#### A. School Performance Committee

Tori reported the following items were reviewed by the committee:

- School enrollment trends and concerns.
- NWEA testing requirement vs. waiver decision. If state cannot provide growth data from its through-year assessments, the commission may need to require NWEA testing. If the state data does provide reliable growth data, a NWEA waiver may be granted. The state results will be available soon to assess if the growth data is reliable.
- Mission/Vision/Values suggestions.

#### **B.** Finance Committee

Brian reported the following items were reviewed by the committee:

- Financial management accounting matters for all schools.
- · School budget planning and construction updates.
- Cancellation of the July Committee meeting.
- Commission Spending Dashboard review.

Joe commented he was pleased to see an increase in the low-risk scores for schools which reduces the number of high-risk scores indicating schools are getting better financial traction.

#### C. Executive Committee

The Executive Committee meeting was cancelled in June due to attendance and no pressing issues to discuss this month.

#### D. Ad-Hoc Nomination Committee

Tori and Brian proposed that Norm and Leigh continue as Chair and Vice Chair of the Commission.

Norm outlined his vision of the Commission's role next year as follows:

- To continue work aligning the Commission's vision, mission and values.
- To ensure commission support and resources for the team.
- To foster development of new Charter School opportunities.
- To develop a marketing campaign that educates the public and political environment about charter schools value.
- To ensure the effective transfer of leadership.

Walter Wallace from the Maine Connections Academy shared that a recent graduate was featured in a recent Portland Press Herald Article about 10 students to watch from the 2024 graduating classes in the Southern Maine area.

Sherry Gilbert spoke positively about the Maine Arts Academy graduation that included performances from all programs.

#### **VI. Presentations**

#### A. Joe Mattos - President of Maine Alliance of Public Charter Schools

Joe Mattos provided an overview of the Maine Alliance of Public Charter Schools ("MAPCS") leadership and recent activity and discussed their new website (www.mapcs.net) with information about charter schools that parents can use as a resource.

He announced the September 1, 2024, hiring of a part time Executive Director is in the works for communication, marketing, aggregation of programming, etc.

#### VII. Executive Director/Commission Staff Report

#### A. School Updates

Maine Virtual Academy will be running a six-week summer session with expanded offerings.

Fiddlehead - Angus King visited an eighth-grade classroom to talk about government and decision making.

MeANS received a grant from GEAR UP Maine RISE.

Maine Arts Academy graduating students received \$617,000 in scholarships this year and performed 28 times in the community this past year.

Lana congratulated all of the graduates this year.

#### **B.** Organizational Updates

Lana reported the following:

- Thanks to ELC for hosting the Commission.
- A School Board Professional Development session was held on May 15th in Augusta. The topic was setting strong long and short-term goals and was facilitated by Naomi DeVeaux from the National Charter Schools Institute. Eight of nine Boards were represented and gave positive feedback.
- Reviewed the Heat-Map of Maine Charter School Students hometowns.
- End of Year School Visits are scheduled for each school where visits are required.
- Panorama Survey is closing this week and results will be shared at the next meeting.
- School Renewal visits for MVA and ELC have taken place. The Year 4 performance report will be available this summer. Focus Group and Public Hearings will be held prior to the Commission vote for renewal in October.
- New School applications On July 1, the Letter of Intent to open a new charter school will be released publicly on our website. The Letter of Intent to apply filing deadline is July 15 and is required in order to submit an application in February.
- Thank you to Commission for drafting the new mission/vision/and values statements.

Eight Teachers Will Continue Through the Teacher of the Year Process



Augusta, ME–Eight Maine teachers were announced today as the state semifinalists for the 2025 Maine Teacher of the Year. These inspiring educators, members of the 2024 County Teacher of the Year cohort, embody the dedication, innovation, and leadership synonymous with Maine's exceptional classroom teachers. As ambassadors for their students, colleagues, and school communities, their selection acknowledges their excellence in teaching and celebrates the collective achievements and commitment of the entire teaching profession in Maine.

"I'm so inspired by the extraordinary work you do each and every day on behalf of your students, schools, and communities. Thank you for stepping up to represent Maine teachers as County Teachers of the Year and now as Teacher of the Year Semifinalists."

"We are thrilled to recognize these outstanding educators who exemplify the passion and dedication that define Maine's teaching community," said Educate Maine Executive Director Jason Judd. "Their commitment to student success and innovation in the classroom is truly commendable. We look forward to the next phases of the selection process and the announcement of the 2025 Maine Teacher of the Year."

