#### Maria Gibson- Grades 1&2

Our morning meetings are discussing citizenship as well as working on our daily practices of place values and vocabulary words. The ELA centers are choral reading with Ms. B reading non-fiction and fiction books including Big Ben and Westminster Palace. Group 3 in the writing center with Ms. Brinks continues our creative writing paragraphs with a topic sentence and 3 detailed sentences. Phonological awareness with me is moving onto initial and final S blends.

In the Wit & Wisdom curriculum we are enjoying A Season of Change Module. We have read *Why Do Trees Change Color?* and *Sky Tree*. These books combine the academic language of science and weather with the story elements.

We are moving through the Bridges math curriculum at a good rate and are now on Unit 5. First Grade students are working on Geometry. 2D and 3D shapes and their attributes which is such a fun subject. Second Grade students are using place value to problem solve.

In social studies we are looking at Social and Emotional Concepts. How doing the right thing affects you and others. In science we are looking at erosion and earth surfaces and where rivers begin and end. Art occurs every Thursday. We have used watercolors, made puppets and this week we are using glitter!! The handwriting workshop is continuing to improve our writing skills and letter formation.

Students have worked for months on earning a class party by filling a jar with rice given for exceptional transitions, and outstanding behavior. The party is scheduled for December 17, the day before winter break.

Students are developing essay-writing skills. Our last essay was an opinion essay on their favorite part of the book, Moonshot, and why. We will be writing another essay soon regarding our current book, One Giant Leap, by Robert Burleigh.

We are learning multiple techniques for multiplying large numbers by a single digit, including the standard algorithm. We will soon be addressing multiplying two digit numbers by two digit numbers using the same strategies.

## Dani Krebs- Grade 5&6

Hello board. Happy holidays!

This has been a very enjoyable year for us so far. We are learning about Native American tribes from the past and today, and how the students can relate to them. In math the 5th graders are learning about fractions and how to divide and simplify, and the 6th graders are learning about making good deals!

We have been studying a word of the week all year now from REACH, and we have circled back to the beginning. Our word right now is empathy. We are delving further into what empathy means, and how we can all be empathetic all the time. Empathy is a hard one, because when we are having a hard day it is hard to be empathetic to others. But, I believe that the class is getting there.

The students can win different things at the Osprey Auction, and one of the big ticket items are the movie day passes. The first student chose the original Jumanji movie, and the second student has chosen Spiderman: Into the Spiderverse. The students all love these different options they can win, because they do not always like the items available to them.

I have been thinking of planning a field trip, but I haven't had any nailed down yet. I am hoping to plan one in the next couple of months.

# **Operations and Financial Status**

# **Summary:**


According to the Balance Sheet Detail as of November 30, 2021 (attached):

- Cash in Bank: \$136,313
- Cash in County Treasury Account: \$1,130,850
- Cash in Booster Club Account: \$17,331
- Total Liabilities and Net Assets: \$1,289,426
- Accounts Receivables: \$4,931 (Due from Grantor Governments)
- Accounts Payable: \$3,843 (Due to vendors, STRS, Grantor Governments)
- Year to Date Net Gain (Loss): \$33,074

#### **Notes:**

- These numbers and the attached Balance Sheet Detail are as of November 30, 2021
- Reviewing the Actual to Budget Detail:
  - Revenue is down from expected by \$136,672 or 26%. As with October, none of the expected revenue from November has been posted yet. I don't know whether this is a CharterVision issue or an issue of MCOE not reporting the revenue to CharterVision, but would be worth checking on.
  - o Personnel Expenses are down from expected by \$23,669 or 9.5% of expected
  - o Operating Expenses down from expected by \$18,753 or 12.5%
  - o Resulting in a net gain of \$33,074
- We will be approving the First Interim Budget Report later on in the meeting so discussion on the Budget can wait until then.
- On Friday, December 3, Kim Morgan called me on the telephone with an issue regarding a deadline for the PTN See's Candy fundraiser. The order costing \$5,986.19 needed to be placed that day via the school's Visa card, but the amount exceeded the discretionary threshold of \$5,000 that Board Policy gives the Director. Reasoning that this was a credit card debit obligation, not transferring any funds out of TRCS accounts, that the PTN account had adequate funds to cover the amount and that it would be covered Monday, I concurred with Kim that this was a reasonable and acceptable action. CharterVision gives no way to track deposits, so I am assuming that transfer was made.
- We are continuing to gather information in preparation for negotiating a long-term lease
  with significant facilities upgrades, which may consume a large chunk of our Capital
  fund. The Facilities Committee will have an update on the status of that project in Closed
  Session.



# Educator Effectiveness Block Grant Plan Summary 2021 - 2026

Local Educational Agencies and State Special Schools that receive funding pursuant to California *Education Code (EC)* Section 41480(a) are required to develop and adopt a plan, by December 30, 2021, that delineates the expenditure of funds apportioned including the professional development of teachers, administrators, paraprofessionals and classified staff. The plan shall be presented in a public meeting of the governing board before its adoption in a subsequent meeting.

