Camino Nuevo Charter Academy INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR AGREEMENT

I. This Independent Contractor Agreement (hereinafter called "Agreement") is dated this **7th** day of **August**, 2023, by and between Camino Nuevo Charter Academy (hereinafter called "**CNCA**"), located at 3435 W Temple St. Los Angeles, CA 90027, and Bewilder (hereinafter called "**Contractor**"), located at 3122 Chaucer Street, Los Angeles, CA 90065.

II. **Description of Bewilder CNCA Annual Program**. In consideration of their mutual covenants, the parties hereto agree as follows: The Bewilder CNCA Annual Program to be provided by **Contractor** pursuant to this Agreement (Bewilder CNCA Annual Program), including details regarding the contact that **Contractor** and its assigns will have with students, are described in

Attachment A - Description of Bewilder CNCA Annual Program – (MUST BE COMPLETED AND ATTACHED TO THIS DOCUMENT)

Contractor hereby verifies that it is specially trained or experienced and competent to provide the Bewilder CNCA Annual Program required by this Agreement and acknowledges that **CNCA** has entered into this Agreement in reliance on the above verification.

III. **Term of Agreement.** The work specified above will commence on September 11, 2023 and will be completed by June 18, 2024. **CNCA** has no legal obligation to renew this Agreement and the decision to do so shall be entirely within the discretion of **CNCA**.

IV. **Billing.** In consideration of the Bewilder CNCA Annual Program provided, **Contractor** will submit invoices X monthly \Box annually \Box at completion of contract and will be paid at the rate of \$300,000 per [year]. The total contract amount will not exceed \$300,000. Payment is due within thirty (30) days of receipt of invoice.

V. Indemnification. Contractor agrees to defend, indemnify and hold harmless CNCA, its officers, directors, employees, agents, affiliates, owners, volunteers, successors and assigns from and against any and all claims, including active and passive claims, losses, costs, attorney fees and expenses arising out of any liability or claim of liability for personal injury, bodily injury to persons or death, contractual liability and/or damage to property sustained, or claimed to have been sustained, arising out of any act or omission by Contractor or its sub-Contractors, and/or any other person, firm or corporation furnishing or supplying services, materials or supplies in conjunction with the Bewilder CNCA Annual Program of the Contractor, whether authorized by this Agreement or not. Contractor further agrees to waive all rights of subrogation against CNCA. The provisions of this article do not apply to any damage or losses caused solely by the negligence or willful misconduct of CNCA or any of its agents or employees.

VI. **Insurance**. **Contractor** shall, at its own expense, procure and maintain at all times it performs any portion of the Bewilder CNCA Annual Program the following insurance with minimum limits equal to the amounts indicated below.

- 1) <u>Minimum Scope of Insurance</u>
 - a) Commercial General Liability and Automobile Liability Insurance. Commercial General Liability Insurance and Automobile Liability Insurance that shall protect Contractor, CNCA, and the State from all claims of bodily injury, property damage, personal injury, death, advertising injury, and medical payments arising performing any portion of the Bewilder CNCA Annual Program. (Form CG 0001 and CA 0001) Commercial General Liability insurance shall include contractual liability, products liability, completed operations and broad form property damage coverage.
 - b) Workers' Compensation and Employers' Liability Insurance. Workers' Compensation Insurance and Employers' Liability Insurance for all of its employees performing any portion of the Bewilder CNCA Annual Program. In accordance with provisions of section 3700 of the California Labor Code, Contractor shall be required to secure workers' compensation coverage for its employees. If any class of employee or employees engaged in performing any portion of the Bewilder CNCA Annual Program under this Agreement are not protected under the Workers' Compensation Statute, adequate insurance coverage for the protection of any employee(s) not otherwise protected must be obtained before any of those employee(s) commence performing any portion of the Bewilder CNCA Annual Program.

- c) *Professional Liability (Errors and Omissions) Insurance*. Professional Liability (Errors and Omissions) Insurance against loss due to error, omission or malpractice, unless waived in writing by CNCA.
- d) *Sexual Abuse & Molestation Insurance*. Sexual Abuse & Molestation Insurance covering bodily injury, emotional distress, or mental anguish related to any claim, cause of action, or liability associated with child molestation or sexual abuse.

2) Minimum Limits of Insurance

- i. *Commercial General Liability Insurance*: \$1,000,000 combined single limit per occurrence for bodily injury, personal injury, and property damage; \$3,000,000 general aggregate.
- ii. *Automobile Liability Insurance*: \$1,000,000 combined single limit per accident for bodily injury and property damage; \$2,000,000 general aggregate.
- iii. *Workers' Compensation and Employers' Liability Insurance*: Workers' compensation limits as required by the Labor Code of the State of California and Employers Liability limits of \$1,000,000 per accident.
- iv. Professional Liability (Errors and Omissions) Insurance: \$1,000,000 single limit per claim; \$2,000,000 general aggregate.
- v. Sexual Abuse & Molestation Insurance. \$2,000,000 per claim and in aggregate if this coverage is applicable to the Bewilder CNCA Annual Program provided.
- <u>Claims-Made Forms</u>: If the above insurance is written on a claims-made form, it shall continue for three years following termination of this Agreement. Such insurance shall have a retroactive date of placement prior to or coinciding with the effective date of this Agreement.
- 4) <u>Deductibles and Self-Insured Retentions</u>: Any deductibles or self-insured retentions must be declared to and approved by **CNCA**.
- 5) Other Insurance Provisions: The policies shall contain, or be endorsed to contain, the following provisions:
 - *a) General Liability and Automobile Liability Coverages*
 - i. **Contractor's** insurance coverage shall be primary insurance with respect to **CNCA**, its officers, board members, officials, employees, agents, or volunteers. Any insurance or self-insurance maintained by **CNCA**, its officers, board members, officials, employees, or volunteers shall be in excess of **Contractor's** insurance and shall not contribute to it.
 - ii. CNCA, its officers, board members, officials, employees, agents, and volunteers shall be covered as additional insureds with respect to liability arising out of activities performed by or on behalf of **Contractor**; and premises owned, leased, or used by **Contractor**. The coverage shall contain no special limitations on the scope of the protection afforded to CNCA, its officers, board members, officials, employees, agents, or volunteers.
 - iii. Failure to comply with reporting provisions of the policies shall not affect coverage provided to CNCA, its officers, board members, officials, employees, agents, and volunteers.
 - iv. Coverage shall state that **Contractor's** insurance shall apply separately to each insured against whom a claim is made or a suit is brought, except with respect to the limits of the insurer's liability.
 - b) All Coverages
 - i. Each insurance policy required by this Agreement shall be endorsed to state that coverages shall not be canceled except after thirty (30) days prior written notice has been given to CNCA. In addition, Contractor agrees that it shall not reduce its coverage or limits on any such policy except after thirty (30) days prior written notice has been given to CNCA and CNCA approves the reduction in coverage or limits. Contractor further agrees that it shall not increase any deductibles or self-insured retentions on any such policy except after thirty (30) days prior written notice has been given to CNCA and CNCA approves the reduction of CNCA and CNCA approves the reduction in coverage or limits. Contractor further agrees that it shall not increase any deductibles or self-insured retentions on any such policy except after thirty (30) days prior written notice has been given to CNCA and CNCA approves such increase. Insurance is to be placed with insurers with a Best's rating of no less than A: VII. This requirement may, however, be waived in individual cases for Errors and Omissions Coverages only, provided that in no event will a carrier with a rating of B: IX or lower be acceptable.
- 6) Self-Insured Entities: CNCA may, at its discretion, accept self-insurance as being in compliance with this section. In such case, Contractor agrees that it will defend and indemnify CNCA, including its officers, board members, officials, employees, agents, and volunteers, to the same extent as it would Contractor or any other self-insured person or entity, and that it will treat CNCA, including its officers, board members, officials, employees, agents, and volunteers as if it were covered to the same extent as Contractor or any other self-insured person or entity. Self-insurance shall be subject to all requirements contained in this section. Alternatively, self-insured entities may purchase insurance covering CNCA for all work performed and/or services rendered under this Agreement, provided such insurance complies with all the requirements of this section.
- 7) Evidence of Insurance: Prior to commencing work under this Agreement, **Contractor** shall provide **CNCA** with certificates of insurance evidencing compliance with this section. On request, **Contractor** shall furnish copies of any and/or all of the required insurance policies.

VII. Limitation of CNCA Liability. Other than as provided in this Agreement, CNCA's financial obligations under this Agreement shall be limited to the payment of the compensation provided in this Agreement. Notwithstanding any other provision of this Agreement, in no event, shall CNCA be liable, regardless of whether any claim is based

on contract or tort, for any special, consequential, indirect or incidental damages, including, but not limited to, lost profits or revenue, arising out of or in connection with this Agreement or for the Bewilder CNCA Annual Program performed in connection with this Agreement.

VIII. **Non-Discrimination**. **Contractor** shall ensure that no person employed by, associated with, or subcontracted to **Contractor** shall, on the basis of race, color, national origin, age, ancestry, religion, sex, handicap or sexual orientation, or other basis protected by law, be excluded from participation in, or otherwise be subjected to discrimination under any program or activity at **CNCA** and shall ensure its, and its employees' and subcontractors' compliance with applicable Federal and California laws including, but not limited to the California Fair Employment and Housing Act beginning with Government Code Section 12900 and Labor Code Section 1735.

IX. Interest of Contractor. It is understood and agreed that this Agreement is not a contract of employment between CNCA and Contractor. At all times Contractor shall be deemed to be an independent contractor and is not authorized to bind CNCA to any contracts or other obligations. In executing this Agreement, Contractor certifies that no one who has or who will have any financial interest under this Agreement is an officer or employee of CNCA. Additionally, as the Contractor is not a CNCA employee, Contractor is solely responsible for all employment-related responsibilities for its employees, including but not limited to training, fingerprinting, workers' compensation, etc..

X. Workers' Compensation. Contractor is aware of the laws of the State of California requiring employers to be insured against liability for Workers' Compensation and shall comply with such laws during the term of this Agreement.

XI. **Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA)**. **Contractor** is aware of OSHA standards and codes as set forth by the U.S. Department of Labor and the derivative Cal/OSHA standards, laws and regulations relating thereto, and verify that all performance under this Agreement shall be in compliance therewith.

XII. **Originality of Services**. **Contractor** agrees that all technologies, formulae, procedures, processes, methods, writings, ideas, dialogue, compositions, recordings, teleplays and video productions prepared for, written for, or submitted to the **CNCA** and/or used in connection with this Agreement, shall be wholly original to **Contractor** and shall not be copied in whole or in part from any other source, except that submitted to **Contractor** by **CNCA** as a basis for such services.

XIII. License and Authority. Contractor warrants that it will maintain all necessary licenses, registrations, and certifications during the term of this Agreement, and that it is duly authorized to enter into this Agreement by its governing or controlling body. Evidence or copies of all necessary licenses, registrations and certifications must be provided to CNCA.

XIV. **Compliance with Laws**. **Contractor** shall observe and comply with all rules and regulations of the governing board of **CNCA** and all federal, state, and local laws, ordinances and regulations. **Contractor** shall give all notices required by any law, ordinance, rule and/or regulation bearing on the performance of the Bewilder CNCA Annual Program as indicated or specified. If **Contractor** observes that the Bewilder CNCA Annual Program is at variance with any such laws, ordinances, rules or regulations, **Contractor** shall notify **CNCA** in writing, and at the sole option of **CNCA**, any necessary changes to the Bewilder CNCA Annual Program shall be made and this Agreement shall be appropriately amended in writing, or this Agreement shall be terminated effective upon **Contractor's** receipt of a written termination notice from **CNCA**. If **Contractor** performs any work that is in violation of any laws, ordinances, rules or regulations, without first notifying **CNCA** of the violation, **Contractor** shall bear all costs arising therefrom.

XV. **Equipment and Facilities**. **Contractor** will provide all necessary equipment and facilities to render its Bewilder CNCA Annual Program pursuant to this Agreement, unless the parties to this Agreement specifically agree in writing that said equipment and facilities will be provided in a different manner. Equipment purchased under the provisions of this Agreement by **CNCA** is the property of **CNCA** and shall be used for its intended purpose during the term of this Agreement. An inventory of all equipment purchased under this Agreement shall be maintained. After the term of this Agreement, the equipment shall continue to be the property of **CNCA**.

XVI. Employment of Additional Workers by Contractor. Contractor may, at its own expense, employ additional workers or subcontractors as necessary for the completion of this Agreement and shall maintain workers' compensation insurance as required by state law. CNCA shall not control, direct, or supervise Contractor's additional workers or subcontractors in the performance of services. Contractor assumes full and sole responsibility for the payment of all compensation and expenses of these additional workers or sub-contractors and for all state and federal income tax, unemployment insurance, social security, disability insurance, and other applicable

withholdings. **Contractor** shall not hire employees of **CNCA** for performance of this Agreement unless such employment does not conflict with **CNCA's** personnel policies as determined by **CNCA**.

XVII. Assignment. Without the prior written consent of CNCA, this Agreement is not assignable by the Contractor, either in whole or in part.

XVIII. **Successors and Assigns**. Subject to the provision regarding assignment, this Agreement shall be binding on the heirs, executors, administrators, successors, and assigns of the respective parties.

XIX. **Governing Law**. The validity of this Agreement and any of its terms or provisions as well as the rights and duties of the parties hereunder shall be governed by the laws of the State of California. Venue for all litigation relative to the formation, interpretation, and performance of this Agreement shall be in County of Los Angeles, California.

XX. Withholding. CNCA shall not withhold or set aside any money on behalf of the Contractor for Federal Income Tax, State Income Tax, Social Security Tax, Unemployment Insurance, Disability Insurance, or any other federal or state fund whatsoever. It shall be the sole responsibility of the Contractor to withhold, set aside and account for all of the above.

XXI. Audit. Contractor shall establish and maintain books, records, and systems of account, in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles, reflecting all business operations of Contractor transacted under this Agreement. Contractor shall retain these books, records, and systems of account during the Term of this Agreement and for three (3) years thereafter. Contractor shall permit CNCA, its agent, other representatives, or an independent auditor to audit, examine, and make excerpts, copies, and transcripts from all books and records, and to make audit(s) of all billing statements, invoices, records, and other data related to the Bewilder CNCA Annual Program covered by this Agreement. Audit(s) may be performed at any time, provided that CNCA shall give reasonable prior notice to Contractor and shall conduct audit(s) during Contractor's normal business hours, unless Contractor otherwise consents.

XXII. CNCA's Evaluation of Contractor and Contractor's Employees and/or Subcontractors. CNCA may evaluate Contractor in any manner which is permissible under the law. CNCA's evaluation may include, without limitation:

- 1) Requesting CNCA employee(s) evaluate Contractor and Contractor's employees and subcontractors and each of their performance.
- 2) Announced and unannounced observance of Contractor, Contractor's employee(s), and/or subcontractor(s).

XXIII. Entire Agreement/Changes or Alterations. This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement between the Parties and supersedes all prior discussions, negotiations, and agreements, whether oral or written. This Agreement may be amended or modified only by a written instrument executed by both Parties.

XXIV. Termination.

- 1) <u>For Cause</u>: **CNCA** may terminate this Agreement upon giving of written notice of intention to terminate for cause. Cause shall include:
 - a) material violation of this Agreement by Contractor;
 - b) any act by Contractor exposing CNCA to liability to others for personal injury or property damage; or
 - c) Contractor is adjudged a bankrupt, Contractor makes a general assignment for the benefit of creditors, or a receiver is appointed on account of Contractor's insolvency. If the expenses, fees, and/or costs to CNCA exceed the cost of providing the Bewilder CNCA Annual Program pursuant to this Agreement, Contractor shall immediately pay the excess expense, fees, and/or costs to CNCA upon the receipt of CNCA's notice of these expenses, fees, and/or costs. The foregoing provisions are in addition to and not a limitation of any other rights or remedies available to CNCA.
- 2) <u>Without Cause by CNCA</u>: CNCA may, at any time, with or without reason, terminate this Agreement and compensate Contractor only for the Bewilder CNCA Annual Program satisfactorily rendered to the date of termination. Written notice by CNCA shall be sufficient to stop further performance by Contractor. Notice shall be deemed given when received by the Contractor or no later than three days after the day of mailing, whichever is sooner.
 - a) Upon termination, **Contractor** shall provide **CNCA** with all documents produced, maintained, or collected by **Contractor** pursuant to this Agreement, whether such documents are final or draft documents.

XXV. Waiver. No delay or omission by CNCA in exercising any right under this Agreement shall operate as a waiver of that or any other right and no single or partial exercise of any right shall preclude CNCA from any or further exercise of any right or remedy.

XXVI. **Headings**. All section headings contained herein are for clarification and convenience of reference only and are not intended to limit the scope of any provision of the Agreement.

XXVII. **Severability**. In the event any portion of this Agreement shall be finally determined by any court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unenforceable, such provision shall be deemed void and the remainder of this Agreement shall continue in full force and effect.

XXVIII. **Ambiguity**. The parities to this Agreement, and each of them, hereby represent that the language contained herein is to be construed as jointly proposed and jointly accepted, and in the event of any subsequent determination of ambiguity, all parties shall be treated as equally responsible for such ambiguity.

XXIX. **Copyright**. Any written product produced as a result of this contract shall be a work for hire and shall be the property of **CNCA**.

XXX. Expenses. Contractor shall be responsible for all costs and expenses incident to the performance of services for CNCA, including but not limited to all costs of equipment provided by Contractor, all fees, fines, licenses, bonds and/or taxes required of or imposed against Contractor, and all other of Contractor's costs of doing business. CNCA shall be responsible for no expenses incurred by Contractor in performing services for CNCA except as provided by this Agreement.

XXXI. **Privacy, Security, and Confidentiality**. If, in the course of carrying out this Agreement, **Contractor** gathers or processes personal (private) information, **Contractor** shall manage the data in accordance with all applicable federal and California state privacy laws including, but not limited to: Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1984 (20 U.S.C. Sec. 1232g) and Children's Online Privacy Protection Act (COPPA), and California Education Code sections 49069 to 49079. Examples of personal information include, but are not limited to name, telephone number, email account, address, date of birth, social security number, and student assessment data.

In addition, the Parties shall demonstrate that they have taken specific steps to ensure that data are kept secure and confidential as evidenced by, at a minimum, the following:

- 1) Every employee, volunteer or other person with access to personal information shall sign a statement that they understand that the information is personal and they will take steps to ensure that unauthorized personnel do not gain access to personal data.
- 2) Personal data, while being transmitted electronically, shall be encrypted.
- 3) Any repository for the data shall be locked and have access restricted to those personnel that have a legitimate need to access the data and have signed a confidentiality agreement.
- 4) Any security breach shall be reported to CNCA in writing within 24 hours of discovery.

XXXII. **Department of Justice (DOJ) Fingerprinting and Tuberculosis (TB) Clearance**. **Contractor** agrees to adhere to the DOJ fingerprint and criminal background investigation and TB requirements of California Education Code sections 45125.1, et seq., and 49406 and provide an affidavit that certifies that all of its employees that work at **CNCA** campuses and come into contact with students have appropriate DOJ and TB clearances. Clearances must not be obtained at the expense of **CNCA** and **CNCA** shall not reimburse for these expenses. The affidavit must list the following:

- 1) Employee name and CNCA location(s) he/she services;
- 2) Date of criminal background check clearance;
- 3) TB expiration date; and
- 4) Name of **Contractor's** DOJ custodian of records.

Contractor's affidavit must be submitted with high authority per its Organizational Chart (i.e. Owner, Management Team, C-level executive, etc.). The affidavit must be provided to **CNCA** prior to the first day of service. Failure to provide this documentation shall be considered a material breach and can be used as grounds to terminate the contract immediately. **CNCA** may request updated documentation as needed. **Contractor** must take appropriate action to remove any employee whose arrest notification poses a threat to the school population to ensure the safety of **CNCA** students.

XXXIII. **Independent Contractor Status**. **Contractor** attests that it is engaged in a separately established bona fide business and is in fact an Independent Contractor in accordance with IRS and EDD requirements. **Contractor** understands and agrees that it and all of its employees shall not be considered officers, employees, agents, partners, or joint ventures of **CNCA**, and are not entitled to benefits of any kind or nature normally provided employees of **CNCA** and/or to which **CNCA's** employees are normally entitled, including, but not limited to, State Unemployment Compensation or Worker's Compensation. XXXIV. Conflict Of Interest. By signing this Agreement all parties acknowledge and assert that there is no known Conflict of Interest in the execution of this Agreement.

XXXV. Commencement of Work. Contractor is not authorized and will not commence any work of this Agreement and CNCA will not assume legal, financial or any other obligation for work performed prior to the issuance of an authorizing purchase orders with reference to this Agreement.

This Agreement, including attachments, constitutes the entire understanding of the parties and any changes or modifications shall be in writing and signed by both parties.



ALL WORDS OR PHRASES, OTHER THAN CAPTIONS, PRINTED IN BOLD FACE ARE DEFINED IN THE POLICY. VARIOUS PROVISIONS IN THIS POLICY RESTRICT COVERAGE. READ THE ENTIRE POLICY CAREFULLY TO DETERMINE RIGHTS, DUTIES AND WHAT IS AND IS NOT INSURED.

CLAIMS MADE POLICY: THIS INSURANCE COVERAGE IS ON A CLAIMS MADE BASIS. COVERAGE APPLIES ONLY TO THOSE CLAIMS THAT ARE FIRST MADE DURING THE POLICY PERIOD AND ANY EXTENDED REPORTING PERIOD, IF APPLICABLE, AS THOSE TERMS ARE DESCRIBED IN THIS POLICY. COVERAGE DOES NOT APPLY TO ANY WRONGFUL ACT COMMITTED BEFORE THE RETROACTIVE DATE STATED IN THIS POLICY.

SECTION I – INSURING AGREEMENTS

A. Coverage

- The Company will pay on the Insured's behalf those sums, in excess of the Retention and within the applicable Limit of Insurance, that the Insured becomes legally obligated to pay as Damages or Claim Expense because of Claims first made during the Policy Period or Extended Reporting Period (if applicable) as a result of Wrongful Acts committed in the performance of Insured Services.
- For the purposes of this policy of insurance, "Wrongful Act" shall mean the following conduct or alleged conduct by an Insured, or any person or organization for whom an Insured is legally liable:
 - **a.** A negligent act, error or omission;

- b. Any form of defamation or other tort related to disparagement or harm to the character, reputation or feelings of any person or organization, including libel, slander, product disparagement, trade libel, infliction of emotional distress, malicious falsehood, outrage or outrageous conduct;
- c. Any form of invasion, infringement or interference with rights of privacy or publicity, including false light, public disclosure of private facts, intrusion, breach of confidence, and commercial appropriation of name or likeness;
- **d.** Wrongful entry or eviction, trespass, eavesdropping or other invasion of the right of private occupancy;
- e. False arrest, detention or imprisonment; or
- f. Malicious prosecution.

All **Wrongful Acts** that take place between the **Retroactive Date** and the end of the **Policy Period** of the last policy the **Company** issued to the **Insured** and are related by common facts, circumstances, transactions, events and/or decisions will be treated as one **Wrongful Act**.

B. Defense and Settlement of a Claim

The **Company** will have the right and duty to appoint an attorney and defend a covered **Claim**, even if the allegations are groundless, false or fraudulent. However:

1. The Company may, at the Company's discretion, investigate and settle a covered Claim.

- No offer to settle any Claim will be made or accepted by the Insured without prior written agreement by the Company. Notwithstanding the foregoing, it is understood that the Insured may settle any Claim for which the total cost of Damages and Claim Expense associated therewith is less than the amount of the remaining Retention.
- 3. If the **Company** is willing to accept the judgment of the trial or appellate court or any negotiated settlement or settlement offer and the **Insured** is not willing to accept such judgment or settlement, the **Company's** liability for any **Claim Expense** and/or **Damages** incurred after the **Company** indicated its willingness to accept such judgment or settlement shall be limited to the amount for which the **Company** could have resolved the **Claim** plus an additional fifty percent (50%) of that amount. Nothing in this provision will cause the **Company's** liability to exceed the applicable Limits of Insurance set forth on the Declarations Page.
- 4. The Company's right and duty to defend and pay on the Insured's behalf ends when the Company has used up the applicable Limit of Insurance in payment of Damages or Claim Expense, or has met its payment obligations in connection with a Claim subject to Section I.B.3.

Nothing in this **SECTION I – INSURING AGREEMENT, Section B. Defense and Investigation** will relieve the **Insured** from any notice or cooperation requirements contained in the **GENERAL CONDITIONS** section or any other part of this policy.

