A. Kent Bevers, Nutrition Services Director

Overview

Freeman SD Nutrition Services supports the philosophy of the National School Lunch and Breakfast Programs and will provide wholesome and nutritious meals for our students.

 - 3. Announcements have also gone out through community communications.

B. Everett Combs, Transportation Supervisor

Overview

"The students of Freeman are the heart of our community and the reason we serve. The Freeman School District Transportation Department is dedicated to providing safe, reliable, and respectful transportation for all TK–12 students. We are committed to connecting home, school, and community, ensuring every student arrives ready to learn and thrive."

Areas of Focus

- We just sold a bus that came off our depreciation schedule. We are using GovDeals.com after we wait 30 days so other districts can have a chance to purchase the buses. Picking it up tomorrow morning.
- The State depreciates the cost of the bus over 13 years minus tax and district options. We are very fortunate to have this program as not all states do this.
- We are asking for approval to purchase a new bus for an October 2025 delivery.
 This will allow us to keep up with healthy depreciation money coming in from the State.
- We have a TK/SPED route that covers Hangman and Valleyford to help keep the pressure off those buses which have quite a few students on board. The new bus will be replacing the current bus on this route which will have a greater capacity than the one we currently have on that route.
- We currently have:
 - 11 Gen ED routes
 - ∘ 1 SPED route with a lift
 - ∘ 1 TK/SPED route with a lift

C. Kirk Lally, Maintenance-Grounds Director

Areas of Focus:

- 1. Completed report in ICOS for Alyssa's law. This included district panic buttons, camera upgrades, live audio feeds, fencing, etc. Kirk went in by building to make updates to make sure we are in compliance.
- 2. Working on permit for wastewater discharge.

- Working on creating data-driven intervention groups for elementary students in reading and math. Groups will be started week of 9.22

E. Todd Reed, Technology Director

Overview

Provide the highest quality technology-based services, in the most cost-effective manner, to help facilitatethe FSD mission

Areas of Focus

- We successfully implemented two-factor authentication on district email accounts, with transportation still pending, to strengthen security and safeguard district information. Kudos to Joe Branon who managed this process very successfully.
- All six district generators underwent biannual maintenance, with all systems checking out successfully, except the high school generator which still needs its coolant system flush.
- After a year of research and coordination, we successfully transitioned our elevator and fire panels from outdated POTS lines to cellular and network communication, a move projected to save the district approximately \$2,000 per month.
- Alyssa's Law 14 year old killed that drove this bill for safety in schools panic button, live audio feed for classrooms, MOU with Spokane County Sheriff who can tap in to our cameras when we have an emergency, remote control the front door, safety plan in place

VII. Superintendent's Report

A. Curriculum, Instruction and Assessment

Dr. Russell reviewed Board Policy & Procedure No. 2410 - High School Graduation Requirements. Reviewed the twenty-four requirements and the procedures. Some kids can get mastery level credit and Freeman ConnectEd is added.

B. School Safety, Culture and Environment

- Walk throughs are beginning soon and Dr. Russell invited the board members to attend as their schedules allow.
- We had a safety concern at the High School today that was handled without incident. The concept of See Something, Say Something is critical for our school

district and community as everyone has a responsibility for the safety and security of our students, staff and campus.

C. Partnering with Parents and School/Community

 Dr. Russell shared an update regarding the Solar Project. Colby Peone will be our Project Manager with Ellensburg Solar. Installation will be happening in January 2026. Inland Power wants to take power off of the grid in phases, more to come on that. Everything is on track, no changes to our 100kW ground mount system.
 As a reminder, this project has no cost to the Freeman School District or

D. Fiscal and Legal Accountability

taxpayers.

- Alan Steinolfson, Director of Finance, gave a financial update with Dr. Russell and reviewed both the capital projects and overall cash flow. Our lowest point brought us to a .14% fund balance. After tightening things across all areas of the district, we have slowly built back up to a 5.5% fund balance. This took incredible diligence and sacrifice from the staff to protect our finances during a critical period. We are not out of the woods, but certainly are in a much better place. Thanks to Alan for his leadership in this process.
- Dr. Russell reviewed our overall enrollment, which wasn't a huge report since we are only in month one of school. He then reviewed our 2025-2026 Choice Student enrollment with the board, as well as September enrollment. We have tracked the choice student numbers carefully for the past decade, which breaks down staff and non-staff student numbers. It's good for the community to know where we stand with choice numbers, and also how critical it is for funding programs and educators in our district. We receive the state funds for all choice students who attend Freeman.
 - Dave Teague asked if we should estimate the value of the choice kids in our district, which we can do if needed. The state funding we receive from

choice students allows us to keep and add programs and staff to keep our student experience competitive. Most importantly, we want our community to know what the numbers actually are, and what it's looked like over the past 10+ years.

- Bill Morphy commented that having the FHS football game on Saturday night during fair weekend was beneficial for those wanting to attend fair activities Friday evening. He then asked if that was something we would consider again in the future (Saturday football game vs. Friday during fair weekend). Nate Talbott mentioned that it just depends on what the fair activity schedule is each year. This year didn't have a conflicting dance Saturday night, but it may in future years.
- Dave Teague commented that it really seems to be a great start to the school year and to thank all who contribute to that success.

- We are requesting the approval of the purchase of a new bus for a 2026-27 school year delivery from RWC in keeping with our bus replacement schedule. RWC submitted the lowest state bid to OSPI for the category of type C (conventional) with a 72-77 passenger capacity.
- Our last bus we got for the 2025-26 school year cost about \$179,000. This one will be almost \$208,000. The reason for the big increase is:
 - o The cost of buses has increased.
 - o In the quote I'm requesting full a/c. As we get more into the hot months, especially as we look down the road (so to speak) at a midwinter break, there is a need for full a/c I believe because it definitely is hotter on a full metal bus than what the outside temps say. This is a \$12,000-\$13,000 option. Also, there is an increase in cost with the components to run the a/c, such as a larger capacity alternator and 3 batteries instead of 2.
 - O Another cost increase is with the use of integrated seats, meaning that the 5-point harness is built into the seats in the first two rows to accommodate the smaller TK students.
 - O I've also specked out underneath storage compartments only on the passenger side. I've not had these installed in the last 6 or so buses but we have found out that students on route buses or players on sport buses have larger equipment that when stored in the passenger area takes seats away from the students.
- Right now, we have \$277,300 in our depreciation account for the 2026-27 school year. This will increase by a few thousand once we receive the new little bus that you just approved and get it on the depreciation schedule. District options are coded to transportation instead of using our depreciation money.

SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT PLANS

Each school shall develop and adopt a school improvement plan or process, with annual review for progress and necessary changes. Each school shall submit its plan to the board of directors by June 30th of each year for initial approval and annual review and approval.

Each school improvement plan or process shall be data driven and shall promote a positive impact on student learning. A positive impact on student learning means promoting the continuous achievement of the state learning goals and essential academic learning requirements, and the achievement of nonacademic growth in areas like public speaking, leadership, interpersonal relationship skills, team work, self-confidence and resiliency, so that students can meet the goals of Washington's basic education system: to become responsible citizens, to contribute to their own economic well-being and that of their families and communities, and to enjoy productive and satisfying lives.

Each school improvement plan or process shall be based on a building self-review that includes the active participation and input of building staff, students, parents and community members.

Each school improvement plan or process shall address the following elements:

- Characteristics of effective schools as identified by the office of the superintendent of public instruction and the educational service district (a plan may focus on one or several of the characteristics for up to three years);
- Safe and supportive learning environments;
- Educational equity factors including gender, race, ethnicity, culture, language and physical and mental ability;
- Use of technology;
- Parent and community involvement; and
- Other factors identified by the school community for inclusion in the plan or process.

Any school participation in a program of school improvement assistance through the state accountability system or the federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act shall constitute sufficient compliance with this policy.







Policy No. 2021 Instruction

LIBRARY INFORMATION AND TECHNOLOGY PROGRAMS

The district's library information and technology programs provide a broad, flexible array of services, resources, and instruction that support student mastery of state standards in all subject areas. The programs include resources that promote a positive impact on student learning, like a variety of resource for reading advocacy, student communication skills, and electronic and print information.

