replaced with the cloud-based system FMX. The newly implemented "PCHS Calendar" (powered by FMX) is in use, and once utilized and vetted for another month, will enable EMS to be retired.
- IT spent over 100 hours during Winter Break to resolve gradebook issues in Infinite Campus after the Semester 1 grading window closed. A significant number of grades were not posted by teachers, which required IT to manually transfer grades, if available, from Schoology to Infinite Campus.

Information Technology (Continued):

- Planning for an eRate supplemented update to the wireless network has nearly concluded. Next steps will be working with our eRate vendor on a bid and securing funding through the available grants and 2023-24 PCHS budget process to move forward with a hopeful Summer 2023 installation. The estimated cost at this time is between \$750,000 and \$1,000,000. The eRate portion of this funding is ~\$250,000.
- The amazing Pali Booster Club has generously provided for a mobile audio and video system that will enhance the quality of audio and provide for the addition of video, for our large format meetings, such as the Board of Trustees meeting. Once we receive a key component, we will implement and schedule the system for use as requested by school wide meeting organizers. Thank you, Boosters!
- Preliminary feedback on our recently hired Copy Clerk has been extraordinarily positive. As you know, a good Copy Clerk on campus often achieves rock-star status. Thank you HR for working so long to find a quality person for this critical role!
- As an FYI PCHS currently has ~\$8,500 in outstanding fees/fines for seniors that are related to Tech Devices, Textbooks and Library Books as recorded in the Destiny Tracking System. There is much more outstanding related to Freshman thru Junior students as well, but with seniors graduating this semester, the ~\$8,500 is at greater risk of being lost without extra effort collection efforts.

- This project has LAUSD-FSD Support and has been cleared to proceed independently (and could be simultaneously) with the Campus-Wide Non-Bungalows A/C Project.
- Catalyze has finalized their Detailed Specifications and Conceptual Design, Schedule and Cost Estimate, which has been submitted to LAUSD-FSD for review. Once Catalyze and LAUSD can reach agreement on terms and conditions of a long-term contract, they will start getting into Detail Architectural & Engineering Construction Design, submit for LAUSD BOC approval, LAUSD Board approval, and DSA Submittal/Approval.

CBO Report Board of Trustees Meeting January 24, 2023

2022-2023 BUDGET UPDATE

- The attached budget vs actuals reflects revenue and expenditures through Dec 31, 2022.
- PCHS is on track to meet its fiscal obligations.
- Note: the year-to-date transportation expense appears high, but we need to apply student/family fees, Booster donation and competition team fees.
- ADA (average daily attendance) is 2,797. As a reminder, this is the largest revenue assumption. We decreased the ADA from 2,820 during our First Interim Report (last month).
- As noted in the first interim presentation, the CDE will soon publish our allocation for the COVID-19 ADA loss mitigation revenue. We anticipate it to be approximately \$700,000 and look forward to receiving guidance on how to account for the revenue.
- In addition, the Learning Recovery Emergency Grant and Arts, Instructional Materials & IMA grant revenue will post, but we won't account for it until there is a board approved spending plan.

INVESTMENT OF RETIREE FUND

- As part of the recent CSD Oversight visit, LAUSD acknowledged our retiree benefit investment fund, but recommended that we establish a trust.
- US Bank is sending over a proposal for trustee services. We will schedule a Lifetime Health Benefits committee meeting to review and approve the proposal.

COMPLIANCE

- The independent audit for 2021-22 is nearly complete. We requested (and were granted) an extension. The audit firm will present the audit report at the February board meeting. Prior to the board meeting, the audit firm will also review the audit report with the PCHS audit committee.
- The actuarial valuation for 2021-22 is also in process. We are working closely with the actuary to provide updated census data and financial information.

2023-2024 Budget Development Process

- Next month, we will kick-off the budget development process for 2023-2024
- CBO attended the Governor's State Budget workshop on January 19, 2023. Some key highlights:
 - The Governor projects a ~\$22.5 Billion budget deficit in 2023-24. However, through funding delays, reductions, pullbacks, and shifting, the Governor was able to meet the K-12 funding requirement.
 - o Projected COLA: 8.13%
 - This applies to LCFF and categorial funding (special education, child nutrition, mandate block grant, etc.).
 - This amount may also change by the time the State budget is adopted. Only 6 of the 8 economic indicators that make-up the COLA formula are available.