C. Spousal Coverage

If a **Claim** made against an **Individual Insured** includes a **Claim** against that **Individual Insured's** lawful spouse solely by reason of:

- 1. Such spouse's status as the Individual Insured's spouse, or
- 2. Such spouse's ownership interest in property from which the claimant seeks recovery for the Individual Insured's Wrongful Acts,

all **Claim Expense** and **Damages** which such spouse becomes legally obligated to pay on account of such **Claim** shall be treated for purposes of this policy as **Claim Expense** and **Dam**-

ages which the Individual Insured is legally obligated to pay on account of the Claim made against the Individual Insured. Such Claim Expense and Damages shall be covered under this policy only if and to the extent that such Claim Expense and Damages would be covered under this policy if incurred by the Individual Insured. A. Limits of Insurance

1. Each Wrongful Act

The Each **Wrongful Act** Limit of Insurance stated in Item 5.a. on the Declarations Page is the most the **Company** will pay for **Damages** and **Claim Expense** combined for the total of all **Claims** made during the **Policy Period** and any Extended Reporting Period arising from one **Wrongful Act**, no matter how many:

- a. Insureds this policy covers;
- b. Claims are made; or
- c. Persons or organizations make Claims.
- **2.** Total Limit of Insurance

The Total Limit of Insurance stated in Item 5.b. on the Declarations Page is the most the **Company** will pay for **Damages** and **Claim Expense** combined for the total of all **Claims** made during the **Policy Period** and any Extended Reporting Period, no matter how many:

- a. Insureds this policy covers;
- b. Claims are made;
- c. Persons or organizations make Claims; or

- d. Wrongful Acts are committed.
- 3. Sub-Limits
 - a. Disciplinary Proceedings Claim Expense

The most the **Company** will pay for all **Claim Expense** incurred in connection with **Disciplinary Proceedings** commenced during the **Policy Period** and any applicable Extended Reporting Period shall be \$10,000, no matter how many:

- (1) Insureds this policy covers;
- (2) Disciplinary Proceedings are commenced;
- (3) Persons, organizations, or authorities institute Disciplinary Proceedings; or
- (4) Wrongful Acts are committed.

b. Insured's Claim Attendance Expense

If the **Insured** is requested by the **Company** to attend hearings, depositions and trials in connection with the defense of a covered **Claim**, the most the **Company** shall pay for the **Insured's Claim Attendance Expense** incurred as a direct result of such attendance, after any applicable **Retention** is satisfied, will be the lesser of: the **Insured's** actual **Claim Attendance Expense**, or \$500 per day. In any event, the **Company's** total payment for all such **Claim Attendance Expense** shall not exceed \$10,000 for each **Policy Period**, no matter how many:

- (1) **Insureds** this policy covers;
- (2) Claims are made;
- (3) Persons or organizations make **Claims**;
- (4) Trials, depositions, hearings or related appearances the **Insured** attends; or
- (5) Wrongful Acts are committed.

- c. These sub-limits, and any other sub-limit which may be stated in any endorsement to this policy, shall be part of, and not in addition to, the Total Limit of Insurance stated in Item 5.b. of the Declarations. Payment for Claim Expense or Damages to which a sub-limit applies will reduce the Total Limit of Insurance available to pay Claims covered under this policy.
- d. If more than one sub-limited coverage applies to a **Claim** covered under this policy, the **Company** shall not be obligated to pay more than the largest applicable sub-limit for all **Claim Expense** and **Damages** in connection with such **Claim**.

B. Retention

The **Company** shall be liable for only that part of **Damages** and **Claim Expense** covered under this policy which is excess of the **Wrongful Act Retention** as described below and in the amount set forth in Item 6. of the Declarations. Such **Retention** shall be borne by the **Insureds** uninsured and at their own risk.

With respect to **Claims** for **Wrongful Acts**, the **Retention** set forth in Item 6. of the Declarations shall apply to each **Wrongful Act** covered by this policy. All **Wrongful Acts** that involve the same or related subject, person, class of person or have common facts or circumstances or involve common transactions, events or decisions, regardless of the number of repetitions, alterations, actions, or forms of communication will be treated as one **Wrongful Act** for the purposes of applying the **Retention**. The **Retention** applies to **Damages** and **Claim Expense** combined. The **Retention** shall not apply to **Claim Expense** incurred in connection with **Disciplinary Proceedings**.

If more than one **Retention** applies to a **Claim** covered under this policy, the **Insured's Retention** obligation shall not exceed the largest applicable **Retention** in connection with such **Claim**.

The Limit of Insurance shall not be reduced by the application of the **Retention**. All other rights, duties and obligations under the policy shall remain the same regardless of whether or not the **Retention** has been satisfied, including, but not limited to, the **Company's** right and duty to investigate, defend and settle **Claims** and the **In**-

sured's notice and cooperation duties set forth in this policy.

C. Reimbursement

If, at the **Company's** option, the **Company** has paid any amounts for **Damages** or **Claim Expense** in excess of the applicable Limit of Insurance, including any amounts paid in excess of the **Company's** obligation to pay **Damages** and **Claim Expense** pursuant to **SECTION I – INSURING AGREEMENT, Section B. Defense and Investigation, Paragraph 3.** of this policy, or if the **Company** has paid part or all of any **Retention**, the **Insured** shall reimburse the **Company** for such amounts upon demand.

The **Company** will have the right to seek recovery from any **Insured** of any **Claim Expense** or **Damages** paid by the **Company** as a result of any portion of a **Claim** that is not covered by this policy.

SECTION III – EXCLUSIONS

- A. The Company is not obligated to pay Damages or Claim Expense or defend Claims for or arising directly or indirectly out of:
 - 1. Bodily Injury or Property Damage.
 - 2. An act or omission that is dishonest, fraudulent, criminal, malicious or was intentionally committed while knowing it was wrongful, as evidenced by any judgment, final adjudication, alternate dispute resolution proceeding or written admission by the Insured. This exclusion does not apply to any Individual Insured that did not commit, acquiesce or participate in the actions that gave rise to the Claim. Pursuant to SECTION II -LIMITS OF INSURANCE, RETENTION AND REIMBURSEMENT, Section C. of this policy, the Company shall have a right to reimbursement of any Damages or Claim Expense paid by the Company as a result of a Claim to which this exclusion applies.
 - **3.** Infringement, misappropriation or theft of:
 - a. Copyright;
 - **b.** Trademark, trade dress, trade name, service mark, service name, title or slogan;
 - c. Patent; or

- **4.** Unfair competition, restraint of trade or any other violation of antitrust laws.
- **5.** Harassment, misconduct or discrimination because of or relating to:
 - a. Race, creed, color or age;
 - **b.** Sex, sexual preference, national origin or religion; or
 - c. Handicap, disability or marital status,

but only if the harassment, misconduct or discrimination was knowingly committed, as evidenced by any judgment, final adjudication, alternate dispute resolution proceeding or written admission by the **Insured**. Pursuant to **SECTION II – LIMITS OF INSURANCE, RETENTION AND REIMBURSEMENT, Section C.** of this policy, the **Company** shall have a right to reimbursement of any **Damages** or **Claim Expense** paid by the **Company** as a result of a **Claim** to which this exclusion applies.

- Gain, profit or advantage to which any Insured is not legally entitled, as evidenced by any judgment, final adjudication, alternate dispute resolution proceeding or written admission by the Insured. Pursuant to SECTION II LIMITS OF INSURANCE, RETENTION AND REIMBURSEMENT, Section C. of this policy, the Company shall have a right to reimbursement of any Damages or Claim Expense paid by the Company as a result of a Claim to which this exclusion applies.
- 7. Violation of any provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (the "Act") or:
 - **a.** Any amendment to the Act; or
 - **b.** Any regulations, rulings or orders issued pursuant to the Act.
- 8. Violation of the Securities Act of 1933 as amended, The Securities Exchange Act of 1934 as amended, the Investment Advisers Act of 1940, any state blue sky or securities law, any similar state or federal law, or any order, ruling or regulation issued pursuant to the above laws.

- 9. The actual or threatened discharge, dispersal or release of any Pollutant; or the creation of an injurious condition involving any Pollutant; or the existence of any Pollutant on any property; or the clean up, removal, testing, monitoring, containment, treatment, detoxification or neutralization of any Pollutant. This exclusion shall apply whether or not the pollution was sudden, accidental, gradual, intended, expected or preventable or whether or not any Insured caused or contributed to the pollution.
- **10.** The performance of services which can only be performed by a:
 - **a.** Architect or licensed engineer;
 - **b.** Attorney;
 - c. Certified public accountant;
 - d. Medical practitioner or other health care provider, including, but not limited to, physicians or nurses, and including any Claims arising directly or indirectly out of medical malpractice, including the giving or receiving of professionally qualified medical opinions, or the administration of or failure to administer or summon medical care or first aid;
 - e. Actuary;
 - f. Licensed insurance agent or broker;
 - **g.** Certified financial planner; or
 - **h.** Securities or investment advisor or broker/dealer.
- Malfunction or defect of any hardware, equipment or component. This exclusion does not apply when the malfunction or defect is solely the result of any **Insured's** Wrongful Act in performing **Insured Ser**vices.
- **12.** Electrical or mechanical failure, including power interruption, surge, spike, brownout or blackout, and outages to gas, water, telephone, cable, satellite, telecommunications or other infrastructure; except this exclusion does not apply when the failure is solely the result of the **Insured's Wrongful Act** in performing **Insured Services**.

- **13.** Gathering, acquisition or obtaining of information about Internet users in any manner, including but not limited to, placement and/or use of spyware or adware.
- **14.** Unsolicited faxes, unsolicited electronic mail, unsolicited telephone calls or other unsolicited electronic communications. This exclusion shall include alleged violations of state, local or federal law, including non-U.S. laws, any amendment to such laws, or violation of any order, ruling or regulation issued pursuant to such laws that regulate such communication.
- **15.** Actions, decisions, orders or proceedings by the Federal Trade Commission, Federal Communications Commission or any other federal, state or local governmental regulatory agency, except for **Disciplinary Proceedings**.
- **16.** Unauthorized access to, unauthorized use of, or unauthorized alteration of any computer or system, hardware, software, program, network, data, database, communication network or service, including the introduction of malicious code or virus, or repetitively accessing a website under the control of an **Insured** with the intent to deny others access to such website or with the intent to cause such website's functionality to fail, including what is commonly referred to as denial of service attacks.
- 17. Advertising by the Insured, including inaccurate, inadequate or incomplete description of the price of the Insured's goods, products or services, or the failure of the Insured's goods, products or services to conform with any represented quality or performance contained in Advertising by the Insured.
- **18.** Performance or failure to perform otherwise covered **Insured Services** without a valid and active license, certification, accreditation, or designation if required by federal, state, or local statutory laws to perform such **Insured Services**
- **19.** Obligations under any Workers' Compensation, Unemployment Compensation, Employers Liability or Disability Benefit Law, including any similar provisions of any federal, state or local statutory or common law.

- **20.** Failure to protect any non-public, personally identifiable information in the **Insured**'s care, custody or control.
- **21.** Violation of or noncompliance with any law or regulation governing or pertaining to gambling, gaming, lotteries or games of chance and any other act associated with any such violation or noncompliance
- **22.** Theft, misappropriation, commingling or conversion of any funds, monies, assets, or property.
- **23.** Investment advice including guarantees about the future performance or value of investments, rates of return, interest, or tax consequences
- B. The Company is not obligated to pay Damages or Claim Expense or defend Claims made by:
 - 1. Any enterprise that is a parent, affiliate or partner of any **Insured**;
 - Any enterprise directly or indirectly controlled, operated or managed by the Insured or an enterprise described in SECTION III – EXCLUSIONS, Section B., Paragraph 1 above;
 - 3. Any Insured;
 - Any present, former or prospective employees, officers, directors of any **Insured** when the **Claim** is in any way related to the present, former or prospective employment relations between the claimant and any **Insured**; or
 - 5. Any regulatory authority, or any federal, state or local governmental agency; except this exclusion does not apply to a Claim brought by any of these entities if such entity is also a client, and the Claim arises from actual or alleged Wrongful Acts in the Insured's performance of Insured Services for or on behalf of such agency or entity.
- C. The Company is not obligated to pay Damages or Claim Expense or defend Claims for the breach of express warranties, guarantees or contracts; provided, however, with respect to al-

legations of breach of contract this exclusion shall not apply to any liability that would have attached in the absence of such contract nor to coverage for **Claims** for actual or alleged negligent performance of **Insured Services**.

- **D.** The **Company** is not obligated to pay **Damages** or **Claim Expense** or defend **Claims** based upon, arising out of, directly or indirectly resulting from, in consequence of or in any way involving:
 - 1. Any fact, circumstance, transaction, event or **Wrongful Act** that:
 - a. before the First Inception Date was the subject of any notice of claim or loss, or notice of potential claim or potential loss, given under any other policy of insurance; or
 - b. which, as of the First Inception Date any Insured had knowledge and that was reasonably likely to give rise to a Claim that would fall within the scope of the insurance afforded by this policy; or
 - c. any other Wrongful Act whenever occurring, which together with a Wrongful Act described in a. or b. above, constitute one Wrongful Act as defined in this policy;
 - **2.** Any demand, suit or other proceeding pending, or order, decree or judgment entered:
 - a. against any **Insured** on or prior to the **First Inception Date** or any **Wrongful Act**, fact, circumstance or situation underlying or alleged therein; or
 - **b.** any other **Wrongful Act** whenever occurring, which, together with a **Wrongful Act** described in a. above, constitute one **Wrongful Act** as defined in this policy.

SECTION IV – WHERE AND WHEN THE COMPANY INSURES

A. Where The Company Insures

Coverage under this policy applies to **Wrongful Acts** committed anywhere and to **Claims** made in the jurisdiction of the United States of America (including its territories and possessions), Puerto Rico and Canada. If **Damages** or **Claim Expense** are paid in a currency other than United

States of America dollars, then the payment under this policy will be considered to have been made in United States dollars at the conversion rate published in *The Wall Street Journal* at the time of the payment.

B. When The Company Insures

1. Claims First Made

This insurance applies when a **Claim** is first made against any **Insured** during the **Policy Period**. To be covered, the **Claim** must also arise from a **Wrongful Act** committed during the **Policy Period**, except as otherwise provided below in **SECTION – IV**, **Section B**. **When The Company Insures**, **Paragraphs 2 and 3**. The **Company** will consider a **Claim** to be first made against an **Insured** when a written **Claim** is first received by any **Insured**.

This insurance also applies to **Claims** under the following conditions:

2. Prior Wrongful Acts

This policy will apply to a **Claim** first made against any **Insured** arising from a **Wrongful Act** committed between the **Retroactive Date** and the Inception Date of the policy, but only if all of the following conditions are met:

- a. The Claim is first made against any Insured during the Policy Period. The Company will consider a Claim to be first made against the Insured when a Claim is received by any Insured;
- **b.** No **Insured** knew, prior to the **First Inception Date**, of a circumstance that could reasonably be expected to lead to the **Claim**; and
- **c.** There is no other valid and collectible insurance applicable to the **Claim**.

3. Reported Wrongful Acts

This policy will apply to a **Claim** first made against any **Insured** after the end of the **Policy Period**, but only if all of the following conditions are met:

a. The Wrongful Act giving rise to the Claim is committed between the Retro-

active Date and the end of the Policy Period;

- b. Prior to the First Inception Date, no Insured knew of the Wrongful Act, alleged Wrongful Act or circumstance that could reasonably be expected to lead to the Claim;
- c. The Company receives written notice from the Insured during the Policy Period of the Wrongful Act. The notice must include all of the following information:
 - The names of those persons or organizations involved in the Wrongful Act;
 - (2) The specific person or organization likely to make the **Claim**;
 - (3) A description of the time, place and nature of the **Wrongful Act**; and
 - (4) A description of the potential **Dam**ages; and
- **d.** There is no other valid and collectible insurance applicable to the **Claim**.

The provisions of the policy in effect on the date the **Company** receives the notice of the **Wrongful Act** under this paragraph 3. will apply to any resulting **Claim**.

4. Extended Reporting Period

If the Insured did not report Wrongful Acts during the Policy Period as described in SECTION – IV, Section B. When The Company Insures, Paragraph 3 above, and Claims arising from such Wrongful Acts are first made after the end of the Policy Period, such Claims are not covered under this policy unless the First Named Insured purchases an Extended Reporting Period from the Company.

a. If the First Named Insured purchases an Extended Reporting Period, the Company will cover a Claim first made against any Insured after the end of the Policy Period but during the Extended Reporting Period, only if all of the following conditions are met:

- (1) The Wrongful Act giving rise to such Claim is committed between the Retroactive Date and the end of the Policy Period;
- (2) No **Insured** knew prior to the **First Inception Date** of a circumstance that could reasonably be expected to lead to the **Claim**; and
- (3) There is no other valid or collectible insurance applicable to the **Claim**.

The **Company** will consider a **Claim** to be made during the Extended Reporting Period only if the **Claim** is first received by any **Insured** after the Expiration Date of the **Policy Period** and prior to the Expiration Date stated in the Extended Reporting Period Endorsement.

- **b.** The following provisions and conditions also apply to the Extended Reporting Period:
 - (1) If there is a Termination of Coverage and upon request by the Named Insured, the Company will sell one of the Extended Reporting Period options listed on the Extended Reporting Period Option Endorsement. Where a claims-made relationship between the Insured and the Company has continued for less than one year the Company is not required to sell an Extended Reporting Period for Termination of Coverage for nonpayment of premium or fraud.
 - (2) The Company must receive the First Named Insured's request for the Extended Reporting Period in writing within the later of:

a) sixty (60) days after the end of the **Policy Period**, or

b) thirty (30) days from the date of mailing or delivery of the advice informing the insured of an Extended Reporting Period option. This advice does not apply upon cancellation due to non-payment of premium or fraud on the part of the **Insured**.

On receipt and acceptance of the request, the **Company** will issue an endorsement showing the Extended Reporting Period in accordance with the option requested by the **First Named Insured**. At the same time, the **Company** will bill the additional premium, and the **Company** must receive payment within thirty (30) days after the billing date for the endorsement to be effective.

- (3) The endorsement shall also include the provisions and conditions applicable to the Extended Reporting Period. Once in effect, the Extended Reporting Period may not be canceled.
- (4) A Claim that is first made during the Extended Reporting Period will be deemed to have been made on the last day of the Policy Period. The provisions of the policy in effect on the last day of the Policy Period will apply.
- (5) The Extended Reporting Period does not extend the **Policy Period** or change the scope of coverage provided.
- (6) If a corporation, partnership or other entity has been placed in liquidation or bankruptcy or permanently ceases operations and the entity or its designated trustee does not purchase extended reporting period coverage then any person covered under the policy may request the extended reporting period coverage within 120 days of the termination of coverage
- 5. Multiple Claims

All **Claims** arising from the same **Wrongful Act** will be deemed to have been made on the earlier of the following times:

- a. The date the first of those Claims is made against any Insured; or
- b. The first date the Company receives the Insured's written notice of the Wrongful Act.

The provisions of the policy in effect on that date will apply.

SECTION V – DEFINITIONS

- A. "Advertising by the Insured" means advertising, publicity or promotion of any kind of the Insured's products and services.
- **B.** "Application" means all of the following:
 - The Insured's Miscellaneous Professional Liability insurance policy application, and, if this policy is a renewal of a policy issued by the Company, the Insured's Miscellaneous Professional Liability insurance renewal application, including all applications and renewal applications submitted for such policies;
 - 2. Other companies' insurance policy applications, if accepted by the **Company**; and
 - 3. All attachments to the **Application** or renewal **Application** and any other information furnished to the **Company** for the purpose of applying for the insurance. All such attachments and information will be kept on file by the **Company**, deemed attached to the policy as if physically attached to it and shall become incorporated in and constitute a part of this policy.
- **C.** "**Bodily Injury**" means physical injury to the body, or sickness or disease sustained by a person, including death resulting therefrom.

Bodily Injury also means mental injury or mental anguish, including emotional distress, shock or fright, if resulting from injury to the body, sickness, disease or death of any person. However, **Bodily Injury** does not include such mental injury or mental anguish if directly resulting from a covered **Wrongful Act** arising out of the performance or failure to perform **Insured Services**.

- D. "Claim" means a written demand or written assertion of a legal right made against any Insured seeking Damages or non-monetary relief, including arbitration proceedings and Disciplinary Proceedings, including any appeal therefrom.
- E. "Claim Attendance Expense" means the Insured's actual loss of earnings and reasonable expenses incurred directly in order for the Insured to attend hearings, depositions and trials

at the request of the **Company** in connection with the defense of a covered **Claim**.

- F. "Claim Expense" means expenses incurred by the Company or by the Insured with the Company's consent in the investigation, adjustment, negotiation, arbitration, mediation and defense of covered Claims, whether paid by the Company or Insured with the Company's consent. Claim Expense includes:
 - 1. Attorneys fees;
 - 2. Costs taxed against an **Insured** in any suit defended by the **Company**;
 - **3.** The cost of appeal bonds or bonds to release attachments, but only for bond amounts within the applicable Limit of Insurance. The **Company** does not have to furnish these bonds; and
 - Reasonable expenses incurred by an Insured at the Company's request, excluding:
 - Loss of earnings (except to the extent covered as Claim Attendance Expense); and
 - **b.** Salaries or other compensation paid to any **Insured**.
- **G.** "**Company**" means the insurance company stated at the top of the Declarations Page.
- H. "Damages" means monetary judgment, award or settlement, including those that are actual, statutory, punitive, multiplied or exemplary, if permitted by law in an applicable jurisdiction; and legal expense or other costs included as part of a judgment, award or settlement. Damages also includes interest on any part of any judgment that accrues after entry of the judgment and before the Company has paid, offered to pay or deposited in court the part of the judgment that is within the applicable Limit of Insurance.

Damages does not include fines, penalties, taxes or return of fees, deposits, commissions or charges for goods or services.

Damages also does not include costs of correcting, performing or re-performing **Insured Services** by:

- 1. Any Insured; or
- **2.** Another party, when an **Insured** had the opportunity to correct, perform or re-perform the service that generated the cost.

In determining the insurability of punitive or exemplary damages, or the multiplied portion of any multiplied damage award, the law of the jurisdiction most favorable to the insurability of those damages will control for purposes of resolving any dispute between the **Company** and the **Insureds**, provided that such jurisdiction is:

- **1.** Where the punitive, exemplary or multiplied damages were awarded or imposed;
- 2. Where the **Wrongful Act** giving rise to the **Claim** took place;
- 3. Where either the **Company** or any **Insured** is incorporated, has its principal place of business or resides; or
- **4.** Where this policy was issued or became effective.
- I. "Disciplinary Proceeding" means any action, investigation or request for information by a regulatory or disciplinary official, board or agency authorized by law or administrative order to oversee, investigate or institute actions regarding the **Insured's** professional misconduct in the performance of **Insured Services**.
- J. "First Inception Date" is the Inception Date of the earliest errors and omissions insurance policy the Company issued to the First Named Insured that provides similar coverage by the Company, provided that there has been uninterrupted coverage by the Company for the First Named Insured from that earliest policy to this policy.
- K. The "First Named Insured" is the Named Insured first listed on the Declarations Page.
- L. "Individual Insured" means, individually and collectively:
 - **1.** Any **Named Insured** that is an individual person;
 - 2. Any **Named Insured's** stockholders for their liability as stockholders;

- 3. Any Named Insured's and Subsidiary's partners, officers, directors and employees, but only with respect to their activities within the scope of their duties in such capacity in the performance of Insured Services by the Named Insured or any Subsidiary; and
- 4. Any Named Insured's and Subsidiary's former partners, officers, directors and employees, but only with respect to their activities within the scope of their duties in the capacity of the Named Insured's partners, officers, directors or employees in the performance of Insured Services by the Named Insured.

In the event of death, incompetency, insolvency or bankruptcy of any **Insured**, the **Insured's** legal representative shall be considered an "**Individual Insured**", but only with respect to its activities within the scope of its duties in such capacity in the performance of **Insured Services** by a **Named Insured**.

