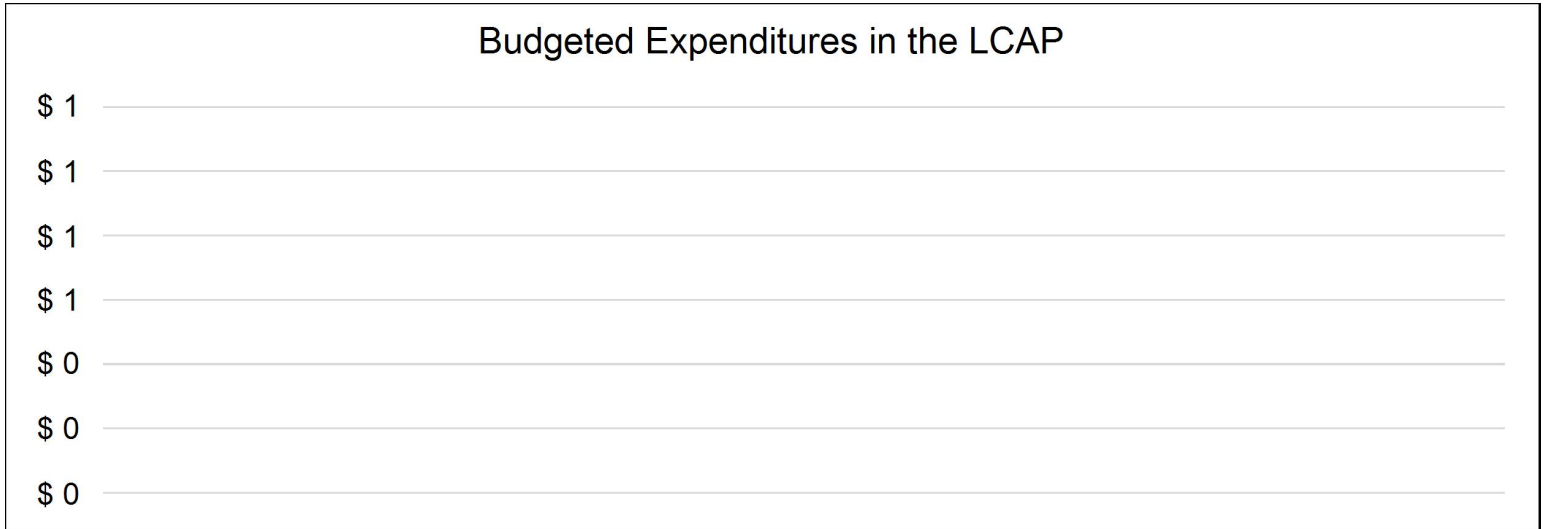

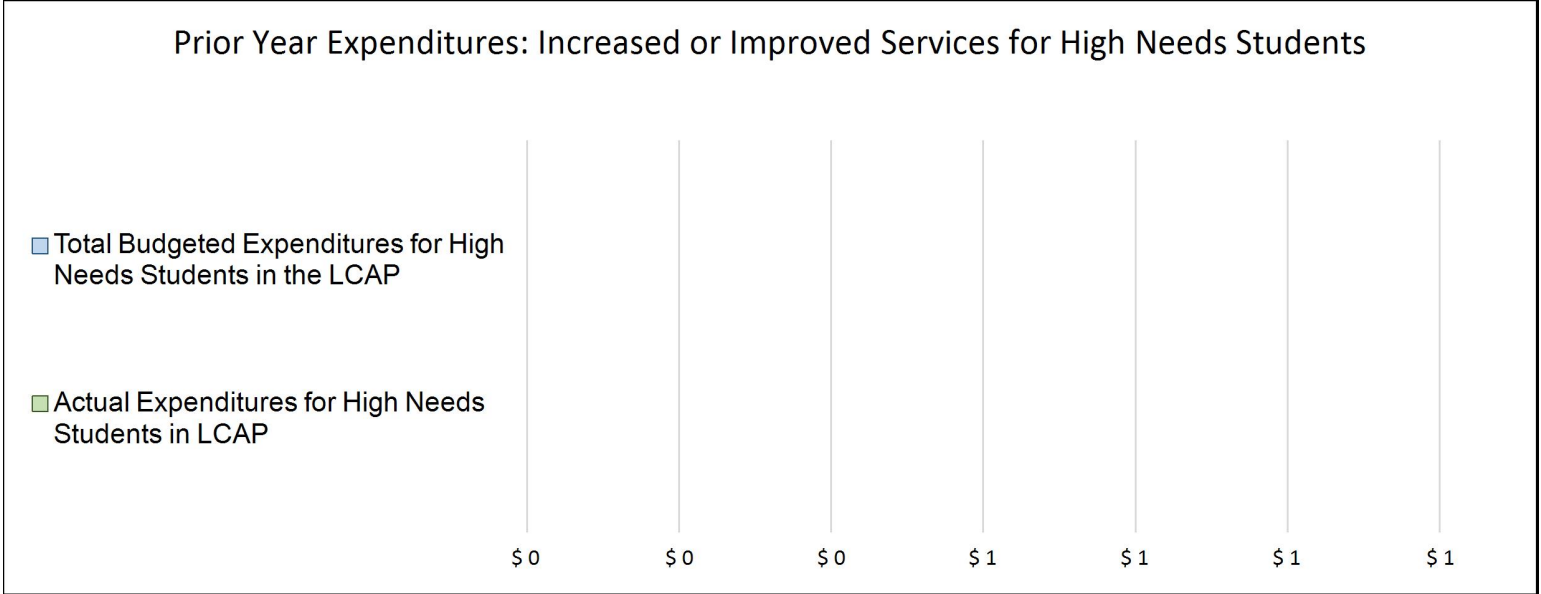

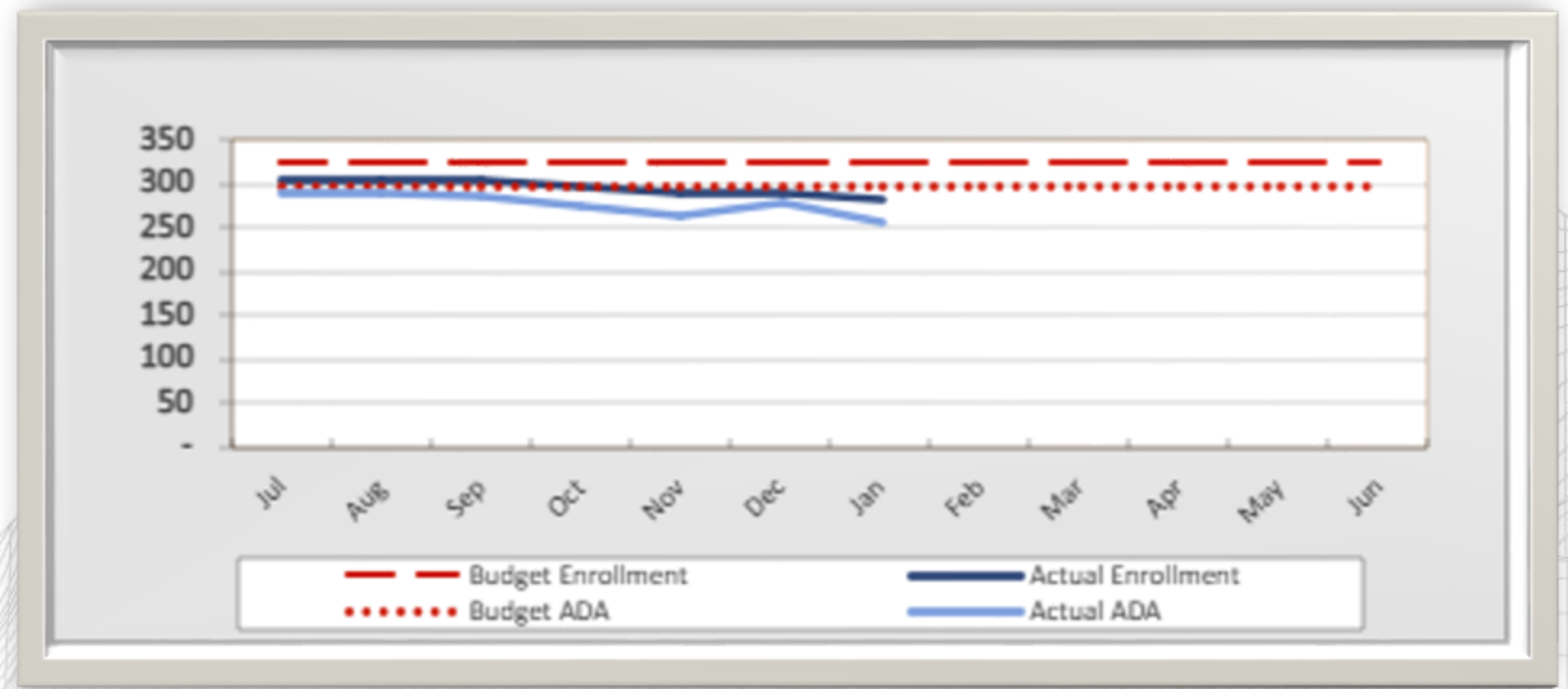

ARTICLE I. INTRODUCTION

Alta Public Schools, hereinafter referred to as the school food authority ("**SFA**"), enters into this Agreement with Everytable, PBC, hereinafter referred to as the food service management company ("**Vendor**"), to provide food service management assistance for the SFA’s food service program (the "**Services**"). During the term of this Agreement, the Vendor will provide Services to the SFA as described in the Scope of Work (Exhibit A) attached hereto.

ARTICLE II. GENERAL TERMS AND CONDITIONS

A. Term

The term of this Agreement is one (1) year, commencing on June 1, 2026 and continuing through June 30, 2027 (the "**Initial Term**"). After the Initial Term, the SFA may renew this Agreement for up to four (4) additional one-year periods (each a "**Renewal Term**") upon mutual written agreement of both parties, for a maximum total contract period through June 30, 2031. Each Renewal Term shall be subject to the same terms and conditions, except as otherwise modified in writing by the parties. Execution of all contracts and amendments is contingent on approval by the California Department