Funds may be used to support professional learning for certificated teachers, administrators, paraprofessional educators and certification staff with a focus on any of the ten areas included in *EC* 41480(b). Funds are subject to annual audit.

#### The ten areas are:

- (1) Coaching and mentoring of staff serving in an instructional setting and beginning teacher or administrator induction, including, but not limited to, coaching and mentoring solutions that address a local need for teachers that can serve all pupil populations with a focus on retaining teachers, and offering structured feedback and coaching systems organized around social-emotional learning, including, but not limited to, promoting teacher self-awareness, self-management, social awareness, relationships, and responsible decision making skills, improving teacher attitudes and beliefs about one's self and others, and supporting learning communities for educators to engage in a meaningful classroom teaching experience.
- (2) Programs that lead to effective, standards-aligned instruction and improve instruction in literacy across all subject areas, including English language arts, history-social science, science, technology, engineering, mathematics, and computer science.
- (3) Practices and strategies that reengage pupils and lead to accelerated learning.
- (4) Strategies to implement social-emotional learning, trauma-informed practices, suicide prevention, access to mental health services, and other approaches that improve pupil well-being.
- (5) Practices to create a positive school climate, including, but not limited to, restorative justice, training around implicit bias, providing positive behavioral supports, multitiered systems of support, transforming a schoolsite's culture to one that values diverse cultural and ethnic backgrounds, and preventing discrimination, harassment, bullying, and intimidation based on actual or perceived characteristics, including disability, gender, gender identity, gender expression, language, nationality, race or ethnicity, religion, or sexual orientation.

- (6) Strategies to improve inclusive practices, including, but not limited to, universal design for learning, best practices for early identification, and development of individualized education programs for individuals with exceptional needs.
- (7) Instruction and education to support implementing effective language acquisition programs for English learners, which may include integrated language development within and across content areas, and building and strengthening capacity to increase bilingual and biliterate proficiency.
- (8) New professional learning networks for educators not already engaged in an education-related professional learning network to support the requirements of subdivision (c).
- (9) Instruction, education, and strategies to incorporate ethnic studies curricula adopted pursuant to Section 51226.7 into pupil instruction for grades 7 to 12, inclusive.
- (10) Instruction, education, and strategies for certificated and classified educators in early childhood education, or childhood development.

Three Rivers Charter School is a small, first through eighth grade charter school with an enrollment of about 100 students. It has 4 multi-graded classrooms (1-2, 3-4, 5-6, and 7-8.) We have an instructional aide in every classroom with a credentialed teacher. We pride ourselves on providing instruction and an educational program that addresses the "whole" child. We are just as interested in a child living a happy, well-rounded life as a child that is academically strong. We develop programs that address individual students and we stress our REACH values which are; respect, empathy, achievement, citizenship, and hardwork. We have developed and maintain a Multi-Tier Student Support System (MTSS) which provides social-emotional support and academic support.

We have been very successful in raising our testing scores. We have aligned our demographics better with our authorizing district and we have a significantly low suspension and expulsion rate. We are also seeing students leaving our school with high values and a strong sense of who they are. We enjoy a positive reputation with our community.

We presented to the group at our meeting on November 12, 2020 and goals and actions were discussed. The LCAP was again discussed at our February 25, 2021 meeting. Previous goals and actions were reviewed and we engaged in a process to solicit ideas and input. Post it notes were distributed around the room and a poster hung on the wall for stakeholders to post their ideas, suggestions and thoughts about the LCAP. An LCAP Workshop was then held and stakeholder discussed the ideas shared in more detail and offered more input. Invitations for stakeholders to attend PTN meetings and the LCAP Workshop are promoted in the Directors email bulletins to families, on the marquee on the front of the school building, in teacher newsletters to families, on the school Facebook page and with flyers.
- 2. Staff input was gathered in several ways. The LCAP Goals were shared at a weekly staff meeting and teachers gave input. All staff, certificated and classified received a survey over email and in paper form. The survey shared the LCAP goals and actions and provided space for staff to share what they think is going well, improvements they see, suggestions they would like to offer and suggestions they have. Additionally, all staff is invited to be part of the PTN.
- 3. LCAP Goals were shared and discussed with the TRCS Board of Directors in a meeting on 9/15/20, 2/23/21 and 4/20/21.

#### A summary of the feedback provided by specific stakeholder groups.

Most of the stakeholders are fine with the plan and programs we are currently working on. There was very little change suggested or asked for, so we will continue with the plan and enhance the programs as appropriate. Many of our programs are being impacted by the pandemic, so we will continue with them as we can. Support for our families have been enhanced because of the pandemic and we are more active in providing food support, clothing and rental support, and technology support.

#### A description of the aspects of the LCAP that were influenced by specific stakeholder input.

As mentioned above, family needs for support for various programs has changed because of the pandemic. Because access to our campus is restricted, many of our programs have been limited. during the 21-22 school year, restrictions and guidelines put out by the Public Health Departments, the CDE and the needs of our families will determine how many of our programs will be shaped. That will continue to unfold over the next several months. The Board and community members present at the last Board meeting also requested a sports related program be put into the LCAP for next year.