The district's library and technology program are staffed by certified or classified librarians.

Librarians will collaborate as instructional partners and information specialists with classroom teachers to develop students' information and technology skills, help all students meet the content goals in all subject areas and assist high school students in completing their, culminating project and High School and Beyond Plans.

Additionally, librarians' duties may include, but are not limited to, integrating information and technology into curriculum and instruction; providing instruction to students and staff regarding the use of emerging learning technology; providing instruction to students about the appropriate use of computers and mobile devices at school; helping teachers and staff access and use information ethically; instructing students in digital citizenship; promoting a culture of reading within the school community; and providing individual support and guidance for students.

The superintendent will establish procedures for selecting library materials with the understanding that media literacy resources will consist of a balance of sources and perspectives. Parents who wish to express a concern about specific material included in the collection may do so according to the procedure outlined in Procedure 2021P, understanding that the criteria and rationale for considering library resources differ from those for reconsidering classroom instructional materials.

LIBRARY INFORMATION AND TECHNOLOLGY PROGRAMS

Library Collection Development

This procedure guides librarians and informs the community about the process for selecting, acquiring, evaluating, and maintaining library information and technology program materials. The objective of each program is to implement, support and enrich the district's educational program.

To best meet the unique needs of each school, the district will strive to create a library collection based on an assessment of student and staff needs. This will be accomplished by the following:

- 1. Providing curricular and personal resource materials for students and faculty
- 2. Providing materials that meet the interests, vocabulary, maturity and ability levels of all students
- 3. Providing a diversity of materials to achieve a balance of sources and perspectives
- 4. Fostering reading as a lifelong activity through pleasurable exposure to printed and digital materials
- 5. Including materials in the collection because of their academic, literary, or artistic value and merit

Library Materials and Electronic Resources

Library materials or digital services are those items accessible through the library information and technology program that provide support for an area of the curriculum, information for independent study, or resources for enrichment and recreational interest. Electronic resources include access to electronic documents, databases and websites.

Suggestions for Acquisition

Students, parents, community members or teachers may suggest materials for the district to acquire. Library information and technology staff will weigh requests, evaluates materials and select those materials that fulfill the needs of the instructional program. Librarians in each school determine final selections.

Selection

Librarians will use multiple sources to select materials. Those sources may include the following: Vendor catalogs, American Historical Fiction, Basic Book Collection for Elementary Grades, the Best in Children's Books, Children and Books, Children's Catalog, Elementary School Library Collection, European Historical Fiction and Biography, Guide to Sources in Educational Media, Junior High School Catalog Reference Books For School Libraries, Subject Guide To Children's Books in Print, Subject Index to Books for Intermediate Grades, Subject Index to Books for Primary Grades, and Westinghouse Learning Directory.

Librarians may also use current review journals like: AASA Science Books and Films,

American Film & Video Association Evaluations, Kirkus Reviews, Media and Methods, School Library Journal, Bulletin of the Center for Children's Books, Horn Book, KLIATT, VOYA, and Booklist.

All items selected for placement in the school library will do the following:

- 1. Support and be consistent with the state's and district's general educational goals and the aims and objectives of individual schools and specific courses
- 2. Support and be consistent with school library media and information literacy standards established by the American Association of School Librarians and the content area standards established by the Office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction
- 3. Meet high standards of quality in factual content and presentation
- 4. Contain appropriate subject matter for the age, emotional development, ability level, learning styles, and social development of the students for whom they are selected
- 5. Serve the intended purpose, for library materials in both physical format and appearance
- 6. Help students gain an awareness of our pluralistic society
- 7. Motivate students and staff to examine their duties, responsibilities, rights, and privileges as participating citizens in our society and make informed judgments in their daily lives
- 8. Withstand scrutiny based on their strengths Clarify historical and contemporary forces by presenting and analyzing intergroup tension and conflict objectively presenting and analyzing intergroup tension and conflict emphasizing, recognizing and understanding social and economic problems.

Gifts/Donations

Materials donated to the school library will be accepted or declined in accordance with the criteria applied to the purchase of materials.

Collection Assessment

De-selection (weeding out) of outdated and damaged materials is a natural part of the library's life cycle and maintenance of the quality and integrity of the collection. Librarians will evaluate the library collection on a continuing basis to ensure that meets the district's mission statement and goals.

Considerations for De-selection

Librarians will consider the following in deciding what materials to de-select:

Procedure No. 2021P Instruction

- 1. Whether the subject matter is out of date or no longer relevant to the instructional program
- 2. Whether the item is worn, soiled, missing pages, antiquated in appearance or unattractive;
- 3. Whether the item has circulated within a reasonable amount of time
- 4. Whether a newer edition has superseded the item
- 5. Whether the materials perpetuate cultural, ethnic, or sexual stereotypes
- 6. Whether the materials aren't appropriate for students' reading levels
- 7. Whether the materials contain appropriate subject atter for the age, emotional development, and social development of the students for whom they were selected
- 8. Whether there are already multiple copies of an item

Requests for Review and Removal of Library Media Materials

- 1. Request for Review: A parent or legal guardian of a student enrolled in the district (a "parent") may submit a written request to review and remove library materials to the applicable librarian and principal.
- 2. Seeking Resolution: If the parent requests, the school will arrange a meeting with the parent, the principal, and the librarian to address the parent's concerns and find solutions.
- **3. Principal's Decision:** If the issue cannot be resolved, the principal, in consultation with a librarian, will review the materials and issue a written decision on whether to remove them. The decision must be issued within 30 days of meeting with the parent or within 60 days of receiving the request to review and remove if the parent doesn't request a meeting.
- **4. Appeal Process:** If the parent or librarian disagrees with the principal's decision, they may appeal to the superintendent or designee in writing. The superintendent's or designee's decision is final and cannot be appealed. Once the final decision is made, the same materials may not be reconsidered for at least three years unless the superintendent determines a significant change in circumstances arises.

The decisions made under this process must comply with RCW 28A.320.233, will be based on the criteria for selecting and de-selecting library materials described in this procedure, and may apply only to the student or students whose parent submitted the request to review and reconsider.

Policy No. 3206 Students

PREGNANT AND PARENTING STUDENTS

The district is committed to a positive and productive education free from sex-based discrimination as required by Federal and State laws for all students in its education programs and activities, including discrimination based on current, potential, past pregnancy, or related conditions, or marital or parental status. Sex-based harassment is a form of sex-based discrimination and includes harassment based on pregnancy or related conditions or marital or parental status.

The district establishes this policy and the accompanying Superintendent's procedures for ensuring the protection and equal treatment of students who are or become pregnant, individuals with pregnancy-related conditions, and new parents.

Pregnancy or related conditions include:

- Pregnancy, childbirth, termination of pregnancy, or lactation;
- · Medical conditions related to the above; or
- Recovery from above.

The district must also not adopt or implement any policy, practice, or procedure concerning a student's current, potential, or past parental, family, or marital status that treats students differently on the basis of sex, except as necessary to provide pregnancy or pregnancy-related medical accommodations.

This commitment and discrimination prohibition extends to all students involved in academic, educational, extracurricular, athletic, and other programs or activities of the school, whether that program or activity is in a school facility, on school transportation, or at a class or school training held elsewhere.

The district does not engage in prohibited discrimination when it allows a student, based on pregnancy or related conditions, to *voluntarily* participate in a separate portion of its education program or activity, *provided* the district ensures that the separate portion is comparable to that offered to students who are not pregnant or parenting, and do not have related conditions.

This policy is a component of the district's responsibility to create and maintain a safe, civil, respectful, and inclusive learning community and will be implemented in conjunction with comprehensive training of staff and volunteers. Specific notice, training, and compliance requirements are included in the accompanying procedure 3206P.

Investigation and Response / Grievance Procedures

The Superintendent will develop and implement procedures for receiving, investigating, and resolving complaints or reports of sex-based discrimination and will include reasonable and prompt timelines and delineate roles and responsibilities for such. The procedure can be found at 3210P.