of Education ("**CDE**"). The SFA may cancel this Agreement upon notification from the CDE that it or any part of the bidding process has been determined noncompliant with state and federal laws and regulations (7 CFR, Section 210.16[d]).

C. Fees

1. Fixed-Price Contract. The SFA will pay the Vendor at a fixed rate per meal. The fixed rate per meal includes all fees and charges indicated in the Schedule of Fees (Exhibit B) of this Agreement. The SFA must determine, and the Vendor shall credit the SFA for, the full value of U.S. Department of Agriculture ("**USDA**") Foods. The Vendor’s fixed-price invoice will be fully compliant with procurement requirements for the National School Lunch, School Breakfast, and applicable CACFP and Seamless Summer Option programs, set forth in 7 CFR, parts 210, 215, and 220, and the USDA Food and Nutrition Service ("**FNS**") Final Rule issued October 31, 2007.

The Vendor shall take discounts, rebates, and other credits into account when formulating prices for this fixed-price contract (2 CFR, Section 200.406[a]).

2. Payment Terms. The Vendor shall submit monthly invoices by the 15th of the following month reflecting all activity for the previous calendar month. The Vendor must submit detailed cost documentation monthly to support all charges to the SFA. All costs, charges, and expenses must be mutually agreeable to the SFA and the Vendor, and must be allowable costs consistent with the cost principles in 2 CFR, Part 200, as applicable. The SFA will pay undisputed invoices submitted by the Vendor within thirty (30) days of receipt. If the SFA disputes any portion of an invoice, the SFA shall notify the Vendor in writing within ten (10) business days of receipt, specifying the nature of the dispute in reasonable detail. The SFA shall pay all undisputed portions of such invoice within the twenty (30)-day payment period, and the parties shall work in good faith to resolve the disputed portion within fifteen (15) business days of the SFA's notice. If the SFA fails to pay any undisputed amount when due, interest shall accrue on the overdue balance at a rate of one percent (1%) per month, or the maximum rate permitted by applicable law, whichever is less, beginning on the thirty-first (31st) day following receipt of the invoice; provided, however, that any such interest shall not be charged to the nonprofit school food service account (cafeteria fund) and shall be payable solely from the SFA's non-federal, non-program funds.