The selection process for the Maine Teacher of the Year Program is rigorous and reflective, designed by educators to offer candidates an opportunity to reflect on their instructional practice. Each educator was nominated in January by a member of their community for their commitment to their students and exemplary service in education. They first participated in the County Selection Process, where a distinguished panel of teachers, principals, and business community members selected them as a County Teacher of the Year from among hundreds of nominees. In May, they embarked on the state Teacher of the Year process, showcasing their instructional practices through a classroom video and written reflection.

In the next phase of the selection process, the semifinalists will deliver keynote speeches, submit professional portfolios, and participate in an expert panel discussion on educational equity, teacher leadership, and education policy. The state finalists will be announced in September, and the 2025 Maine Teacher of the Year will be revealed in October. The 2025 Maine Teacher of the Year will serve as an ambassador for the teaching profession and represent Maine in the National Teacher of the Year program.

The Maine Teacher of the Year program is administered by Educate Maine through a unique partnership with the Maine Department of Education with support from the <u>Maine</u> <u>County and State Teacher of the Year Association</u> (MCSTOYA) and the <u>Maine State Board</u> <u>of Education</u>. Funding for the program is generously provided by Bangor Savings Bank, Dead River, Geiger, Hannaford, Maine Lottery, the Silvernail Family, and Unum.

AUGUSTA — Maine Arts Academy recently completed the 2023-24 school year in its new building.

This is the school's 8th year of operation, serving 240 students grades 9-12. Students performed 26 times in various communities, at venues like downtown Augusta, the Maine Veterans Home, The Buker Center in collaboration with Augusta Adult and Community Education, Colby College Break, Build, Burn and "Of This Place," The University of Maine at Augusta, The University of Maine at Orono, Kennebec Valley Coaching and several performances in the school's new location.

Maine Arts Academy received a \$100,000 COPS Safety grant and \$54,000 from the Department of Education for the Maine Outdoor Learning Initiative. The senior class, with 56 graduates, received over \$250,000 in scholarship funds this year from colleges and universities.

## Dawson White achieves Eagle Scout rank

Dawson James White, 18, of Sidney, was presented with Scouting's highest rank, the Eagle Scout, during a ceremony at the Augusta Elks, on January 6, 2024, which capped off an eleven-year Scouting career. "I learned so much in Scouting," White said. "I learned survival skills, people skills and how to be a decent person in Scouting."

"This is an occasion for pride and joy, as well as a time for serious reflection," said former Troop #401 Scoutmaster Ryan Poulin, who served as Master of Ceremonies.

"The Eagle Scout rank is the highest recognition Scouting offers a Scout. It is earned through the advancement program, and only a small percentage of youth who begin in Scouting are recognized with this honor. In full awareness of the challenge of these times, the parents and leaders of this Eagle Scout have labored long and faithfully to develop him to be alert and to participate in citizenship through the Scouting program. His efforts culminate today in the presentation of the Eagle Scout Badge. The success of these efforts will become evident in the way this Eagle Scout will set his social pattern for all the lives he may touch. Democracy is a fresh conquest for each generation."

Dawson, who lives in Sidney, is now a Junior Assistant Scoutmaster in Troop #401 and will become an Assistant Scoutmaster after he turns 21. He graduated from the Maine Virtual Academy and is working full time at Rainbow Valley Dairy Farm. He said he had many great experiences in Scouting. He enjoyed the Troop's trip to Gettysburg, camping at Camp Bomazeen, the West Point Camporee, and overnights aboard the USS Massachusetts (BB-59) in Battleship Cove in Fall River, Massachusetts. "I built a bunker gear dryer for the Sidney fire department's turnout gear so it will take a day instead of a week to dry and built shelving for above their new extractor which is an industrial washing machine. They also had a six inch ledge that had no safety marker on it so we did that," Dawson said of his Eagle Scout project that benefited the Sidney Volunteer Fire Department. Overall, 80 hours of volunteer work were spent on the project. "I know several people who are firemen and was really happy to help out."

Troop #401 Committee Chairman Andy Steinberger said, "To a Scout, bravery means not only the courage to face physical danger, but the determination to stand up for what is right. While trusting in God with faith in his fellow citizens, he looks forward to each day, seeking his share of the world's work."