- O Pension Obligations: Employer paid STRS remains at 19.10%, but PERS increases from a projected 25.2% to 27%.
- Equity Multiplier: provides additional funding to highest-needs schools. Unfortunately, PCHS does NOT qualify.
- Recommendations:
 - Review one-time categorical funding by deadline (one-time grants)
 - FTE/staffing review ahead of Feb/March
 - Bargain with dollars, not percentages
 - Review local enrollment trends and attendance rates

Executive Director/Principal Report Board of Trustees Meeting January 24, 2023

Our mission: PCHS will empower our diverse student population to make positive contributions to the global community by dedicating our resources to ensure educational excellence, civic responsibility, and personal growth.

Schoolwide Goals - Academic Achievement/Professional Development/Diversity Spring Professional Development

PCHS faculty and staff returned from Winter Break on January 9, 2023 to a day of professional development focused on campus culture and climate. PCHS cares deeply about providing a safe and equitable climate for every student, which is why we decided to start 2023 with a recommitment to our Campus Climate & Culture Pledge. Having a strong sense of safety and belonging at school are critical elements of a positive learning environment where students can thrive.

PCHS Campus Climate & Culture Pledge

PCHS will not tolerate and will stand against any form of hate or discrimination based on race, ethnicity, religion, gender, abilities, sexual orientation, citizenship, or socioeconomic status. Our goal is for all students and staff to know they are safe, valued, and respected.

Our vision is to become a cohesive and constructive community for students to learn who they want to be. As staff members, we are fully committed to our mission statement. Together we will cultivate an uplifting environment where students are inspired and empowered to pursue their personal aspirations.

January 9, 2023 - Teacher/Staff Professional Development

Richard Eaton, Director of Research at the Simon Wiesenthal Center/Director of the Center's Digital Terrorism and Hate Project, spoke to teachers, staff and administrators about increasing hate incidents and reports of antisemitism in schools such as PCHS, local areas, nationwide, as well as on social media. This presentation launched an ongoing PCHS professional development series in collaboration with the Museum of Tolerance focused on creating and maintaining positive school climate and culture, developing safe environments for sensitive critical conversations, and responding to everyday bias and stereotypes.

January 11, 2023 - Student Campus Climate & Culture Survey

PCHS conducted this important schoolwide survey to hear student opinions about our school. The anonymous survey asked for opinions on questions ranging from student engagement to bullying, to the conditions of the school building itself. Responses will be used to improve the student experience at PCHS. The survey results will be studied by our administration, the school's equity team, and our leadership teams to inform equity action plans for our school.

Math Task Force

The PCHS Math Task Force has reconvened to analyze current data to make recommendations for math related policies and practices. The task force includes math teachers, academic and college counselors, parents, students and administrators.

Schoolwide Goals - Academic Achievement/Communication/Organizational Excellence Communication - ParentSquare

ParentSquare is a two-way parent communication portal that enables parents to send and receive information about student attendance, sign permission slips, communicate with teachers, and receive important updates about school functions. ParentSquare operates through an application that sends notifications directly to the parent's phone, translated into the family's home language. In the next few months, Pali will be piloting ParentSquare to implement stronger communication between parents, teachers, and administration.







PCHS AT A GLANCE - Palisades Charter High School is a financially independent comprehensive four year public high school. In 1993 a Charter was approved by the Los Angeles Unified School District and the California State Department of Education, which specified accountability for higher levels of student achievement. In 2003, all school stakeholder groups unanimously supported the transition to financial independence and accountability. Palisades Charter High School is a California nonprofit public benefit corporation governed by an elected Board of Trustees, and is a California Distinguished School.

Palisades Charter High School is fully accredited by the Western Association of Schools and Colleges (WASC) until 2024. The school year includes two semesters of 20 weeks each. Periods 1 through 6 meet every other day for approximately 100 minutes each. Periods 0 and 7 are optional and meet daily for 55 minutes. These periods are used for students who would like to take additional electives such as; AP Computer Science Principles, language courses, drama and orchestra courses.

Students earn elective credits for college eligibility by completing additional math, science, and foreign language courses. Students are required to take 5 credits of Computer Science. Students must complete ten hours of community service per year. (Waived during COVID)

Class of 2022 GPA/CLASS RANK - Effective August 1, 2020, PCHS will no longer use ranking. Grades are calculated on a 4.0 scale based on all grades earned in the 9th, 10th, and 11th grades. If classes are repeated, both grades are included. Only AP grades are weighted in computing GPA (unweighted GPA is augmented .025 point per AP per semester). The grading system is A-B-C-D-F; D is a passing grade for high school graduation purposes. Courses completed outside of Palisades Charter High School are included on the transcript only if the course or the credits are required for graduation.

