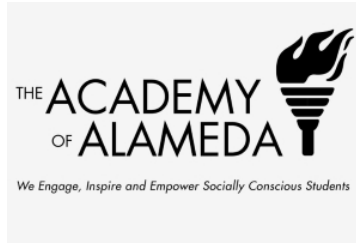

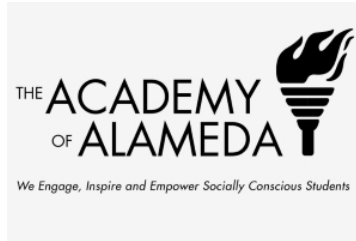

What To Do If You Think You Find A Mistake On Your Statement

If you think there is an error on your statement, please call us at the telephone number on the front of this statement, or write to us at: Elan Financial Services, P.O. Box 6335, Fargo, ND 58125-6335.

In your letter or call, give us the following information:

- ▶ Account information: Your name and account number.
- ▶ Dollar amount: The dollar amount of the suspected error.
- ▶ Description of Problem: If you think there is an error on your bill, describe what you believe is wrong and why you believe it is a mistake. You must contact us within 60 days after the error appeared on your statement. While we investigate whether or not there has been an error, the following are true:
 - ▶ We cannot try to collect the amount in question, or report you as delinquent on that amount.
 - ▶ The charge in question may remain on your statement, and we may continue to charge you interest on that amount. But, if we determine that we made a mistake, you will not have to pay the amount in question or any interest or other fees related to that amount.
 - ▶ While you do not have to pay the amount in question, you are responsible for the remainder of your balance.
 - ▶ We can apply any unpaid amount against your credit limit.

Your Rights If You Are Dissatisfied With Your Credit Card Purchases

If you are dissatisfied with the goods or services that you have purchased with your credit card, and you have tried in good faith to correct the problem with the merchant, you may have the right not to pay the remaining amount due on the purchase.

To use this right, all of the following must be true:

1. The purchase must have been made in your home state or within 100 miles of your current mailing address, and the purchase price must have been more than \$50. (Note: Neither of these are necessary if your purchase was based on an advertisement we mailed to you, or if we own the company that sold you the goods or services.)
2. You must have used your credit card for the purchase. Purchases made with cash advances from an ATM or with a check that accesses your credit card account do not qualify.
3. You must not yet have fully paid for the purchase.

While we investigate, the same rules apply to the disputed amount as discussed above. After we finish our investigation, we will tell you our decision. At that point, if we think you owe an amount and you do not pay we may report you as delinquent.

Important Information Regarding Your Account

1. INTEREST CHARGE: Method of Computing Balance Subject to Interest Rate: We calculate the periodic rate or interest portion of the **INTEREST CHARGE** by multiplying the applicable Daily Periodic Rate ("**DPR**") by the Average Daily Balance ("**ADB**") (including new transactions) of the Purchase, Advance and Balance Transfer categories subject to interest, and then adding together the resulting interest from each category. We determine the **ADB** separately for the Purchases, Advances and Balance Transfer categories. To get the **ADB** in each category, we add together the daily balances in those categories for the billing cycle and divide the result by the number of days in the billing cycle. We determine the daily balances each day by taking the beginning balance of those Account categories (including any billed but unpaid interest, fees, credit insurance and other charges), adding any new interest, fees, and charges, and subtracting any payments or credits applied against your Account balances that day. STUDENT WELLNESS POLICY

The Academy of Alameda (“AoA” or the “Charter School”) is committed to the optimal development of every student. AoA believes that for students to have the opportunity to achieve personal, academic, developmental and social success, we need to create positive, safe and health-promoting learning environments at every level, in every setting, throughout the school year.