The Eagle Scout medal was pinned to his uniform by his mother and Dawson in turn presented pins to his parents Darin and Sarah White.

Although Ben Schmidt has Olympic dreams someday, he and his family are taking it one jump at a time.

"We don't want to try and say, 'You're going to be an Olympian,' let's focus on this year this season, this competition," Tony Schmidt said. "As long as he's enjoying it, we're going to be there for him and supporting him."

#### Maine Arts Academy is building out new campus, expanding programs and enrollment

After moving a year ago to Augusta and into a new home, the Maine Arts Academy is now outfitting it with a new dance studio and performance hall.

The hall will seat about 200 and perhaps as many as 250, Heather King, the head of schools, told Mainebiz.

"We are adding a stage and opening up the ceiling," she said. "We've taken walls down on each side to create a space that is roughly 4,000 square feet."

The contractor is Boucher Builders LLC in Windsor. The engineer overseeing the project is Criterium Engineers in Freeport. WBRC Inc., an architectural firm in Bangor and Portland, designed the spaces.

Features in the dance studio will include Marley flooring, a specialized vinyl surface often used in dance. There will be new mirrors along the walls and an accessible door, and the ceilings will be lifted slightly.

In the auditorium, there will be a stage with the ceiling lifted substantially above the stage for lighting, along with a sound and lighting booth for performances.

The charter school for the arts moved into 310 Cony Road in June 2023 and began the school year two months later.

The building, a former Maine Veterans' Homes site, <u>is about six times larger</u> than the academy's previous 12,000-square-foot location at 11 Goldenrod in Sidney.

By contrast, 310 Cony Road, purchased for \$3.25 million, is 69,615-square-foot building on nine acres.

USDA Rural Development provided a direct loan and a loan guarantee to Kennebec Savings Bank to make possible the school's purchase.

USDA Rural Development staff, include COO Roger Glendenning, recently visited the campus to see how the funding worked on the ground.

"When touring the new facility with Heather and her team, I could envision the potential it has for students involved in dance, music, visual and other creative arts," Glendenning said. "How exciting to know this school will now have the capacity to expand and grow into the future."

Established in 2016, the school for grades 9 through 12 offers studies in dance, music, theater, visual arts and film, as well as English, math, science, social studies and world languages.

Charter schools in Maine are publicly funded schools through the state, but do not receive local tax support. They rely on state money, grants and donations.

"Our enrollment has increased every year since we have been open," said King. "We are hoping for 250 to 260 students this upcoming year."

The school is seeking approval to add a middle school.

"If we get approved, we will open it in the fall of 2025 with 7th and 8th grade," she said. Meanwhile, additional bus stops are bringing students from farther away.

"We have students coming from Westbrook, Newport, Mechanic Falls and as far east as Bucksport," King said.

She expects that the larger space will benefit the school's theater, music, dance and visual arts departments, as well as the public.

"This space will also support other community endeavors," she added.

For example, the local Colonial Theater held a dinner theater in the building this past spring and is using the building for rehearsals until the company's own theater is complete in downtown Augusta.

"Pineland Suzuki School's Orchestra will be using our building as well," King said. "We have driver's education in the building, and Healthy Communities of the Capital Area and Indigo Arts Alliance out of Portland have both been working on projects with us that highlight the arts and social issues.

"Having a larger space will not only benefit our students but will benefit community partnerships."

High school learners will engage in hybrid learning, which will include in-person, online, and place-based experiences aligned to Maine's diploma requirements and recently adopted economic development priorities. All graduates will earn career- and college-relevant credentials and credits, alongside the networks and plans needed to activate them. This will be supported by strategic resource sharing across the network, including the development of a robust nonprofit, early college, and workforce partner ecosystem.

MICS will use the International Baccalaureate programs: both the Diploma Programme and Career Programme for grades 11-12, preceded by the Middle Years Programme (MYP) for grades 9-10. There will be individualized instruction and flexible promotion, so that students who are able to graduate with two years of college credit (i.e., an Early College program) have the courses and assessments to do so. While MICS will not be affiliated with an ESP, it will collaborate with PlanetLabs.Earth (a non-profit education provider based in Maine) to develop a separate private school co-located and co-operated with MICS. This sister school -- operated like many private schools that provide public education in Maine (e.g. George Stevens Academy) -- will primarily target out-of-state and international students. We may also collaborate with Unity Environmental University for online instruction, especially in the CP courses, and for apprenticeship placements.