Effective as of the 2020-2021 school year, Palisades Charter High School will no longer rank our students. This decision was approved by our Board of Directors in efforts to more accurately depict our student's individual academic performance. Palisades Charter High School offers an extremely rigorous program including college level AP courses. very demanding honors level courses alongside a very strong high school curriculum. In 2021-2022 year due to the AB140 bill, students had the option to take a Pass/No Credit grade.

TEST SCORES

In May 2022, 1,179 AP exams were administered in 24 subjects, with 31% of the students scoring 5, 31% scoring 4, and 25% scoring 3, for an overall pass rate of 87%. Pass rates for AP courses:



The calculation of GPA ("grade point average") converts high school letter grades to a number. An "A" is worth 4 points, a "B" is worth 3 points, a "C" is worth 2 points, a "D" is worth 1 point, and an "F" is worth 0 points. Extra credit is given for AP courses only. College courses that are not required for graduation will not be put on your high school transcript and will not be included in your Pali GPA. Generally, colleges count only grades earned in academic courses when calculating your GPA and will give extra credit for most honors courses.

To calculate your Pali GPA, count the number of A, B, C, D and F grades on your transcript and enter those numbers in Column 1 below. ALL grades (including PE, service, summer school, college courses required for high school graduation, repeated courses) from 9th grade through first semester of 12th grade, are included in your final Pali High GPA. If it is on your transcript, it will be included in your GPA. Multiply the numbers in Column 1 by the number next to it and enter the total in Column 2. Total the numbers in Column 1 and Column 2. **Divide the number in Column 2 by the number in Column 1, and add the AP augmentation if applicable (see below)**. For example, if you have taken two AP courses and got a "C" or better in all four semesters, you will get four AP augmentation points; 4 x .025 = .1, so you will add .1 to your GPA.



TESTING, TESTING, 1-2-3!

With the 2022-23 school year well under way, here is some important information about the school's spring assessment season. PCHS students will take up to four different types of assessments to measure student and school achievement.

1. California Assessment of Student Performance and Progress (CAASPP)

Students at Palisades Charter High School take the CAASPP state tests that assess interdisciplinary state-standard achievement in English Language Arts, Math, and other core subjects. These standardized tests have moved away from previous fill-in-the bubble exams that focused on rote memorization to a format that requires students to explain their reasoning and write out their answers.

These new tests measure more complex, real-world skills such as critical-thinking, writing, and problem solving so that every student can successfully transition from grade to grade and be prepared for his or her next steps after high school. Palisades Charter High School will give the various CAASPP tests during the spring semester. The tests

PCHS State Test and Assessment Policy

As a California public charter school, PCHS administers all California state-mandated assessments in the California Assessment of Student Performance and Progress (CAASPP). In addition to California state-mandated assessments in the CAASPP. PCHS has selected and developed other assessments designed to provide students, parents/guardians, and the school with feedback on student performance. The school uses the results of these assessments to make adjustments to the instructional program to ensure that students are adequately prepared for success in college and careers. These assessments may include department-created writing prompts, department-created multiple-choice assessments, computer-based assessments, and third-party standardized assessments. The selection and development of the PCHS assessments is a local decision made by the PCHS instructional departments. Careful consideration is given to the purpose of these assessments, the usefulness of the results, and the instructional time necessary for the administration of the tests. The administration and testing personnel determine the assessment dates and bell schedule.

are not timed, so students may take as long as they need to fully demonstrate what they know and can do.

We know that an end-of-the-year test cannot possibly tell us *everything* about your child's academic progress. However, the results do act as a snapshot of your child's strengths and areas for improvement, and they can be used as a way to ensure he or she is getting the support he or she needs. Additionally, the tests help Palisades Charter High School's efforts to equitably distribute resources and support student learning. The CAASPP battery of tests are listed below:

- The Interim Assessment Blocks (IAB) are administered in grades 9-11. These are formative state tests given in the classroom. The student results are reported to teachers in a short amount of time and are used to determine how students are progressing toward meeting state standards.
- The California Science Test (CAST) is administered in the 11th grade. Any junior or senior who has not taken the assessment will be tested in March.
- The California Alternative Assessment (CAA) replaces the CAPA test andt is administered to students whose Individualized Education Plan (IEP) requires an alternative assessment.
- The Smarter Balanced Summative Assessments (SBAC) is given to juniors. The scores that students earn will help to determine placement in their senior classes. Additionally, colleges and universities use these results to determine college readiness. Our students' collective SBAC scores produce a part of the PCHS school performance state score. The SBAC tests in English Language Arts/Literacy and Mathematics will be administered in social studies and English classes during March, April, and May.
- The California Science Test (CST) is given the Native Speakers Spanish II class and is used, in part, to determine elibibility for the seal of bilitracy.