3. Interest, Fines, Penalties, Finance Charges. Interest, fines, penalties, finance charges, income and expenses that may accrue under this Agreement are not allowable expenses to the nonprofit school food service (cafeteria fund) (2 CFR, Section 200.441). The SFA is prohibited from paying unallowable expenses from the SFA's cafeteria fund.

4. Spoiled or Unwholesome Food. The SFA shall make no payment to the Vendor for meals that are demonstrably spoiled or unwholesome at the time of delivery, or that materially fail to meet the detailed food component specifications as developed by the SFA for the meal pattern, or that otherwise materially fail to meet the requirements of this Agreement (7 CFR, Section 210.16[c][3]). The SFA shall notify the Vendor in writing of any rejected meals within two (2) business days of delivery, describing in reasonable detail the specific basis for rejection. The Vendor shall have the opportunity to inspect or review evidence of any rejected meals and to cure any non-conformance. If the Vendor disputes a rejection, the parties shall meet in good faith within five (5) business days of the Vendor's written objection to resolve the matter. Meals that are rejected solely on the basis of minor presentation or packaging variations that do not affect nutritional content, food safety, or regulatory compliance shall not be grounds for non-payment, though the SFA may require the Vendor to correct such variations on a prospective basis. The SFA shall document and retain records of all meal rejections for the duration of the contract term plus three (3) years.

D. Contract Cost Adjustment

The contract price (which may include General and Administrative Expense and Management Fees) may be increased on an annual basis by the Yearly Percentage Change in the Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers, Food Eaten Away from Home, as published by the U.S. Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics ("CPI"). The January CPI value will be used as a representation of the change in CPI. Such increases shall be effective on a prospective basis

on each anniversary date of this Agreement and will be allowed only if approved in advance by the SFA. CPI fee increases for an upcoming Renewal Term must be submitted to the SFA in writing no less than sixty (60) days prior to the commencement of such Renewal Term.

Renegotiation of price terms under this Agreement is permitted only upon the occurrence of unpredictable, unexpected conditions beyond the reasonable control of both parties that create a significant and material change in the financial assumptions upon which the price terms were based. Any renegotiation must be mutual, and both parties must agree in writing on any changes in price terms. Substantive changes will require the SFA to rebid the contract.

E. Availability of Funds

Every payment obligation of the SFA under this Agreement is conditioned upon the availability of funds appropriated or allocated for the payment of such obligation. The SFA may terminate this Agreement at the end of the period for which funds are available if funds are not allocated and available for the continuance of this Agreement. In the event the SFA exercises this provision, no liability shall accrue to the SFA, and the SFA shall not be obligated or liable for any future payments or for any damages resulting from such termination, provided the SFA gives the Vendor no less than sixty (60) days' written notice.

F. Timeliness

Time is of the essence in this Agreement.

G. CDE Approval

This Agreement has no force or effect until it is signed by both parties and is approved by the CDE (7 CFR, Section 210.19[a][5]).

H. Amendment

No amendment or variation of the terms of this Agreement shall be valid unless made in writing, signed by both parties, and approved by the CDE. Any oral understanding or agreement not incorporated into the Agreement in writing and approved by the CDE is not binding on either party (7 CFR, Section 210.19[a][5]).

I. Substantive Changes

Any change to this Agreement that results in a material change, or any proposed renewals, may, at the determination of the CDE, either void this Agreement or require the SFA to rebid the contract. Examples of substantive changes that could require rebidding include the addition of a program or a major shift in responsibilities for Vendor or SFA staff.

