### **B. Call the Meeting to Order**

F. Sutton called a meeting of the board of trustees of E.L. Haynes Public Charter School to order on Wednesday Dec 10, 2025 at 6:04 PM.

### **C. Approve Minutes**

F. Sutton made a motion to approve the minutes from E.L. Haynes Board of Trustees Regular Meeting on 09-24-25.

R. Payes seconded the motion.

The board **VOTED** unanimously to approve the motion.

### **D. Public Comment**

There was no public comment.

## **II. CEO Updates**

### **A. CEO Updates**

- Chief Executive Officer Toni R. Barton presented an overview of the Q1 Organizational Dashboard, explaining its structure, highlighting five distinct focus areas, and responding to trustee questions about key metrics.
- She also shared updates on ongoing field opportunities to learn about innovative school models, noting that additional information would be shared with the School Performance Committee and at the February Board meeting.
- T. Barton previewed conversations taking place through the Community Design Groups.
- In response to a question about facilities planning, Senior Advisor Justin Rydstrom shared that he would share the Fielding International findings report.

## **III. School Performance**

### **A. Q1 and Early Q2 Reflections**

- Toni R. Barton shared reflections on Q1 and early Q2 academic data, noting positive trends in ANet performance.
- She also noted that each school is mapping specific instructional goals informed by observations from Lit and Zaretta Hammond coaching, and that the School Performance Committee received an early preview of this work.

## **IV. Governance**

### **A. Share SY 2025-26 Committee Goals**

Governance Committee Chair Roshelle Payes outlined the committee's SY 2025-26 goals:

- Elect a 13th trustee.

- Identify and elect an E.L. Haynes alumnus to serve on the board.
- Identify and elect a middle school parent/caregiver to serve on the board

## **B. Discuss and VOTE to Elect New Trustee**

F. Sutton made a motion to elect Natalie Gordon to serve on the Board of Trustees, effective immediately. Per Section 3.04 of the Bylaws, Natalie Gordon's first term will end on June 30, 2029.

R. Payes seconded the motion.

The board **VOTED** unanimously to approve the motion.

## **C. Share Trustee Recruitment Updates**

Senior Director of External Relations and Strategic Initiatives Katie Wynne shared updates on ongoing efforts to identify and recruit potential trustees, noting that Trustee Michael Hall is working with Trustee Jennie Niles to engage potential alumni.

## **V. Audit, Finance, and Facilities**

### **A. FY24 Financial Analysis Report**

Justin Rydstrom highlighted key findings from the Public Charter School Board's FY24 Financial Analysis Report for E.L. Haynes.

### **B. FY25 Audit Updates**

J. Rydstrom confirmed that the draft FY25 financial audit report has been completed and was approved at the Audit, Finance, and Facilities Committee meeting on November 21, noting that the school remains on track to submit the final report to PCSB by the required deadline.

### **C. FY26 Q1 Financials**

J. Rydstrom highlighted increased revenue, strategic investments, and enrollment growth during his overview of the FY26 Q1 financials, noting that this growth differs from broader citywide enrollment trends.

### **D. Initial FY27 Budget Planning Updates**

J. Rydstrom provided a high-level overview of the budget engagement and planning timeline, including a review of the current-year budget and initiation of next year's planning (January–February), refinement of the proposal (March), presentation of a draft FY27 budget for trustee discussion (April), presentation of the final FY27 budget for approval (May), and submission of the final budget to PCSB (June).

## **VI. Community Relations Committee**

### **A. Share SY 2025-26 Committee Goals**

- Community Relations Committee Chair Grase Oleaga Calá provided an overview of the committee's SY2025–26 goals, including designing and launching a community advisory group and organizing a smaller-scale springtime event.
- G. Oleaga Calá also highlighted an interest in increasing family giving, potentially through tier-based monthly giving programs.
- Trustees encouraged the committee and school to continue emphasizing community relations, morale-building, storytelling, and partnership development.