Research shows that two components, good nutrition and physical activity before, during and after the school day, are strongly correlated with positive student outcomes. Conversely, less-than-adequate consumption of specific foods including fruits, vegetables and dairy products, is associated with lower grades among students. In addition, students who are physically active through active transport to and from school, recess, physical activity breaks, high-quality physical education and extracurricular activities – do better academically. Finally, there is evidence that adequate hydration is associated with better cognitive performance.

This Policy outlines AoA’s approach to ensuring environments and opportunities for all students to practice healthy eating and physical activity behaviors throughout the school day while minimizing commercial distractions. Specifically, this Policy establishes goals and procedures to ensure that:

- Students in AoA have access to healthy foods throughout the school day—both through reimbursable school meals and other foods available throughout the Charter School campus—in accordance with Federal and state nutrition standards.
- Students receive quality nutrition education that helps them develop lifelong healthy eating behaviors.
- Students have opportunities to be physically active before, during and after the school day.
- The Charter School engages in nutrition and physical activity promotion and other activities that promote student wellness.
- Charter School staff are encouraged and supported to practice healthy nutrition and physical activity behaviors in and out of school.

- The Charter School establishes and maintains an infrastructure for management, oversight, implementation, communication about and monitoring of this Policy and its established goals and objectives.

This Policy applies to all students and staff in AoA.

I. Charter School Wellness Committee

Committee Role and Membership

Working with the Executive Director and assigned designees, key stakeholders, and other appropriate persons shall serve as an advisory group to oversee the implementation and evaluation of the Policy. AoA encourages the participation of parents, students, community partners, representatives of the school nutrition services, physical education teachers, school health professionals, the school board, and school administrators in the Wellness Policy process. The advisory group shall meet annually to review the Wellness Policy, advise school leadership on nutrition-related policies, protocols, and programs as needed.

Leadership

The Executive Director or designee(s) will convene the advisory group annually to facilitate the development of and updates to the Policy and will ensure the Charter School's compliance with the Policy.

II. Wellness Policy Implementation, Monitoring, Accountability and Community Engagement

- Documentation to demonstrate compliance with the annual public notification requirements and community involvement requirements.
- Documentation of the triennial assessment of the Policy.
- Documentation demonstrating the most recent assessment on the implementation of the Policy has been made available to the public.

Annual Notification of Policy

AoA will actively inform families and the public each year of basic information about this Policy, including its content, any updates to the Policy, and implementation status. AoA will make this information available via the Charter School website and/or Charter School-wide communications.

Revisions and Updating the Policy

AoA will review this Policy annually and update or modify this Policy at least every three (3) years as needed. Updates will take into consideration the results of the annual Charter School spring student and family surveys; Charter School priorities change; community needs change; new health science information; and if new Federal or state guidance or standards are issued.

Community Involvement, Outreach and Communications

AoA is committed to being responsive to community input, which begins with awareness of the Policy. AoA will actively communicate ways in which representatives of advisory group/the Charter School and others can participate in the development, implementation and periodic review and update of this Policy through a variety of means. AoA will also inform parents of the improvements that have been made to school meals and compliance with school meal standards, availability of child nutrition programs and how to apply, and a description of and compliance with Smart Snacks in Charter School nutrition standards.

AoA will use electronic mechanisms, such as email or displaying notices on the Charter School's website, as well as non-electronic mechanisms, such as newsletters, presentations to parents, or sending information home to parents, to ensure that all families are actively notified of the content of, implementation of, and updates to this Policy, as well as how to get involved and support the Policy. The Charter School will ensure that communications are culturally and linguistically appropriate to the community and accomplished through means similar to other ways that other local schools are communicating important school information with parents.

The Charter School will actively notify the public about the content of, the implementation of, and any updates to the Policy annually, at a minimum AoA will also use these mechanisms to inform the community about the availability of the annual and triennial reports.