- M. "Insured" means, individually and collectively:
 - 1. A Named Insured; and
 - 2. The Individual Insureds.
- N. "Insured Services" means those services performed for others as stated in Item 4. on the Declarations Page, or as otherwise stated by endorsement to this policy.
- **O.** "**Named Insured**" means the person or entity listed in Item 1. of the Declarations Page and its **Subsidiaries**.
- **P.** "**Policy Period**" means the period of time stated in Item 2. on the Declarations Page, or any shorter period resulting from policy cancellation.
- **Q.** "**Pollutant**" means any solid, liquid, gaseous or thermal irritant or contaminant, including but not limited to:
 - **1.** Smoke, vapor, soot, fumes, acids, alkalis, chemicals, lead, silica, mold or asbestos;
 - **2.** Hazardous, toxic or radioactive matter or nuclear radiation;
 - **3.** Waste, which includes material to be recycled, reconditioned or reclaimed; or

4. Any other pollutant as defined by applicable federal, state or local statutes, regulations, rulings or ordinances.

R. "Property Damage" means:

- **1.** Physical injury to tangible property, including all resulting loss of use of that property; or
- **2.** Loss of use of tangible property that is not physically injured.
- **S.** "**Retention**" means the amount stated in Item 6. on the Declarations Page and described in **Section II.B.** of this policy.
- **T.** "**Retroactive Date**" means the date, if any, stated in Item 3. on the Declarations Page.
- **U.** "Subsidiary(ies)" means any entity in which, and so long as, a **Named Insured**, either directly or indirectly:
 - 1. Owns more than fifty (50) percent of the issued and outstanding voting equity securities; or
 - 2. Controls voting rights representing the present right to vote for election or to appoint more than fifty (50) percent of the directors or trustees;

on or before the effective date of this policy, or after the effective date of this policy; provided that, with any respect to any entity that becomes a **Subsidiary** after the effective date of the policy, and the entity's gross revenues exceed ten percent (10%) of the **Insured's** annual gross revenues at the Inception Date of the policy, the entity shall only be deemed a **Subsidiary** under this policy for a period of ninety (90) days from the date it became a **Subsidiary**.

If the **Insured** gives written notice within ninety (90) days of the creation or acquisition of the **Subsidiary**, including the necessary underwriting information the **Company** may require and pay any reasonable additional premium as the **Company** may require, then the **Company** will issue an endorsement including such entity in the definition of **Subsidiary** for the duration of the **Policy Period**.

In all events there is no coverage for **Wrongful Acts**, **Damages** or **Claim Expense** relating to any activities of a **Subsidiary**, or **Insured** thereof, occurring prior to the time such entity became a **Subsidiary**.

V. "Wrongful Act" means conduct or alleged conduct by an **Insured**, or any person or organization for whom an **Insured** is legally liable, as described in Insuring Agreement **Section I.A.** of this policy or as amended by applicable endorsement(s) attached hereto.

All Wrongful Acts that:

- 1. Take place between the **Retroactive Date** and the end of the **Policy Period** of the last policy the **Company** issued to the **Insured** and
- 2. Are related by common facts, circumstances, transactions, events and/or decisions will be treated as one **Wrongful Act**.

SECTION VI – GENERAL CONDITIONS

A. Time of Inception; Policy Period

This policy will begin at 12:01 A.M. on the Inception Date shown in the Declarations. This policy will continue to apply until 12:01 A.M. on the Expiration Date also shown in the Declarations unless terminated at an earlier date.

B. Premium

The **First Named Insured** will pay to the **Company** the amount of premium stated in Item 7. of the Declarations. The premium may be adjusted at any time during the **Policy Period** or any extensions of the **Policy Period** based upon changes in the provisions of this policy as may be agreed upon by the **First Named Insured** and the **Company**.

C. Insured's Duties in the Event of a Claim

- 1. If there is a **Claim**, the **Insured** must do the following after the **Named Insured** has knowledge of the **Claim**:
 - a. Notify the **Company** in writing as soon as practicable. This notice must contain details that identify the **Insured**, the claimant and also reasonably obtainable information concerning the time, place and other details of the **Wrongful Act** and **Claim**.

- Immediately send the Company copies of all demands, notices, summonses or legal papers received in connection with the Claim;
- **c.** Authorize the **Company** to obtain records and other information;
- d. Cooperate with and assist the **Compa**ny in the investigation, settlement or defense of the **Claim**; and
- e. Assist the Company, upon the Company's request, in enforcing any rights of contribution or indemnity against another who may be liable to any **Insured**.
- 2. No **Insured** will, except at the **Insured's** own cost, voluntarily make a payment, admit liability, assume any obligation or incur any expense without the **Company's** prior written consent.
- 3. When this policy requires that an **Insured** provide notice of a **Claim**, we will consider the **Insured** to have knowledge of that **Claim** when any of the offices of the **Named Insured's** chairperson of the board of directors, president, chief executive officer, chief operating officer, chief financial officer, risk manager or in-house counsel has that knowledge.

D. Bankruptcy

The bankruptcy or insolvency of the **Insured** or **Insured's** estate will not relieve the **Company** of the **Company's** obligation under this insurance. However, this insurance will not apply to liability directly or indirectly due to such bankruptcy, insolvency, receivership or subsequent liquidation.

E. Other Insurance

If other valid and collectible insurance applies to a **Claim** covered under this policy, this insurance is excess over such other insurance, except when the other insurance is specifically arranged by or on behalf of the **Named Insured** to apply in excess of this insurance, and no other insurance applies to the **Claim**.

F. Subrogation and Recovery

In the event of any payment under this policy, the **Company** will be subrogated to all the **In**- **sured's** rights of recovery therefore against any person or organization, and the **Insured** will execute and deliver instruments and papers and do whatever else is necessary to secure such rights. The **Insured** will do nothing to prejudice such rights. The **Company** will have no rights of subrogation against any **Insured** hereunder. Any recoveries shall be applied as follows:

- 1. First, to the **Company** up to the amount the **Company** has paid for **Damages** and **Claim Expense**.
- 2. Then, to the First Named Insured as recovery of Retention amounts paid as Damages and Claim Expense.

G. Changes in Insured's Operations

This policy applies only to **Insured Services** as described in the **Application**. This policy will not apply to any other activities or entities unless, with the **Company's** consent, such activities or entities are added to this policy by endorsement. The **Named Insured** will promptly pay any additional premium that may become due as a result of such addition.

H. Assignment

Assignment of any interest under this policy will not bind the **Company** unless and until its written consent is endorsed hereon.

I. Cancellation and Nonrenewal

- 1. Cancellation
 - a. The First Named Insured may cancel this policy by mailing or delivering written notice of cancellation to the Company or the Company's authorized representative, at the address shown on the Declarations Page of this policy. Such notice of cancellation will state the effective date of cancellation or, if no effective date is stated, the effective date of cancellation shall be thirty (30) days after receipt of notice. The Policy Period will end on that date.
 - **b.** The **Company** may cancel this policy by mailing or delivering to the **First Named Insured** written notice of cancellation at least:

- (1) Ten (10) days before the effective date of cancellation if the **Company** cancels for nonpayment of premium; or
- (2) Thirty (30) days before the effective date of cancellation if the **Company** cancels for any other reason.
- c. If this policy is canceled, the Company will send the First Named Insured any premium refund due. If the Company cancels, the refund will be the pro rata unearned amount of the annual premium. If the First Named Insured cancels, the refund, if any, will be the pro rata unearned amount of the annual premium calculated at the customary short rate. Return of premium to the First Named Insured is not a condition precedent to cancellation.
- **d.** The **Company** will mail or deliver the notice to the address stated in Item 1. on the Declarations Page.
- e. If notice of cancellation is mailed, proof of mailing will be sufficient proof of notice. Delivery of the notice will be the same as mailing.

2. Nonrenewal

The **Company** may elect not to renew this policy by mailing or delivering written notice of nonrenewal to the **First Named Insured** at the address shown on the Declarations Page of this policy. The **Company** will mail or deliver the notice at least sixty (60) days before the expiration of the policy.

If notice of nonrenewal is mailed, proof of mailing will be sufficient proof of notice. Delivery of the notice will be the same as mailing.

J. Action Against the Company

No action will lie against the Company unless, as a condition precedent thereto, there has been full compliance with all of the terms of this policy by all Insureds, nor until the amount of the Insured's obligation to pay has been fully determined either by judgment or award against the Insured after actual trial or arbitration or by written agreement among the Insured, the claimant

and the **Company**. Any person or organization, or the legal representative thereof, who has secured such judgment or written agreement, will thereafter be entitled to recover under this policy to the extent of the insurance afforded by this policy.

2. No person or organization will have any right under this policy to join the **Company** as a party to any action against the **Insured** to determine the **Insured's** liability, nor will the **Company** be impleaded by the **Insured** or the **Insured's** legal representative.

K. Representations

By accepting this policy, the **Named Insured** agrees:

- The statements made and information contained in the Application for this insurance furnished to the Company are true, accurate and complete;
- 2. Those statements furnished to the Company are representations the Named Insured made to the Company on behalf of all Insureds;
- Those representations are a material inducement to the Company to issue this policy;
- **4.** The **Company** has issued this policy in reliance upon those representations;
- 5. This policy embodies all agreements existing between the **Insured** and the **Company** or any of its agents relating to this insurance;
- 6. The **Insured** has and will provide true, accurate and complete information with regard to audits, claims, and assessments as required by the **Company**;
- 7. The Application, including any attachments, and all other information and materials submitted by or on behalf of the Insureds to the Company in connection with the Company underwriting this policy, will be kept on file by the Company, deemed attached to this policy as if physically attached to it and shall become incorporated in and constitute a part of this policy;

8. If such representations or such information are not true, accurate and complete, this policy shall be null and void in its entirety and the **Company** shall have no liability hereunder.

L. Severability

With regard to the information provided on any insurance **Application** or with regard to knowledge of any **Wrongful Acts** or **Claims** as referenced in this policy, only facts pertaining to and knowledge possessed by any of the offices of the **Named Insured's** chairperson of the board of directors, president, chief executive officer, chief operating officer, chief financial officer, risk manager, in-house counsel or any person whose signature appears on any **Application**, shall be imputed to the **Insured**.

M. Changes to the Policy

Notice or knowledge possessed by any person will not effect a waiver or a change in any part of this policy or estop the **Company** from asserting any rights under the terms of this policy; nor will the terms of this policy be waived or changed except by written endorsement issued to form a part of this policy.

N. Authorization

The **First Named Insured** is responsible for assurance of payment of all premiums and **Retentions**. The **First Named Insured** will have exclusive authority to act on behalf of all other **Insureds** with respect to providing and receiving notices of cancellation or nonrenewal, receiving any return premium, and purchasing an Extended Reporting Period. In the event of a disagreement between any **Insureds**, the **First Named Insured** will have exclusive authority to act on behalf of all other **Insureds** with respect to negotiation of settlements and the decision to appeal or not to appeal any judgment.

Camino Nuevo Charter Academy INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR AGREEMENT

I. This Independent Contractor Agreement (hereinafter called "Agreement") is dated this **7th** day of **August**, 2023, by and between Camino Nuevo Charter Academy (hereinafter called "**CNCA**"), located at 3435 W Temple St. Los Angeles, CA 90027, and Tinker the Robot (hereinafter called "**Contractor**"), located at2438 San Gabriel Blvd., Ste. C, Rosemead, CA 91770.

II. **Description of Engineer Design Challenge/Robot Build Series**. In consideration of their mutual covenants, the parties hereto agree as follows: The Engineer Design Challenge/Robot Build Series to be provided by **Contractor** pursuant to this Agreement (Engineer Design Challenge/Robot Build Series), including details regarding the contact that **Contractor** and its assigns will have with students, are described in

Attachment A - Description of Engineer Design Challenge/Robot Build Series – (MUST BE COMPLETED AND ATTACHED TO THIS DOCUMENT)

Contractor hereby verifies that it is specially trained or experienced and competent to provide the Engineer Design Challenge/Robot Build Series required by this Agreement and acknowledges that **CNCA** has entered into this Agreement in reliance on the above verification.

III. **Term of Agreement.** The work specified above will commence on September 11, 2023 and will be completed by June 18, 2024. **CNCA** has no legal obligation to renew this Agreement and the decision to do so shall be entirely within the discretion of **CNCA**.

IV. **Billing.** In consideration of the Engineer Design Challenge/Robot Build Series provided, **Contractor** will submit invoices X monthly \Box annually \Box at completion of contract and will be paid at the rate of \$253,000 per year. The total contract amount will not exceed \$253,000. Payment is due within thirty (30) days of receipt of invoice.

V. Indemnification. Contractor agrees to defend, indemnify and hold harmless CNCA, its officers, directors, employees, agents, affiliates, owners, volunteers, successors and assigns from and against any and all claims, including active and passive claims, losses, costs, attorney fees and expenses arising out of any liability or claim of liability for personal injury, bodily injury to persons or death, contractual liability and/or damage to property sustained, or claimed to have been sustained, arising out of any act or omission by Contractor or its sub-Contractors, and/or any other person, firm or corporation furnishing or supplying services, materials or supplies in conjunction with the Engineer Design Challenge/Robot Build Series of the Contractor, whether authorized by this Agreement or not. Contractor further agrees to waive all rights of subrogation against CNCA. The provisions of this article do not apply to any damage or losses caused solely by the negligence or willful misconduct of CNCA or any of its agents or employees.

VI. **Insurance**. **Contractor** shall, at its own expense, procure and maintain at all times it performs any portion of the Engineer Design Challenge/Robot Build Series the following insurance with minimum limits equal to the amounts indicated below.

- 1) <u>Minimum Scope of Insurance</u>
 - a) *Commercial General Liability and Automobile Liability Insurance*. Commercial General Liability Insurance and Automobile Liability Insurance that shall protect **Contractor**, **CNCA**, and the State from all claims of bodily injury, property damage, personal injury, death, advertising injury, and medical payments arising performing any portion of the Engineer Design Challenge/Robot Build Series. (Form CG 0001 and CA 0001) Commercial General Liability insurance shall include contractual liability, products liability, completed operations and broad form property damage coverage.
 - b) Workers' Compensation and Employers' Liability Insurance. Workers' Compensation Insurance and Employers' Liability Insurance for all of its employees performing any portion of the Engineer Design Challenge/Robot Build Series. In accordance with provisions of section 3700 of the California Labor Code, Contractor shall be required to secure workers' compensation coverage for its employees. If any class of employee or employees engaged in performing any portion of the Engineer Design Challenge/Robot Build Series under this Agreement are not protected under the Workers' Compensation Statute, adequate insurance coverage for the protection of any employee(s) not otherwise protected must be obtained before

any of those employee(s) commence performing any portion of the Engineer Design Challenge/Robot Build Series.

- c) *Professional Liability (Errors and Omissions) Insurance*. Professional Liability (Errors and Omissions) Insurance against loss due to error, omission or malpractice, unless waived in writing by CNCA.
- d) *Sexual Abuse & Molestation Insurance.* Sexual Abuse & Molestation Insurance covering bodily injury, emotional distress, or mental anguish related to any claim, cause of action, or liability associated with child molestation or sexual abuse.

2) Minimum Limits of Insurance

- i. *Commercial General Liability Insurance*: \$1,000,000 combined single limit per occurrence for bodily injury, personal injury, and property damage; \$3,000,000 general aggregate.
- ii. *Automobile Liability Insurance*: \$1,000,000 combined single limit per accident for bodily injury and property damage; \$2,000,000 general aggregate.
- iii. *Workers' Compensation and Employers' Liability Insurance*: Workers' compensation limits as required by the Labor Code of the State of California and Employers Liability limits of \$1,000,000 per accident.
- iv. Professional Liability (Errors and Omissions) Insurance: \$1,000,000 single limit per claim; \$2,000,000 general aggregate.
- v. *Sexual Abuse & Molestation Insurance*. \$2,000,000 per claim and in aggregate if this coverage is applicable to the Engineer Design Challenge/Robot Build Series provided.
- 3) <u>Claims-Made Forms</u>: If the above insurance is written on a claims-made form, it shall continue for three years following termination of this Agreement. Such insurance shall have a retroactive date of placement prior to or coinciding with the effective date of this Agreement.
- 4) <u>Deductibles and Self-Insured Retentions</u>: Any deductibles or self-insured retentions must be declared to and approved by CNCA.
- 5) <u>Other Insurance Provisions</u>: The policies shall contain, or be endorsed to contain, the following provisions:
 - a) General Liability and Automobile Liability Coverages
 - i. Contractor's insurance coverage shall be primary insurance with respect to CNCA, its officers, board members, officials, employees, agents, or volunteers. Any insurance or self-insurance maintained by CNCA, its officers, board members, officials, employees, or volunteers shall be in excess of Contractor's insurance and shall not contribute to it.
 - ii. CNCA, its officers, board members, officials, employees, agents, and volunteers shall be covered as additional insureds with respect to liability arising out of activities performed by or on behalf of **Contractor**; and premises owned, leased, or used by **Contractor**. The coverage shall contain no special limitations on the scope of the protection afforded to CNCA, its officers, board members, officials, employees, agents, or volunteers.

Contractor further agrees that it shall not increase any deductibles or self-insured retentions on any such policy except after thirty (30) days prior written notice has been given to CNCA and CNCA approves the reduction of CNCA and CNCA approves the reduction in coverage or limits. Contractor further agrees that it shall not increase any deductibles or self-insured retentions on any such policy except after thirty (30) days prior written notice has been given to CNCA and CNCA approves such increase. Insurance is to be placed with insurers with a Best's rating of no less than A: VII. This requirement may, however, be waived in individual cases for Errors and Omissions Coverages only, provided that in no event will a carrier with a rating of B: IX or lower be acceptable.
- 6) Self-Insured Entities: CNCA may, at its discretion, accept self-insurance as being in compliance with this section. In such case, Contractor agrees that it will defend and indemnify CNCA, including its officers, board members, officials, employees, agents, and volunteers, to the same extent as it would Contractor or any other self-insured person or entity, and that it will treat CNCA, including its officers, board members, officials, employees, agents, and volunteers as if it were covered to the same extent as Contractor or any other self-insured person or entity. Self-insurance shall be subject to all requirements contained in this section. Alternatively, self-insured entities may purchase insurance covering CNCA for all work performed and/or services rendered under this Agreement, provided such insurance complies with all the requirements of this section.
- <u>7) Evidence of Insurance</u>: Prior to commencing work under this Agreement, **Contractor** shall provide **CNCA** with certificates of insurance evidencing compliance with this section. On request, **Contractor** shall furnish copies of any and/or all of the required insurance policies.
- VII. Limitation of CNCA Liability. Other than as provided in this Agreement, CNCA's financial obligations under

this Agreement shall be limited to the payment of the compensation provided in this Agreement. Notwithstanding any other provision of this Agreement, in no event, shall **CNCA** be liable, regardless of whether any claim is based on contract or tort, for any special, consequential, indirect or incidental damages, including, but not limited to, lost profits or revenue, arising out of or in connection with this Agreement or for the Engineer Design Challenge/Robot Build Series performed in connection with this Agreement.

VIII. **Non-Discrimination**. **Contractor** shall ensure that no person employed by, associated with, or subcontracted to **Contractor** shall, on the basis of race, color, national origin, age, ancestry, religion, sex, handicap or sexual orientation, or other basis protected by law, be excluded from participation in, or otherwise be subjected to discrimination under any program or activity at **CNCA** and shall ensure its, and its employees' and subcontractors' compliance with applicable Federal and California laws including, but not limited to the California Fair Employment and Housing Act beginning with Government Code Section 12900 and Labor Code Section 1735.

IX. Interest of Contractor. It is understood and agreed that this Agreement is not a contract of employment between CNCA and Contractor. At all times Contractor shall be deemed to be an independent contractor and is not authorized to bind CNCA to any contracts or other obligations. In executing this Agreement, Contractor certifies that no one who has or who will have any financial interest under this Agreement is an officer or employee of CNCA. Additionally, as the Contractor is not a CNCA employee, Contractor is solely responsible for all employment-related responsibilities for its employees, including but not limited to training, fingerprinting, workers' compensation, etc..

X. Workers' Compensation. Contractor is aware of the laws of the State of California requiring employers to be insured against liability for Workers' Compensation and shall comply with such laws during the term of this Agreement.

XI. Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA). Contractor is aware of OSHA standards and codes as set forth by the U.S. Department of Labor and the derivative Cal/OSHA standards, laws and regulations relating thereto, and verify that all performance under this Agreement shall be in compliance therewith.

XII. **Originality of Services**. **Contractor** agrees that all technologies, formulae, procedures, processes, methods, writings, ideas, dialogue, compositions, recordings, teleplays and video productions prepared for, written for, or submitted to the **CNCA** and/or used in connection with this Agreement, shall be wholly original to **Contractor** and shall not be copied in whole or in part from any other source, except that submitted to **Contractor** by **CNCA** as a basis for such services.

XIII. License and Authority. Contractor warrants that it will maintain all necessary licenses, registrations, and certifications during the term of this Agreement, and that it is duly authorized to enter into this Agreement by its governing or controlling body. Evidence or copies of all necessary licenses, registrations and certifications must be provided to CNCA.

XIV. **Compliance with Laws**. **Contractor** shall observe and comply with all rules and regulations of the governing board of **CNCA** and all federal, state, and local laws, ordinances and regulations. **Contractor** shall give all notices required by any law, ordinance, rule and/or regulation bearing on the performance of the Engineer Design Challenge/Robot Build Series as indicated or specified. If **Contractor** observes that the Engineer Design Challenge/Robot Build Series are at variance with any such laws, ordinances, rules or regulations, **Contractor** shall notify **CNCA** in writing, and at the sole option of **CNCA**, any necessary changes to the Engineer Design Challenge/Robot Build Series shall be made and this Agreement shall be appropriately amended in writing, or this Agreement shall be terminated effective upon **Contractor's** receipt of a written termination notice from **CNCA**. If **Contractor** performs any work that is in violation of any laws, ordinances, rules or regulations, without first notifying **CNCA** of the violation, **Contractor** shall bear all costs arising therefrom.

XV. Equipment and Facilities. Contractor will provide all necessary equipment and facilities to render its Engineer Design Challenge/Robot Build Series pursuant to this Agreement, unless the parties to this Agreement specifically agree in writing that said equipment and facilities will be provided in a different manner. Equipment purchased under the provisions of this Agreement by CNCA is the property of CNCA and shall be used for its intended purpose during the term of this Agreement. An inventory of all equipment purchased under this Agreement shall be maintained. After the term of this Agreement, the equipment shall continue to be the property of CNCA.

XVI. Employment of Additional Workers by Contractor. Contractor may, at its own expense, employ additional workers or subcontractors as necessary for the completion of this Agreement and shall maintain workers' compensation insurance as required by state law. CNCA shall not control, direct, or supervise Contractor's additional workers or subcontractors in the performance of services. Contractor assumes full and sole responsibility

for the payment of all compensation and expenses of these additional workers or sub-contractors and for all state and federal income tax, unemployment insurance, social security, disability insurance, and other applicable withholdings. **Contractor** shall not hire employees of **CNCA** for performance of this Agreement unless such employment does not conflict with **CNCA's** personnel policies as determined by **CNCA**.

XVII. Assignment. Without the prior written consent of CNCA, this Agreement is not assignable by the Contractor, either in whole or in part.

XVIII. **Successors and Assigns**. Subject to the provision regarding assignment, this Agreement shall be binding on the heirs, executors, administrators, successors, and assigns of the respective parties.

XIX. **Governing Law**. The validity of this Agreement and any of its terms or provisions as well as the rights and duties of the parties hereunder shall be governed by the laws of the State of California. Venue for all litigation relative to the formation, interpretation, and performance of this Agreement shall be in County of Los Angeles, California.

XX. Withholding. CNCA shall not withhold or set aside any money on behalf of the Contractor for Federal Income Tax, State Income Tax, Social Security Tax, Unemployment Insurance, Disability Insurance, or any other federal or state fund whatsoever. It shall be the sole responsibility of the Contractor to withhold, set aside and account for all of the above.

XXI. Audit. Contractor shall establish and maintain books, records, and systems of account, in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles, reflecting all business operations of Contractor transacted under this Agreement. Contractor shall retain these books, records, and systems of account during the Term of this Agreement and for three (3) years thereafter. Contractor shall permit CNCA, its agent, other representatives, or an independent auditor to audit, examine, and make excerpts, copies, and transcripts from all books and records, and to make audit(s) of all billing statements, invoices, records, and other data related to the Engineer Design Challenge/Robot Build Series covered by this Agreement. Audit(s) may be performed at any time, provided that CNCA shall give reasonable prior notice to Contractor and shall conduct audit(s) during Contractor's normal business hours, unless Contractor otherwise consents.

XXII. CNCA's Evaluation of Contractor and Contractor's Employees and/or Subcontractors. CNCA may evaluate Contractor in any manner which is permissible under the law. CNCA's evaluation may include, without limitation:

- 1) Requesting CNCA employee(s) evaluate Contractor and Contractor's employees and subcontractors and each of their performance.
- 2) Announced and unannounced observance of **Contractor**, **Contractor**'s employee(s), and/or subcontractor(s).

XXIII. Entire Agreement/Changes or Alterations. This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement between the Parties and supersedes all prior discussions, negotiations, and agreements, whether oral or written. This Agreement may be amended or modified only by a written instrument executed by both Parties.