#### **B. Debrief Our Next Chapter Event and Share End-of-Year Fundraising Progress Report**

Katie Wynne facilitated a debrief of the *Our Next Chapter* fundraising event, with trustees reflecting on overall strengths and identifying opportunities to refine timing, engagement, and long-term fundraising strategy.

#### **C. Review FY26 Fundraising Progress**

K. Wynne provided an overview of fundraising progress to date and noted the opportunity to reassess the school's fundraising and external relations strategy in light of current conditions, including local financial forecasts, federal workforce impacts, and internal leadership transitions. Trustees agreed and emphasized the importance of increased focus on community relations and partnership development.

#### **D. Highlight Upcoming Community Events**

K. Wynne shared a calendar of upcoming community engagement opportunities for trustees.

### **VII. Closed Session**

#### **A. Disciplinary Matters**

F. Sutton made a motion to move into closed session to discuss disciplinary and personnel matters, in accordance with DC Code Section 2-575(b).

L. Robinson Mills seconded the motion.

The board **VOTED** unanimously to approve the motion.

# Adopting ASPIRE as Goals

- ELH must transition from the DC PCSB's former PMF goals to either their new ASPIRE framework or define unique charter goals for accountability and future charter reviews.
- ASPIRE aligns with ELH's mission and strengths, emphasizing academic achievement, growth, attendance, re-enrollment, college preparation, postsecondary success, and campus-specific measures.
- Adopting ASPIRE now will ensure a more accurate, stable, and equitable evaluation for upcoming charter reviews, including the forthcoming 25-year review.

# MOY Data

# MOY Data Highlights

## ELA Performance

- i-Ready Mid Grade + Rates **rose 7pts to 24%** from 23-24 while % on pace to achieve growth goals rose by 1pts to 60%. Both the **ES and MS achieved all time record** Mid Grade + rates for their campuses, with every grade level seeing improvement.
- 58% of **HS** students scored Average or better on **NWEA MAP in ELA, a 10pt increase** from last year. Growth rates saw a 1pt dip to 51%.
- 53% of ES students achieved Benchmark or better on **DIBELS, a 9pt increase** from 23-24 and an all time record for MOY. **64% achieved typical growth or better for the semester, the highest in 3 years.**

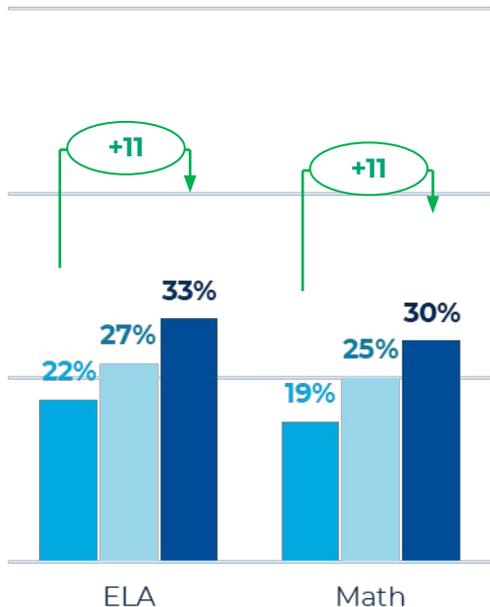
## Math Performance

- i-Ready Math Mid Grade + **Rates rose 6pts to 19%** from 23-24 while % on pace to achieve growth goals rose by 8pts to 62%. Both the **ES and MS achieved all time record growth rates**, and the ES also achieved an all time record Mid Grade + rate.
- i-Ready Three or More Grade Levels **Behind rates dropped to 19%** for the district, the lowest rate since the measure began being tracked in 22-23.
- 56% of HS students scored Average or better on NWEA MAP in Math, a 4pt increase from last year. Growth rates saw a 6pt dip to 56%.