III. Nutrition***Charter School Meals***

AoA participates in USDA child nutrition programs, including the National School Lunch Program ("NSLP"), the School Breakfast Program ("SBP"), and *Summer Food Service Program* ("SFSP"). The Charter School is committed to offering school meals through the NSLP, SBP, and SFSP programs, and other applicable Federal child nutrition programs, that:

Water

To promote hydration, free, safe, unflavored drinking water will be available to all students throughout the school day. AoA will make drinking water available where school meals are served during mealtimes.

Competitive Foods and Beverages

The Charter School is committed to ensuring that all foods and beverages available to students on the Charter School campus during the school day support healthy eating. The foods and beverages sold to students on campus during the school day (including the period from the midnight before, to 30 minutes after the end of the official school day) and served outside of the Charter School meal programs (e.g., “competitive” foods and beverages) will meet the USDA Smart Snacks in School nutrition standards, at a minimum. Smart Snacks aim to improve student health and well-being, increase consumption of healthful foods during the school day and create an environment that reinforces the development of healthy eating habits.

Celebrations and Rewards

All foods offered on the AoA campus will meet or exceed the USDA Smart Snacks in Charter School nutrition standards, including through:

1. Celebrations and parties. AoA will provide a list of healthy party ideas to parents and teachers, including non-food celebration ideas.
2. Classroom snacks brought by parents. AoA will provide to parents a list of foods and beverages that meet Smart Snacks nutrition standards.
3. Rewards and incentives. AoA will provide teachers and other relevant school staff a list of alternative ways to reward children. Foods and beverages will not be used as a reward, or withheld as punishment for any reason, such as for performance or behavior.

Fundraising

Foods and beverages that meet or exceed the USDA Smart Snacks in Charter Schools nutrition standards may be sold through fundraisers on the AoA campus during the school day. AoA will make available to parents and teachers a list of healthy fundraising ideas.

Nutrition Promotion

AoA will promote healthy food and beverage choices for all students on the school campus, as well as encourage participation in school meal programs. This promotion will occur through implementing food promotion through the school meal programs, and ensuring 100% of foods and beverages promoted to students meet the USDA Smart Snacks in Charter School nutrition standards.

Food and Beverage Marketing in Schools

The CDC recommends that aerobic activity make up the bulk of such physical activity, with vigorous-intensity aerobic activity on at least three days per week. The CDC also recommends that physical activity include muscle strengthening activities, such as gymnastics or push-ups, on at least three days per week, and bone strengthening activities like jumping rope or running at least three days per week.

V. Other Activities that Promote Student Wellness

AoA will coordinate and integrate other initiatives related to physical activity, physical education, nutrition and other wellness components to work towards the same set of goals and objectives promoting student well-being, optimal development and strong educational outcomes when appropriate.

All Charter School-sponsored events will adhere to this Policy’s wellness guidelines. All Charter School-sponsored wellness events will include physical activity and healthy eating opportunities when appropriate.

Partnership Engagement

AoA will provide Policy updates and resources linked to the Policy to students, parents/guardians, and community stakeholders through means such as school newsletters, educational material, parent/guardian and community meetings, school websites, social media, and/or other communications. AoA will review opportunities for partnerships with the community in support of promoting nutrition, health, and wellness opportunities for students, families, and staff members.

E-BIKES AND MOTORIZED SCOOTER POLICY

E-bikes and other motorized personal vehicles, particularly when operated by minors under the age of 16, present unique safety risks on and around school campuses.

These risks may impact both the rider and surrounding students due to speed, weight, and limited operating experience among younger users.

Students and minors under the age of 16 are prohibited from bringing Class 2 1 or Class 3 2 e-bikes, e-scooters 3, and e-boards 4 onto any Charter School campus.

This does not apply to parents/guardians, Charter School employees, or authorized visitors over age 16, who may use legally compliant e-bikes for transportation and may park but not ride them on Charter School property except for medical purposes.

1 Class 2 electric bicycle is equipped with a motor that may be used exclusively to propel the bicycle, and that is not capable of providing assistance when the bicycle reaches a speed of 20 miles per hour.