XXIV. Termination.

- 1) <u>For Cause</u>: **CNCA** may terminate this Agreement upon giving of written notice of intention to terminate for cause. Cause shall include:
 - a) material violation of this Agreement by **Contractor**;
 - b) any act by Contractor exposing CNCA to liability to others for personal injury or property damage; or
 - c) Contractor is adjudged a bankrupt, Contractor makes a general assignment for the benefit of creditors, or a receiver is appointed on account of Contractor's insolvency. If the expenses, fees, and/or costs to CNCA exceed the cost of providing the Engineer Design Challenge/Robot Build Series pursuant to this Agreement, Contractor shall immediately pay the excess expense, fees, and/or costs to CNCA upon the receipt of CNCA's notice of these expenses, fees, and/or costs. The foregoing provisions are in addition to and not a limitation of any other rights or remedies available to CNCA.
- 2) Without Cause by CNCA: CNCA may, at any time, with or without reason, terminate this Agreement and compensate Contractor only for the Engineer Design Challenge/Robot Build Series satisfactorily rendered to the date of termination. Written notice by CNCA shall be sufficient to stop further performance by Contractor. Notice shall be deemed given when received by the Contractor or no later than three days after the day of mailing, whichever is sooner.
 - a) Upon termination, **Contractor** shall provide **CNCA** with all documents produced, maintained, or collected by **Contractor** pursuant to this Agreement, whether such documents are final or draft documents.

XXV. Waiver. No delay or omission by CNCA in exercising any right under this Agreement shall operate as a waiver of that or any other right and no single or partial exercise of any right shall preclude CNCA from any or further exercise of any right or remedy.

XXVI. **Headings**. All section headings contained herein are for clarification and convenience of reference only and are not intended to limit the scope of any provision of the Agreement.

XXVII. **Severability**. In the event any portion of this Agreement shall be finally determined by any court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unenforceable, such provision shall be deemed void and the remainder of this Agreement shall continue in full force and effect.

XXVIII. **Ambiguity**. The parities to this Agreement, and each of them, hereby represent that the language contained herein is to be construed as jointly proposed and jointly accepted, and in the event of any subsequent determination of ambiguity, all parties shall be treated as equally responsible for such ambiguity.

XXIX. **Copyright**. Any written product produced as a result of this contract shall be a work for hire and shall be the property of **CNCA**.

XXX. Expenses. Contractor shall be responsible for all costs and expenses incident to the performance of services for CNCA, including but not limited to all costs of equipment provided by Contractor, all fees, fines, licenses, bonds and/or taxes required of or imposed against Contractor, and all other of Contractor's costs of doing business. CNCA shall be responsible for no expenses incurred by Contractor in performing services for CNCA except as provided by this Agreement.

XXXI. **Privacy, Security, and Confidentiality**. If, in the course of carrying out this Agreement, **Contractor** gathers or processes personal (private) information, **Contractor** shall manage the data in accordance with all applicable federal and California state privacy laws including, but not limited to: Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1984 (20 U.S.C. Sec. 1232g) and Children's Online Privacy Protection Act (COPPA), and California Education Code sections 49069 to 49079. Examples of personal information include, but are not limited to name, telephone number, email account, address, date of birth, social security number, and student assessment data.

In addition, the Parties shall demonstrate that they have taken specific steps to ensure that data are kept secure and confidential as evidenced by, at a minimum, the following:

- 1) Every employee, volunteer or other person with access to personal information shall sign a statement that they understand that the information is personal and they will take steps to ensure that unauthorized personnel do not gain access to personal data.
- 2) Personal data, while being transmitted electronically, shall be encrypted.
- 3) Any repository for the data shall be locked and have access restricted to those personnel that have a legitimate need to access the data and have signed a confidentiality agreement.
- 4) Any security breach shall be reported to CNCA in writing within 24 hours of discovery.

XXXII. **Department of Justice (DOJ) Fingerprinting and Tuberculosis (TB) Clearance**. **Contractor** agrees to adhere to the DOJ fingerprint and criminal background investigation and TB requirements of California Education Code sections 45125.1, et seq., and 49406 and provide an affidavit that certifies that all of its employees that work at **CNCA** campuses and come into contact with students have appropriate DOJ and TB clearances. Clearances must not be obtained at the expense of **CNCA** and **CNCA** shall not reimburse for these expenses. The affidavit must list the following:

- 1) Employee name and CNCA location(s) he/she services;
- 2) Date of criminal background check clearance;
- 3) TB expiration date; and
- 4) Name of **Contractor's** DOJ custodian of records.

Contractor's affidavit must be submitted with high authority per its Organizational Chart (i.e. Owner, Management Team, C-level executive, etc.). The affidavit must be provided to **CNCA** prior to the first day of service. Failure to provide this documentation shall be considered a material breach and can be used as grounds to terminate the contract immediately. **CNCA** may request updated documentation as needed. **Contractor** must take appropriate action to remove any employee whose arrest notification poses a threat to the school population to ensure the safety of **CNCA** students.

XXXIII. **Independent Contractor Status**. **Contractor** attests that it is engaged in a separately established bona fide business and is in fact an Independent Contractor in accordance with IRS and EDD requirements. **Contractor** understands and agrees that it and all of its employees shall not be considered officers, employees, agents, partners,

or joint ventures of CNCA, and are not entitled to benefits of any kind or nature normally provided employees of CNCA and/or to which CNCA's employees are normally entitled, including, but not limited to, State Unemployment Compensation or Worker's Compensation.

XXXIV. Conflict Of Interest. By signing this Agreement all parties acknowledge and assert that there is no known Conflict of Interest in the execution of this Agreement.

XXXV. Commencement of Work. Contractor is not authorized and will not commence any work of this Agreement and CNCA will not assume legal, financial or any other obligation for work performed prior to the issuance of an authorizing purchase orders with reference to this Agreement.

This Agreement, including attachments, constitutes the entire understanding of the parties and any changes or modifications shall be in writing and signed by both parties.



Camino Nuevo Charter Academy INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR AGREEMENT

I. This Independent Contractor Agreement (hereinafter called "Agreement") is dated this **7th** day of **August**, 2023, by and between Camino Nuevo Charter Academy (hereinafter called "**CNCA**"), located at 3435 W Temple St. Los Angeles, CA 90027, and Stem to the Future (hereinafter called "**Contractor**"), located at 1510 W 36th St #1 Los Angeles, CA 90018.

II. **Description of Planting the Seed Class**. In consideration of their mutual covenants, the parties hereto agree as follows: The Planting the Seed Class to be provided by **Contractor** pursuant to this Agreement (Planting the Seed Class), including details regarding the contact that **Contractor** and its assigns will have with students, are described in

Attachment A - Description of Planting the Seed Class – (MUST BE COMPLETED AND ATTACHED TO THIS DOCUMENT)

Contractor hereby verifies that it is specially trained or experienced and competent to provide the Planting the Seed Class required by this Agreement and acknowledges that **CNCA** has entered into this Agreement in reliance on the above verification.

III. **Term of Agreement.** The work specified above will commence on September 11, 2023 and will be completed by June 18, 2024. **CNCA** has no legal obligation to renew this Agreement and the decision to do so shall be entirely within the discretion of **CNCA**.

IV. **Billing.** In consideration of the Planting the Seed Class provided, **Contractor** will submit invoices September 11, 2023 and January 11, 2024 and will be paid at the rate of \$56,400 per year. The total contract amount will not exceed \$56,400. Payment is due within thirty (30) days of receipt of invoice.

V. Indemnification. Contractor agrees to defend, indemnify and hold harmless CNCA, its officers, directors, employees, agents, affiliates, owners, volunteers, successors and assigns from and against any and all claims, including active and passive claims, losses, costs, attorney fees and expenses arising out of any liability or claim of liability for personal injury, bodily injury to persons or death, contractual liability and/or damage to property sustained, or claimed to have been sustained, arising out of any act or omission by Contractor or its sub-Contractors, and/or any other person, firm or corporation furnishing or supplying services, materials or supplies in conjunction with the Planting the Seed Class of the Contractor, whether authorized by this Agreement or not. Contractor further agrees to waive all rights of subrogation against CNCA. The provisions of this article do not apply to any damage or losses caused solely by the negligence or willful misconduct of CNCA or any of its agents or employees.

VI. **Insurance**. **Contractor** shall, at its own expense, procure and maintain at all times it performs any portion of the Planting the Seed Class the following insurance with minimum limits equal to the amounts indicated below.

1) <u>Minimum Scope of Insurance</u>

- a) *Commercial General Liability and Automobile Liability Insurance.* Commercial General Liability Insurance and Automobile Liability Insurance that shall protect **Contractor**, **CNCA**, and the State from all claims of bodily injury, property damage, personal injury, death, advertising injury, and medical payments arising performing any portion of the Planting the Seed Class. (Form CG 0001 and CA 0001) Commercial General Liability insurance shall include contractual liability, products liability, completed operations and broad form property damage coverage.
- b) Workers' Compensation and Employers' Liability Insurance. Workers' Compensation Insurance and Employers' Liability Insurance for all of its employees performing any portion of the Planting the Seed Class. In accordance with provisions of section 3700 of the California Labor Code, Contractor shall be required to secure workers' compensation coverage for its employees. If any class of employee or employees engaged in performing any portion of the Planting the Seed Class under this Agreement are not protected under the Workers' Compensation Statute, adequate insurance coverage for the protection of any employee(s) not otherwise protected must be obtained before any of those employee(s) commence performing any portion of the Planting the Seed Class.

- c) *Professional Liability (Errors and Omissions) Insurance*. Professional Liability (Errors and Omissions) Insurance against loss due to error, omission or malpractice, unless waived in writing by CNCA.
- d) *Sexual Abuse & Molestation Insurance*. Sexual Abuse & Molestation Insurance covering bodily injury, emotional distress, or mental anguish related to any claim, cause of action, or liability associated with child molestation or sexual abuse.

2) Minimum Limits of Insurance

- i. *Commercial General Liability Insurance*: \$1,000,000 combined single limit per occurrence for bodily injury, personal injury, and property damage; \$3,000,000 general aggregate.
- ii. *Automobile Liability Insurance*: \$1,000,000 combined single limit per accident for bodily injury and property damage; \$2,000,000 general aggregate.
- iii. *Workers' Compensation and Employers' Liability Insurance*: Workers' compensation limits as required by the Labor Code of the State of California and Employers Liability limits of \$1,000,000 per accident.
- iv. Professional Liability (Errors and Omissions) Insurance: \$1,000,000 single limit per claim; \$2,000,000 general aggregate.
- v. Sexual Abuse & Molestation Insurance. \$2,000,000 per claim and in aggregate if this coverage is applicable to the Planting the Seed Class provided.
- <u>Claims-Made Forms</u>: If the above insurance is written on a claims-made form, it shall continue for three years following termination of this Agreement. Such insurance shall have a retroactive date of placement prior to or coinciding with the effective date of this Agreement.
- 4) <u>Deductibles and Self-Insured Retentions</u>: Any deductibles or self-insured retentions must be declared to and approved by **CNCA**.
- 5) Other Insurance Provisions: The policies shall contain, or be endorsed to contain, the following provisions:
 - *a) General Liability and Automobile Liability Coverages*
 - i. **Contractor's** insurance coverage shall be primary insurance with respect to **CNCA**, its officers, board members, officials, employees, agents, or volunteers. Any insurance or self-insurance maintained by **CNCA**, its officers, board members, officials, employees, or volunteers shall be in excess of **Contractor's** insurance and shall not contribute to it.
 - ii. CNCA, its officers, board members, officials, employees, agents, and volunteers shall be covered as additional insureds with respect to liability arising out of activities performed by or on behalf of **Contractor**; and premises owned, leased, or used by **Contractor**. The coverage shall contain no special limitations on the scope of the protection afforded to CNCA, its officers, board members, officials, employees, agents, or volunteers.
 - iii. Failure to comply with reporting provisions of the policies shall not affect coverage provided to CNCA, its officers, board members, officials, employees, agents, and volunteers.
 - iv. Coverage shall state that **Contractor's** insurance shall apply separately to each insured against whom a claim is made or a suit is brought, except with respect to the limits of the insurer's liability.
 - b) All Coverages
 - i. Each insurance policy required by this Agreement shall be endorsed to state that coverages shall not be canceled except after thirty (30) days prior written notice has been given to CNCA. In addition, Contractor agrees that it shall not reduce its coverage or limits on any such policy except after thirty (30) days prior written notice has been given to CNCA and CNCA approves the reduction in coverage or limits. Contractor further agrees that it shall not increase any deductibles or self-insured retentions on any such policy except after thirty (30) days prior written notice has been given to CNCA and CNCA approves the reduction of CNCA and CNCA approves the reduction in coverage or limits. Contractor further agrees that it shall not increase any deductibles or self-insured retentions on any such policy except after thirty (30) days prior written notice has been given to CNCA and CNCA approves such increase. Insurance is to be placed with insurers with a Best's rating of no less than A: VII. This requirement may, however, be waived in individual cases for Errors and Omissions Coverages only, provided that in no event will a carrier with a rating of B: IX or lower be acceptable.
- 6) Self-Insured Entities: CNCA may, at its discretion, accept self-insurance as being in compliance with this section. In such case, Contractor agrees that it will defend and indemnify CNCA, including its officers, board members, officials, employees, agents, and volunteers, to the same extent as it would Contractor or any other self-insured person or entity, and that it will treat CNCA, including its officers, board members, officials, employees, agents, and volunteers as if it were covered to the same extent as Contractor or any other self-insured person or entity. Self-insurance shall be subject to all requirements contained in this section. Alternatively, self-insured entities may purchase insurance covering CNCA for all work performed and/or services rendered under this Agreement, provided such insurance complies with all the requirements of this section.
- 7) Evidence of Insurance: Prior to commencing work under this Agreement, **Contractor** shall provide **CNCA** with certificates of insurance evidencing compliance with this section. On request, **Contractor** shall furnish copies of any and/or all of the required insurance policies.

VII. Limitation of CNCA Liability. Other than as provided in this Agreement, CNCA's financial obligations under this Agreement shall be limited to the payment of the compensation provided in this Agreement. Notwithstanding any other provision of this Agreement, in no event, shall CNCA be liable, regardless of whether any claim is based

on contract or tort, for any special, consequential, indirect or incidental damages, including, but not limited to, lost profits or revenue, arising out of or in connection with this Agreement or for the Planting the Seed Class performed in connection with this Agreement.

VIII. **Non-Discrimination**. **Contractor** shall ensure that no person employed by, associated with, or subcontracted to **Contractor** shall, on the basis of race, color, national origin, age, ancestry, religion, sex, handicap or sexual orientation, or other basis protected by law, be excluded from participation in, or otherwise be subjected to discrimination under any program or activity at **CNCA** and shall ensure its, and its employees' and subcontractors' compliance with applicable Federal and California laws including, but not limited to the California Fair Employment and Housing Act beginning with Government Code Section 12900 and Labor Code Section 1735.

IX. Interest of Contractor. It is understood and agreed that this Agreement is not a contract of employment between CNCA and Contractor. At all times Contractor shall be deemed to be an independent contractor and is not authorized to bind CNCA to any contracts or other obligations. In executing this Agreement, Contractor certifies that no one who has or who will have any financial interest under this Agreement is an officer or employee of CNCA. Additionally, as the Contractor is not a CNCA employee, Contractor is solely responsible for all employment-related responsibilities for its employees, including but not limited to training, fingerprinting, workers' compensation, etc..

X. Workers' Compensation. Contractor is aware of the laws of the State of California requiring employers to be insured against liability for Workers' Compensation and shall comply with such laws during the term of this Agreement.

XI. **Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA)**. **Contractor** is aware of OSHA standards and codes as set forth by the U.S. Department of Labor and the derivative Cal/OSHA standards, laws and regulations relating thereto, and verify that all performance under this Agreement shall be in compliance therewith.

XII. **Originality of Services**. **Contractor** agrees that all technologies, formulae, procedures, processes, methods, writings, ideas, dialogue, compositions, recordings, teleplays and video productions prepared for, written for, or submitted to the **CNCA** and/or used in connection with this Agreement, shall be wholly original to **Contractor** and shall not be copied in whole or in part from any other source, except that submitted to **Contractor** by **CNCA** as a basis for such services.

XIII. License and Authority. Contractor warrants that it will maintain all necessary licenses, registrations, and certifications during the term of this Agreement, and that it is duly authorized to enter into this Agreement by its governing or controlling body. Evidence or copies of all necessary licenses, registrations and certifications must be provided to CNCA.

XIV. **Compliance with Laws**. **Contractor** shall observe and comply with all rules and regulations of the governing board of **CNCA** and all federal, state, and local laws, ordinances and regulations. **Contractor** shall give all notices required by any law, ordinance, rule and/or regulation bearing on the performance of the Planting the Seed Class as indicated or specified. If **Contractor** observes that the Planting the Seed Class is at variance with any such laws, ordinances, rules or regulations, **Contractor** shall notify **CNCA** in writing, and at the sole option of **CNCA**, any necessary changes to the Planting the Seed Class shall be made and this Agreement shall be appropriately amended in writing, or this Agreement shall be terminated effective upon **Contractor's** receipt of a written termination notice from **CNCA**. If **Contractor** performs any work that is in violation of any laws, ordinances, rules or regulations, without first notifying **CNCA** of the violation, **Contractor** shall be arall costs arising therefrom.

XV. Equipment and Facilities. Contractor will provide all necessary equipment and facilities to render its Planting the Seed Class pursuant to this Agreement, unless the parties to this Agreement specifically agree in writing that said equipment and facilities will be provided in a different manner. Equipment purchased under the provisions of this Agreement by CNCA is the property of CNCA and shall be used for its intended purpose during the term of this Agreement. An inventory of all equipment purchased under this Agreement shall be maintained. After the term of this Agreement, the equipment shall continue to be the property of CNCA.

XVI. Employment of Additional Workers by Contractor. Contractor may, at its own expense, employ additional workers or subcontractors as necessary for the completion of this Agreement and shall maintain workers' compensation insurance as required by state law. CNCA shall not control, direct, or supervise Contractor's additional workers or subcontractors in the performance of services. Contractor assumes full and sole responsibility for the payment of all compensation and expenses of these additional workers or sub-contractors and for all state and federal income tax, unemployment insurance, social security, disability insurance, and other applicable

withholdings. **Contractor** shall not hire employees of **CNCA** for performance of this Agreement unless such employment does not conflict with **CNCA's** personnel policies as determined by **CNCA**.

XVII. Assignment. Without the prior written consent of CNCA, this Agreement is not assignable by the Contractor, either in whole or in part.

XVIII. **Successors and Assigns**. Subject to the provision regarding assignment, this Agreement shall be binding on the heirs, executors, administrators, successors, and assigns of the respective parties.

XIX. **Governing Law**. The validity of this Agreement and any of its terms or provisions as well as the rights and duties of the parties hereunder shall be governed by the laws of the State of California. Venue for all litigation relative to the formation, interpretation, and performance of this Agreement shall be in County of Los Angeles, California.

XX. Withholding. CNCA shall not withhold or set aside any money on behalf of the Contractor for Federal Income Tax, State Income Tax, Social Security Tax, Unemployment Insurance, Disability Insurance, or any other federal or state fund whatsoever. It shall be the sole responsibility of the Contractor to withhold, set aside and account for all of the above.

XXI. Audit. Contractor shall establish and maintain books, records, and systems of account, in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles, reflecting all business operations of Contractor transacted under this Agreement. Contractor shall retain these books, records, and systems of account during the Term of this Agreement and for three (3) years thereafter. Contractor shall permit CNCA, its agent, other representatives, or an independent auditor to audit, examine, and make excerpts, copies, and transcripts from all books and records, and to make audit(s) of all billing statements, invoices, records, and other data related to the Planting the Seed Class covered by this Agreement. Audit(s) may be performed at any time, provided that CNCA shall give reasonable prior notice to Contractor and shall conduct audit(s) during Contractor's normal business hours, unless Contractor otherwise consents.

XXII. CNCA's Evaluation of Contractor and Contractor's Employees and/or Subcontractors. CNCA may evaluate Contractor in any manner which is permissible under the law. CNCA's evaluation may include, without limitation:

- 1) Requesting CNCA employee(s) evaluate Contractor and Contractor's employees and subcontractors and each of their performance.
- 2) Announced and unannounced observance of Contractor, Contractor's employee(s), and/or subcontractor(s).

XXIII. Entire Agreement/Changes or Alterations. This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement between the Parties and supersedes all prior discussions, negotiations, and agreements, whether oral or written. This Agreement may be amended or modified only by a written instrument executed by both Parties.

XXIV. Termination.

- 1) <u>For Cause</u>: **CNCA** may terminate this Agreement upon giving of written notice of intention to terminate for cause. Cause shall include:
 - a) material violation of this Agreement by Contractor;
 - b) any act by Contractor exposing CNCA to liability to others for personal injury or property damage; or
 - c) Contractor is adjudged a bankrupt, Contractor makes a general assignment for the benefit of creditors, or a receiver is appointed on account of Contractor's insolvency. If the expenses, fees, and/or costs to CNCA exceed the cost of providing the Planting the Seed Class pursuant to this Agreement, Contractor shall immediately pay the excess expense, fees, and/or costs to CNCA upon the receipt of CNCA's notice of these expenses, fees, and/or costs. The foregoing provisions are in addition to and not a limitation of any other rights or remedies available to CNCA.
- 2) <u>Without Cause by CNCA</u>: CNCA may, at any time, with or without reason, terminate this Agreement and compensate Contractor only for the Planting the Seed Class satisfactorily rendered to the date of termination. Written notice by CNCA shall be sufficient to stop further performance by Contractor. Notice shall be deemed given when received by the Contractor or no later than three days after the day of mailing, whichever is sooner.
 - a) Upon termination, **Contractor** shall provide **CNCA** with all documents produced, maintained, or collected by **Contractor** pursuant to this Agreement, whether such documents are final or draft documents.

XXV. Waiver. No delay or omission by CNCA in exercising any right under this Agreement shall operate as a waiver of that or any other right and no single or partial exercise of any right shall preclude CNCA from any or further exercise of any right or remedy.

XXVI. **Headings**. All section headings contained herein are for clarification and convenience of reference only and are not intended to limit the scope of any provision of the Agreement.

XXVII. Severability. In the event any portion of this Agreement shall be finally determined by any court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unenforceable, such provision shall be deemed void and the remainder of this Agreement shall continue in full force and effect.

XXVIII. **Ambiguity**. The parities to this Agreement, and each of them, hereby represent that the language contained herein is to be construed as jointly proposed and jointly accepted, and in the event of any subsequent determination of ambiguity, all parties shall be treated as equally responsible for such ambiguity.

XXIX. **Copyright**. Any written product produced as a result of this contract shall be a work for hire and shall be the property of **CNCA**.

XXX. Expenses. Contractor shall be responsible for all costs and expenses incident to the performance of services for CNCA, including but not limited to all costs of equipment provided by Contractor, all fees, fines, licenses, bonds and/or taxes required of or imposed against Contractor, and all other of Contractor's costs of doing business. CNCA shall be responsible for no expenses incurred by Contractor in performing services for CNCA except as provided by this Agreement.

XXXI. **Privacy, Security, and Confidentiality**. If, in the course of carrying out this Agreement, **Contractor** gathers or processes personal (private) information, **Contractor** shall manage the data in accordance with all applicable federal and California state privacy laws including, but not limited to: Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1984 (20 U.S.C. Sec. 1232g) and Children's Online Privacy Protection Act (COPPA), and California Education Code sections 49069 to 49079. Examples of personal information include, but are not limited to name, telephone number, email account, address, date of birth, social security number, and student assessment data.

In addition, the Parties shall demonstrate that they have taken specific steps to ensure that data are kept secure and confidential as evidenced by, at a minimum, the following:

- 1) Every employee, volunteer or other person with access to personal information shall sign a statement that they understand that the information is personal and they will take steps to ensure that unauthorized personnel do not gain access to personal data.
- 2) Personal data, while being transmitted electronically, shall be encrypted.
- 3) Any repository for the data shall be locked and have access restricted to those personnel that have a legitimate need to access the data and have signed a confidentiality agreement.
- 4) Any security breach shall be reported to CNCA in writing within 24 hours of discovery.

XXXII. **Department of Justice (DOJ) Fingerprinting and Tuberculosis (TB) Clearance**. **Contractor** agrees to adhere to the DOJ fingerprint and criminal background investigation and TB requirements of California Education Code sections 45125.1, et seq., and 49406 and provide an affidavit that certifies that all of its employees that work at **CNCA** campuses and come into contact with students have appropriate DOJ and TB clearances. Clearances must not be obtained at the expense of **CNCA** and **CNCA** shall not reimburse for these expenses. The affidavit must list the following:

- 1) Employee name and CNCA location(s) he/she services;
- 2) Date of criminal background check clearance;
- 3) TB expiration date; and
- 4) Name of Contractor's DOJ custodian of records.