# SY25-26 MOY Performance Year Over Year by School

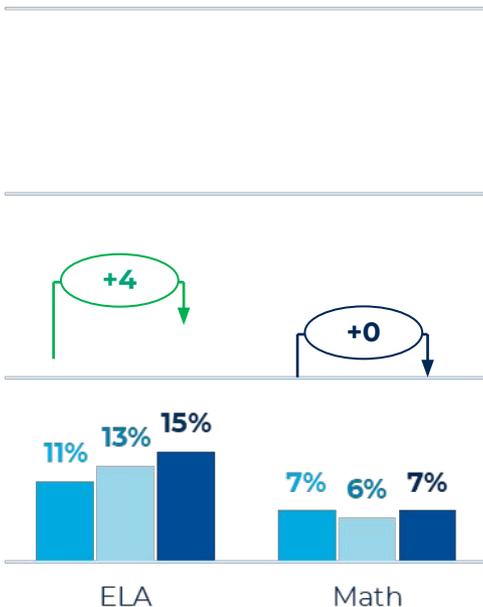

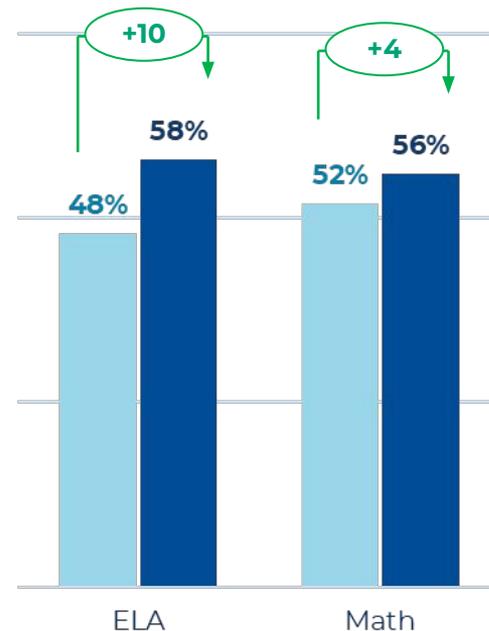
## MS i-Ready Mid Grade or Better

## HS MAP Average or Better Quintile

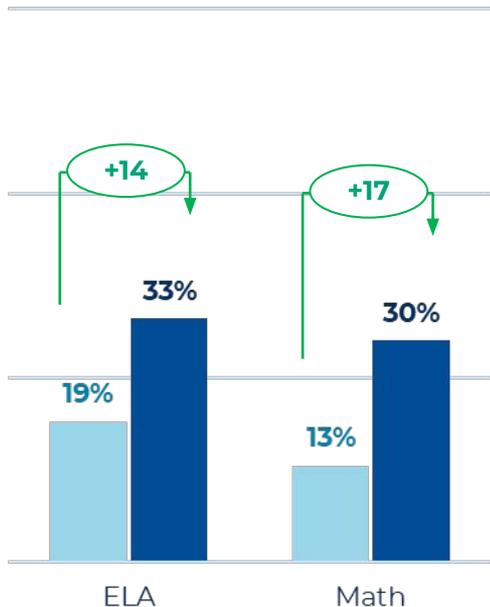

# SY25-26 Performance BOY to MOY by School

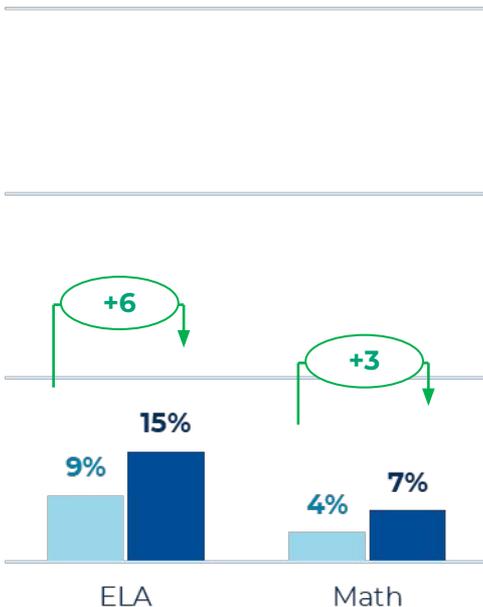

