If you can't run, then walk,


If you can't walk, then crawl,

Keep moving forward and accomplishing greatness! Congratulations, class of 2020!






Online Scholars' Work Samples & Learning Labs


Scholars have been working hard this semester and using their focused notes to be successful in their courses. Oney F. shared his focused notes for geometry.

- You should expect to work about 50 hours or more a week




During Sociology class, scholars researched the demographics and information for the city in which they live. In this project, Tevan H. shared about his town of Victorville.

Little Red Tortoise's Actions and Interaction




Scholars in a government learning lab shared what they learned regarding government procedures and protocol. Here they review the reasons for a president to be removed from office.




Scholars participated in an Iron Chef lesson and eighth graders practice a math lesson.

Meet Sean M., Graduating Senior

We are shining a spotlight on graduating senior, Sean M. Sean's father shares with us about his son's experience at Compass.

My son Sean has always been inquisitive, and when his brick-and-mortar school teacher in the sixth grade complained to me about Sean asking too many questions during class, we decided that it might be worth trying an online school. At Compass, he has been able to learn at his own pace and research any question he has, any time he likes.

My wife and I were amazed at how his knowledge and skills began to flourish in the first year, and for all of the following years at Compass. Sean has had an excellent education and enjoys learning. He wants to become a high school history teacher, as well as maintain the option of working in water services operations. Sean has been a volunteer with the City of Anaheim Water Department for five years, picking up trash on the hiking trail at the Walnut Canyon Reservoir, and he has learned a lot about water distribution systems.

A typical school day for Sean consists of eating an early breakfast, logging onto Compass online school between 7-8 am, and reading his lessons multiple times, to grasp the information in preparation for the related assignments. He researches related subjects, to gain further knowledge and understanding, and prepares his focus notes for each course. Sean attends learning lab sessions as offered. He types his assignments and reviews them multiple times before submitting, to make sure that he catches any errors. Sean usually finishes school at around 4 pm.

The greatest joy that I have experienced as a Father, in coaching Sean has been seeing him develop into such a knowledgeable, responsible, and independent thinker. Sean has several disabilities, and he has had multiple surgeries to help correct these disabilities. Seeing Sean overcome these challenges and learning so much has been a dream come true for our family. The brick-and-mortar setting was unresponsive to Sean's learning and disabilities, but Compass has been a perfect fit for Sean's needs. The teachers, counselors, and administrators provide him with tremendous support, care, consideration, instruction, guidance, and encouragement. It is no wonder that Sean is now a happy graduating senior in the Class of 2020! Sean has a 4.0 GPA and clear goals for his future, including starting at Santiago Community College in fall 2020.

We chose Compass Charter Schools because it is accredited, and the teachers, counselors, and administrators have very positive reputations for helping students and learning coaches.