J. Subcontract/Assignment

No provision of this Agreement shall be assigned or subcontracted without prior written approval of the SFA which shall not be unreasonably withheld or delayed. If subcontracts are let, the

Vendor shall take steps to contract with small and minority businesses, women's business enterprises, and labor surplus area firms when possible (2 CFR, Section 200.321).

K. Written Commitments

Any written commitment by either party relative to the Services shall be binding upon the party making such commitment. Failure of either party to fulfill any such commitment shall render that party liable for direct damages incurred by the other party as a result thereof. Such written commitments include any warranty or representation made in any publication, drawing, or specifications accompanying or referred to in a party's proposal or solicitation materials, and any written notifications, affirmations, or representations made during the course of negotiations that are incorporated into a formal amendment to this Agreement. For the avoidance of doubt, informal communications, including emails, verbal discussions, and preliminary drafts exchanged during negotiations, shall not constitute binding written commitments unless expressly incorporated into this Agreement or a formal written amendment executed by both parties. Neither party shall be liable for indirect, consequential, or speculative damages arising from a failure to fulfill a written commitment under this Section.

L. Trade Secrets/Copyrights

Each party shall designate any information it considers confidential or proprietary—including recipes, surveys and studies, management guidelines, operational manuals, and similar documents—that it regularly uses in the operation of its business or develops independently during the course of this Agreement. Information so designated shall be treated as confidential by each party, and each party shall exercise the same level of care in maintaining the confidences of the other party as it would employ in maintaining its own confidences, unless disclosure is otherwise required under law. All such materials shall remain the exclusive property of the party that developed them and shall be returned immediately upon termination. Notwithstanding, the federal awarding agency reserves a royalty-free, nonexclusive, and irrevocable license to reproduce, publish, or otherwise use the work for federal purposes (2 CFR, Section 200.315[b]).

M. Severability

Should any provision(s) of this Agreement be declared or found to be illegal, unenforceable, ineffective, or void, then each party shall be relieved of any obligations arising from such provision(s). The balance of this Agreement, if capable of performance, shall remain and continue in full force and effect.

N. Counterparts

This Agreement may be executed in counterparts, each of which shall be deemed an original, but all of which together will constitute one and the same instrument.

O. Silence/Absence/Omission

Any silence, absence, or omission from the Agreement specifications concerning any point shall mean that only the best commercial practices are to prevail. Only those materials (e.g., food,

supplies, etc.) and workmanship of a quality that would normally be specified by the SFA are to be used.

P. Indemnification

1. Vendor Indemnification of SFA. The Vendor shall indemnify, defend, and hold harmless the SFA, its employees, directors, agents, and Board Members from and against all claims, damages, losses, and expenses (including reasonable attorney's fees and court costs), and decrees or judgments arising from any injuries, including death or damage to or destruction of property, resulting from the Vendor's acts or omissions, willful misconduct, negligence, or breach of the Vendor's obligations under this Agreement by the Vendor, its agents, employees, or other persons under its supervision and direction.

2. SFA Indemnification of Vendor. The SFA shall indemnify, defend, and hold harmless the Vendor, its employees, officers, directors, and agents from and against all claims, damages, losses, and expenses (including reasonable attorney's fees and court costs), and decrees or judgments arising from any injuries, including death or damage to or destruction of property, resulting from the SFA's acts or omissions, willful misconduct, negligence, or breach of the SFA's obligations under this Agreement by the SFA, its agents, employees, or other persons under its supervision and direction.

3. Limitation. Neither party shall be required to indemnify or hold harmless the other party from any liability or damages arising from the indemnified party's sole acts, omissions, willful misconduct, or negligence.

Q. Sanctions

If either party fails to perform under the terms of this Agreement, the non-breaching party may: (a) require the breaching party to provide in writing how it will ensure future compliance; (b) upon continued nonperformance, proceed to termination of this Agreement in accordance with Article XIV; and (c) in the case of Vendor nonperformance, the Vendor may be prohibited from bidding on future contracts with the SFA.