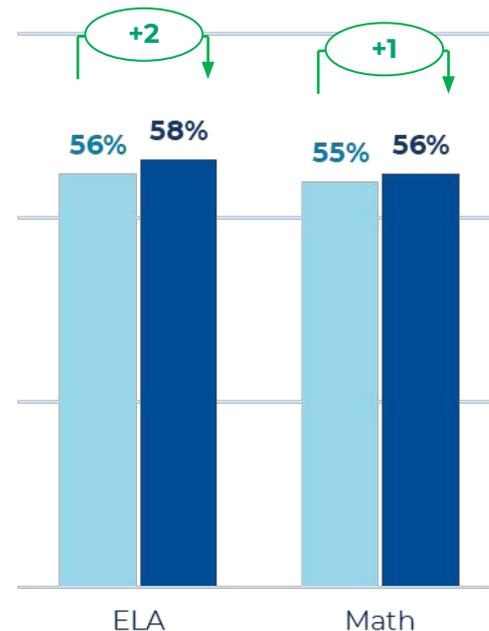

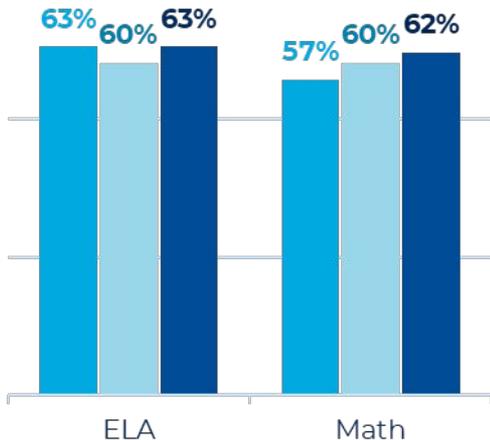

# SY25-26 MOY Growth Year Over Year by School

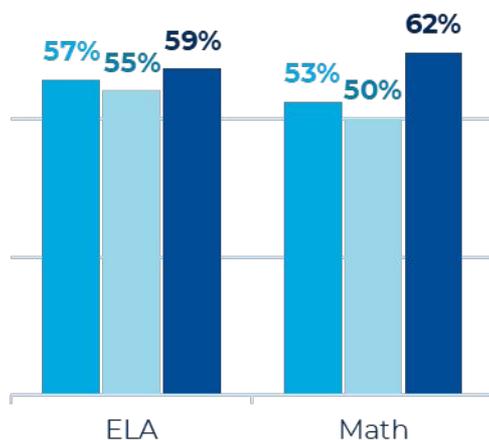
## ES i-Ready On Track to Typical Growth or Better

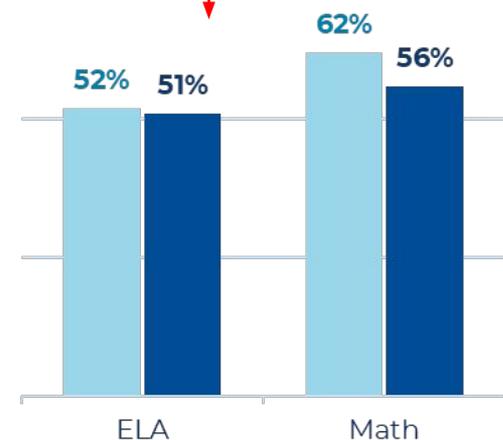
## MS i-Ready On Track to Typical Growth or Better