Policy No. 3206 Students

Complaints alleging discrimination or harassment based on a person's actual or perceived pregnancy status are to be taken seriously and handled in the same manner as other sex-based discrimination and harassment complaints.

If an investigation reveals that sex-based harassment has created a hostile environment, the district will take prompt and effective steps reasonably calculated to end the sex-based harassment, eliminate the hostile environment, prevent its recurrence, and, as appropriate, remedy its effects.

Allegations of criminal misconduct and suspected child abuse will be reported to law enforcement or Child Protective Services as required by law. A criminal investigation does not relieve the district of its independent obligation to investigate and resolve sexbased harassment.

Retaliation and False Allegations

Retaliation, as defined under Federal and State laws and the Superintendent's procedure, including retaliation by a student against another student, is prohibited and will result in appropriate discipline. The district will take appropriate actions to protect involved persons from retaliation.

It is a violation of this policy to knowingly report false allegations of sex-based discrimination. Persons found to knowingly report or corroborate false allegations will be subject to appropriate discipline as discussed in the Superintendent's procedure.

This policy and its procedure will support that effort by facilitating district compliance with local, state, and federal laws concerning sex-based discrimination.

PREGNANT AND PARENTING STUDENTS

The district is committed to a positive and productive education free from sex-based discrimination as required by Federal and State laws for all students in its education programs and activities, including discrimination based on current, potential, past pregnancy, or related conditions, or marital or parental status. Sex-based harassment is a form of sex-based discrimination and includes harassment based on pregnancy or related conditions or marital or parental status.

The superintendent establishes this procedure to ensure the protection and equal treatment of pregnant persons, individuals with pregnancy-related conditions, and new parents. Nothing in this procedure should be construed to allow different treatment on the basis of sex concerning a student's current, potential, or past parental, family, or marital status, except as necessary to provide pregnancy or pregnancy-related medical accommodations.

A. Key Definitions/Terms

- Caretaking means caring for and providing for the needs of a child.
- **Familial status** refers to the configuration of one's family or one's role in a family.
- **Marital status** refers to the state of being married, single, or divorced.
- Medically necessary is a determination made by a health care provider of a student's choosing.
- Parental status refers to the status of a person who, with respect to another
 person who is under the age of 18 (or a person who is 18 or older but who is
 incapable of self-care because of a mental or physical disability is a biological,
 adoptive, foster, or stepparent; a legal custodian or guardian; in loco parentis
 with respect to such a person; or actively seeking legal custody, guardianship,
 visitation, or adoption of such a person.
- Parental, family, and marital status discrimination is different treatment based on one or more of those statuses. For example, treating an unmarried mother worse than a married mother, treating a married person of one sex or gender more or less favorably than a married person of another gender based on sex stereotypes, or treating a man who is married to a man worse than a woman who is married to a man.
- Pregnancy discrimination includes treating a pregnant student or a student with a pregnancy-related condition less favorably than similar individuals not so affected and includes a failure to provide legally mandated leave or accommodations.
- Pregnancy and pregnancy-related conditions include (but are not limited to)
 - pregnancy, childbirth, false pregnancy, termination of pregnancy, miscarriage, lactation (expressing breast milk);
 - medical conditions related to the above;
 - recovery from above; and
 - any other conditions in accordance with State and Federal law.
- Pregnant student/birthparent refers to the student who is or was pregnant.

- Reasonable modifications mean individualized modifications to the district's
 policies, practices, or procedures that are comparable to the modifications
 offered for any other temporary medical condition. A modification that the district
 can demonstrate would fundamentally alter the nature of its education program
 or activity is not a reasonable modification.
- Student's legal representative means a parent or other person who has a legal right to act on behalf of the affected student.

B. Student Protections

The district must give all pregnant and parenting students equal access to district programs, extracurricular activities, athletic programs, and educational opportunities. The district may not require students to change educational plans (e.g., drop out of a class or program) or deny an honor or award based on pregnancy or parental status, including valedictorian status, scholarships, participation in graduation, or election for class office or homecoming court. The district cannot expel or suspend a student for being pregnant or being a parent.

C. The Title IX Coordinator's Responsibility

If a student (or a student's legal representative) informs the Title IX Coordinator of the student's pregnancy or pregnancy-related condition, then the Title IX Coordinator must inform the student or legal representative of the following:

- The district's policy of nondiscrimination.
- The district's obligation to provide equal access and modifications.
- The district's confidentiality obligations under State and Federal laws, and this
 policy and procedure.

D. Privacy and Confidentiality

As stated in WSSDA Model Policy 3230 - Searches of Students and Student Privacy, Washington State law provides that at certain ages, students attain the right to decide for themselves what records will remain confidential, even from their parents, and what activities the student will participate in. A student's pregnancy or pregnancy-related conditions may constitute confidential medical or educational information. Disclosing information about a pregnancy or pregnancy-related condition may violate privacy laws. To ensure the safety and well-being of the student, school employees should not disclose a student's pregnancy status or pregnancy-related conditions to others unless (1) legally required to do so or (2) the student has authorized such disclosure.

Except, the district may disclose some information to provide reasonable modifications. For example, the district may need to tell specific staff to implement reasonable modification for a student, but does not need to disclose why the reasonable modification is being provided.

The following are other exceptions that may apply:

(1) A person with the legal right to consent to the disclosure provides written consent and specifies to whom the disclosure may be made.

- (2) As required by laws, regulations, or to comply with State or Federal grant awards or other funding agreement.
- (3) When required by Federal, State or local law, including FERPA, and those laws do not conflict with Title IX.

E. Comparable treatment to other temporary medical conditions

The district must treat pregnancy or related conditions in the same manner and under the same policies as any other temporary medical conditions with respect to any medical or hospital benefit, service, plan, or policy the district administers, operates, offers, or participates in with respect to students admitted to the district's education program or activity.

F. Certification to participate

The district must not require a student who is pregnant or has related conditions to provide certification from a healthcare provider or any other person that the student is physically able to participate in the district's class, program, or extracurricular activity unless such a certification is required of all students for other physical or emotional conditions requiring the attention of a physician.

G. Reasonable modifications

The district must make reasonable modifications to its policies, practices, or procedures as necessary to prevent sex discrimination and ensure equal access to the district's education program or activity.

- Each reasonable modification must be based on the student's individualized needs.
- In determining what modifications are required under this paragraph, the district must consult with the student.
- A modification that a district can demonstrate would fundamentally alter the nature of its education program or activity is not a reasonable modification.
- The student has the discretion to accept or decline each reasonable modification offered by the district. If a student accepts a district's offered reasonable modification, the district must implement it.

Reasonable modifications may include, but are not limited to:

- breaks during class to express breast milk, breastfeed, or attend to health needs associated with pregnancy or related conditions, including eating, drinking, or using the restroom;
- allowing a student to sit or stand or carry or keep water nearby;
- intermittent absences to attend medical appointments;
- excusing medically necessary absences;
- access to online or homebound education;
- changes in schedule or course sequence;
- extensions of time for coursework and rescheduling of tests and examinations;
- counseling;

- changes in physical space or supplies (for example, access to a bigger desk or a footrest);
- requested accommodations to protect the health and safety of the student and/or their pregnancy (such as allowing the student to maintain a safe distance from hazardous substances); or
- elevator access.

H. Voluntary Access to Separate and Comparable Portion of Program or Activity The district must allow the student to voluntarily access any separate and comparable portion of the district's education program or activity, provided that the separate portion is comparable to that offered to students who are not pregnant and do not have related conditions.

The district may offer alternative schools or programs for pregnant and parenting students so long as participation in such programs is *voluntary* on the part of the student. When discussing such options with students, school personnel should present all options available in a non-coercive manner.

Alternative schools or programs for pregnant and parenting students must offer opportunities and programs comparable to those offered for non-pregnant students.

Parenting classes and programs must be open to male and female students.