2 Class 3 electric bicycle is equipped with a motor that provides assistance only when the rider is pedaling, and that ceases to provide assistance when the bicycle reaches a speed of 28 miles per hour. This bicycle is equipped with a speedometer.

3 An electric scooter is a two-wheeled device with handlebars and a floorboard designed to be stood upon while riding (or it can have a seat that does not interfere with ability to stand and ride, and is powered by electricity or other power source but may also be designed to be powered by human propulsion.

4 An electrically motorized board, or hoverboard, is any wheeled device that has a floorboard designed to be stood upon when riding, that is not greater than 60 inches deep and 18 inches wide, and designed to transport only one person. The device has an electric propulsion system averaging less than 1,000 watts, with a maximum speed of no more than 20 miles per hour

EXTREME WEATHER POLICY

Background and Purpose

Education Code section 33355 was enacted through SB 1248. The law required the California Department of Education (“CDE”) to compile and post standardized guidance identifying temperature thresholds or index ratings that should trigger modifications to student physical activities during extreme weather conditions. CDE has now issued that **guidance** that was used in the creation of this policy.

The purpose of this document is to develop clear criteria for determining when weather conditions are considered extreme weather conditions and warrant modification or cessation of outdoor physical activities. This policy will outline the following:

- Procedures for monitoring weather forecasts and alerts to anticipate extreme weather conditions.
- Protocols for communicating with staff, pupils, and parents or guardians regarding changes to outdoor activities due to extreme weather or air quality conditions.
- Designation of indoor alternative activities that can be safely conducted during extreme weather or air quality conditions.
- Training for staff members on recognizing signs of weather-related distress in pupils and appropriate response measures.
- Coordination with relevant local agencies and experts to ensure timely access to weather-related information and resources.

Procedures

It will be the responsibility of a member of The Academy of Alameda leadership team, which includes the Executive Director, Principal, and Director of Operations, to make the determination on whether or not it is safe for students to participate in outdoor activities during various weather conditions. In the absence of all 3 of those individuals, the Dean of Students can serve as an

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alternate to make the determination. The guidelines for determining safety will be based on both state and federal guidelines as listed below.

When a change in weather conditions or air quality requires a modification to outdoor schedules, all staff will be notified immediately via email, chat, and / or walkie talkie channels. In extreme cases where outdoor activities are suspended or postponed due to extreme weather conditions or air quality, a member of the leadership team will notify families via ParentSquare.

Extreme Heat

In the case of extreme heat as monitored by the National Weather Service [here](#), The Academy of Alameda will use the published California Department of Public Health Heat Risk grid to determine the level activity that is safe for students.

**Populations at higher risk of heat-related health impacts include older adults, young children, unhoused residents, those with chronic health conditions, outdoor workers, those exercising or doing strenuous activities outdoors during the heat of the day, pregnant individuals, those living in low-income communities, and more.*

*** For Extreme (Magenta/4) and Major (Red/3) risk levels, CDPH recommends more caution and therefore guides canceling outdoor activities based on these scenarios.*

- During heat risks of Minor, outdoor activities will continue as normal, with an increase to hydration breaks as needed.
- During heat risks of Moderate, outdoor activities will be limited to 15 minute intervals with extended required cool down and hydration breaks. If space is available, indoor PE can occur in the gym instead of outdoors.

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- During heat risk conditions of Major and above, outdoor recess and PE classes will be moved inside, and alternative indoor recess and PE activities will be conducted by teachers. Because AC is not available in the building, we will use fans to keep classrooms cool.

Air Quality

The Academy of Alameda will monitor air quality using the AirNow website here. Activities based on air quality will follow the CDPH recommendations listed in the table below.

Alternative Indoor Activities

Gym Activities:

- When the gym is available, two middle school PE classes can share the space, and the following activities can be made available: basketball, volleyball, dodgeball
- When the gym is available for elementary students, the following activities can be made available: basketball, various forms of tag, gaga ball.