There are no grades associated with any assessment in the CAASPP program. However, PCHS-developed or selected assessments are often graded, and students who do not participate in PCHS-selected or developed assessments may receive a grade indicating lack of participation and may lose opportunities to participate in optional school activities or academic honor federations and societies.

All students must fully participate in PCHS assessments in their 9th-, 10th- and 11th-grade years to be eligible to participate in optional activities such as senior activities, school extracurricular activities, school athletics, and academic honor federations and societies. Students who clearly disregard an assessment as determined by the testing coordinator or test proctor will be regarded as having refused to comply with the testing requirement and may be subject to loss of senior activities, school extracurricular activities, school athletics, and academic honor federations and societies. For example: If the student does not complete the English writing assessment in the 9th grade, he/she/they may be ineligible for student activities during his/her/their 10th-grade year. Eligibility will be reinstated for the 11th-grade year if the student sits for all assessments in his/her/their 10th-grade year. For information about this policy, contact the Director of Academic Achievement.

Per California Education Code 60615, parents and guardians have the right to exempt their child from participating in the CAASPP program. The CAASPP program includes the grade 11 Smarter Balanced Assessments in ELA and Mathematics, CAASPP interim assessments, and the California Science Test. Students not participating in the CAASPP program are expected to be in attendance at school during the testing periods each day, and they will be required to complete an alternative school assessment during these periods.

2. Advanced Placement Tests

After spring break, PCHS will hit the ground running in preparation for AP course finals and AP College Board testing. In May 2022, PCHS administered 1,179 AP exams with an overall pass rate of 87%.


The AP College Board exams are given in May to students who are currently enrolled in AP classes. The College Center proctors all the AP tests given at PCHS. Each June, AP teachers and college faculty gather for the AP Reading, where they score the free-response sections of the AP Exams.

3. NWEA Testing

Students learn better — and more quickly — when teachers have a clear picture of what students know and how they are growing academically. That's why a group of educators and researchers founded NWEA®, a not-for-profit organization that has created some of the most trusted and reliable assessment solutions available. MAP Growth uses a RIT scale to accurately measure what students know, regardless of their grade level. It also measures growth over time, allowing you to track your child's progress throughout the school year and across multiple years. Once your child completes a MAP Growth test, they receive a RIT score. The RIT scale precisely measures student performance, regardless of whether they're performing at, above, or below grade level. The Norm Grade Level Mean (RIT) is the average among students in the same grade, subject, and testing term from the Norms study. You can use this data to compare students to others in the United States.

4. Physical Fitness Test

The Physical Fitness Test (PFT) for ninth-grade students in California schools is the FITNESSGRAM®. The test has six parts that determine a level of fitness. The test results can be used by students, teachers, and parents to encourage students to build life-long habits of regular physical activity. This exam is administered in PE classes between Feb. 1 and March 17, 2023.

STATE AND PCHS TESTING/ASSESSMENT POLICY

As a California public charter school, PCHS administers all California state-mandated assessments in the California Assessment of Student Performance and Progress (CAASPP). In addition to California state-mandated assessments in the CAASPP, PCHS has selected and developed other assessments designed to provide students, parents/guardians, and the school with feedback on student performance. The school uses the results of these assessments to make adjustments to the instructional program to ensure that students are adequately prepared for success in college and careers. These assessments may include department-created writing prompts, department-created multiple-choice assessments, computer-based assessments, and third-party standardized assessments. The selection and development of the PCHS assessments is a local decision made by the PCHS instructional departments. Careful consideration is given to the purpose of these assessments, the usefulness of the results, and the instructional time necessary for the administration of the tests. The administration and testing personnel determine the assessment dates and bell schedule.

There are no grades associated with any assessment in the CAASPP program. However, PCHS-developed or selected assessments are often graded, and students who do not participate in PCHS-selected or developed assessments may receive a grade indicating lack of participation and may lose opportunities to participate in optional school activities or academic honor federations and societies.