I. Voluntary leaves of absence and intermittent absences

The district must allow the student to voluntarily take a leave of absence from the district's education program or activity to cover, at minimum, the time deemed medically necessary by the student's licensed healthcare provider.

To the extent that a student qualifies for leave under a leave policy maintained by a district that allows a greater period of time than the medically necessary period, the district must permit the student to take voluntary leave under that policy instead if the student so chooses.

When the student returns to the district's education program or activity, the student must be reinstated to the academic status and as practicable, to the extracurricular status that the student held when the voluntary leave began.

The district may not penalize a student for absences related to pregnancy or childbirth. Childbirth or pregnancy-related absences deemed medically necessary by a student's doctor must be excused. Health plans, medical benefits, and related services must be provided to pregnant students in the same manner as services are provided to students with temporary disabilities.

If home instruction is available for students who need to stay home due to a medical condition, then students are entitled to home instruction if they need to stay home due to pregnancy or childbirth. When a student returns to the district or a school

following a pregnancy-related absence, the student must be reinstated to the status they held when the absences began.

If other students who miss school for health reasons receive make-up assignments from their teachers, pregnant students are also entitled to receive make-up assignments for classes missed due to pregnancy or childbirth.

J. Limitation on supporting documentation

The district must not require supporting documentation unless the documentation is necessary and reasonable for the district to determine the reasonable modifications to make or whether to take additional specific actions under paragraphs.

Examples of situations when requiring supporting documentation is not necessary and reasonable include, but are not limited to, when the student's need for a specific action is obvious, such as

- when a student who is pregnant needs a bigger uniform;
- when the student has previously provided the district with sufficient supporting documentation;
- when the reasonable modification because of pregnancy or related conditions at issue is allowing a student to carry or keep water nearby and drink, use a bigger desk, sit or stand, or take breaks to eat, drink, or use the restroom;
- · when the student has lactation needs; or
- when the modification, access, leave, or space is available to students for reasons other than pregnancy or related conditions without submitting supporting documentation.

K. Lactation space

The district must ensure that the student can access a lactation space, which must be a space other than a bathroom, which is clean, shielded from view, free from intrusion from others, and may be used by a student for expressing breast milk or breastfeeding as needed.

L. Retaliation Prohibited

"Retaliation" means intimidation, threats, coercion, or discrimination against any person for the purpose of interfering with any right or privilege secured by Title IX, this policy and procedure, or because the person reported information, made a complaint, was a witness or provided information, assisted, or participated or refused to participate in any manner in an investigation or appeal under the Title IX regulations and this process. Retaliation is prohibited from the district, a student, or an employee or other person authorized by the district to provide any aid, benefit, or service under the district's education program or activity.

When the district has information about conduct that reasonably may constitute retaliation under Title IX or this policy and procedure, the district is obligated to respond promptly and effectively, inform the Title IX Coordinator, and provide notice of the district's grievance process for addressing complaints of retaliation. Upon

receiving a complaint alleging retaliation, the district must initiate its grievance procedures as described below or, as appropriate, an informal resolution process under those procedures.

M. Grievance Procedure

The district has adopted procedure 3210P to set forth the process for receiving, investigating, and resolving reports or complaints of sex-based discrimination, including harassment based on a person's actual or perceived pregnancy status, and retaliation. Such complaints are to be taken seriously and handled in the same manner as other sex-based discrimination and harassment complaints. Procedure 3205P.1 is designed to provide for a prompt, thorough, and equitable investigation of complaints and to take appropriate steps to resolve such situations. If sex-based discrimination or retaliation is found to have occurred, the district must take immediate action to eliminate the discrimination or retaliation, prevent its reoccurrence, and address its effects.

SEXUAL HARASSMENT OF DISTRICT STAFF PROHIBITED

This district is committed to a positive and productive working environment free from discrimination, including sex-based harassment. This commitment extends to all employees, applicants for employment, and other persons involved in academic, educational, extracurricular, athletic, and other programs or activities of the school, whether that program or activity is in a school facility, on school transportation, or at a class or school training held elsewhere.

Definitions

For purposes of this policy, sexual harassment means unwelcome conduct or communication of a sexual nature. Sexual harassment can occur student to adult, adult to adult or can be carried out by a group of students or adults and will be investigated by the district even if the alleged harasser is not a part of the school staff or student body. The district prohibits sexual harassment of district employees by other students, employees or third parties involved in school district activities.

The term "sexual harassment" is defined by the regulations implementing the federal law Title IX of the Education Amendments Act of 1972 at 34 C.F.R. § 106.30.

Under federal and state law, the term "sexual harassment" may include:

- acts of sexual violence;
- unwelcome sexual or gender-directed conduct or communications that interferes with an individual's employment performance or creates an intimidation, hostile, or offensive environment;
- unwelcome sexual advances;
- unwelcome requests for sexual favors;
- sexual demands when submission is a stated or implied obtaining work opportunity or other benefit;
- sexual demands where submission or rejection is a factor in a work or other school-related decision affecting an individual.

A "hostile environment" for an employee is created where the unwanted conduct is sufficiently severe or pervasive to create a work environment that a reasonable person would consider intimidation, hostile, or abusive.

Investigation and Response

If the district knows, or reasonably should know, that sexual harassment has created a hostile environment, the district will promptly investigate to determine what occurred and will take appropriate steps to resolve the situation. If an investigation reveals that sexual harassment has created a hostile environment, the district will take prompt and effective steps reasonably calculated to end sexual harassment, eliminate the hostile environment, prevent its recurrence and, as appropriate, remedy its effects. The district will take prompt, equitable and remedial action within its authority every time a report, complaint and grievance alleging sexual harassment that come to the attention of the district, either formally or informally.

Allegations of criminal misconduct will be reported to law enforcement, and suspected child abuse will be reported to law enforcement or Child Protective Services as required by law. Regardless of whether the misconduct is reported to law enforcement, school staff will promptly investigate to determine what occurred and take appropriate steps to resolve the situation to the extent that such investigation does not interfere with an ongoing criminal investigation. A criminal investigation does not relieve the district of its independent obligation to investigate and resolve sexual harassment.

Engaging in sexual harassment will result in appropriate discipline or other appropriate sanctions against offending staff or other third parties involved in school district activities. Anyone else who engages in sexual harassment on school property or at school activities will have their access to school property and activities restricted, as appropriate.

Retaliation and False Allegations

Retaliation against any person who makes or is a witness in a sexual harassment complaint is prohibited and will result in appropriate discipline. The district will take appropriate actions to protect involved persons from retaliation.

It is a violation of this policy to knowingly report false allegations of sexual harassment. Persons found to knowingly report or corroborate false allegations will be subject to appropriate discipline.

Staff Responsibilities

The superintendent will develop and implement formal and informal procedures for receiving, investigating and resolving complaints or reports of sexual harassment. The procedures will include reasonable and prompt timelines and delineate staff responsibilities under this policy.

Any school employee who witnesses sexual harassment or receives report, informal complaint, or written complaint about sexual harassment is responsible for informing the district's Title IX or Civil Rights Compliance Coordinator. All staff are also responsible for directing complainants to the formal complaint process.

This policy applies to sexual harassment (including sexual violence) targeted at district employees carried out by a student, employee, or a third party involved in school district activities.

A formal complaint filed by an employee or filed by or on behalf of a student complainant against an employee respondent will be investigated under the definitions, requirements, and procedures of Policy 3205 and Procedure 3205P.

Reports of sex discrimination and sexual harassment will be referred to the district's Title IX Coordinator. Reports of discrimination based on sexual orientation, gender expression, gender identity, race, creed, color, national origin, religion, honorably discharged veteran or military status, or age, or complaints alleging violations of the Boy

Scouts of America Act will be referred to the district's Civil Rights Compliance Coordinator.

Reports of disability discrimination or harassment will be referred to the district's Section 504 Coordinator.