Classroom activities:

- In the event that PE is held in the classroom, students can participate in health and wellness lessons, do classroom appropriate stretching and physical activity, or watch movies or documentaries relevant to the current unit of study.

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Staff Training

All staff who are in roles that include direct supervision of students during outdoor activities (recess and lunch supervision, PE teachers, office staff, and administration) are trained in First Aid and CPR, which includes how to notice and manage signs of heat exhaustion or illness.

ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE POLICY

The Academy of Alameda (“AoA”) or the “Charter School”) recognizes that Artificial Intelligence (AI), including AI tools and systems, holds significant potential to expand student access to information, support educator effectiveness, reduce barriers to learning, and prepare all students for a future shaped by AI technology, as well as the potential for AI to undermine academic integrity, student privacy, equity, and well-being.

Guiding Principles

The use of AI at the Charter School will ensure:

1. Students and educators remain at the center of education;
2. Evidence-based AI technology enhances the educational experience;
3. The ethical development and use of AI technology and strong data protection practices;
4. Equitable access to and use of AI tools; and
5. Ongoing education with and about AI for all students and educators.

Therefore, the Charter School is committed to ensuring that AI is used in the best interests of students, in a human-centered, responsible, and equitable manner that meets the diverse needs of all learners, in accordance with the following principles:

- 1. Plagiarism, Disclosure, & Citation.** AI use should be transparently disclosed in accordance with established academic standards. Students must produce and submit original work within assignment guidelines. Submitting AI-generated content without clear disclosure constitutes plagiarism and academic dishonesty.
- 2. AI Detection Software.** AI detection software should not be used as the sole basis for disciplinary action or grade penalty. Concerns about misuse must rely on educator evaluation of student engagement, alternative assessment, and documented evidence of authorship, with clear criteria for rebutting claims of inappropriate AI use made available to students and parents/guardians.
- 3. Acceptable Use.** AI should be used to support learning, instruction, and operations in ways that enhance human decision-making and should not substitute for critical thinking

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or required academic work. All AI used by educators, staff, or students must be Charter School authorized and comply with applicable privacy and conduct policies, with notification and consent required whenever AI is used for grading or feedback.

- 4. Safe & Responsible AI Use.** AI should not be used to harm individuals, encourage self-harm, or cause harm to the school community. All AI use remains subject to the Charter School's Student Code of Conduct, anti-bullying policies, and applicable personnel policies.
- 5. Instructional Discretion.** Educators should have the discretion to determine when and how AI may be used in individual assignments, with expectations, purpose, and reasoning clearly communicated to students and families. Permitted AI use may vary from one assignment to another.
- 6. Modeling, Practice, & Ongoing Discussion.** Educators should disclose their own AI use to students to model responsible practice and establish reciprocal trust. Students are likewise expected to disclose their use of AI when submitting work, fostering ongoing discussion about AI's efficacy, responsible use, and evolution. Educators should model the difference between using AI for efficiency and using AI to support learning, giving students opportunities to practice and demonstrate both.

Equitable Access

The Charter School shall ensure all students and staff have equitable access to AI tools, irrespective of gender, ethnicity, disability status, socioeconomic status, geographic location, or displacement status. The Charter School shall provide assistive AI technologies to support diverse learning needs, including accommodations for students with disabilities according to the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA).

Algorithmic Bias and Fairness

AI tools and systems utilized in the Charter School shall undergo regular audits to identify and mitigate biases. Oversight committees, inclusive of educators, shall be established to review AI implementation efforts for unintended biases and to ensure alignment with Charter School equity goals.

Student and Educator Data Privacy

The Charter School shall adhere to all federal and state laws regarding student and staff data privacy. Only vendors with thorough data protection practices should be used for any purchases within the Charter School. The Charter School must inform educators, parents, and students of what and how AI tools are used in schools. Data collected through AI shall be subject to protocols providing transparency about the types of data collected and how the data is stored, utilized, and protected.