Contractor's affidavit must be submitted with high authority per its Organizational Chart (i.e. Owner, Management Team, C-level executive, etc.). The affidavit must be provided to **CNCA** prior to the first day of service. Failure to provide this documentation shall be considered a material breach and can be used as grounds to terminate the contract immediately. **CNCA** may request updated documentation as needed. **Contractor** must take appropriate action to remove any employee whose arrest notification poses a threat to the school population to ensure the safety of **CNCA** students.

XXXIII. **Independent Contractor Status**. **Contractor** attests that it is engaged in a separately established bona fide business and is in fact an Independent Contractor in accordance with IRS and EDD requirements. **Contractor** understands and agrees that it and all of its employees shall not be considered officers, employees, agents, partners, or joint ventures of **CNCA**, and are not entitled to benefits of any kind or nature normally provided employees of **CNCA** and/or to which **CNCA's** employees are normally entitled, including, but not limited to, State Unemployment Compensation or Worker's Compensation.

Description of Services

Program Description

STEM TO THE FUTURE (STTF) will support Camino Nuevo Charter Academy (PARTNER) by providing after-school STEAM (science, technology, engineering, art, and math) programming for students in grades 3rd-5th. STTF will support PARTNER by using an engaging hands-on curriculum created by the STTF team. Students will complete grade level appropriate units that expose them to a variety of STEAM skills related to health justice while also learning how they can use these tools to uplift their communities.

Implementation Fees: STTF will provide 1 staff member to implement weekly STEAM based programming for up to 15 students in grades 3rd-5th once a week at four PARTNER sites: Camino Burlington, Camino Kayne Siart, Camino Cisneros, and Camino Castellanos. Each site will receive instruction for up to 90 minutes each week totalling 32 sessions per site. Additionally, students will participate in 2 community engagement events during Parent/Teacher conference in which students share projects they're working on in class to get feedback and learn about their community. The program will end with a showcase of learning where students present their final projects and share what they've learned over the course of the program. STTF will provide additional staff and materials for community engagement

events and end of year student showcase to actively engage families and community members in attendance.

Example: 32 Week Programming

After 8 weeks,

- Students learn the foundations of a STEAM skill by creating projects centered on identity and diversity. Students demonstrate their knowledge of covered material by completing a presentation to their peers.
- STTF hosts a back to school family engagement night for students to gain exposure to new STEAM skills that are not enrolled in STTF classes.

After 16 weeks,

- Students gain exposure to new STEAM skills while creating projects focused on activism and social change.
- Students identify community assets and unmet needs within their school or local community. Students brainstorm ideas to address a need identified.

After 24 sessions,

- Students begin creating project drafts and/or prototypes addressing a need collectively identified.
- Students lead a family engagement workshop with families and community members to spread awareness about the identified need and solicit feedback on their prototypes.

After 32 sessions,

- Students build upon and refine their projects based on community input.
- Students plan and lead a workshop that showcases what they've learned and created during the program.

Under U.S. law, this student will become a resident alien for tax purposes if his or her stay in the United States exceeds 5 calendar years. However, paragraph 2 of the first Protocol to the U.S.-China treaty (dated April 30, 1984) allows the provisions of Article 20 to continue to apply even after the Chinese student becomes a resident alien of the United States. A Chinese student who qualifies for this exception (under paragraph 2 of the first protocol) and is relying on this exception to claim an exemption from tax on his or her scholarship or fellowship income would attach to Form W-9 a statement that includes the information described above to support that exemption.

Backup Withholding

What is backup withholding? Persons making certain payments to you must under certain conditions withhold and pay to the IRS 24% of such payments. This is called "backup withholding." Payments that may be subject to backup withholding include interest, tax-exempt interest, dividends, broker and barter exchange transactions, rents, royalties, nonemployee pay, payments made in settlement of payment card and third party network transactions, and certain payments from fishing boat operators. Real estate transactions are not subject to backup withholding.

You will not be subject to backup withholding on payments you receive if you give the requester your correct TIN, make the proper certifications, and report all your taxable interest and dividends on your tax return.

Payments you receive will be subject to backup withholding if:

CAMINO NUEVO CHARTER ACADEMY INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR CONSULTING AGREEMENT

This Independent Contractor Consulting Agreement ("Agreement") is entered into by and between **Sunny Strategies Inc** ("Consultant") and **Camino Nuevo Charter Academy** ("CNCA"), collectively referred to herein as the "Parties."

RECITALS

WHEREAS, CNCA is a California non-profit public benefit corporation that provides public educational programs, and in particular, operates public charter schools in historically underserved areas of Central Los Angeles;

WHEREAS, Consultant, a California corporation, is engaged in the businesses of providing experienced and qualified professional services concerning curriculum development and specifically dual language instruction; and

WHEREAS, CNCA desires to retain Consultant as an independent contractor for the purpose of providing the Consulting Services described herein.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the foregoing recitals, the promises and the mutual covenants contained herein, and for other good, valuable and sufficient consideration, the Parties agree as follows:

AGREEMENT

1. <u>Contracted Services</u>. Consultant is hereby engaged by CNCA to perform the consulting services specified in **Attachment A**, which is incorporated by reference ("Consulting Services"), consistent with the terms and conditions contained herein. Consultant shall determine the method, details and means of performing the Consulting Services. Consultant shall supply at her own expense all tools, materials and equipment required to perform the Services under this Agreement. Consultant assumes full responsibility for the performance of the Consulting Services provided for under the terms of this Agreement. CNCA does not guarantee any minimum amount of work by this Agreement. Consultant shall not have authority to enter into any contracts on CNCA's behalf, unless expressly authorized to do so in writing by CNCA's CEO.

2. Independent Contractor. It is expressly understood between the Parties that Consultant is an independent contractor and not an employee of CNCA. Consultant shall perform the Consulting Services under the general direction of CNCA, but Consultant shall determine, in Consultant's sole discretion reasonably exercised, the manner and means by which the Consultant shall determine. Consultant will maintain its own place of business separate and apart from CNCA. Consultant is free to work with other companies and individuals provided such work does not create a conflict of interest or adversely impact Contractor's ability to perform the Consulting Services. Consultant is responsible for Consultant's own expenses and costs of doing business. Consultant is not and shall not hold itself out to be an agent or employee of CNCA, and has no authority to bind CNCA by contract or otherwise. CNCA shall have the right to assign, approve or disapprove services provided by Consultant and shall have the right to set deadlines for the completion of services provided under this Agreement. Nothing in this Agreement shall be interpreted or construed as creating or establishing the relationship of employee between the Parties. Nothing in this Agreement shall be interpreted or construed as creating or establishing the relationship of employee between the Parties.

2.1 <u>Consultant's Obligation to Pay Taxes</u>. All compensation called for under this Agreement shall be paid without deductions or withholdings, and will be accompanied by an IRS Form 1099 at year end. As an independent contractor, Consultant agrees that he/she will be responsible for the reporting and payment of any state and/or federal income tax or other withholdings on the compensation provided under this Agreement or any related assessments. In addition, Consultant shall fill out and execute a Form W-9. In the event that the Internal Revenue Service or the State of California should determine that Consultant is an employee subject to withholding and social security contributions, Consultant





acknowledges consistent with this Agreement that all payments due to Consultant upder this Agreement are gross payments, and the Consultant is solely responsible for all income taxes, social security payments, or other applicable deductions thereon.

2.2 <u>Benefits and Credentials</u>. As an independent contractor, Consultant is not entitled to the rights or benefits that may be afforded to an employee including, but not limited to, disability, workers' compensation, unemployment benefits, sick leave, vacation leave, medical insurance and retirement benefits. Consultant is solely responsible for providing at Consultant's own expense, and at Consultant's discretion, disability, unemployment, workers' compensation and other insurance for Consultant and for Consultant's employees and subcontractors. Consultant shall further maintain at Consultant's own expense any permits, credentials, certifications and/or licenses and shall provide any trainings necessary for Consultant to perform the Consulting Services under this Agreement.

3. <u>Term and Termination</u>. This Agreement shall be effective from **July 1, 2023** through **June 30, 2024**, unless terminated earlier by either party or extended by mutual agreement of the Parties. CNCA or Consultant may terminate this Agreement at any time and for any reason upon ten (10) days advance written notice Following notice of termination, Consultant shall cease performing work under this Agreement unless otherwise directed in writing by CNCA. This Agreement automatically terminates, without notice and effective immediately, in the event of the incapacity, death, closure, insolvency, bankruptcy, or appointment of a receiver for either party. CNCA shall pay Consultant for all necessary and approved services rendered pursuant to this Agreement up to the effective date of termination. CNCA has no obligation to pay Consultant for any services provided nor reimburse Consultant for any expenses incurred after the effective date of termination.

4. <u>Compensation</u>. CNCA shall pay Consultant a project fee of \$110,000 to be invoiced on a monthly basis. Consultant will invoice CNCA on or before the 15th of September, December, February, and June for these payments.

5. <u>Mutual Indemnity</u>. CNCA and Consultant shall defend, indemnify and hold harmless the other, including their respective officers, directors, employees, representatives, agents, successors and assigns from and against all claims, demands, losses, costs, expenses, obligations, liabilities, damages, recoveries, and deficiencies, including interest, penalties, attorneys' fees, and costs that such entities or persons may incur with regard to performance of this Agreement, except those that arise out of or relate to: (a) the party's own negligence, recklessness or willful misconduct in performing any of its obligations under this Agreement; and (b) the party's own material breach of any of its representations, warranties, covenants or agreements under this Agreement. The consultant further agrees to waive all rights of subrogation against CNCA. These indemnity, defense and hold harmless obligations survive the termination of this Agreement.

6. <u>Insurance</u>. Consultant agrees to carry insurance sufficient to cover the potential liabilities arising from the Consulting Services provided for by this Agreement, for the duration of this Agreement in Attachment B. Consultant's insurance shall constitute primary coverage for any loss or liability arising from or relating to this Agreement and any insurance held by CNCA shall constitute secondary, excess coverage.

7. <u>Professional Responsibility</u>. The Consulting Services to be rendered by Consultant require special skills which Consultant is both experienced and qualified to provide. Consultant represents that Consultant has the qualifications, skills and if applicable the certification necessary to perform the Consulting Services in a competent, professional manner, without the advice or direction of CNCA. In conformity with the terms of this Agreement, Consultant shall render all Consulting Services hereunder in accordance with Consultant's independent and professional judgment. Consultant shall perform the Consulting Services in accordance with the generally accepted practices and principles of Consultant's trade. This Agreement shall be subject to all federal, state and local laws and regulations governing the practice of Consultant's trade and the Consulting Services required. Except when otherwise expressly required by applicable laws and regulations, CNCA shall not be responsible for monitoring Consultant's compliance with any laws or regulations. If Consultant performs any Consulting Services in a manner that is contrary to laws or regulations, Consultant shall bear all claims, costs, losses and damages (including, but not limited to, reasonable attorneys' fees and costs) arising out of or relating to such Consulting Services.

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8. <u>Work Product</u>. Any reports, documents or materials prepared by Cobseltant pursuant to this Agreement shall be the sole and exclusive property of CNCA, and as such, Consultant shall assign Consultant's entire right, title, and interest in each such invention or work of authorship to CNCA, except as excluded from any obligation to assign to CNCA as a matter of law or mutual written agreement of Consultant and CNCA. Title to and ownership of all work products and materials created by or on behalf of Consultant for CNCA or otherwise arising out of the performance of the Services hereunder, whether partial or complete (collectively referred to as the "Work"), shall be shared between Consultant and CNCA. Consultant and CNCA shall be considered the author of the Work for purposes of copyright. CNCA and Consultant agree that either Party may use descriptions of Consultant's Services in future promotional materials and client lists, and that Consultant may explicitly identify CNCA as a client of Consultant with CNCA's permission

9. Confidential Information. Consultant acknowledges that during the course of performing Consulting Services, Consultant may become privy to confidential, privileged and/or proprietary information important to CNCA. Consultant further acknowledges Consultant's continuing obligations under the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act ("FERPA") and California Uniform Trade Secrets Act. Consultant must take all necessary and appropriate steps to protect and safeguard all proprietary, confidential and sensitive information of CNCA. Consultant shall ensure that all of Consultant's employees, agents and subcontractors agree to the requirements of this paragraph prior to receiving any Confidential Information. Consultant shall not use or disclose during or after the term of this Agreement, without the prior written consent of CNCA, any information relating to CNCA's employees, directors, agents, students or families, or any information regarding the affairs or operations of CNCA, including CNCA's confidential/proprietary information and trade secrets ("Confidential Information"). Confidential Information, whether prepared by or for CNCA, includes, without limitation, all of the following: education records, student lists, medical records, personnel records, information technology systems, financial and accounting information, business or marketing plans or strategies, methods of doing business, curriculum, lists, email addresses and other information concerning actual and potential students or vendors and/or any other information Consultant reasonably should know is treated as confidential by CNCA. The only allowed disclosure of Confidential Information is (i) with prior written consent of CNCA; (ii) after the information is generally available to the public other than by reason of a breach by Consultant of this agreement to maintain confidentiality; (iii) after the information has been acquired by Consultant through independent means and without a breach of Consultant's duties to CNCA under this Agreement or otherwise; or (iv) pursuant to the order of a court or other tribunal with jurisdiction if Consultant has given CNCA adequate notice so that CNCA may contest any such process. Personally identifiable student information may only be used as necessary to meet Consultant's obligations in this Agreement.

10. <u>Non-Disparagement</u>. Consultant and CNCA mutually agree that, as of the date they sign this Agreement, Consultant will not, in communication with any person or entity whatsoever, or any third-party media outlet, Facebook, Twitter, LinkedIn, or other social media service or personal website, make any derogatory, disparaging, critical or negative statements, publications or comments, either written, oral or otherwise, referencing, relating to, about or regarding each other or any of either entity's current employees, officers, directors or members. Consultant and CNCA further agree that they will take all reasonable steps to prevent others from making such statements on their behalf. However, this section will in no way prevent Consultant or CNCA from testifying truthfully pursuant to an enforceable subpoena. It is understood and agreed that this is a material term of this Agreement and that any breach at all of this term shall constitute a material breach.

11. <u>Non-Competition/Solicitation</u>. All information about CNCA's employees, officers, members, directors, clients and affiliates that is not otherwise known to the public is Confidential Information. During Consultant's retention Consultant shall not directly or indirectly ask, induce, or encourage any employee(s) of CNCA to leave their employment with CNCA or solicit any employee(s) of CNCA for employment. During Consultant's retention Consultant shall not directly or indirectly or indirectly or indirectly or prospective clients with whom Consultant had contact during his/her relationship with CNCA or any clients with whom Consultant had contact during his/her relationship with CNCA or any clients with whom Consultant shall not use Confidential Information. For example, Consultant shall not use Confidential Information acquired from appointments set by or on behalf of CNCA and use it for any benefit other than for CNCA. This section is intended to be construed as broadly as possible but in no way to limit Consultant's post-termination ability to conduct business. The sole purpose of this section is to protect CNCA's Confidential Information, which CNCA heavily invested time and resources into developing and acquiring.



12. General Provisions.

Charter Academy

a. <u>Non-Exclusive Agreement</u>. This Agreement is not exclusive. Consultant shall be permitted to engage in other activities for other businesses during the term of this Agreement.

b. <u>Successors and Assigns</u>. The rights and obligations of CNCA under this Agreement shall inure to the benefit of and shall be binding upon the successors and assigns of CNCA. Consultant shall not be entitled to assign any of his/her rights or obligations under this Agreement without the prior written consent of an authorized officer of CNCA, and any such assignment by Consultant without CNCA's prior written consent shall be void

c. <u>Governing Law; Venue</u>. This Agreement shall be construed and enforced under and in accordance with the laws of the State of California. Venue to any action or proceeding arising out of this Agreement shall be in Los Angeles County, California.

d. <u>Entire Agreement</u>. This Agreement, including all attachments which are hereby incorporated by reference, reflect the only, sole, and entire agreement between the Parties relating in any way to the subject matter hereof. No statement, promise, or oral representations have been made which in any way form a part of or modify this Agreement. This Agreement is intended to replace and supersede any and all other agreements between the Parties, whether oral or in writing, relating to the subject matter of this Agreement.

e. <u>Amendment/Modification</u>. No amendment or modification of the terms or conditions of this Agreement shall be valid unless made in writing and signed by the Parties hereto.

f. <u>Severability</u>. Each term, condition, covenant, or provision of this Agreement shall be viewed as separate and distinct, and in the event that any, such term, covenant, or provision shall be held by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, the remaining provisions shall continue in full force and effect.

g. <u>Waiver</u>. A waiver by either party of a breach of any provision or provisions of this Agreement shall not constitute a general waiver or prejudice the other party's right otherwise to demand strict compliance with that provision or any other provisions in this Agreement.

h. <u>Notices</u>. Any notice required or permitted to be given under this Agreement shall be sufficient if in writing and delivered by overnight mail and/or by hand delivered to the last known address of Consultant or to the principal office of CNCA. To be effective, any notice to CNCA shall be directed to the attention of the CEO.

i. <u>Counterparts</u>. This Agreement may be executed in counterparts and, if so executed, each such counterpart shall have the force and effect of an original. A facsimile, scanned, and/or photographic signature shall have the same force and effect as an original signature



School Facility Conditions and Planned Improvements

School campus, three buildings, are in good and safe condition, this includes buildings for the 2022-2023 school year. School buildings were acquired in 2000, renovated for school use, with appropriate permits. The campus is comprised of 25 classrooms in three buildings, office spaces, two playgrounds, two indoor PE areas, outdoor and indoor eating areas, and is a total of 40,035 sf. The buildings were cabled with cat6 under E-rate in November/December 2022. Smartboards have been added to all classrooms. Security guards are provided Mon-Fri during and after school hours, 12 hours per day. The three school buildings have had security camera upgrades, along with repairs to new PA system. The PA system is integrated throughout the three buildings instead of per building, with enhanced security alert features. A standing guard was also added to help support city cleaning encampments throughout the public alley located in the part of the three buildings. The K-4 playground was modified to add a 40x40 ft flat surface for play. The TK building (661) play area was renovated and new turf was installed. Large sections of concrete features were removed in order to install turf. Planned improvements for this site include ADA compliant ramp and play area that will have soft turf surface. Future plans also include new elevators, and 2024 new play apparatus with playground improvements to the playgrounds at 653 and 661 Burlington buildings. Part of these improvements include a walkway that will connect the three buildings from within the campus.

Opportunities for Parental Involvement (School Year 2023–24)

At Camino Nuevo, we value the strengths and gifts that diverse families contribute and believe that learning must be relevant and contextual. Our Families as Partners program engages the whole family in the learning process to support our students' social, emotional, and intellectual development. Our goal is to create the strongest possible partnership between home and school to increase student achievement and success. We strongly believe that students will find greater levels of academic success when their home and school share similar values about learning, develop a positive relationship, and work together to build a strong partnership. To ensure the development of authentic and productive relationships, Camino Nuevo offers a variety of opportunities for families to be involved both in the classroom and at the school level. Families are also able provide input to school leaders. We further demonstrate our commitment to forging genuine partnerships with all families by offering high-quality family services, including a comprehensive family workshop program and case management for families in need.

• Committees - Each school site has several leadership committees that families can join. One of them is the English Learner Advisory Committee (ELAC). Each campus with 21 or more English language learners has this committee. This committee is responsible for advising the principal and staff on programs and services for English language learners. In addition, ELAC assists the school in the development of the school's needs assessment and brainstorms ways to make families/guardians aware of the importance of regular school attendance. The Site Based Council (SBC) or the School Site Council (SSC) is another committee that families can join. It serves as an advisory council to the school site principals. This committee is responsible for reviewing policies and providing feedback on the school's LCAP goals (i.e., School Safety Plan, share resources available to support students & families, the Parent Involvement Policy, Spring and Winter Consolidated Applications, LCAP goals, and the Retention and Culmination policy).

• Annual School Satisfaction Survey - Every year during the winter, parents received a survey to share comments, suggestions, and concerns about the school. Parents can share the areas of the school they feel happiest about, areas that need improvement, and suggestions to improve school-home communication. The survey is divided into different sections: college readiness, family engagement, family support, learning behaviors, school climate, school fit, and technology/communication. Results from the survey are shared with school leaders, parents, teachers, and the Home Support Office. Data from the survey informs school decisions, helps shape the Families as Partners Program, and determines goals for the school year.

• Capacity Building/Family Workshops - Family workshops and special school events and activities are held during the school year. Student and Family Services Coordinators and/or other school leaders facilitate a variety of workshops throughout the year. Topics like SBAC, ELPAC, Mental Health, and college and career readiness, as well as how to successfully transition to middle and high school are covered. Schools also host workshops on how to have successful parent conferences, as student academic progress is monitored during these conferences three times per year (in October, January, and April) and report cards are distributed at this time. At these workshops, parents not only receive sample questions to trigger conversations with teachers, but they also receive information on how to prepare for conferences and how to follow up with teachers afterward. In addition, during the school year, parents are encouraged to reach out to teachers in person and/or via Parent Square if any questions arise regarding their child's academic achievement. Translators are scheduled beforehand for those teachers who do not speak Spanish.

• Parent and Family Engagement Policy - The Parent and Family Engagement Policy is reviewed and updated annually during an SBC meeting. Principals gather feedback from parents and other members and make edits accordingly. The final version is available in English and Spanish by Student and Family Services Coordinators and can be found at the main office. CNCA has developed a written Title I parental involvement policy with input from Title I parents and Site Base Councils. Each year, CNCA also collects feedback from parents to inform any revisions to the policy that may be necessary. CNCA distributes the policy to parents of Title I students. It is distributed at the beginning of the school year and is available online via the CNCA website.

 School-Parent Compact – The Compact describes the best ways to support families and increase student achievement. It was developed with input from parents to create the strongest possible partnership between home, school, and students to increase academic achievement and success.
 Parents/guardians are encouraged to complete 15 hours of volunteer service per family per site. Attendance at workshops and school activities, completing city college classes, taking your student to the public library, or enrolling in other community-based education programs counts towards hours of volunteer service. These opportunities offer parents targeted training that empowers and motivates them to seek personal and professional growth opportunities for themselves while advocating for a quality education and life for their students.

• Professional Development/Staff Training - As part of the onboarding process, all new staff attends a week of training, including a session on our Families as Partners Program. New classified and certified staff learn how to build trusting relationships with their families and link learning in the classroom with learning at home. The session highlights how to communicate better, partner with families, and engage them as equal partners in the school community. In addition, the Student and Family Services Coordinators host sessions during Professional Development week about how to engage families in the classroom and gather feedback to plan activities. Each school has a full-time and bilingual Student and Family Services Coordinator.

• School Home Communication - Schools communicate information to families in a culturally sensitive way via the school's website, social media (Facebook/Instagram), and/or Parent Square. Schools also share information via traditional methods like a parent newsletter, robocalls, etc. Student and Family Coordinators have an open-door policy to ensure parents feel comfortable reaching out when they need support for their children and

referrals for any social or medical services. All communication with families is done in English and Spanish (or any preferred language for the family), ensuring that any difficult or complicated academic language is clearly explained in a culturally sensitive way. Translators are readily available during parent meetings, conferences, and workshops to ensure understanding and maximize communication.

• Community Partnerships - We leverage the expertise of our community partners, like Promotoras Comunitarias, Breese Foundation, and Central City Neighborhood Partners, to provide services and resources beyond academics.

• Health & Wellness - To serve the whole child and provide a continuum of care, we also provide access to mental health services, case management, community referrals, and parent support groups.

• Community Building - Each school offers opportunities to build community, like parent meetings called Coffee with the Leadership Team (or "Cafecitos"). The goal of the "Cafecitos" is for parents to learn, build community, and get updates about the school. During these monthly parent meetings, school leaders interact with families and parents get an opportunity to share concerns, ask questions, offer suggestions and provide feedback on topics covered. Other events include Open House, Math/Literacy Night, Back to School Night, and an organization-wide Parent Book Club. The annual book club is a unique opportunity for parents to model reading at home, build community with other families, and spend quality time with families from other school sites.