Notice and Training

The superintendent will develop procedures to provide information and education to district staff, parents and volunteers regarding this policy and the recognition and prevention of sexual harassment. At a minimum, sexual harassment recognition and prevention and the elements of this policy will be included in staff and regular volunteer orientation. This policy and the procedure, which includes the complaint process, will be posted in each district building in a place available to staff, parents, volunteers, and visitors. Information about the policy and procedure will be clearly stated and conspicuously posted throughout each school building, provided to each employee, and reproduce in each staff, volunteer, and parent handbook. Such notices will identify the District's Title IX coordinator and provide contact information, including the coordinator's email address.

Policy Review

The superintendent will make an annual report to the board reviewing the use and efficacy of this policy and related procedures. Recommendations for changes to this policy, if applicable, will be included in the report. The superintendent is encouraged to involve staff, volunteers and parents in the review process.

SEXUAL HARASSMENT OF DISTRICT STAFF PROHIBITED

The procedure is intended to set forth the requirements of Policy 5011, including the process for a prompt, thorough, and equitable investigation of allegations of sexual harassment and the need to take appropriate steps to resolve such situations. If sexual harassment is found to have created a hostile environment, staff must take immediate action to eliminate the harassment, prevent its reoccurrence, and address its effects.

This procedure applies to sexual harassment (including sexual violence) targeted at district employees carried out by students, other employees, or third parties involved in school district activities. The district has jurisdiction over these complaints pursuant to Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972, Chapter 28A.640, RCW and Chapter 392-190 WAC.

Notice of Sexual Harassment Policy

A. Posting of Notices

Information about the district's sexual harassment policy will be easily understandable and conspicuously posted throughout each school building, provided to each employee and reproduced in each staff, volunteer and parent handbook. In addition to the posting and reproduction of this procedure and Policy 5011, the district will provide annual notice to employees that complaints pursuant to this procedure may be filed at 15001 S Jackson Rd, Rockford, WA 99030.

B. Responding to Notice of Sexual Harassment

Once the district is on notice of possible sexual harassment, the Title IX Coordinator will promptly contact the complainant to discuss the availability of supportive measures, consider the complainant's wishes with respect to supportive measures, inform the complainant of the availability of supportive measures with or without the filing of a formal complaint, and explain to the complainant the process for filing a formal complaint. Additionally, staff will also inform an appropriate supervisor or professional staff member when they receive complaints of sexual harassment, especially when the complaint is beyond their training to resolve or alleges serious misconduct.

In the event of an alleged sexual assault, the school principal will immediately inform the Title IX Coordinator so that the district can appropriately respond to the incident consistent with its own grievance procedures. The principal will notify the targeted district staff person of their right to file a criminal complaint and a sexual harassment complaint simultaneously.

Supportive Measures

Supportive measures must be offered to the complainant before or after the filing of a formal complaint or where no formal complaint has been filed. Supportive measures may also be provided to the respondent.

Procedure No. 5011P Personnel

Supportive measures are non-disciplinary, non-punitive individualized services offered as appropriate, as reasonably available, and without fee or charge to the complainant or respondent. Supportive measures should be designed to restore or preserve access to the district's education program or activity without unreasonably burdening the other party.

Supportive measures may include:

- An opportunity for the complainant to explain to the alleged harasser that his or her conduct is unwelcome, offensive or inappropriate, either in writing or faceto-face;
- A statement from a staff member to the alleged harasser that the alleged conduct is not appropriate and could lead to discipline if proven or repeated;
- A general public statement from an administrator in a building reviewing the district sexual harassment policy without identifying the complainant;
- Developing a safety plan;
- Modifications of work or class schedules:
- Mutual restrictions on contact between the parties;
- Increased security and monitoring of certain areas of the campus or school building, or
- Providing staff and/or student training.

The district will inform the complainant how to report any subsequent problems. Additionally, the district will conduct follow-up inquiries to see if there have been any new incidents or instances of retaliation, and respond promptly and appropriately to address any new or continuing problems appropriately. Follow-up inquiries will follow a timeline agreed to by the district and complainant.

A complainant may file a formal complaint at any time while receiving supportive measures. A complainant, their parent or guardian, or the Title IX Coordinator may file a formal complaint because, for example, they feel the complaint needs to be more thoroughly investigated or discipline may be warranted for an individual alleged to have engaged in sexually harassing conduct.

Confidentiality

- The district will maintain as confidential any supportive measures provided to the complainant or respondent, to the extent that maintaining such confidentiality would not impair the ability of the district to provide the supportive measures.
- If a complainant requests that their name not be revealed to the alleged perpetrator or asks that the district not investigate or seek action against the alleged perpetrator, the request will be forwarded to the superintendent or designee for evaluation. The superintendent or designee should inform the complainant that the district will need to determine whether or not it can honor such a request while still providing a safe and nondiscriminatory environment for all students, staff, and other third parties engaging in district

activities, including the person who reported the sexual harassment.

• If the complainant's request that their name not be disclosed to the alleged perpetrator or that the district not investigate or seek action against the alleged perpetrator can be honored, the superintendent or designee should notify the complainant that honoring the request may limit its ability to respond fully to the incident, including pursuing disciplinary action against the alleged perpetrator. However, the district will use other appropriate means available to address the sexual harassment.

Retaliation

Title IX prohibits retaliation against any individual who files a complaint under these laws or participates in a complaint investigation. When an informal or formal complaint of sexual harassment is made, the district will take steps to stop further harassment and prevent any retaliation against the person who made the complaint, was the subject of the harassment, or against those who provided information as a witness. The district will investigate all allegations of retaliation and take actions against those found to have retaliated.

Formal Title IX Sexual Harassment Complaint Process

In response to formal complaints of sexual harassment, the district will take prompt and appropriate action to investigate and take prompt and effective steps reasonably calculated to end harassment, eliminate the hostile environment, prevent its recurrence, and, as appropriate, remedy its effects.

Anyone may initiate a formal complaint of sexual harassment.

A. Filing of Complaint

All formal complaints will be in writing and will set forth the specific acts, conditions or circumstances alleged to have occurred and to constitute sexual harassment. The Title IX Coordinator may draft the complaint based on the report of the complainant for the complainant to review and approve. The Title IX Coordinator may also conclude that the district needs to conduct an investigation based on information in his or her possession, regardless of the complainant's interest in filing a formal complaint.

Complaints must be filed within one year from the date of the occurrence that is the subject matter of the complaint. However, a complaint filing deadline may not be imposed if the complainant was prevented from filing due to: 1) Specific misrepresentations by the district that it had resolved the problem forming the basis of the complaint; or 2) Withholding of information that the district was required to provide under WAC 392-190-065 or WAC 392- 190-005.

Complaints may be submitted by mail, fax, email, or hand-delivery to the district Title IX Coordinator. Any district employee who receives a complaint that meets these criteria will promptly notify the Coordinator.

B. Discipline and Emergency Removals for Alleged Sexual Harassment under Title IX

A respondent who is accused of sexual harassment under Title IX and this process is presumed not responsible for the alleged conduct until after a determination regarding responsibility is made at the conclusion of the grievance/investigation process.

Until a determination of responsibility for sexual harassment is made, the district may not impose any disciplinary sanctions or other punitive actions against the respondent. (Supportive measures are not disciplinary sanctions and must be non-punitive.)

In rare instances, a district may remove a student from school on an emergency basis consistent with Policy and Procedure 3241 – Student Discipline and the associated student discipline regulations for emergency expulsion.

Additionally, a non-student employee respondent may be placed on administrative leave during the pendency of a grievance process.

C. Formal Complaints by Staff will be Processed under the Procedures of 3205P

The district will consider a formal complaint concerning the sexual harassment of an
employee under the process, definitions, and standards outlined for formal
complaints in Section VI. of Procedure 3205P or relevant district policy. If the formal
complaint proceeds with an investigation under that procedure, the parties will have
the appeal rights designated in that procedure.

If a formal complaint was filed, employees will also be permitted to use the Title IX Informal Resolution Process under that procedure.