R. Breach of Contract

If the Vendor causes a breach, the Vendor assumes liability for any and all damages, including excess cost to the SFA in procuring similar services, and is liable for administrative, contractual, and legal remedies, as applicable. If the SFA causes a breach, the SFA assumes liability for any and all damages directly resulting therefrom, and the Vendor shall be entitled to pursue available administrative, contractual, and legal remedies.

S. Penalties

Costs resulting from either party's violations, alleged violations of, or failure to comply with federal, state, tribal, local, or foreign laws and regulations are unallowable, except when incurred as a result of compliance with specific provisions of the federal award, or with prior written approval of the federal awarding agency (2 CFR, Section 200.441).

T. Force Majeure

Neither party shall be liable to the other for delay in, or failure of, performance, nor shall any such delay or failure constitute default, if caused by force majeure. Force majeure means an occurrence beyond the control of the affected party that occurs without its fault or negligence, including but not limited to acts of God, acts of the public enemy, acts of the state in its sovereign capacity, fires, floods, power failure, disabling strikes, epidemics, quarantine restrictions, and freight embargoes. Force majeure does not include late delivery of equipment or materials caused by congestion at a manufacturer's plant or an oversold condition of the market, late performance by a subcontractor (unless arising from a force majeure occurrence), or inability to acquire or maintain any required insurance, bonds, licenses, or permits. The delayed party shall notify the other party in writing as soon as practicable and no later than the following work day and shall cause such delay to cease as soon as practicable.

U. Nondiscrimination

Both the SFA and Vendor agree that no child who participates in the NSLP, SBP, or CACFP will be discriminated against on the basis of race, color, national origin, age, sex, or disability. Both parties shall comply with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972, Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, the Age Discrimination Act of 1975, and USDA regulations on nondiscrimination (7 CFR, parts 15, 15a, and 15b) and FNS Instruction 113-1 (7 CFR, Section 210.23[b]).

V. Compliance with Law

The Vendor shall comply with all laws, ordinances, rules, and regulations of all applicable federal, state, county, and city governments regarding purchasing, sanitation, health, and safety for the food service operations, and shall procure and maintain all necessary licenses and permits. The SFA shall cooperate as necessary in the Vendor's compliance efforts. The Vendor shall comply with all applicable federal regulations in 2 CFR, parts 200 and 400, and 7 CFR, parts 210, 220, 245, and 250, USDA FNS Instructions and policy, federal laws and regulations, the California Education Code, and California laws and regulations, where applicable.

W. Choice of Law

This Agreement shall be construed under the laws of the State of California, without giving effect to the principles of conflict of laws. Any action or proceeding arising out of this Agreement shall be heard in the appropriate courts in California.

X. Advice of Counsel

Each party acknowledges that, in executing this Agreement, such party has had the opportunity to seek the advice of independent legal counsel and has read and understood all of the terms and provisions of this Agreement.

ARTICLE III. RELATIONSHIP OF THE PARTIES

A. The Vendor's relationship with the SFA will be that of an independent contractor and not that of an employee of or supervisor for the SFA. The Vendor will not be eligible for any employee benefits, nor will the SFA make deductions from payments to the Vendor for taxes, all of which will be the Vendor's responsibility. The Vendor agrees to indemnify and hold the SFA harmless from any liability for, or assessment of, any such taxes imposed on the SFA by relevant taxing authorities. The Vendor will have no authority to enter into contracts that bind the SFA or create obligations on the part of the SFA.

B. When the SFA is a public school district or program operated by a county Office of Education, the Vendor, as an independent contractor, shall have no authority to supervise food service classified personnel operating the NSLP, SBP, or Afterschool Meal Supplements under the NSLP (California Education Code Section 45103.5).

C. All Services to be performed by the Vendor will be as agreed between the Vendor and the SFA. The Vendor will be required to report to the SFA concerning the Services performed under this Agreement. The SFA shall determine the nature and frequency of these reports.