Camino Nuevo Charter Academy offers after-school programming via our Expanded Learning Opportunity Program. Our ELO-P program is structured to provide a safe and supportive environment for our students that meets their developmental, physical, and social-emotional needs. Our program will incorporate elements such as adequate space indoors and outdoors for program services. Indoor areas used for the program will have adequate heat and light, room for storing belongings, and be equipped with materials to enhance learning opportunities. Recreational equipment will be plentiful and safe and under a safety review each quarter, or more often if needed to ensure safety of youth served. All program staff will be trained in safety, first aid, and trauma-informed learning practices as part of their onboarding. Since our afterschool program is located on our campus, we consider the afterschool program an extension of our school day and structure it as such. Offering the program on-site minimizes transportation barriers that could otherwise impact students who would not be able to participate. To enhance student learning we may offer enrichment field trips for students; transportation to and from offsite locations will be provided as part of the program.



Opportunities for Parental Involvement (School Year 2023–24)

At Camino Nuevo, we value the strengths and gifts that diverse families contribute and believe that learning must be relevant and contextual. Our Families as Partners program engages the whole family in the learning process to support our students' social, emotional, and intellectual development. Our goal is to create the strongest possible partnership between home and school to increase student achievement and success. We strongly believe that students will find greater levels of academic success when their home and school share similar values about learning, develop a positive relationship, and work together to build a strong partnership. To ensure the development of authentic and productive relationships, Camino Nuevo offers a variety of opportunities for families to be involved both in the classroom and at the school level. Families are also able provide input to school leaders. We further demonstrate our commitment to forging genuine partnerships with all families by offering highquality family services, including a comprehensive family workshop program and case management for families in need.

• Committees - Each school site has several leadership committees that families can join. One of them is the English Learner Advisory Committee (ELAC). Each campus with 21 or more English language learners has this committee. This committee is responsible for advising the principal and staff on programs and services for English language learners. In addition, ELAC assists the school in the development of the school's needs assessment and brainstorms ways to make families/guardians aware of the importance of regular school attendance. The Site Based Council (SBC) or the School Site Council (SSC) is another committee that families can join. It serves as an advisory council to the school site principals. This committee is responsible for reviewing policies and providing feedback on the school's LCAP goals (i.e., School Safety Plan, share resources available to support students & families, the Parent Involvement Policy, Spring and Winter Consolidated Applications, LCAP goals, and the Retention and Culmination policy).

• Annual School Satisfaction Survey - Every year during the winter, parents received a survey to share comments, suggestions, and concerns about the school. Parents can share the areas of the school they feel happiest about, areas that need improvement, and suggestions to improve school-home communication. The survey is divided into different sections: college readiness, family engagement, family support, learning behaviors, school climate, school fit, and technology/communication. Results from the survey are shared with school leaders, parents, teachers, and the Home Support Office. Data from the survey informs school decisions, helps shape the Families as Partners Program, and determines goals for the school year.

• Capacity Building/Family Workshops - Family workshops and special school events and activities are held during the school year. Student and Family Services Coordinators and/or other school leaders facilitate a variety of workshops throughout the year. Topics like SBAC, ELPAC, Mental Health, and college and career readiness, as well as how to successfully transition to middle and high school are covered. Schools also host workshops on how to have successful parent conferences, as student academic progress is monitored during these conferences three times per year (in October, January, and April) and report cards are distributed at this time. At these workshops, parents not only receive sample questions to trigger conversations with teachers, but they also receive information on how to prepare for conferences and how to follow up with teachers afterward. In addition, during the school year, parents are

encouraged to reach out to teachers in person and/or via Parent Square if any questions arise regarding their child's academic achievement. Translators are scheduled beforehand for those teachers who do not speak Spanish.

• Parent and Family Engagement Policy - The Parent and Family Engagement Policy is reviewed and updated annually during an SBC meeting. Principals gather feedback from parents and other members and make edits accordingly. The final version is available in English and Spanish by Student and Family Services Coordinators and can be found at the main office. CNCA has developed a written Title I parental involvement policy with input from Title I parents and Site Base Councils. Each year, CNCA also collects feedback from parents to inform any revisions to the policy that may be necessary. CNCA distributes the policy to parents of Title I students. It is distributed at the beginning of the school year and is available online via the CNCA website.

• School-Parent Compact – The Compact describes the best ways to support families and increase student achievement. It was developed with input from parents to create the strongest possible partnership between home, school, and students to increase academic achievement and success. Parents/guardians are encouraged to complete 15 hours of volunteer service per family per site. Attendance at workshops and school activities, completing city college classes, taking your student to the public library, or enrolling in other community-based education programs counts towards hours of volunteer service. These opportunities offer parents targeted training that empowers and motivates them to seek personal and professional growth opportunities for themselves while advocating for a quality education and life for their students.

• Professional Development/Staff Training - As part of the onboarding process, all new staff attends a week of training, including a session on our Families as Partners Program. New classified and certified staff learn how to build trusting relationships with their families and link learning in the classroom with learning at home. The session highlights how to communicate better, partner with families, and engage them as equal partners in the school community. In addition, the Student and Family Services Coordinators host sessions during Professional Development week about how to engage families in the classroom and gather feedback to plan activities. Each school has a full-time and bilingual Student and Family Services Coordinator.

• School Home Communication - Schools communicate information to families in a culturally sensitive way via the school's website, social media (Facebook/Instagram), and/or Parent Square. Schools also share information via traditional methods like a parent newsletter, robocalls, etc. Student and Family Coordinators have an open-door policy to ensure parents feel comfortable reaching out when they need support for their children and referrals for any social or medical services. All communication with families is done in English and Spanish (or any preferred language for the family), ensuring that any difficult or complicated academic language is clearly explained in a culturally sensitive way. Translators are readily available during parent meetings, conferences, and workshops to ensure understanding and maximize communication.

• Community Partnerships - We leverage the expertise of our community partners, like Promotoras Comunitarias, Breese Foundation, and Central City Neighborhood Partners, to provide services and resources beyond academics.

• Health & Wellness - To serve the whole child and provide a continuum of care, we also provide access to mental health services, case management, community referrals, and parent support groups.

• Community Building - Each school offers opportunities to build community, like parent meetings called Coffee with the Leadership Team (or "Cafecitos"). The goal of the "Cafecitos" is for parents to learn, build community, and get updates about the school. During these monthly parent meetings, school leaders interact with families and parents get an opportunity to share concerns, ask questions, offer suggestions and provide feedback on topics covered. Other events include Open House, Math/Literacy Night, Back to School Night, and an organizationwide Parent Book Club. The annual book club is a unique opportunity for parents to model reading at home, build community with other families, and spend quality time with families from other school sites.


Camino Nuevo Elementary #3 offers after-school programming via our Expanded Learning Opportunity Program. Our ELO-P program is structured to provide a safe and supportive environment for our students that meets their developmental, physical, and social-emotional needs. Our program will incorporate elements such as adequate space indoors and outdoors for program services. Indoor areas used for the program will have adequate heat and light, room for storing belongings, and be equipped with materials to enhance learning opportunities. Recreational equipment will be plentiful and safe and under a safety review each quarter, or more often if needed to ensure safety of youth served. All program staff will be trained in safety, first aid, and trauma-informed learning practices as part of their onboarding. Since our afterschool program is located on our campus, we consider the afterschool program an extension of our school day and structure it as such. Offering the program on-site minimizes transportation barriers that could otherwise impact students who would not be able to participate. To enhance student learning we may offer enrichment field trips for students; transportation to and from offsite locations will be provided as part of the program.



Opportunities for Parental Involvement (School Year 2023–24)

At Camino Nuevo, we value the strengths and gifts that diverse families contribute and believe that learning must be relevant and contextual. Our Families as Partners program engages the whole family in the learning process to support our students' social, emotional, and intellectual development. Our goal is to create the strongest possible partnership between home and school to increase student achievement and success. We strongly believe that students will find greater levels of academic success when their home and school share similar values about learning, develop a positive relationship, and work together to build a strong partnership. To ensure the development of authentic and productive relationships, Camino Nuevo offers a variety of opportunities for families to be involved both in the classroom and at the school level. Families are also able provide input to school leaders. We further demonstrate our commitment to forging genuine partnerships with all families by offering high-quality family services, including a comprehensive family workshop program and case management for families in need.

• Committees - Each school site has several leadership committees that families can join. One of them is the English Learner Advisory Committee (ELAC). Each campus with 21 or more English language learners has this committee. This committee is responsible for advising the principal and staff on programs and services for English language learners. In addition, ELAC assists the school in the development of the school's needs assessment and brainstorms ways to make families/guardians aware of the importance of regular school attendance. The Site Based Council (SBC) or the School Site Council (SSC) is another committee that families can join. It serves as an advisory council to the school site principals. This committee is responsible for reviewing policies and providing feedback on the school's LCAP goals (i.e., School Safety Plan, share resources available to support students & families, the Parent Involvement Policy, Spring and Winter Consolidated Applications, LCAP goals, and the Retention and Culmination policy).

• Annual School Satisfaction Survey - Every year during the winter, parents received a survey to share comments, suggestions, and concerns about the school. Parents can share the areas of the school they feel happiest about, areas that need improvement, and suggestions to improve school-home communication. The survey is divided into different sections: college readiness, family engagement, family support, learning behaviors, school climate, school fit, and technology/communication. Results from the survey are shared with school leaders, parents, teachers, and the Home Support Office. Data from the survey informs school decisions, helps shape the Families as Partners Program, and determines goals for the school year.

• Capacity Building/Family Workshops - Family workshops and special school events and activities are held during the school year. Student and Family Services Coordinators and/or other school leaders facilitate a variety of workshops throughout the year. Topics like SBAC, ELPAC, Mental Health, and college and career readiness, as well as how to successfully transition to middle and high school are covered. Schools also host workshops on how to have successful parent conferences, as student academic progress is monitored during these conferences three times per year (in October, January, and April) and report cards are distributed at this time. At these workshops, parents not only receive sample questions to trigger conversations with teachers, but they also receive information on how to prepare for conferences and how to follow up with teachers afterward. In addition, during the school year, parents are encouraged to reach out to teachers in person and/or via Parent Square if any questions arise regarding their child's academic achievement. Translators are scheduled beforehand for those teachers who do not speak Spanish. • Parent and Family Engagement Policy - The Parent and Family Engagement Policy is reviewed and updated annually during an SBC meeting. Principals gather feedback from parents and other members and make edits accordingly. The final version is available in English and Spanish by Student and Family Services Coordinators and can be found at the main office. CNCA has developed a written Title I parental involvement policy with input from Title I parents and Site Base Councils. Each year, CNCA also collects feedback from parents to inform any revisions to the policy that may be necessary. CNCA distributes the policy to parents of Title I students. It is distributed at the beginning of the school year and is available online via the CNCA website.

• School-Parent Compact – The Compact describes the best ways to support families and increase student achievement. It was developed with input from parents to create the strongest possible partnership between home, school, and students to increase academic achievement and success. Parents/guardians are encouraged to complete 15 hours of volunteer service per family per site. Attendance at workshops and school activities, completing city college classes, taking your student to the public library, or enrolling in other community-based education programs counts towards hours of volunteer service. These opportunities offer parents targeted training that empowers and motivates them to seek personal and professional growth opportunities for themselves while advocating for a quality education and life for their students.

• Professional Development/Staff Training - As part of the onboarding process, all new staff attends a week of training, including a session on our Families as Partners Program. New classified and certified staff learn how to build trusting relationships with their families and link learning in the classroom with learning at home. The session highlights how to communicate better, partner with families, and engage them as equal partners in the school community. In addition, the Student and Family Services Coordinators host sessions during Professional Development week about how to engage families in the classroom and gather feedback to plan activities. Each school has a full-time and bilingual Student and Family Services Coordinator.

• School Home Communication - Schools communicate information to families in a culturally sensitive way via the school's website, social media (Facebook/Instagram), and/or Parent Square. Schools also share information via traditional methods like a parent newsletter, robocalls, etc. Student and Family Coordinators have an open-door policy to ensure parents feel comfortable reaching out when they need support for their children and referrals for any social or medical services. All communication with families is done in English and Spanish (or any preferred language for the family), ensuring that any difficult or complicated academic language is clearly explained in a culturally sensitive way. Translators are readily available during parent meetings, conferences, and workshops to ensure understanding and maximize communication.

• Community Partnerships - We leverage the expertise of our community partners, like Promotoras Comunitarias, Breese Foundation, and Central City Neighborhood Partners, to provide services and resources beyond academics.

• Health & Wellness - To serve the whole child and provide a continuum of care, we also provide access to mental health services, case management, community referrals, and parent support groups.

• Community Building - Each school offers opportunities to build community, like parent meetings called Coffee with the Leadership Team (or "Cafecitos"). The goal of the "Cafecitos" is for parents to learn, build community, and get updates about the school. During these monthly parent meetings, school leaders interact with families and parents get an opportunity to share concerns, ask questions, offer suggestions and provide feedback on topics covered. Other events include Open House, Math/Literacy Night, Back to School Night, and an organization-wide Parent Book Club. The annual book club is a unique opportunity for parents to model reading at home, build community with other families, and spend quality time with families from other school sites.


Camino Nuevo Charter Academy #4 offers after-school programming via our Expanded Learning Opportunity Program. Our ELO-P program is structured to provide a safe and supportive environment for our students that meets their developmental, physical, and social-emotional needs. Our program will incorporate elements such as adequate space indoors and outdoors for program services. Indoor areas used for the program will have adequate heat and light, room for storing belongings, and be equipped with materials to enhance learning opportunities. Recreational equipment will be plentiful and safe and under a safety review each quarter, or more often if needed to ensure safety of youth served. All program staff will be trained in safety, first aid, and trauma-informed learning practices as part of their onboarding. Since our afterschool program is located on our campus, we consider the afterschool program an extension of our school day and structure it as such. Offering the program on-site minimizes transportation barriers that could otherwise impact students who would not be able to participate. To enhance student learning we may offer enrichment field trips for students; transportation to and from offsite locations will be provided as part of the program.



The purpose of this School Accountability Report Card is to provide you, the parents and the community, with specific information about academic achievements, student safety, campus facilities, qualifications of professional staff, instructional materials and progress in meeting state standards.

The underlying philosophy of CNHS No. 2 is that when underserved students are provided equal access to rigorous, research-based educational programs in which families are an integral component, children gain the tools to achieve academic success throughout their educational careers. CNHS No. 2 serves 465 students from grades 9-12. Approximately 95% of our students qualify for free or reduced meals, and approximately 98% of our student population is Hispanic/Latino. Our students reside in some of the most historically underserved areas of Central Los Angeles, including the communities of MacArthur Park, Pico-Union, U.S., where the annual family income is among the lowest in the city.

Despite these economic and social disadvantages, our students are bucking the community trend with exceptional academic excellence, preparation for college, and civic engagement. For the graduating class of 2020, 100% of graduating seniors met A-G requirements and 70% of graduating seniors were accepted into four-year colleges. Additionally, CNHS No. 2 students are becoming youth leaders in the community through school-based clubs, service learning projects, and involvement in college-readiness programs.

Our school has been able to overcome many of the barriers to high achievement that plague historically underserved communities. We are committed to reducing and eventually eliminating these disparities through a rigorous academic program that builds upon the diverse strengths of all students, regardless of the challenges they may bring to school. Similarly, we maintain a shared commitment to do "whatever it takes" to ensure that our students successfully navigate the social obstacles that hinder academic achievement by involving families and working relentlessly to create success for all.



Opportunities for Parental Involvement (School Year 2023–24)

At Camino Nuevo, we value the strengths and gifts that diverse families contribute and believe that learning must be relevant and contextual. Our Families as Partners program engages the whole family in the learning process to support our students' social, emotional, and intellectual development. Our goal is to create the strongest possible partnership between home and school to increase student achievement and success. We strongly believe that students will find greater levels of academic success when their home and school share similar values about learning, develop a positive relationship, and work together to build a strong partnership. To ensure the development of authentic and productive relationships, Camino Nuevo offers a variety of opportunities for families to be involved both in the classroom and at the school level. Families are also able provide input to school leaders. We further demonstrate our commitment to forging genuine partnerships with all families by offering highquality family services, including a comprehensive family workshop program and case management for families in need.

• Committees - Each school site has several leadership committees that families can join. One of them is the English Learner Advisory Committee (ELAC). Each campus with 21 or more English language learners has this committee. This committee is responsible for advising the principal and staff on programs and services for English language learners. In addition, ELAC assists the school in the development of the school's needs assessment and brainstorms ways to make families/guardians aware of the importance of regular school attendance. The Site Based Council (SBC) or the School Site Council (SSC) is another committee that families can join. It serves as an advisory council to the school site principals. This committee is responsible for reviewing policies and providing feedback on the school's LCAP goals (i.e., School Safety Plan, share resources available to support students & families, the Parent Involvement Policy, Spring and Winter Consolidated Applications, LCAP goals, and the Retention and Culmination policy).

• Annual School Satisfaction Survey - Every year during the winter, parents received a survey to share comments, suggestions, and concerns about the school. Parents can share the areas of the school they feel happiest about, areas that need improvement, and suggestions to improve school-home communication. The survey is divided into different sections: college readiness, family engagement, family support, learning behaviors, school climate, school fit, and technology/communication. Results from the survey are shared with school leaders, parents, teachers, and the Home Support Office. Data from the survey informs school decisions, helps shape the Families as Partners Program, and determines goals for the school year.

• Capacity Building/Family Workshops - Family workshops and special school events and activities are held during the school year. Student and Family Services Coordinators and/or other school leaders facilitate a variety of workshops throughout the year. Topics like SBAC, ELPAC, Mental Health, and college and career readiness, as well as how to successfully transition to middle and high school are covered. Schools also host workshops on how to have successful parent conferences, as student academic progress is monitored during these conferences three times per year (in October, January, and April) and report cards are distributed at this time. At these workshops, parents not only receive sample questions to trigger conversations with teachers, but they also receive information on how to prepare for conferences and how to follow up with teachers afterward. In addition, during the school year, parents are encouraged to reach out to teachers in person and/or via Parent Square if any

questions arise regarding their child's academic achievement. Translators are scheduled beforehand for those teachers who do not speak Spanish.

• Parent and Family Engagement Policy - The Parent and Family Engagement Policy is reviewed and updated annually during an SBC meeting. Principals gather feedback from parents and other members and make edits accordingly. The final version is available in English and Spanish by Student and Family Services Coordinators and can be found at the main office. CNCA has developed a written Title I parental involvement policy with input from Title I parents and Site Base Councils. Each year, CNCA also collects feedback from parents to inform any revisions to the policy that may be necessary. CNCA distributes the policy to parents of Title I students. It is distributed at the beginning of the school year and is available online via the CNCA website.

• School-Parent Compact – The Compact describes the best ways to support families and increase student achievement. It was developed with input from parents to create the strongest possible partnership between home, school, and students to increase academic achievement and success. Parents/guardians are encouraged to complete 15 hours of volunteer service per family per site. Attendance at workshops and school activities, completing city college classes, taking your student to the public library, or enrolling in other community-based education programs counts towards hours of volunteer service. These opportunities offer parents targeted training that empowers and motivates them to seek personal and professional growth opportunities for themselves while advocating for a quality education and life for their students.

• Professional Development/Staff Training – As part of the onboarding process, all new staff attends a week of training, including a session on our Families as Partners Program. New classified and certified staff learn how to build trusting relationships with their families and link learning in the classroom with learning at home. The session highlights how to communicate better, partner with families, and engage them as equal partners in the school community. In addition, the Student and Family Services Coordinators host sessions during Professional Development week about how to engage families in the classroom and gather feedback to plan activities. Each school has a full-time and bilingual Student and Family Services Coordinator.

• School Home Communication - Schools communicate information to families in a culturally sensitive way via the school's website, social media (Facebook/Instagram), and/or Parent Square. Schools also share information via traditional methods like a parent newsletter, robocalls, etc. Student and Family Coordinators have an open-door policy to ensure parents feel comfortable reaching out when they need support for their children and referrals for any social or medical services. All communication with families is done in English and Spanish (or any preferred language for the family), ensuring that any difficult or complicated academic language is clearly explained in a culturally sensitive way. Translators are readily available during parent meetings, conferences, and workshops to ensure understanding and maximize communication.

• Community Partnerships - We leverage the expertise of our community partners, like Promotoras Comunitarias, Breese Foundation, and Central City Neighborhood Partners, to provide services and resources beyond academics.

• Health & Wellness - To serve the whole child and provide a continuum of care, we also provide access to mental health services, case management, community referrals, and parent support groups.

• Community Building - Each school offers opportunities to build community, like parent meetings called Coffee with the Leadership Team (or "Cafecitos"). The goal of the "Cafecitos" is for parents to learn, build community, and get updates about the school. During these monthly parent meetings, school leaders interact with families and parents get an opportunity to share concerns, ask questions, offer suggestions and provide feedback on topics covered. Other events include Open House, Math/Literacy Night, Back to School Night, and an organizationwide Parent Book Club. The annual book club is a unique opportunity for parents to model reading at home, build community with other families, and spend quality time with families from other school sites.



Opportunities for Parental Involvement (School Year 2023–24)

At Camino Nuevo, we value the strengths and gifts that diverse families contribute and believe that learning must be relevant and contextual. Our Families as Partners program engages the whole family in the learning process to support our students' social, emotional, and intellectual development. Our goal is to create the strongest possible partnership between home and school to increase student achievement and success. We strongly believe that students will find greater levels of academic success when their home and school share similar values about learning, develop a positive relationship, and work together to build a strong partnership. To ensure the development of authentic and productive relationships, Camino Nuevo offers a variety of opportunities for families to be involved both in the classroom and at the school level. Families are also able provide input to school leaders. We further demonstrate our commitment to forging genuine partnerships with all families by offering highquality family services, including a comprehensive family workshop program and case management for families in need.

• Committees - Each school site has several leadership committees that families can join. One of them is the English Learner Advisory Committee (ELAC). Each campus with 21 or more English language learners has this committee. This committee is responsible for advising the principal and staff on programs and services for English language learners. In addition, ELAC assists the school in the development of the school's needs assessment and brainstorms ways to make families/guardians aware of the importance of regular school attendance. The Site Based Council (SBC) or the School Site Council (SSC) is another committee that families can join. It serves as an advisory council to the school site principals. This committee is responsible for reviewing policies and providing feedback on the school's LCAP goals (i.e., School Safety Plan, share resources available to support students & families, the Parent Involvement Policy, Spring and Winter Consolidated Applications, LCAP goals, and the Retention and Culmination policy).

• Annual School Satisfaction Survey - Every year during the winter, parents received a survey to share comments, suggestions, and concerns about the school. Parents can share the areas of the school they feel happiest about, areas that need improvement, and suggestions to improve school-home communication. The survey is divided into different sections: college readiness, family engagement, family support, learning behaviors, school climate, school fit, and technology/communication. Results from the survey are shared with school leaders, parents, teachers, and the Home Support Office. Data from the survey informs school decisions, helps shape the Families as Partners Program, and determines goals for the school year.

• Capacity Building/Family Workshops - Family workshops and special school events and activities are held during the school year. Student and Family Services Coordinators and/or other school leaders facilitate a variety of workshops throughout the year. Topics like SBAC, ELPAC, Mental Health, and college and career readiness, as well as how to successfully transition to middle and high school are covered. Schools also host workshops on how to have successful parent conferences, as student academic progress is monitored during these conferences three times per year (in October, January, and April) and report cards are distributed at this time. At these workshops, parents not only receive sample questions to trigger conversations with teachers, but they also receive information on how to prepare for conferences and how to follow up

with teachers afterward. In addition, during the school year, parents are encouraged to reach out to teachers in person and/or via Parent Square if any questions arise regarding their child's academic achievement. Translators are scheduled beforehand for those teachers who do not speak Spanish.

• Parent and Family Engagement Policy - The Parent and Family Engagement Policy is reviewed and updated annually during an SBC meeting. Principals gather feedback from parents and other members and make edits accordingly. The final version is available in English and Spanish by Student and Family Services Coordinators and can be found at the main office. CNCA has developed a written Title I parental involvement policy with input from Title I parents and Site Base Councils. Each year, CNCA also collects feedback from parents to inform any revisions to the policy that may be necessary. CNCA distributes the policy to parents of Title I students. It is distributed at the beginning of the school year and is available online via the CNCA website.

• School-Parent Compact – The Compact describes the best ways to support families and increase student achievement. It was developed with input from parents to create the strongest possible partnership between home, school, and students to increase academic achievement and success. Parents/guardians are encouraged to complete 15 hours of volunteer service per family per site. Attendance at workshops and school activities, completing city college classes, taking your student to the public library, or enrolling in other community-based education programs counts towards hours of volunteer service. These opportunities offer parents targeted training that empowers and motivates them to seek personal and professional growth opportunities for themselves while advocating for a quality education and life for their students.