If the Title IX Coordinator must dismiss a complaint under that procedure, the Title IX Coordinator will provide the complainant with written notice that the complaint has been dismissed. The notice should also inform the complainant whether the complaint has been:

- Referred for consideration under the district's policy prohibiting discrimination against staff, including sex-based discrimination Policy and its procedures for investigating a complaint under that policy.
- Referred for other action or consideration under another District policy and procedure.
- Dismissed with no further action anticipated because the information provided does not suggest a potential violation of District policy or state or federal law.

The complainant must be provided notice of the right to appeal any dismissal decision(s) to the superintendent or designee. Additionally, dismissal of a prior complaint shall not be a basis for refusing to consider any new formal complaints filed by the same complainant or their legal representative.

I. Other Complaint Options

Office for Civil Rights (O.C.R.), U.S. Department of Education

O.C.R. enforces several federal civil rights laws, which prohibit discrimination in public schools on the basis of race, color, national origin, sex, disability, and age. File complaints with O.C.R. within 180 calendar days of the date of the alleged discrimination.

Washington State Human Rights Commission (WSHRC)

WSHRC enforces the Washington Law Against Discrimination (RCW 49.60), which prohibits discrimination in employment and places of public accommodation, including schools. File complaints with WSHRC within six months of the date of the alleged discrimination.

II. Investigation Recordkeeping

The district will maintain, for a period of X years, records of all sexual harassment investigations.

The district will maintain, for a period of seven years, records of each Title IX sexual harassment investigation, including any determination regarding responsibility and any audio or audiovisual recording or transcript; any disciplinary sanctions imposed on the respondent, and any remedies provided to the complainant; and any appeal from the result of a determination regarding responsibility.

The district will maintain, for a period of seven years, records of any actions, including supportive measures, taken in response to a report or formal complaint of sexual harassment under Title IX.

III. Training and Orientation

A fixed component of all district orientation sessions for staff, students and regular volunteers will introduce the elements of this policy. Staff will be provided information on recognizing and preventing sexual harassment. Staff will be fully informed of the formal and informal complaint processes and their roles and responsibilities under the policy and procedure

Certificated staff will be reminded of their legal responsibility to report suspected child abuse, and how that responsibility may be implicated by some allegations of sexual harassment. Regular volunteers will get the portions of this component of orientation relevant to their rights and responsibilities

Students will be provided with age-appropriate information on the recognition and prevention of sexual harassment and their rights and responsibilities under this

and other district policies and rules at student orientation sessions and on other appropriate occasions, which may include parents

As part of the information on the recognition and prevention of sexual harassment staff, volunteers, students and parents will be informed that sexual harassment may include, but is not limited to:

- Demands for sexual favors in exchange for preferential treatment or something of value;
- Stating or implying that a person will lose something if he or she does not submit to a sexual request;
- Penalizing a person for refusing to submit to a sexual advance, or providing a benefit to someone who does;
- Making unwelcome, offensive or inappropriate sexually suggestive remarks comments, gestures, or jokes; or remarks of a sexual nature about a person's appearance, gender or conduct;
- Using derogatory sexual terms for a person;
- Standing too close, inappropriately touching, cornering or stalking a person;
 or
- Displaying offensive or inappropriate sexual illustrations on school property.

IV. Policy and Procedure Review

Annually, the superintendent or designee will convene an ad hoc committee composed of representatives of certificated and classified staff, volunteers, students and parents to review the use and efficacy of this policy and procedure. The Title IX Compliance Coordinator will be included in the committee. Based on the review of the committee, the superintendent will prepare a report to the board including, if necessary, any recommended policy changes. The superintendent will consider adopting changes to this procedure if recommended by the committee.

POLICY ADOPTION, MANUALS AND ADMINISTRATIVE PROCEDURES

Policy Adoption

Proposed new policies and proposed changes in existing policies shall be presented in writing for reading and discussion. Unless it is deemed by the board that immediate action would be in the best interests of the district, the final vote for adoption shall take place not earlier than the next succeeding regular or special board meeting. Any written statement by any person relative to a proposed policy or amendment should be directed to the board secretary prior to the second reading. The board may invite oral statements from staff members or patrons as an order of business.

When the board of directors is considering a district policy or amendment to policy that is not expressly or by implication authorized by state or federal law, but which will promote the education of kindergarten through twelfth grade students in public schools or will promote the effective, efficient or safe management and operation of the district, the proposed policy shall be described in any notice of the meetings at which the policy will be considered, if the notice is issued pursuant to the Open Public Meetings Act, Ch. 42.30 RCW. The board of directors will provide an opportunity for public written and oral comment on such policies before adoption or amendment.

In the event that immediate action on a proposed policy is necessary, the motion for its adoption shall provide that immediate adoption is in the best interest of the district. No further action is required. All new or amended policies shall become effective upon adoption, unless a specific effective date is provided in the motion for adoption.

Policies as adopted or amended shall be made a part of the minutes of the meeting at which action was taken and shall also be included in the district's policy manual.

Non-substantive editorial revisions and changes in administrative, legal and/or cross references need not be approved by the board.

Policy Interpretation

It is the policy of the state of Washington that policies and procedures adopted by school districts under Title 28A RCW must prioritize the protection of every student's safety, access to the state's statutory program of basic education as defined in RCW 28A.150.203, and privacy, to the fullest extent possible, except as required by state or federal law.

Policy Manuals

The superintendent shall develop and maintain a current policy manual which contains the policies of the district.

Policy No. 1310 The Board of Directors

The manual is intended both as a tool for district management as well as a source of information to patrons, staff and others about how the district operates. To that end each administrator shall have ready access to the manual. In addition, a manual shall be available in each school library and such other places as the superintendent may determine for the use of staff, students and patronscommunity members.

All policy manuals distributed to anyone shall remain the property of the district. They shall be subject to recall at any time.

Administrative Procedures

The superintendent shall develop such administrative procedures as are necessary to ensure consistent implementation of policies adopted by the board.

When a written procedure is developed, the superintendent shall submit it to the board as an information item. Such procedures need not be approved by the board, though it may revise them when it appears that they are not consistent with the board's intentions as expressed in its policies. Procedures need not be reviewed by the board prior to their issuance; though on controversial topics, the superintendent may request prior board consultation.

GRADING AND PROGRESS REPORTS

The board believes that the cooperation of school and home is a vital ingredient in the growth and education of the student and recognizes the responsibility to keep parents informed of student welfare and progress in school.

The district will inform parents or legal guardians about their students' academic progress, including the right to receive periodic reports on their students' educational growth and development in accordance with RCW 28A.150.240 and to receive notice of their students' performance on state learning standard tests and assessments in accordance with RCW 28A.230.195. The district will also inform the parents or legal guardians whether their students' performance could threaten their ability to be promoted to the next grade level. Parents or legal guardians have the right to request an in-person meeting with their students' classroom teachers and principals to discuss any resources or strategies available to support and encourage their students' academic improvement.

The district will issue grades and written or electronic progress reports, and provide opportunities for parent to serve as a basis for continuous evaluation of the student's performance and to help in determining changes that should be made to effect improvement. These written and verbal reports shall be designed to provide information that will be helpful to the student, teacher, counselor and parent.

The district shall will comply with the marking/grading system incorporated into the statewide standardized high school transcript. Secondary students' grade points shall be reported for each term; individually and cumulatively.

The superintendent or designee will establish a system of reporting student progress and shall require all staff members to comply with such a system as part of their teaching responsibility.

At the beginning of each term, each teacher shall specify in writing the student learning goals or standards for his/her respective courses. If participation is used as the basis of mastery of a goal or standard, a student's grades may be adversely affected for failure to attend or participate, provided on that day there was a graded participation activity. If the teacher does not so advise students in writing, the teacher may not use attendance and participation in the grading process. Students, who feel that attendance or tardiness factors has been unfairly applied, may appeal to the principal to determine a resolution.

NOTIFICATION AND DISSEMINATION OF INFORMATION ABOUT STUDENT OFFENSES AND NOTIFICATION OF THREATS OF VIOLENCE OR HARM

The Freeman School Districtdistrict is committed to providing a safe and secure environment for all its students and staff. All students, including those who have committed or been adjudicated for offenses, have constitutional rights to public education.