D. The SFA is the responsible authority, without recourse to USDA or CDE, for the settlement and satisfaction of all contractual and administrative issues arising from this Agreement, including source evaluation, protests, disputes, claims, or other matters of a contractual nature.

ARTICLE IV. FOOD SERVICE PROGRAM

A. Food Service Management Company Responsibilities

1. The Vendor will not directly or indirectly restrict the sale or marketing of fluid milk at any time or in any place on school premises or at any school-sponsored event (7 CFR, Section 210.21[e]).
2. The Vendor shall have state or local health certification for any facility outside the school in which it proposes to prepare meals and shall maintain this health certification for the duration of the Agreement (7 CFR, Section 210.16[c][2]).

B. School Food Authority Responsibilities

1. The SFA shall ensure that the food service operation is in conformance with the SFA's Permanent Single Agreement with the CDE and will monitor the food service operation through periodic on-site visits (7 CFR, Sections 210.16[a][2] and 210.16[a][3]).
2. The SFA retains control of the quality, extent, and the general nature of its food service; the prices children are charged for meals (7 CFR, Section 210.16[a][4]), and a la carte prices.
3. SFAs with more than one school shall perform no less than one on-site review of the lunch counting and claiming system employed by each school under its jurisdiction prior to February 1 of each school year, and shall conduct follow-up corrective action reviews as required (7 CFR, Section 210.8[a][1]).
4. The SFA shall retain responsibility for developing the meal pattern for students with disabilities, when their disability restricts their diet, and for students without disabilities who are unable to

consume the regular meal because of medical or other special dietary needs (7 CFR, Section 210.10[m]).

5. The SFA shall retain signature authority for the food services application, agreements, Free and Reduced-Price Policy Statement, monthly Claim for Reimbursement, reports, program renewal, verification of applications, letters to households, and all correspondence to the CDE relating to the food service program (7 CFR, Section 210.16[a][5]).

6. The SFA shall be responsible for the establishment and maintenance of the free and reduced-price meals eligibility roster (California Education Code Section 49558).

7. The SFA shall be responsible for the development, distribution, and collection of the letter to households and Application for Free and Reduced-Price Meals (7 CFR, Section 245.6).

8. The SFA shall be responsible for the determination of eligibility for free and reduced-price meals and shall disclose eligibility status to the Vendor only to the extent necessary for the Vendor to fulfill its obligations under this Agreement. The Vendor will not further disclose such information (California Education Code Section 49558).

9. The SFA shall establish and maintain an advisory board composed of parents, teachers, and students to assist with menu planning (7 CFR, Section 210.16[a][8]).

10. The SFA shall maintain applicable health certification and ensure that all state and local regulations are being met by the Vendor (7 CFR, Section 210.16[a][7]).

ARTICLE V. BUY AMERICAN AND CALIFORNIA AGRICULTURAL PREFERENCE REQUIREMENTS

A. Vendor Responsibilities

1. The Vendor will provide meals and snacks purchased with domestic commodities and products to the greatest extent practicable, document exceptions when nondomestic products are purchased, adhere to the nondomestic cap, and comply with all other Buy American regulations (7 CFR 220.16[d] and 7 CFR 210.21[d]).

2. The Vendor must submit statements for all processed agricultural products certifying domestic processing and that the percentage of domestic content exceeds 51 percent by weight or volume (USDA Policy Memo SP 38-2017).

3. The Vendor must notify the SFA in writing at least three (3) days prior to delivering a nondomestic agricultural commodity or product, listing alternative domestic substitutes and providing an explanation for the exception.

4. Per California Food and Agriculture Code Section 58596.3, the Vendor shall give preference to California-grown agricultural food products when the bid or price does not exceed the lowest bid or price for a domestic product produced outside the state and the quality is comparable.

5. The Vendor will provide certification of domestic origin for products without country of origin labels.

6. Per 7 CFR 220.16(d)(5)(ii), the Vendor must adhere to the following caps on non-domestic food purchases: (a) beginning SY 2025-26, 10 percent; (b) beginning SY 2028-29, 8 percent; (c) beginning SY 2031-32, 5 percent.