Vendor and Tool Selection

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The Charter School shall require all vendors of AI tools and resources to meet Charter School standards for transparency, equity, and ethical decision-making. AI tools and resources shall only be adopted once there is data supporting a tool's appropriateness and efficacy with potential users and, for instruction-focused AI, its alignment with high-quality teaching and learning standards and practices. If research is unavailable, AI tools shall be adopted on a pilot or trial basis if the evidence is being collected and analyzed in a timely manner, with an agreement in place to cease the use of the technology if the results of the research do not show the intended benefits. AI tools and resources that are made in collaboration with educators should be prioritized.

AI Literacy and Curriculum Integration

The Charter School shall take steps to ensure all students and educators become AI literate and develop a sense of agency with these technologies. Curricular changes should be made to incorporate AI literacy across all subject areas and education levels so that all students understand the benefits, risks, and effective uses of these tools.

Continuous Improvement

The Charter School shall conduct, at minimum, an annual evaluation of AI tools and practices to ensure they meet Charter School goals.

Definitions

ALGORITHMIC BIAS: "Systematic, unwanted unfairness in how a computer detects patterns or automates decisions," often based on characteristics and identities such as age, class, culture, disability status, ethnicity, gender, location, nationality, political affiliation, race, religious background and practices, and/or sexuality.

ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE (AI): Machine-based systems designed around human-defined objectives to perform tasks that would otherwise require human or animal intelligence. AI

LITERACY: Understanding what it means to learn with and about AI while gaining specific knowledge about how artificial intelligence works, the skills necessary to master AI tools, and how to critically navigate the benefits and risks of this technology.

DATA GOVERNANCE: A set of practices that ensures data assets are formally managed throughout a system/enterprise and that defines the roles, responsibilities, and processes for ensuring accountability for and ownership of data assets.

EDUCATORS: People employed by an institution dedicated to pre-K–12 or higher education.

GENERATIVE AI: Artificial intelligence tools that generate text, images, videos, or other content based on existing data patterns and structures.

TRANSPARENCY: Open disclosure of how AI systems work, including how they reach decisions and the data used to do so.

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PERSONAL ELECTRONICS POLICY

At AoA, we understand that students will bring electronic devices to school, but students bring phones, iPods, smart watches, smart glasses, portable games and other electronics to school at their own risk. AoA will not take responsibility for the security and safety of these devices, unless confiscated by the School. AoA recommends these items be left at home. All electronic devices must be turned OFF (not silent or vibrate) and may not be used during school hours, in the school building, or during any School sponsored activity occurring before or after the school day. They can only be used before and after school.

Electronics such as headphones required as part of a student's IEP plan will be provided by the school.

If School staff sees any electronic device out while school or a school sponsored activity is in session, these items will be confiscated and will be kept in the school office and parents/guardians will be notified. Students may use a classroom or office phone with permission.

Possession of private devices is a privilege, which may be forfeited by any student who fails to abide by the terms of this Policy. All Charter School employees shall remove any private device from the possession of a student found to be violating this Policy. If a private device is heard ringing, beeping, or buzzing from inside a jacket, purse, backpack, or other similar article, whether within the immediate presence of the student or not, a Charter School employee may remove the private device and confiscate the private device. Parents/guardians will be contacted to pick up any confiscated private devices at the end of the regular school day or at the conclusion of a Charter School sponsored activity.

In addition to this Policy, all other applicable Charter School student discipline policies and rules shall apply to any student who fails to comply with the requirements of this Policy.

First offense - Item kept in the school office until the end of the school day, and returned to the student.

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Second offense - Parent/Guardian must pick up the item from the main office.

Additional offenses - Parent/Guardian will be contacted with instructions to not allow the student to have the item(s) on campus. The student may also receive a possible loss of privileges and/or disciplinary consequences.