A. Notification of Student Offenses from County Sheriff's Office, Courts, Department of Social and Health Services, Department of Corrections, and Other School Districts.

The district receives notices and information about student offenders from several statutorily authorized sources, including the county sheriff's office, the courts, the department of social and health services, the department of corrections, and other school districts where the student previously enrolled. The district will take appropriate precautionary measures when it receives notices and information of student offenses from any of these sources. Student discipline, if any, will be consistent with 3241 – Student Discipline.

The superintendent, or his or her designee, and school principals play an important role in determining and implementing appropriate precautionary measures relating to notices and information about student offenses. If the superintendent, a designee of the superintendent, or a principal of a school receives student offense information under RCW 28A.225.330 (notifications from other school districts), 9A.44.138 (sheriff notifications to school districts), 13.04.155 (court notifications to school districts), 13.40.215 (department of children, youth, and families notifications to school districts), or 72.09.730 (department of corrections notifications to school districts), the following notification provisions will be followed.

- 1. Sex Offenses and Registered Sex or Kidnapping Offenders.
 - a. Superintendent or Designee. Upon receipt of information about sex offenses as defined in RCW 9.94A.030 or upon receipt of information about registered sex or kidnapping offenders pursuant to RCW 9A.44.138, the superintendent or his or her designee will provide the information to the principal of the school where the student is enrolled or will enroll—or, if not known, where the student was most recently enrolled.
 - **b. Principals.** When the principal receives the information described above, he or she must then disclose the information as follows.

If the student is classified as a risk level II or III, the principal shall provide the information received to every teacher of the student and to any other personnel who, in the judgment of the principal, supervises the student or for security purposes should be aware of the student's record.

If the student is classified as a risk level I, the principal shall provide the information received only to personnel who, in the judgment of the principal, for security purposes should be aware of the student's record.

c. Convicted Juvenile Sex Offenders Attendance at Victims School. Convicted juvenile sex offenders are prohibited from attending the elementary, middle, or high school attended by their victims or their victims' siblings. The parents or legal guardians of the convicted juvenile sex offender shall be responsible for providing transportation or covering other costs associated with or required by the sex offender's change in school.

The Department of Social and Health Services (DSHS) Sex Offender School Attendance Program assists with ensuring that juvenile sex offenders, committed to Juvenile Rehabilitation Administration (JRA), do not enroll in the same school as their victim or their victims' siblings. If there is a conflict in schools, DSHS program staff will work with JRA to have the offender moved to another school.

- **d. Collaboration.** The principal or designee will consult and collaborate with department of corrections, juvenile justice staff, treatment providers, victim support groups, and families, as applicable, when working with students required to register as a sex or kidnapping offender.
- e. Inquiries by the Public. Law enforcement agencies receive relevant information about the release of sex and kidnapping offenders into communities and decide when such information needs to be released to the public. Therefore, district and school staff will refer all inquiries by the public at large (including parents and students) regarding students required to register as a sex or kidnapping offender directly to law enforcement.
- 2. Violent Offenses, Firearms and Dangerous Weapons Crimes, Unlawful Possession or Delivery of Controlled Substances, or School Disciplinary Actions.
 - a. Superintendent or Designee. Upon receipt of information about a violent offense as defined in RCW 9.94A.030, any crime under chapter 9.41 RCW, unlawful possession or delivery, or both, of a controlled substance in violation of chapter 69.50 RCW, or a school disciplinary action, the superintendent or designee will provide the information to the principal of the school where the student is enrolled or will enrolled—or, if not known, where the student was most recently enrolled.
 - **b. Principals.** When the principal, receives the information described above, he or she, has discretion to share the information with a district staff member if, in the principal's judgment, the information is necessary for:
 - The staff member to supervise the student;

- The staff member to provide or refer the student to therapeutic or behavioral health services; or
- Security purposes.

School principals and staff should use care not to allow a student's demographic or personal characteristics to bias the decision of whether to share information received.

Upon receipt of information about an adjudication in juvenile court for an unlawful possession of a controlled substance in violation of chapter 69.50 RCW, the principal must notify the student and the parent or legal guardian at least five days before sharing the information with a district staff member.

If either the student or the student's parent or legal guardian objects to the proposed sharing of the information, the student, the student's parent or legal guardian, or both, may, within five business days of receiving notice from the principal, appeal the decision to share the information with staff to the superintendent of the district in accordance with procedures developed by the district

The superintendent shall have five business days after receiving an appeal under the above to make a written determination on the matter. Determinations by the superintendent under this subsection are final and not subject to further appeal.

A principal may not share adjudication information under this subsection with a district staff member while an appeal is pending.

3. Public Records Act.

Any information received by district staff under this section is exempt from disclosure under the public records act (chapter 42.56 RCW) and may not be further disseminated except as provided in RCW 28A.225.330, other statutes or case law, and the family and educational and privacy rights act of 1994 (20 U.S.C. Sec. 1232g et seq.).

4. Assignment of Student Offenders to Certain Classrooms.

A student committing an offense under chapter 9A.36 (assault), 9A.40 (kidnapping, unlawful imprisonment, custodial interference, luring, trafficking, and coercion of involuntary servitude), 9A.46 (harassment), or 9A.48 RCW (arson, reckless burning, and malicious mischief) when the activity is directed toward the teacher, shall not be assigned to that teacher's classroom for the duration of the student's attendance at that school or any other school where the teacher is assigned.

A student who commits an offense under chapter 9A.36 (assault), 9A.40 (kidnapping, unlawful imprisonment, custodial interference, luring, trafficking, and coercion of involuntary servitude), 9A.46 (harassment), or 9A.48 RCW (arson,

reckless burning, and malicious mischief), when directed toward another student, may be removed from the classroom of the victim for the duration of the student's attendance at that school or any other school where the victim is enrolled.

B. Notification of Threats of Violence or Harm.

Students and school employees who are subjects of threats of violence or harm will be notified of the threats in a timely manner. "Threats of violence or harm" means direct or indirect communications by any means of the intent to inflict physical harm upon a specific individual or individuals or that place a person in fear of the imminent likelihood of serious harm.

The district will assess and address potential threats of violence or harm in a manner consistent with Policy and Procedure 3225 – School-Based Threat Assessment, other safety policies, and comprehensive safe school plans. In instances where the threat is deemed moderate risk or high risk, or requires further intervention to prevent violence or serious harm, the school administrator shall notify the parent and/or guardian of any student who is the target/recipient of a threat as well as the parent and/or guardian of any student who made the threat. The district will ensure that the notice is in a language the parent and/or guardian understands, which may require language assistance for parents or guardians with limited-English proficiency under Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964.

If there is a specific and significant threat to the health or safety of a student or other individuals, the district may disclose information from education records to appropriate parties whose knowledge of the information is necessary. Timing and details of the notice will be as extensive as permitted by the federal Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act, other legal limitations, and the circumstances.

The district may use information about a threat of harm or violence in connection with student discipline consistent with Policy and Procedure 3241 – Student Discipline.

The district, board, school officials, and school employees providing notice in good faith as required and consistent with the board's policies are immune from any liability arising out of such notification. A person who intentionally and in bad faith or maliciously, knowingly makes a false notification of a threat under this section is guilty of a misdemeanor punishable under RCW 9A.20.021.

C. Immunity.

Any school district or district employee who releases the information in compliance with federal and state law is immune from civil liability for damages unless it is shown that the school district or district employee acted with gross negligence or in bad faith.

D. Notification of Criminal Action

<u>Upon receiving a report that a criminal action is alleged to have been committed</u> <u>against a student on school property during the school day or during a school-sponsored activity, including if there has been a shooting on school property, or that a</u>

student has been detained based on probable cause that they were involved in criminal activity on school property during the school day, the district will immediately notify the student's parents or legal guardians.

Policy No. 3210 Students

NONDISCRIMINATION

The district is committed to complying with anti-discrimination laws.

Definition

"Protected status" is short for the phrase "sex, race, ethnicity, creed, religion, color, national origin, honorably discharged veteran or military status, sexual orientation, gender expression, gender identity, homelessness, immigration or citizenship status, the presence of any sensory, mental, or physical disability, neurodivergence, or the use of a trained dog guide or service animal by a person with a disability."