• Professional Development/Staff Training - As part of the onboarding process, all new staff attends a week of training, including a session on our Families as Partners Program. New classified and certified staff learn how to build trusting relationships with their families and link learning in the classroom with learning at home. The session highlights how to communicate better, partner with families, and engage them as equal partners in the school community. In addition, the Student and Family Services Coordinators host sessions during Professional Development week about how to engage families in the classroom and gather feedback to plan activities. Each school has a full-time and bilingual Student and Family Services Coordinator.

• School Home Communication - Schools communicate information to families in a culturally sensitive way via the school's website, social media (Facebook/Instagram), and/or Parent Square. Schools also share information via traditional methods like a parent newsletter, robocalls, etc. Student and Family Coordinators have an open-door policy to ensure parents feel comfortable reaching out when they need support for their children and referrals for any social or medical services. All communication with families is done in English and Spanish (or any preferred language for the family), ensuring that any difficult or complicated academic language is clearly explained in a culturally sensitive way. Translators are readily available during parent meetings, conferences, and workshops to ensure understanding and maximize communication.

• Community Partnerships - We leverage the expertise of our community partners, like Promotoras Comunitarias, Breese Foundation, and Central City Neighborhood Partners, to provide services and resources beyond academics.

• Health & Wellness - To serve the whole child and provide a continuum of care, we also provide access to mental health services, case management, community referrals, and parent support groups.

• Community Building - Each school offers opportunities to build community, like parent meetings called Coffee with the Leadership Team (or "Cafecitos"). The goal of the "Cafecitos" is for parents to learn, build community, and get updates about the school. During these monthly parent meetings, school leaders interact with families and parents get an opportunity to share concerns, ask questions, offer suggestions and provide feedback on topics covered. Other events include Open House, Math/Literacy Night, Back to School Night, and an organizationwide Parent Book Club. The annual book club is a unique opportunity for parents to model reading at home, build community with other families, and spend quality time with families from other school sites.


Camino Nuevo Charter Academy #2 offers after-school programming via our Expanded Learning Opportunity Program. Our ELO-P program is structured to provide a safe and supportive environment for our students that meets their developmental, physical, and social-emotional needs. Our program will incorporate elements such as adequate space indoors and outdoors for program services. Indoor areas used for the program will have adequate heat and light, room for storing belongings, and be equipped with materials to enhance learning opportunities. Recreational equipment will be plentiful and safe and under a safety review each quarter, or more often if needed to ensure safety of youth served. All program staff will be trained in safety, first aid, and trauma-informed learning practices as part of their onboarding. Since our afterschool program is located on our campus, we consider the afterschool program an extension of our school day and structure it as such. Offering the program on-site minimizes transportation barriers that could otherwise impact students who would not be able to participate. To enhance student learning we may offer enrichment field trips for students; transportation to and from offsite locations will be provided as part of the program.

Camino Nuevo Charter Academy INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR AGREEMENT

I. This Independent Contractor Agreement (hereinafter called "Agreement") is dated this **10th** day of **October**, 2023, by and between Camino Nuevo Charter Academy – (hereinafter called "**CNCA**"), located at 3435 W. Temple Street, Los Angeles, CA 90026, and Mind Body Awareness Project (hereinafter called "**Contractor**").

II. **Description of Mind Body Awareness Project**. In consideration of their mutual covenants, the parties hereto agree as follows: The Mind Body Awareness Project to be provided by **Contractor** pursuant to this Agreement (Mind Body Awareness Project), including details regarding the contact that **Contractor** and its assigns will have with students, are described in

Attachment A - Description of Mind Body Awareness Project – (MUST BE COMPLETED AND ATTACHED TO THIS DOCUMENT)

Contractor hereby verifies that it is specially trained or experienced and competent to provide the Mind Body Awareness Project required by this Agreement and acknowledges that **CNCA** has entered into this Agreement in reliance on the above verification.

III. **Term of Agreement.** The work specified above will commence on October 16, 2023 and will be completed by June 30, 2024. **CNCA** has no legal obligation to renew this Agreement and the decision to do so shall be entirely within the discretion of **CNCA**.

IV. **Billing.** In consideration of the Mind Body Awareness Project provided, **Contractor** will submit invoices3 times per year. Payment for deposit/installment 1 (50%) will be 30 days after the receipt of the signed/executed Independent Contract which will include the cost of all services agreed to but will not include optional services like (coaching, sustainability sessions, strategic consulting or operations). Payment for installment 2 (25%) will be made 30 days after invoice received no later than February/March 2024 for all services rendered up to this point, minus what has been paid. Payment for the final installment (25%) will be made 30 days after invoice for all remaining services rendered, and will be paid at the rate of \$105,600 per year. The total contract amount will not exceed \$105,600. Payment is due within thirty (30) days of receipt of invoice.

V. Indemnification. **Contractor** agrees to defend, indemnify and hold harmless CNCA, its officers, directors, employees, agents, affiliates, owners, volunteers, successors and assigns from and against any and all claims, including active and passive claims, losses, costs, attorney fees and expenses arising out of any liability or claim of liability for personal injury, bodily injury to persons or death, contractual liability and/or damage to property sustained, or claimed to have been sustained, arising out of any act or omission by **Contractor** or its sub-Contractors, and/or any other person, firm or corporation furnishing or supplying services, materials or supplies in conjunction with the Mind Body Awareness Project of the **Contractor**, whether authorized by this Agreement or not. **Contractor** further agrees to waive all rights of subrogation against **CNCA**. The provisions of this article do not apply to any damage or losses caused solely by the negligence or willful misconduct of **CNCA** or any of its agents or employees.

VI. Insurance. Contractor shall, at its own expense, procure and maintain at all times it performs any portion of the Mind Body Awareness Project the following insurance with minimum limits equal to the amounts indicated below.
 <u>Minimum Scope of Insurance</u>

- a) Commercial General Liability and Automobile Liability Insurance. Commercial General Liability Insurance and Automobile Liability Insurance that shall protect **Contractor**, **CNCA**, and the State from all claims of bodily injury, property damage, personal injury, death, advertising injury, and medical payments arising performing any portion of the Mind Body Awareness Project. (Form CG 0001 and CA 0001) Commercial General Liability insurance shall include contractual liability, products liability, completed operations and broad form property damage coverage.
- b) Workers' Compensation and Employers' Liability Insurance. Workers' Compensation Insurance and Employers' Liability Insurance for all of its employees performing any portion of the Mind Body Awareness Project. In accordance with provisions of section 3700 of the California Labor Code, Contractor shall be required to secure workers' compensation coverage for its employees. If any class of

employee or employees engaged in performing any portion of the Mind Body Awareness Project under this Agreement are not protected under the Workers' Compensation Statute, adequate insurance coverage for the protection of any employee(s) not otherwise protected must be obtained before any of those employee(s) commence performing any portion of the Mind Body Awareness Project.

- c) *Professional Liability (Errors and Omissions) Insurance*. Professional Liability (Errors and Omissions) Insurance against loss due to error, omission or malpractice, unless waived in writing by CNCA.
- d) *Sexual Abuse & Molestation Insurance*. Sexual Abuse & Molestation Insurance covering bodily injury, emotional distress, or mental anguish related to any claim, cause of action, or liability associated with child molestation or sexual abuse.
- 2) Minimum Limits of Insurance
 - i. *Commercial General Liability Insurance*: \$1,000,000 combined single limit per occurrence for bodily injury, personal injury, and property damage; \$3,000,000 general aggregate.
 - ii. *Automobile Liability Insurance*: \$1,000,000 combined single limit per accident for bodily injury and property damage; \$2,000,000 general aggregate.
 - iii. *Workers' Compensation and Employers' Liability Insurance*: Workers' compensation limits as required by the Labor Code of the State of California and Employers Liability limits of \$1,000,000 per accident.
 - iv. Professional Liability (Errors and Omissions) Insurance: \$1,000,000 single limit per claim; \$2,000,000 general aggregate.
 - v. *Sexual Abuse & Molestation Insurance*. \$2,000,000 per claim and in aggregate if this coverage is applicable to the Mind Body Awareness Project provided.
- 3) <u>Claims-Made Forms</u>: If the above insurance is written on a claims-made form, it shall continue for three years following termination of this Agreement. Such insurance shall have a retroactive date of placement prior to or coinciding with the effective date of this Agreement.
- 4) <u>Deductibles and Self-Insured Retentions</u>: Any deductibles or self-insured retentions must be declared to and approved by CNCA.
- 5) <u>Other Insurance Provisions</u>: The policies shall contain, or be endorsed to contain, the following provisions:
 - a) General Liability and Automobile Liability Coverages
 - i. Contractor's insurance coverage shall be primary insurance with respect to CNCA, its officers, board members, officials, employees, agents, or volunteers. Any insurance or self-insurance maintained by CNCA, its officers, board members, officials, employees, or volunteers shall be in excess of Contractor's insurance and shall not contribute to it.
 - ii. CNCA, its officers, board members, officials, employees, agents, and volunteers shall be covered as additional insureds with respect to liability arising out of activities performed by or on behalf of **Contractor**; and premises owned, leased, or used by **Contractor**. The coverage shall contain no special limitations on the scope of the protection afforded to CNCA, its officers, board members, officials, employees, agents, or volunteers.
 - iii. Failure to comply with reporting provisions of the policies shall not affect coverage provided to CNCA, its officers, board members, officials, employees, agents, and volunteers.
 - iv. Coverage shall state that **Contractor's** insurance shall apply separately to each insured against whom a claim is made or a suit is brought, except with respect to the limits of the insurer's liability.
 - b) All Coverages
 - i. Each insurance policy required by this Agreement shall be endorsed to state that coverages shall not be canceled except after thirty (30) days prior written notice has been given to CNCA. In addition, Contractor agrees that it shall not reduce its coverage or limits on any such policy except after thirty (30) days prior written notice has been given to CNCA and CNCA approves the reduction in coverage or limits. Contractor further agrees that it shall not increase any deductibles or self-insured retentions on any such policy except after thirty (30) days prior written notice has been given to CNCA and CNCA approves the reduction of CNCA and CNCA approves the reduction in coverage or limits. Contractor further agrees that it shall not increase any deductibles or self-insured retentions on any such policy except after thirty (30) days prior written notice has been given to CNCA and CNCA approves such increase. Insurance is to be placed with insurers with a Best's rating of no less than A: VII. This requirement may, however, be waived in individual cases for Errors and Omissions Coverages only, provided that in no event will a carrier with a rating of B: IX or lower be acceptable.
- 6) Self-Insured Entities: CNCA may, at its discretion, accept self-insurance as being in compliance with this section. In such case, Contractor agrees that it will defend and indemnify CNCA, including its officers, board members, officials, employees, agents, and volunteers, to the same extent as it would Contractor or any other self-insured person or entity, and that it will treat CNCA, including its officers, board members, officials, employees, agents, and volunteers as if it were covered to the same extent as Contractor or any other self-insured person or entity. Self-insurance shall be subject to all requirements contained in this section. Alternatively, self-insured entities may purchase insurance covering CNCA for all work performed and/or services rendered under this Agreement, provided such insurance complies with all the requirements of this section.
- 7) Evidence of Insurance: Prior to commencing work under this Agreement, **Contractor** shall provide **CNCA** with certificates of insurance evidencing compliance with this section. On request, **Contractor** shall furnish copies of any and/or all of the required insurance policies.

VII. Limitation of CNCA Liability. Other than as provided in this Agreement, CNCA's financial obligations under this Agreement shall be limited to the payment of the compensation provided in this Agreement. Notwithstanding any other provision of this Agreement, in no event, shall CNCA be liable, regardless of whether any claim is based on contract or tort, for any special, consequential, indirect or incidental damages, including, but not limited to, lost profits or revenue, arising out of or in connection with this Agreement or for the Mind Body Awareness Project performed in connection with this Agreement.

VIII. **Non-Discrimination**. **Contractor** shall ensure that no person employed by, associated with, or subcontracted to **Contractor** shall, on the basis of race, color, national origin, age, ancestry, religion, sex, handicap or sexual orientation, or other basis protected by law, be excluded from participation in, or otherwise be subjected to discrimination under any program or activity at **CNCA** and shall ensure its, and its employees' and subcontractors' compliance with applicable Federal and California laws including, but not limited to the California Fair Employment and Housing Act beginning with Government Code Section 12900 and Labor Code Section 1735.

IX. Interest of Contractor. It is understood and agreed that this Agreement is not a contract of employment between CNCA and Contractor. At all times Contractor shall be deemed to be an independent contractor and is not authorized to bind CNCA to any contracts or other obligations. In executing this Agreement, Contractor certifies that no one who has or who will have any financial interest under this Agreement is an officer or employee of CNCA. Additionally, as the Contractor is not a CNCA employee, Contractor is solely responsible for all employment-related responsibilities for its employees, including but not limited to training, fingerprinting, workers' compensation, etc..

X. Workers' Compensation. Contractor is aware of the laws of the State of California requiring employers to be insured against liability for Workers' Compensation and shall comply with such laws during the term of this Agreement.

XI. Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA). Contractor is aware of OSHA standards and codes as set forth by the U.S. Department of Labor and the derivative Cal/OSHA standards, laws and regulations relating thereto, and verify that all performance under this Agreement shall be in compliance therewith.

XII. **Originality of Services**. **Contractor** agrees that all technologies, formulae, procedures, processes, methods, writings, ideas, dialogue, compositions, recordings, teleplays and video productions prepared for, written for, or submitted to the **CNCA** and/or used in connection with this Agreement, shall be wholly original to **Contractor** and shall not be copied in whole or in part from any other source, except that submitted to **Contractor** by **CNCA** as a basis for such services.

XIII. License and Authority. Contractor warrants that it will maintain all necessary licenses, registrations, and certifications during the term of this Agreement, and that it is duly authorized to enter into this Agreement by its governing or controlling body. Evidence or copies of all necessary licenses, registrations and certifications must be provided to CNCA.

XIV. **Compliance with Laws**. **Contractor** shall observe and comply with all rules and regulations of the governing board of **CNCA** and all federal, state, and local laws, ordinances and regulations. **Contractor** shall give all notices required by any law, ordinance, rule and/or regulation bearing on the performance of the Mind Body Awareness Project as indicated or specified. If **Contractor** observes that the Mind Body Awareness Project is at variance with any such laws, ordinances, rules or regulations, **Contractor** shall notify **CNCA** in writing, and at the sole option of **CNCA**, any necessary changes to the Mind Body Awareness Project shall be made and this Agreement shall be appropriately amended in writing, or this Agreement shall be terminated effective upon **Contractor's** receipt of a written termination notice from **CNCA**. If **Contractor** performs any work that is in violation of any laws, ordinances, rules or regulations, without first notifying **CNCA** of the violation, **Contractor** shall bear all costs arising therefrom.

XV. **Equipment and Facilities**. **Contractor** will provide all necessary equipment and facilities to render its Mind Body Awareness Project pursuant to this Agreement, unless the parties to this Agreement specifically agree in writing that said equipment and facilities will be provided in a different manner. Equipment purchased under the provisions of this Agreement by **CNCA** is the property of **CNCA** and shall be used for its intended purpose during the term of this Agreement. An inventory of all equipment purchased under this Agreement shall be maintained. After the term of this Agreement, the equipment shall continue to be the property of **CNCA**.

XVI. Employment of Additional Workers by Contractor. Contractor may, at its own expense, employ additional workers or subcontractors as necessary for the completion of this Agreement and shall maintain workers'

compensation insurance as required by state law. CNCA shall not control, direct, or supervise Contractor's additional workers or subcontractors in the performance of services. Contractor assumes full and sole responsibility for the payment of all compensation and expenses of these additional workers or sub-contractors and for all state and federal income tax, unemployment insurance, social security, disability insurance, and other applicable withholdings. Contractor shall not hire employees of CNCA for performance of this Agreement unless such employment does not conflict with CNCA's personnel policies as determined by CNCA.

XVII. Assignment. Without the prior written consent of CNCA, this Agreement is not assignable by the Contractor, either in whole or in part.

XVIII. **Successors and Assigns**. Subject to the provision regarding assignment, this Agreement shall be binding on the heirs, executors, administrators, successors, and assigns of the respective parties.

XIX. **Governing Law**. The validity of this Agreement and any of its terms or provisions as well as the rights and duties of the parties hereunder shall be governed by the laws of the State of California. Venue for all litigation relative to the formation, interpretation, and performance of this Agreement shall be in County of Los Angeles, California.

XX. Withholding. CNCA shall not withhold or set aside any money on behalf of the Contractor for Federal Income Tax, State Income Tax, Social Security Tax, Unemployment Insurance, Disability Insurance, or any other federal or state fund whatsoever. It shall be the sole responsibility of the Contractor to withhold, set aside and account for all of the above.

XXI. Audit. Contractor shall establish and maintain books, records, and systems of account, in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles, reflecting all business operations of Contractor transacted under this Agreement. Contractor shall retain these books, records, and systems of account during the Term of this Agreement and for three (3) years thereafter. Contractor shall permit CNCA, its agent, other representatives, or an independent auditor to audit, examine, and make excerpts, copies, and transcripts from all books and records, and to make audit(s) of all billing statements, invoices, records, and other data related to the Mind Body Awareness Project covered by this Agreement. Audit(s) may be performed at any time, provided that CNCA shall give reasonable prior notice to Contractor and shall conduct audit(s) during Contractor's normal business hours, unless Contractor otherwise consents.

XXII. CNCA's Evaluation of Contractor and Contractor's Employees and/or Subcontractors. CNCA may evaluate Contractor in any manner which is permissible under the law. CNCA's evaluation may include, without limitation:

- 1) Requesting CNCA employee(s) evaluate Contractor and Contractor's employees and subcontractors and each of their performance.
- 2) Announced and unannounced observance of Contractor, Contractor's employee(s), and/or subcontractor(s).

XXIII. Entire Agreement/Changes or Alterations. This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement between the Parties and supersedes all prior discussions, negotiations, and agreements, whether oral or written. This Agreement may be amended or modified only by a written instrument executed by both Parties.

XXIV. Termination.

- 1) <u>For Cause</u>: **CNCA** may terminate this Agreement upon giving of written notice of intention to terminate for cause. Cause shall include:
 - a) material violation of this Agreement by Contractor;
 - b) any act by Contractor exposing CNCA to liability to others for personal injury or property damage; or
 - c) Contractor is adjudged a bankrupt, Contractor makes a general assignment for the benefit of creditors, or a receiver is appointed on account of Contractor's insolvency. If the expenses, fees, and/or costs to CNCA exceed the cost of providing the Mind Body Awareness Project pursuant to this Agreement, Contractor shall immediately pay the excess expense, fees, and/or costs to CNCA upon the receipt of CNCA's notice of these expenses, fees, and/or costs. The foregoing provisions are in addition to and not a limitation of any other rights or remedies available to CNCA.
- 2) <u>Without Cause by CNCA</u>: CNCA may, at any time, with or without reason, terminate this Agreement and compensate Contractor only for the Mind Body Awareness Project satisfactorily rendered to the date of termination. Written notice by CNCA shall be sufficient to stop further performance by Contractor. Notice shall be deemed given when received by the Contractor or no later than three days after the day of mailing, whichever is sooner.
 - a) Upon termination, **Contractor** shall provide **CNCA** with all documents produced, maintained, or collected by **Contractor** pursuant to this Agreement, whether such documents are final or draft documents.

XXV. Waiver. No delay or omission by CNCA in exercising any right under this Agreement shall operate as a waiver of that or any other right and no single or partial exercise of any right shall preclude CNCA from any or further exercise of any right or remedy.

XXVI. **Headings**. All section headings contained herein are for clarification and convenience of reference only and are not intended to limit the scope of any provision of the Agreement.

XXVII. Severability. In the event any portion of this Agreement shall be finally determined by any court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unenforceable, such provision shall be deemed void and the remainder of this Agreement shall continue in full force and effect.

XXVIII. **Ambiguity**. The parities to this Agreement, and each of them, hereby represent that the language contained herein is to be construed as jointly proposed and jointly accepted, and in the event of any subsequent determination of ambiguity, all parties shall be treated as equally responsible for such ambiguity.

XXIX. **Copyright**. Any written product produced as a result of this contract shall be a work for hire and shall be the property of **CNCA**.

XXX. Expenses. Contractor shall be responsible for all costs and expenses incident to the performance of services for CNCA, including but not limited to all costs of equipment provided by Contractor, all fees, fines, licenses, bonds and/or taxes required of or imposed against Contractor, and all other of Contractor's costs of doing business. CNCA shall be responsible for no expenses incurred by Contractor in performing services for CNCA except as provided by this Agreement.

XXXI. **Privacy, Security, and Confidentiality**. If, in the course of carrying out this Agreement, **Contractor** gathers or processes personal (private) information, **Contractor** shall manage the data in accordance with all applicable federal and California state privacy laws including, but not limited to: Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1984 (20 U.S.C. Sec. 1232g) and Children's Online Privacy Protection Act (COPPA), and California Education Code sections 49069 to 49079. Examples of personal information include, but are not limited to name, telephone number, email account, address, date of birth, social security number, and student assessment data.

In addition, the Parties shall demonstrate that they have taken specific steps to ensure that data are kept secure and confidential as evidenced by, at a minimum, the following:

- 1) Every employee, volunteer or other person with access to personal information shall sign a statement that they understand that the information is personal and they will take steps to ensure that unauthorized personnel do not gain access to personal data.
- 2) Personal data, while being transmitted electronically, shall be encrypted.
- 3) Any repository for the data shall be locked and have access restricted to those personnel that have a legitimate need to access the data and have signed a confidentiality agreement.
- 4) Any security breach shall be reported to CNCA in writing within 24 hours of discovery.

XXXII. **Department of Justice (DOJ) Fingerprinting and Tuberculosis (TB) Clearance. Contractor** agrees to adhere to the DOJ fingerprint and criminal background investigation and TB requirements of California Education Code sections 45125.1, et seq., and 49406 and provide an affidavit that certifies that all of its employees that work at CNCA campuses and come into contact with students have appropriate DOJ and TB clearances. Clearances must not be obtained at the expense of CNCA and CNCA shall not reimburse for these expenses. The affidavit must list the following:

- 1) Employee name and CNCA location(s) he/she services;
- 2) Date of criminal background check clearance;
- 3) TB expiration date; and
- 4) Name of Contractor's DOJ custodian of records.

Contractor's affidavit must be submitted with high authority per its Organizational Chart (i.e. Owner, Management Team, C-level executive, etc.). The affidavit must be provided to **CNCA** prior to the first day of service. Failure to provide this documentation shall be considered a material breach and can be used as grounds to terminate the contract immediately. **CNCA** may request updated documentation as needed. **Contractor** must take appropriate action to remove any employee whose arrest notification poses a threat to the school population to ensure the safety of **CNCA** students.

XXXIII. Independent Contractor Status. Contractor attests that it is engaged in a separately established bona fide business and is in fact an Independent Contractor in accordance with IRS and EDD requirements. Contractor

understands and agrees that it and all of its employees shall not be considered officers, employees, agents, partners, or joint ventures of **CNCA**, and are not entitled to benefits of any kind or nature normally provided employees of **CNCA** and/or to which **CNCA's** employees are normally entitled, including, but not limited to, State Unemployment Compensation or Worker's Compensation.

XXXIV. **Conflict Of Interest**. By signing this Agreement all parties acknowledge and assert that there is no known Conflict of Interest in the execution of this Agreement.

XXXV. **Commencement of Work**. Contractor is not authorized and will not commence any work of this Agreement and **CNCA** will not assume legal, financial or any other obligation for work performed prior to the issuance of an authorizing purchase orders with reference to this Agreement.

This Agreement, including attachments, constitutes the entire understanding of the parties and any changes or modifications shall be in writing and signed by both parties.



Memorandum of Understanding Camino Nuevo Charter Academy

MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING Between Camino Nuevo Charter Academy And Think Together, Inc.

The Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) that follows is a formal agreement between Camino Nuevo Charter Academy (herein referred to as CNCA) and Think Together to provide non-instructional day services for the 2023/24 school year. The goal of Think Together programs is to provide the highest quality expanded learning programming to students within the CNCA in an effort to help close the achievement gap.

SCOPE OF WORK

Think Together will provide non-instructional day services up to 200 students at both the Burlington (CNCA #1) and Castellanos (CNCA #3) campuses, a total of 400 students for an additional three hours per day above the non-instructional days funded through 21st Century Community Learning Centers services over 15 program days and up to nine hours per day over 15 program days. Think Together will assign 22 Program Leaders to deliver the services at a supervision ratio of not more than one staff member to 20 students (1:20). Each site will be supervised by a Site Coordinator, supported by an Assistant Site Coordinator. Think Together will pay for all field trip experiences and consumables supplies required to deliver the services. Think Together will apply a 15% administrative fee.