## HS MAP Projected Growth or Better

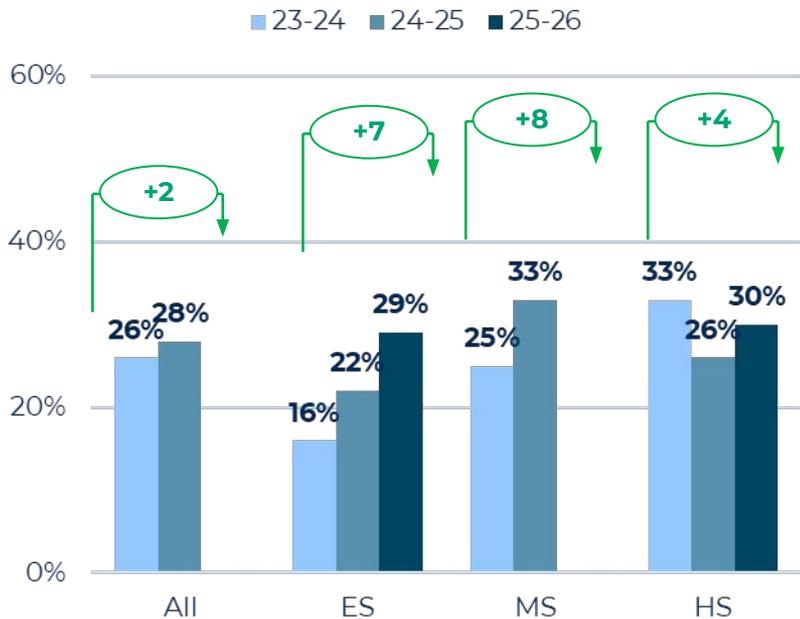

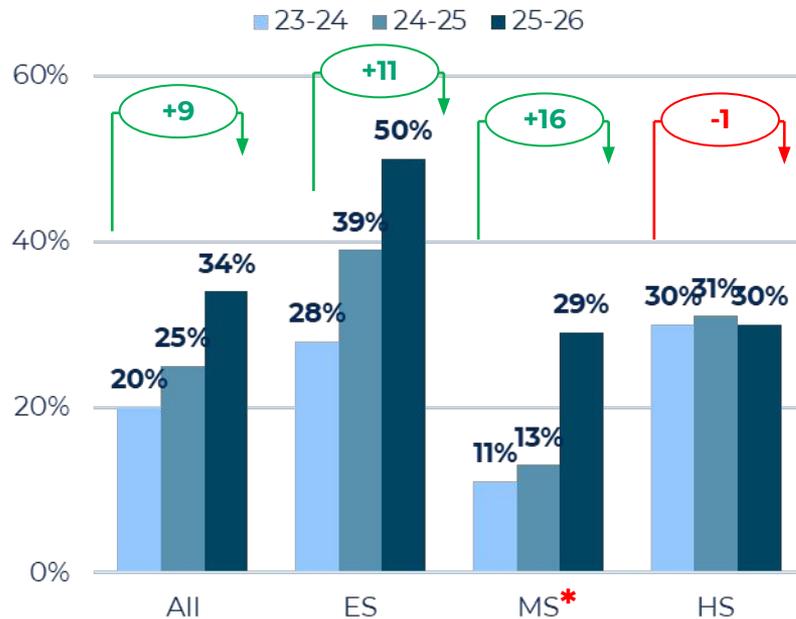

### ANET A2 Math Scores 60%+

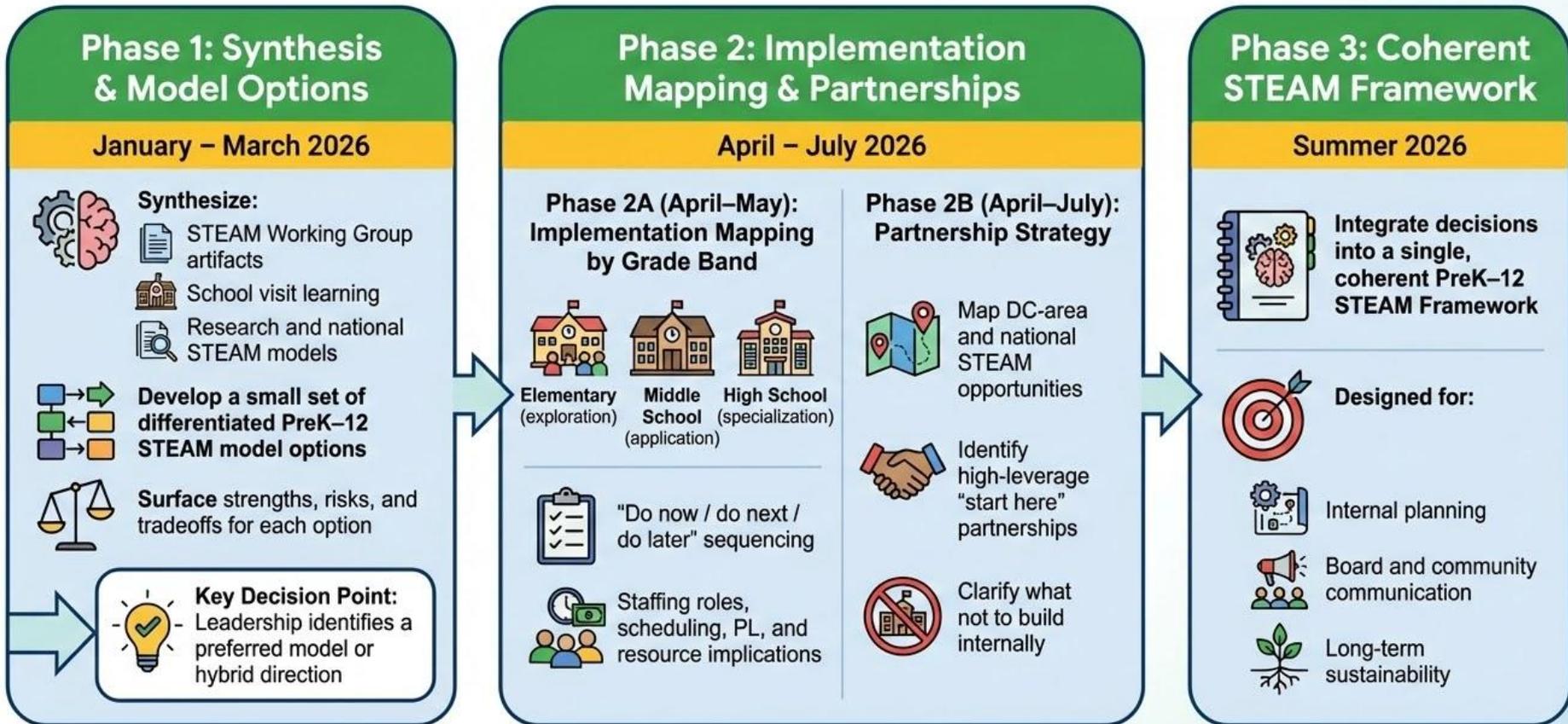

# STEAM Planning and Partnership

- **Academic Identity:** STEAM is the throughline for a clear PK–12 academic identity grounded in rigor, creativity, and relevance.
  - Grounded in our founding story
  - We already have some strong programming in place, but it lacks visibility and coherence.
- **2025–26 Focus:** Partnership with WestEd to design a coherent PK–12 STEAM framework and phased roadmap.
- **Pacing:** Planning and design this year; implementation sequenced over multiple years.

# What the STEAM Framework Will Include



## 1. Clear STEAM Identity for E.L. Haynes PCS

- What STEAM looks like instructionally at: Elementary, Middle School, and High School
- Role of arts, engineering, technology, and project-based learning

**2. Signature Student Experiences:** Developmentally coherent STEAM experiences by grade band with an emphasis on transitions and pipelines

**3. Phased Implementation Roadmap:** “Do now / do next / do later” priorities with a list of dependencies and constraints

**4. System Implications:** Staffing roles (not just headcount), Master scheduling considerations, Professional learning needs. Resource and materials considerations

**5. Partnership Alignment:** Where external programs (e.g., ATC, internships, residencies) are leveraged

# Examples of STEAM In Practice

- **Computer Science Pathways:** We currently offer *game design and web design* at the high school through an external partner.
  - **Pilot Idea:** Extend TAG Lab partnership into middle school to broaden access and build earlier pathways. Add AI and Information Literacy Learning series for students and educators.
- **Arts Access and Progression:** We *do not currently offer AP Art* and have limited cross-campus arts pathways.
  - **Pilot Idea:** Expand art offerings, including the option for middle school students to take select high school arts electives.
- **Dance as a PK–12 Throughline:** We have a *strong elementary dance program*.
  - **Pilot Idea:** Expand dance across elementary, middle, and high school as a visible PK–12 arts pathway.
- **Purpose-Built Learning Spaces:**
  - **Current Pilot:** Launch a *high school Sensory & Arts Studio* as co-taught, interdisciplinary learning environments.
- **Making the Identity Visible:** Launched STEAM pop-ups, a curated high school art gallery, and ‘third teacher’ concept to invite creativity, curiosity, and collaboration.

