

RIGOR & RESULTS




Spotlight on Navigator Schools: Innovation in Action

LAUNCH AND EXPANSION OF NAVI IMPACT




THE HEART OF NAVIGATOR SCHOOLS

To support their development, we provide extensive coaching and collaborative opportunities to ensure they continuously evolve and refine their teaching practices. Teachers at Navigator receive ongoing support to develop a deep understanding of the academic standards for their grade level and content area. At least four times a year, our educators collaborate with colleagues across the network, as well as with Navigator's data analyst and curriculum specialist, to refine and update instructional materials, ensuring the highest quality of learning.

In addition to these collaborative planning sessions, our staff receive weekly coaching and professional development, empowering them to implement the best practices in the classroom. This robust support system is key to the continued growth of both our staff and students.



We are proud to share that our commitment to supporting our educators has resulted in an impressive 90.5% retention rate. This speaks to the strong community we have built at Navigator, where teachers are valued, equipped, and inspired to bring their best to every student, every day.

1. Understanding Your Role as a Board Advocate

As a board member, you are:

- A steward who helps nurture and recognize relationships with current and prospective supporters.

2. Key Messages: How to Talk About Navigator

Mission Statement

Navigator Schools equips students to be learners and leaders in high school, college, and beyond by developing top-tier educators and delivering phenomenal academic outcomes for all students.

- Offer: "You should meet our Development Team. They can share more about what we're working on."
- Send a warm email or schedule a quick coffee or Zoom intro
- Loop us in early—we'll handle the follow-up and the ask if it's appropriate

5. Talking Points: Navigator Schools Enrichment Fund (NSEF)

- NSEF supports academic enrichment, afterschool STEM programs, and basic needs like food and transportation
- Focuses on multilingual learners and economically disadvantaged students
- Designed to close the opportunity gap and increase equity in learning
- Donor investment fuels both classroom impact and broader community stability

8. FAQs & Handling Donor Conversations

Q: Is my donation tax-deductible?

A: Yes, Navigator Schools is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit. Donations are tax-deductible to the extent allowed by law.

Q: How do donations get used?

A: Donations support scholarships, enrichment, student support programs, and educator development.

Q: Can I designate where my donation goes?

A: Absolutely. Donors can choose to support specific programs like NSEF, teacher training, or site-based initiatives.

Q: How do I introduce someone to Navigator?

A: Just loop in the Development Team—we'll take it from there. We're happy to schedule tours, one-on-one meetings, or Zooms.