PRICING

CNCA shall pay to Think Together a fee of **\$347,916** (THREE HUNDRED FORTY-SEVEN THOUSAND, NINE HUNDRED SIXTEEN DOLLARS) to deliver the services describe above. Think Together shall invoice CNCA in three installments: the first on November 1, 2023, equal to 25% of the total fee, the second on March 1, 2024, equal to 25% of the total fee, and the third on May 1, 2024, equal to 50% of the total fee.

TERM

This MOU shall become effective immediately when signed by both parties and remain in effect until both parties have fulfilled all obligations of this MOU, but not later than June 30, 2024.

TERMINATION

Unless otherwise terminated as provided below, this MOU shall continue in force during the Term, or until the services provided for herein have been fully and completely performed, whichever shall occur first, and shall thereupon terminate.

If the CNCA makes a good faith, reasonable determination that Think Together is in default of its obligations under this MOU, CNCA must provide Think Together with a written request to cure the default. If the CNCA reasonably believes that the default has not been cured within thirty (30) days of such written request to cure, then the CNCA shall have the right to immediately terminate this MOU upon written notification to Think Together.

If at any time during the performance of this MOU the CNCA determines, at its sole discretion, to suspend indefinitely or abandon the work under this MOU, the CNCA shall have the right to terminate the performance of Think Together's services hereunder by giving thirty (30) days written notification to Think Together of its intention to terminate.

INDEMNIFICATION

Think Together shall indemnify, pay for the defense of, and hold harmless CNCA and its officers, agents, and employees of and from any and all liabilities, claims, debts, damages, demands, suits, actions, and causes of actions of whatsoever kind, nature or sort which may be incurred by reason of Think Together's negligent or willful acts and/or omissions in rendering any services hereunder. Think Together shall assume full responsibility for payments of federal, state and local taxes or contributions imposed or required under the social security, workers' compensation or income tax law, or any disability or unemployment law, or retirement contribution of any sort whatever, concerning Think Together or any employee of Think Together and shall further indemnify, pay for the defense of, and hold harmless CNCA of and from any such payment or liability arising out of or in any manner connected with Think Together's performance under this MOU.

The CNCA shall indemnify, pay for the defense of, and hold harmless Think Together and its officers, agents and employees of and from any and all liabilities, claims, debts, damages, demands, suits, actions, and causes of actions of whatsoever kind, nature or sort which may be incurred by reason of the CNCA's negligent or willful acts and/or omissions in relation to this MOU.

SUBCONTRACT AND ASSIGNMENT

Neither party shall assign its rights, duties, or privileges under this MOU, nor shall either party attempt to confer any of its rights, duties or privileges under this MOU on any third party, without the written consent of the other party.

INDEPENDENT CORPORATION STATUS

This MOU is by and between two independent entities and is not intended to and shall not be construed to create the relationship of agent, servant, employee, partnership, joint venture, or association.

CALIFORNIA LAW

This MOU shall be governed by and the rights, duties, and obligation of the parties shall be determined and enforced in accordance with the laws of the State of California.

AMENDMENT

This MOU may be amended only by written instrument signed by duly authorized representatives of the CNCA and Think Together.

SEVERABILITY

The invalidity in whole or in part of any provision of this MOU shall not void or affect the validity of any other provision of this MOU.

Context and Background

For decades, families with means have hired tutors when their children fall behind in school. 




Focus – High Dosage Tutoring

During the Spring of 2023, two twin issues occurred at Collegiate Charter School: 1. Low Interim Comprehensive Assessment (ICA) scores that reflected pandemic era achievement. 2. The Algebra II teacher who has most of the juniors, and thus the students testing for the CAASPP, went on family leave for eight weeks due to a personal emergency. During this time, Collegiate did something unique which was hiring a math tutor specifically charged with pulling students for high dosage small group tutoring. Based on ICA data, the tutor re-taught concepts (and at times, first taught) concepts to selected kids who were either "nearly met" on the ICA, or highly motivated to improve their math skills. The result was positive. A near 20 percent jump in students who met standard. This includes a nearly 60 point scale score jump of students that were pulled for tutoring.

(1) ICA January 2023: 2.2, CAASPP May 2023: 21.88

(2) ICA Scale Score January 2023: 2504, CAASPP Scale Score May 2023: 2535














Focus – curriculum implementation of standard aligned materials

CONTRACTOR AGREEMENT

This Math Education Contractor Agreement (this "<u>Agreement</u>") is made as of February 14, 2024, between Camino Nuevo Charter Academy (the "<u>Client</u>") located at 3435 W. Temple Street Los Angeles, CA 90026, and DR. NICK THE MATH GUY, LLC., a California S Corporation (the "<u>Contractor</u>") that Does Business As (DBA) in Los Angeles, California as "The Math Yogis." Located at 5103 Onaknoll Avenue, Los Angeles, CA 90043.

1. <u>Contractor Relationship</u>. During the Term (as defined below) of this Agreement, Contractor will provide the Client tutoring for enrolled students as agreed upon in **Exhibit A** (including any notes incorporated by reference) (hereinafter collectively "<u>Services</u>"). Contractor represents they have the qualifications, the experience and the ability to properly perform the Services. Contractor shall use his best efforts to perform the Services such that the results are satisfactory.

2. <u>Fees</u>. As consideration for the Services to be provided by Contractor and other obligations, Camino Nuevo Charter Academy shall pay the Contractor \$128,000 as specified in **Exhibit A**. Payment is due within thirty (30) days of invoice.

(a) *Term.* The term of this Agreement shall last for as long as is agreed upon between Client and Contractor and memorialized in **Exhibit A** (or any Contractor notes attached thereto).

(b) *Termination (Material Breach).* Either Party may terminate this Agreement with no further obligations to the other, by delivering written notice of termination to the other Party, only if there is a material breach of the terms herein, and such breach has not been cured within five (5) calendar days after written notice thereof.

(c) *Effect of Termination -Notwithstanding Contractor Refund & Cancellation Policy stated in Section 2.1*, after the termination of this Agreement or the expiration of the Term, the Client shall pay the Consultant for any portion of the Services that have been performed prior to the termination in accordance with Consultant's hourly rate stated in **Exhibit A**.

(b) *No Benefits.* Client acknowledges and agrees that Contractor and his Assistants shall not be eligible for any Dr. Nick the Math Guy LLC employee benefits and, to the extent Contractor otherwise would be eligible for any Dr. Nick employee benefits but for the express terms of this Agreement, Contractor (on behalf of himself and his employees) hereby expressly declines to participate in such Dr. Nick the Math Guy LLC. employee benefits.

(c) *Withholding; Indemnification.* Contractor shall have full responsibility for applicable withholding taxes for all compensation paid to Contractor or his Assistants under this Agreement, and for compliance with all applicable labor and employment requirements with respect to Contractor's self-employment, sole proprietorship or other form of business organization, and with respect to the Assistants, including state worker's compensation insurance coverage requirements and any U.S. immigration visa requirements. Contractor agrees to indemnify, defend and hold Dr. Nick harmless from any liability for, or assessment of, any claims or penalties with respect to such withholding taxes, labor or employment requirements, including any liability for, or assessment of, withholding taxes imposed on Dr. Nick by the relevant taxing authorities with respect to any compensation paid to Contractor or his Assistants.

7. **Supervision of Contractor's Services.** All of the services to be performed by Contractor, including but not limited to the Services, will be as agreed between Client and Dr. Nick the Math Guy LLC. Client will be required to report to Dr. Nick concerning the Services performed under this Agreement. The nature and frequency of these reports will be left to the discretion of both parties.

8. <u>Non-Circumvent</u>. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in this Agreement, Client agrees any transaction or disclose any trade secret information that will interfere with, or deprive The Contractor of the business opportunities disclosed pursuant to this Agreement.

9. **Confidential Information.** During the Term and for an indefinite period of time thereafter, all proprietary and confidential business, marketing, technical, and/or other information, disclosed to a Party (the "Receiving Party") by the other (the "Disclosing Party") hereunder, which the Receiving Party should reasonably have known to be confidential information at the time of disclosure or which is marked as "confidential" at the time of disclosure, or, if disclosed or obtained orally or visually (or otherwise in a non-written form), which was described by summary in writing or otherwise in a tangible form by the Disclosing Party as confidential and forwarded to the Receiving Party within thirty (30) days of such disclosure (collectively, "Confidential Information"), shall be deemed to be confidential and shall be treated as such by the Receiving Party and shall not be disclosed or used in all or in part by the Receiving Party to any third Person, except as expressly permitted by this Agreement and shall be used only for the purposes of this Agreement. The mutual obligations of confidentiality under this Section 9 shall not apply to any information to the extent that such information is:

- independently developed by such Party as documented by prior written records outside the scope and not in violation of this Agreement;
- legally in the public domain at the time of its receipt or thereafter legally becoming part of the public domain through no fault of the Receiving Party;
- received without an obligation of confidentiality from a Person having the right to disclose such information; or
- released from the restriction of this Section 9 by the expressed written consent of the Disclosing Party.

10. <u>Conflicts with this Agreement</u>. Contractor represents and warrants that neither Contractor nor any of his Assistants is under any pre-existing obligation in conflict or in any way inconsistent with the provisions of this Agreement. Contractor represents and warrants that Contractor's performance of all the terms of this Agreement will



not breach any agreement to keep in confidence proprietary information acquired by Contractor in confidence or in trust prior to commencement of this Agreement. Contractor warrants that Contractor has the right to disclose and/or or use all ideas, processes, techniques and other information, if any, which Contractor has gained from third parties, and which Contractor discloses to Dr. Nick or uses in the course of performance of this Agreement, without liability to such third parties. Notwithstanding the foregoing, Contractor agrees that Contractor shall not bundle with or incorporate into any deliveries provided to the Dr. Nick the Math Guy LLC. herewith any third-party products/rights, intellectual property, ideas, processes, or other techniques, without the express, written prior approval of Dr. Nick the Math Guy LLC. Contractor represents and warrants that Contractor has not granted and will not grant any rights or licenses to any intellectual property that would conflict with Contractor's obligations under this Agreement. Contractor will not knowingly infringe upon any copyright, trademark, trade secret, patent or other property right of Dr. Nick the Math Guy LLC., former employer or third party in the performance of the Services.

11. **Insurance**. Contractor shall, at its own expense, procure and maintain at all times it performs any portion of the tutoring.

a) *Commercial General Liability and Automobile Liability Insurance*. Commercial General Liability Insurance and Automobile Liability Insurance that shall protect **Contractor**, **Client**, and the State from all claims of bodily injury, property damage, personal injury, death, advertising injury, and medical payments. Commercial General Liability insurance shall include contractual liability, products liability, completed operations and broad form property damage coverage.

b) *Workers' Compensation and Employers' Liability Insurance*. Workers' Compensation Insurance and Employers' Liability Insurance for all of its employees performing any portion of the Tutoring. In accordance with provisions of section 3700 of the California Labor Code, **Contractor** shall be required to secure workers' compensation coverage for its employees.

c) *Professional Liability (Errors and Omissions) Insurance*. Professional Liability (Errors and Omissions) Insurance against loss due to error, omission or malpractice, unless waived in writing by **the client**.

d) *Sexual Abuse & Molestation Insurance*. Sexual Abuse & Molestation Insurance covering bodily injury, emotional distress, or mental anguish related to any claim, cause of action, or liability associated with child molestation or sexual abuse.

Limits of Insurance

i. *Commercial General Liability Insurance*: \$1,000,000 combined single limit per occurrence for bodily

injury, personal injury, and property damage; \$2,000,000 general aggregate.

ii. Workers' Compensation and Employers' Liability Insurance: Workers' compensation limits as required

by the Labor Code of the State of California and Employers Liability limits of \$1,000,000 per accident.

- iii. *Professional Liability (Errors and Omissions) Insurance*: \$1,000,000 single limit per claim; \$1,000,000 general aggregate.
- iv. *Sexual Abuse & Molestation Insurance*. \$1,000,000 per occurrence or unlawful act; \$3,000,000 general aggregate/policy limit



12. Miscellaneous.

(a) <u>Governing Law</u>. The validity, interpretation, construction and performance of this Agreement, and all acts and transactions pursuant hereto and the rights and obligations of the parties hereto shall be governed, construed and interpreted in accordance with the laws of the state of California, without giving effect to principles of conflicts of law.

(b) **Binding Mediation.** The Parties shall attempt in good faith to resolve any dispute arising under this Agreement. If the Parties are unable to resolve the dispute within a reasonable period, then the dispute shall be finally settled by binding mediation in Los Angeles, California in accordance with the Commercial Rules of the American Arbitration Association. The cost for mediation shall initially be split evenly among the parties. The mediation shall be conducted by one mediator appointed in accordance with said rules. The mediator shall apply California law to resolve any dispute. The award rendered by the mediator may include costs of mediation, reasonable attorneys' fees, and costs for witnesses. Judgment on the award rendered by the mediator may be entered in any court having jurisdiction thereof. Notwithstanding the foregoing, the Parties may apply to any court of competent jurisdiction for preliminary or interim equitable relief, or to compel mediation, in accordance with this paragraph, without breach of this mediation provision.

(c) <u>Entire Agreement</u>. This Agreement sets forth the entire agreement and understanding of the parties relating to the subject matter herein and supersedes all prior or contemporaneous discussions, understandings and agreements, whether oral or written, between them relating to the subject matter hereof.

(d) <u>Amendments and Waivers</u>. No modification of or amendment to this Agreement, nor <u>any</u> waiver of any rights under this Agreement, shall be effective unless in writing signed by the parties to this Agreement. No delay or failure to require performance of any provision of this Agreement shall constitute a waiver of that provision as to that or any other instance.

(e) <u>Successors and Assigns</u>. No party to this Agreement may assign, whether voluntarily or by operation of law, any of its rights and obligations under this Agreement, except with the prior written consent of the other party.

(f) **Notices.** Any notice, demand or request required or permitted to be given under this Agreement shall be in writing and shall be deemed sufficient when delivered personally or by overnight courier or sent by email, or 48 hours after being deposited in the U.S. mail as certified or registered mail with postage prepaid, addressed to the party to be notified at such party's address as set forth on the signature page, as subsequently modified by written notice, or if no address is specified on the signature page, at the most recent address set forth in the Contractor's records.

(g) <u>Severability</u>. If one or more provisions of this Agreement are held to be_unenforceable under applicable law, the parties agree to renegotiate such provision in good faith. In the event that the parties cannot reach a mutually agreeable and enforceable replacement for such provision, then (i) such provision shall be excluded from this Agreement, (ii) the balance of the Agreement shall be interpreted as if such provision were so excluded and (iii) the balance of the Agreement shall be enforceable in accordance with its terms.

(h) **Construction.** This Agreement is the result of negotiations between and has been reviewed by each of the parties hereto and their respective counsel, if any; accordingly, this Agreement shall be deemed to be the product of all of the parties hereto, and no ambiguity shall be construed in favor of or against any one of the parties hereto.



(i) <u>Counterparts</u>. This Agreement may be executed in any number of counterparts, each of which when so executed and delivered shall be deemed an original, and all of which together shall constitute one and the same agreement. Execution of a facsimile copy will have the same force and effect as execution of an original, and a facsimile signature will be deemed an original and valid signature.

(j) **Electronic Delivery.** The Parties agree to deliver any documents related to this Agreement or any notices required by applicable law by email or any other electronic means. The Parties hereby consent to (i) conduct business electronically; (ii) receive such documents and notices by such electronic delivery; and (iii) sign documents electronically and agrees to participate through an on-line or electronic system established and maintained by a third party mutually agreed to by the Parties.





Overall – We have enrolled 33 more newly enrolled students mid year than last year

BUR- Increased exits this year, but the demand remains high. We've been able to keep up with exits by extending offers to the waitlist. What's working: enrolling from the waitlist

KAY- Similar amount of new students as last year. We are aggressive about responding to new applications and continue to enroll on a rolling bases as space permits. Currently, we have 3 pending new students. What's working: 24/25 recruitment efforts, waitlist, community partnerships, densely populated neighborhood with families, and word of mouth

CAS- Enrollment is -13 lower than last year, but we have steadily been able to recruit new students to close the gap. We are currently 13 higher than the updated budget and have enrolled 14 more new students this year compared to last year. What's working: newcomers in the neighborhood, word of mouth from current families, and working the waitlist from other CNCA schools

EIS- Steady enrollment, less attrition, and less new spaces for new students.

DAL- Enrollment is 21 higher than last year. We have had more exits this year and 9 less newly enrolled students. Last year, we have a larger influx for 2nd semester; they did not stay long though. We have been enrolling when possible during the open semester periods. What's working: our 24/25 recruitment efforts

CIS- We have steadily been recruiting to close the enrollment gap (21 less than last year). We have been able to enroll 14 more students compared to last year) What's working: newcomers being referred, community partnerships, CNCA waitlists, and 24/25 recruitment efforts

- **BUR** increased interest in TK and 6th. Kinder being on-par is a good sign.
- **KAY** similar applications in most grades compared to last year. Larger increase in TK and 3rd grade applicants. Kinder being on-par is a good sign.
- CAS applications are 14 below compared to last year. Kinder has 12 less applicants. However, we have had 52 applicants only apply to CAS compared to 44 last year. Of the 66 total applicants – 55 listed CAS as their first choice compared to 56 last year. In the declining market, these are good signs, but we must increase Kinder and 1st grade applications in the spring and retain students in those grades.
- **EIS** –lower 6th grade applications (-12), but higher 7th and 8th grade applications from those on the current waitlist. While space is limited at EIS in 6th grade, we will continue to recruit to keep interest high for 23/24, 24/25, and the future. Overall, attrition was reduce by ½ this year!
- CIS while CIS applications are the same as last year, the interest depends on the grade. TK applications are lower, 10 vs 16. However, the same number of TK applicants (6) applied only to CIS. Kinder applications are lower, 20 vs 26. Middle school applications are higher. We will continue to heavily recruit in innovated ways to increase TK and Kinder applications when mapping, our TK and Kinder students and applications are mostly coming from near BUR not CIS people are traveling further
- **DAL** increase in 9th grade applications
- Lottery Details- We are hosting public lotteries on 2/9 at BUR, KAY, EIS, and DAL. All applicants from CIS and CAS will receive an offer on 2/9

CAMINO NUEVO CHARTER ACADEMY Financial Analysis December 2023

Net Income

Camino Nuevo Charter Academy is projected to achieve a net income of \$1.38M in FY23-24 compared to \$417K in the revised board approved budget. Reasons for this positive \$967K variance are explained below in the Income Statement section of this analysis.

Balance Sheet

As of December 31, 2023, the school's cash balance was \$29.67M. By June 30, 2024, the school's cash balance is projected to be \$21.36M, which represents a 33% reserve. There is a \$2.5M dip in projected cash as compared to the budget due to a correction in the ELOP funding receipt formula that had caused the projected deferred revenue and cash to be overstated. There is no net income effect to this correction.

As of December 31, 2023, the Accounts Receivable balance was \$896K, down from \$909K in the previous month, due to the receipt of revenue earned in FY22-23.

As of December 31, 2023, the Accounts Payable balance, including payroll liabilities, totaled \$1.97M, compared to \$1.94M in the prior month.

As of December 31, 2023, CNCA had a debt balance of \$9.64M. An additional \$203K will be paid this fiscal year. This debt is related to Prop 55/Kayne Siart construction loan.

Income Statement

Revenue

Total revenue for FY23-24 is projected to be \$67.36M, which is \$522K or 0.8% over budgeted revenue of \$66.84M.

Interest & Dividend Income (8660) \$349K increase in interest revenue based on most recent LACOE interest distributions. This includes a \$243K adjustment to FY22-23.

SELPA Grants (8698) \$109K increase in SELPA grants revenue based on round one allocations awarded to each charter.

Expenses

Total expenses for FY23-24 are projected to be \$65.97M, which is \$445K or 0.7% under budgeted expenditures of \$66.42M.

Teachers' Salaries - Stipend/Extra Duty (1175) \$105K under budget as the semi-annual stipends came in lower than expected.

Health & Welfare expense is H&W - Health & Welfare (3401) \$444K under budget based on employee elections during open enrollment.

This report will discuss revenue and expenditure variances from the Board-approved budget that are above \$75,000 and 10%.



Non Capitalized Equipment (4411) \$127K over budget largely due to a budgeted furniture purchase at the Dalzell Lance campus which did not meet the capitalization threshold.

Contracted Substitute Teachers (5841) \$176K over budget as a result of teacher vacancies or being absent.

ADA

Budgeted P2 ADA is 2,771.37 based on enrollment of 3,001 and a 92.2% attendance rate.

Forecast P2 ADA is 2,774.99 based on enrollment of 3,004 and a 92.7% attendance rate.

Actual ADA through Month 5 is 2,768.27 with ending enrollment of 3,004 and a 92.7% attendance rate.

In Month 5, ADA was 2,747.63 with a 91.6% attendance rate.













ROLES AND RESPONSIBILITIES

Independent charter schools are run by nonprofit corporations:

 Board of Directors is the governing body with legal responsibility for the charter school.

BOARD'S ROLE

- Board ensures long-term viability of the organization
 - O Ultimately responsible for the overall health and performance of the school
- Board monitors school's performance and other data to inform its decisions
- Board hires, evaluates, and compensates CEO

TYPICAL ROLES AND RESPONSIBILITIES

Board Approves "The Big Stuff":

- Annual budget
- LCAP
- Major contracts (leases, loans)
- Reviews and monitors financial policies and procedures, budget, and finances to inform and evaluate resource allocation
- Hires and evaluates CEO

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CEO (Management)

- In charge of day-to-day operations
- Selection of all other staff

BROWN ACT (OPEN MEETING LAW)

Holding Meetings

- Boards take action at "meetings"
- What is a "meeting"?
 - "Any congregation of a majority of the members of a legislative body ... to hear, discuss, or deliberate, or take action on any item." You may not, "outside a meeting ... use a series of communications ... directly or through intermediaries, to discuss, deliberate, or take action" (Gov. Code sec. 54952.2)
- Avoid inadvertent serial meetings through email or text communications.

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BOARD COMMITTEE MEETINGS

Brown Act applies to committees created by board, even if just advisory:

- Applies to "standing" board committees (e.g., finance committee)
- "Ad hoc" committees exempt

TIP: Brown Act does not apply to non-board "committees". The CEO may set up their own advisory teams, which can also inform and ultimately advise the Board.

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About Committees

- Committees exercising the authority of the board
- Other committees

HOLDING MEETINGS

Brown Act "types" of meetings

- "Regular" meetings require 72 hours posting of notice
- "Special" meetings require 24 hours notice
- What about an "emergency"?
- Teleconferencing
 - Non-emergency "standard" teleconferencing (the same rules we've had for years)
 - Quorum must be physically present in Los Angeles County
 - The new AB 2449 special rule for personal emergencies and "just cause"
 - Complicated and cumbersome

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HOLDING MEETINGS

Brown Act limits meeting to posted agenda:

- Brief general description of business to be transacted (20 words or less)
- Post in publicly accessible place at/near location
- Adding items to regular agenda

Must post agenda on website:

Record how members vote

TIP: If you miss 72-hour posting deadline to include an item on regular agenda, you can still post a special meeting agenda with 24 hours notice for same time and place.

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SB 126 RULES REGARDING MEETING LOCATIONS AND MULTI-SITE TELECONFERENCING

- SB126 imposes additional rules as part of Ed. Code for charters only —not actually part of the Brown Act
- Meeting location requirements vary depending on number of school sites and counties you operate in
- Does not apply to committees

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WHEN IS IT <u>NOT</u> A "MEETING"?

- Limited exceptions to open meeting rules (i.e., not a "meeting"):
 - Conference or public gathering that involves a discussion of issues of general interest (e.g., CCSA annual conference)*
 - Open community meeting or another agency's public meeting*
 - Social or ceremonial occasions (e.g., commencement or holiday party)*
- What about annual board retreat, strategic planning sessions, board study sessions?
 - These are all "meetings"

*So long as the directors do not discuss agency/school business amongst themselves.

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HOLDING MEETINGS-CLOSED SESSION

Brown Act limits "closed" sessions:

- Limited
- Statutory basis must be identified in agenda, such as...
 - Litigation (identify matter)
 - Personnel evaluation, termination (identify position)
 - Real estate negotiations (identify property and negotiators)
- Stick to the closed session topic
 - Don't stray into topics that should be discussed in open session
 - No compensation votes in closed session

HOLDING MEETINGS

Rights of Public:

- Speak <u>before</u> action taken on any item (including closed session)
- Publicly accessible location (with disabled access)
- Public comment can (and should) be time-limited
- At regular meeting to address board on something not on agenda
- Disruptive attendees