Nondiscrimination Statement

The district will adopt a nondiscrimination statement that must include the following:

- Notice that the district may not discriminate in any programs or activities based on sex, race, <u>ethnicity</u>, creed, religion, color, national origin, honorably discharged veteran or military status, sexual orientation, gender expression, gender identity, <u>homelessness immigration or citizenship status</u>, the presence of any sensory, mental, or physical disability, <u>neurodivergence</u>, or the use of a trained dog guide or service animal.
- The name or title, office address, and telephone number of the employee designated as the compliance officer under this policy, the Section 504 Coordinator, and the Title IX Coordinator.
- Notice that the district provides equal access to the Boy Scouts of America and any other youth group listed in Title 36 of the United States Code as a patriotic society.

The district will include this statement in written announcements, notices, recruitment materials, employment application forms, and other publications made available to all students, parents, or employees.

The district may combine the statement described above with the notice described in Policy 3205.

Model Student Handbook Language

The district will adopt the model student handbook language described in RCW 28A.300.286 and include the language in any student, parent, employee, and volunteer handbook it or its schools publish and on its and its schools' websites.

Discriminatory Harassment

Students have a right to be free from discriminatory harassment. The district violates that right if the following conditions are met:

- 1. The alleged conduct is based on a student's protected status.
- 2. The alleged conduct creates a hostile environment. A hostile environment is created if the alleged conduct is sufficiently severe, persistent, or pervasive that it limits or denies a student's ability to participate in or benefit from the district's course offerings, including any educational program or activity. A hostile environment could impact a student's life in many ways. Physical illness, anxiety about going to school, or a decline in grades or attendance could signal a hostile environment.
- 3. After receiving notice of the alleged conduct, the district fails to take prompt and appropriate action to investigate it or fails to take prompt and effective steps reasonably calculated to end the harassment, eliminate the hostile environment, prevent its recurrence, and remedy its effects as appropriate. The district has notice of discriminatory harassment if a reasonable employee knew or, in the exercise of reasonable care, should have known about the harassment. Employees may have notice of discriminatory harassment if they receive an oral report from a student, parent, or other individual; receive a written complaint; witness harassing conduct; or become aware of harassment by members of the community or the media.

Harassing conduct may include verbal acts and name-calling, graphic and written statements, or other conduct that may be physically threatening, harmful, or humiliating.

When the district receives notice of potential discriminatory harassment, it will take prompt and appropriate action to investigate and, as applicable, take prompt and effective steps reasonably calculated to end the harassment, eliminate the hostile environment, prevent its recurrence, and remedy its effects. Examples of the steps the district might take include imposing discipline, separating individuals, developing a safety plan, offering counseling, and providing additional training and instruction. These steps will not penalize the student who was harassed.

Complaint Procedure

The district will adopt a complaint procedure in accordance with chapter 392-190 WAC.

Annually, the district will publish a notice of the complaint procedure in a way that is reasonably calculated to inform all students, parents, and employees of it. The district will provide the notice in a language each parent can understand, which may require language assistance in accordance with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 for those with limited English proficiency.

The district will not adopt any policy, procedure, or practice that would limit a person's right to file a complaint under the complaint procedure.

Policy No. 3210 Students

Compliance Officer

The superintendent will designate an employee who is responsible for monitoring and coordinating the district's compliance with chapter 392-190 WAC and the guidelines the Office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction has adopted under WAC 392-190-005.

The compliance officer is responsible for ensuring that all complaints filed under the complaint procedure are promptly investigated and resolved.

Training

The district will train all administrators, certificated personnel, and classroom personnel regarding their responsibilities under this policy and chapter 392-190 WAC. The training will aim to raise awareness of and eliminate bias based on sex, race, creed, religion, color, national origin, honorably discharged veteran or military status, sexual orientation, gender expression, gender identity, the presence of any sensory, mental or physical disability, or the use of a trained dog guide or service animal.

Retaliation Prohibited

The district will not intimidate, threaten, coerce, or discriminate against any individual who seeks to secure their rights under this policy or chapter 392-190 WAC or because the individual has filed a complaint under the complaint procedure. Further, the district will not tolerate someone else retaliating against another because they sought to secure their rights under this policy or chapter 392-190 WAC or because they have filed a complaint under the complaint procedure.

Any person who retaliates will be subject to appropriate discipline.

USE OF SCHOOL FACILITIES

The board subscribes to the belief that public schools are owned and operated by and for its patrons. The public is encouraged to use school facilities but shall be expected to reimburse the district for such use to insure that funds intended for education are not used for other purposes. On recommendation of the superintendent, the board shall set the rental rates schedule as needed.

The superintendent is authorized to establish procedures for use of school facilities, including rental rates, supervisory requirements, restrictions, and security. Those using school facilities shall maintain insurance for accident and liability covering persons using the district's facilities under the sponsorship of the organization.

The district does not discriminate based on race, ethnicity, creed, religion, color, national origin, age, honorably-discharged veteran or military status, sex, sexual orientation, including gender expression, or gender identity, homelessness, immigration or citizenship status, marital status, the presence of any sensory, mental or physical disability, neurodivergence, or the use of a trained dog guide or service animal by a person with a disability and provides equal access to Boy Scouts of America and other designated youth groups.

Community athletics programs that use district facilities will not discriminate against any person on the basis of sex in the operation, conduct or administration of their programs. The district will provide copies of the district's nondiscrimination policy to all third parties using district facilities.

For rental rate purposes, organizations seeking the use of school facilities have been divided into three categories:

School or Child-related Groups or Other Government Agencies

School or Child-related Groups or Other Government Agencies include those organizations whose main purpose is to promote the welfare of boys and girls or to provide members of the community access to government programs or opportunities for civic participation. Examples are: Scouts, Campfire, PTA, 4-H, city or county sponsored recreation groups, polling places, political caucuses and governmental groups. The district will provide official recruiting representatives of the state and United States military forces, Job Corps, Peace Corps and AmeriCorps with access to school facilities (including number of days and type of presentation space) equal to and no less than the access provided to other post-secondary occupational or educational representatives.

When facilities are used outside of regular school hours, or when the district incurs extra utility, cleaning or supervision costs, a fee, to be established by the superintendent, shall be charged to recoup those costs. Additionally, youth

organizations engaged in sports activities and using school facilities must provide a statement of compliance with the policies for the management of concussion and head injury in youth sports as required by RCW 28A.600.

Nonprofit Groups

Nonprofit groups and organizations includes those organizations which might wish to may use school facilities for lectures, promotional activities, rallies, entertainment, college courses, or other activities for which public halls or commercial facilities generally are rented or owned. The district shall charge a rental rate in excess of costs incurred recept that such excess Excess charges may be waived when a service club or other nonprofit group is raising funds for charitable purposes. To be granted this exception, the charitable organization must be recognized by the Philanthropic Division of the Better Business Bureau.

Professional fund raisers representing charities must provide evidence that they are registered and bonded by the state of Washington. Such fund-raisers must provide evidence that the charity will receive at least sixty (60) percent of the gross revenues received from the public prior to approval to use the facilities.

Similar treatment may be granted public universities and colleges when offering college courses within the community or when any university/college is offering a course for staff at the request of the district. Nonprofit groups of the kind that in most communities have their own facilities (churches, lodges, veterans groups, granges, etc.) who wish to use district facilities on a regular, but temporary, basis may do so under this rental rate, but for no more than two years and may not average more than twelve hours of use per week.

Commercial Enterprises

<u>Commercial Enterprises</u> include profit-making organizations and business-related enterprises. While the district would prefer these organizations use commercial or private facilities, facilities may be rented for nonregular use at the prevailing rate charged by commercial facilities in the area.

District-sponsored activities, including curricular and co-curricular functions, retain first priority in use of facilities. Authorization for use of school facilities shall not be considered as endorsement of or approval of the activity group or organization nor for the purposes it represents.