# FY26 Mid-Year Financials

## Q2 Financial Updates: Changes from Q1

- Revenue received:
  - \$1.7M – 2nd Employee Retention Tax Credit payment
- Expense forecasts:
  - \$1.3M for staffing, contracted services and direct student expenses
    - Increased special education services (student therapy and consultants partially due to special ed director vacancy)
    - Substitutes to support staffing gaps and student needs
    - Staff recognition as a lever for effective change management
    - School library and reading area initiatives
  - \$576k in office & business expenses
    - Additional supplies and professional services
  - \$231k in depreciation of current assets

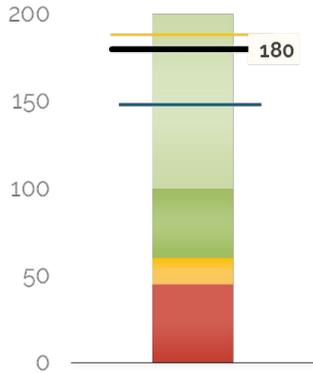

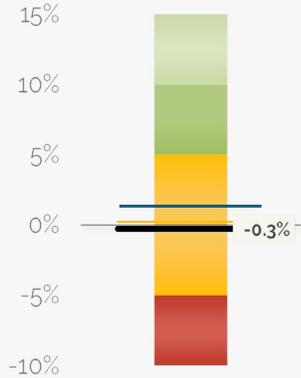

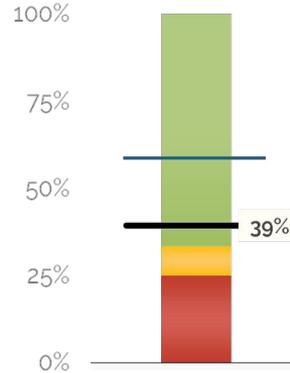

Federal grants requested divided by federal grants awarded.

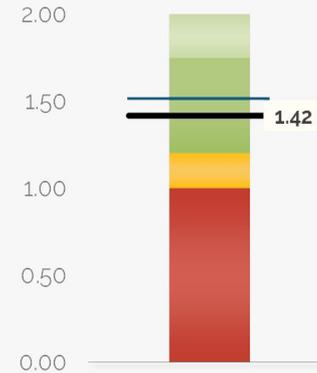

# FY27 Budget Process

- **January–February: Review current year budget and kick off next year’s budget**
  - Present midyear FY26 budget vs. actuals (Q1 &Q2) to Board of Trustees (BoT)
  - Identify priorities and questions for FY27 budgeting process
    - Some potential priorities include: STEAM and strategic planning, special education strategic staffing, compensation investments, and facilities
    - Question: how can we continue to tighten up spending and budgeting processes?
  - Project initial budget drivers for revenue and expenditures
  - Identify investments from budget priorities for FY27 budget
- **March: Refine budget proposal with continued discussion / feedback**
  - Discussions with staff and families on FY27 budget needs
  - Leadership teams engage in planning conversations
  - Finalize budget revenue and expense inputs
- **April: Share draft FY27 budget with BoT for discussion**
- **May: Present final FY27 budget to BoT for vote/approval**
- **June: Final FY27 budget due to PCSB June 2026**

# Facilities Opportunities

Exploring available real estate options in the Petworth/Brightwood neighborhood to responsibly steward space needs. These include:

- A. Several smaller Georgia Avenue commercial spaces
- B. 89,000 SFT building on Taylor Street
- C. Permitted expansion of trailers at KS Avenue
- D. Residential space near KS Avenue (to relocate central office staff)

Also continue to explore viability of interior reconfigurations as suggested in the Fielding study (e.g., middle school STEM lab)