B. SFA Responsibilities

1. The SFA shall maintain all documentation provided by the Vendor regarding domestic and non-domestic product components for the term of the contract plus extensions and three additional school years, and shall make such documentation available during administrative and procurement reviews.

2. The SFA shall monitor compliance with Buy American and California FAC requirements (2 CFR, Section 200.318[b]).

ARTICLE VI. U.S. DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE FOODS

A. Vendor Responsibilities

1. The Vendor shall fully use, to the maximum extent possible, donated foods made available by the SFA solely for the purpose of providing benefits for the SFA's nonprofit school food program (7 CFR, Section 210.16[a][6]).

2. In accordance with 7 CFR, Section 250.53, the Vendor shall: (a) credit the SFA for the value of all donated foods received, including the value of donated foods contained in processed end products; (b) account for the full value by subtracting the value from the SFA's monthly invoice, using the Average Price File for the applicable school year; (c) accept liability for any negligence resulting in loss, improper use, or damage to donated foods; and (d) use all donated beef, pork, and processed end products in the SFA's food service, and use all other donated foods, or commercially purchased foods of the same generic identity, U.S. origin, and equal or better quality, in the SFA's food service (7 CFR, Section 250.51[d]).

3. The Vendor will not itself enter into processing agreements with processors required under subpart C of 7 CFR, Part 250 (7 CFR, Section 250.53[a][8]).

4. The Vendor will comply with storage and inventory requirements for donated foods and will maintain records documenting compliance (7 CFR, Sections 250.53[a][9] and 250.54[b]).

B. SFA Responsibilities

1. The SFA shall retain title to all donated foods and ensure that all donated foods received accrue only for the benefit of the SFA's nonprofit school food service (7 CFR, Section 210.16[a][6]).

2. The SFA will maintain records and conduct reconciliation at least annually and upon termination to ensure that the Vendor has credited the value of all donated foods (7 CFR, Sections 250.54[a] and [c]).

3. The SFA will not extend or renew any contract if the Vendor did not fulfill all provisions relating to donated foods (7 CFR, Section 250.53[a][12]).

ARTICLE VII. MEAL RESPONSIBILITIES

The Vendor shall:

1. Serve meals on such days and at such times as requested by the SFA.
2. Offer free, reduced-price, and paid reimbursable meals to all eligible children through the SFA's food service program.
3. Provide meals that meet the requirements established in 7 CFR, parts 210 and 220, and all applicable CACFP regulations, as applicable.
4. Provide special meals for students with medical conditions requiring food modifications or accommodations, as directed by the SFA.

ARTICLE VIII. FOOD SERVICE MANAGEMENT COMPANY EMPLOYEES

A. The Vendor shall only place employees for work at the SFA that meet the minimum professional standards outlined in 7 CFR, Section 210.30. The Vendor shall ensure their employees take the required annual training and shall maintain documentation validating completion. The Vendor shall remove from the SFA premises any employee who fails to take the required training.

B. The SFA reserves the right to interview and approve the on-site food service consultant(s)/employee(s).

C. The Vendor shall provide the SFA with a schedule of employees, positions, assigned locations, salaries, and work hours at least one (1) calendar week prior to the commencement of operations.

D. The Vendor shall comply with all wage and hours of employment requirements of federal and state laws and will be responsible for supervising and training their personnel.

E. The Vendor assumes full responsibility for the payment of all contributions and assessments, both state and federal, for all of its employees engaged in the performance of this Agreement.

F. The Vendor will be solely responsible for all personnel actions regarding employees on its payroll, including withholding and payment of all applicable federal, state, and local employment taxes, insurance premiums, contributions to benefit plans, licensing fees, and workers' compensation costs. The Vendor shall indemnify, defend, and hold the SFA harmless from any claims related to such responsibilities.

ARTICLE IX. BOOKS AND RECORDS

A. The SFA and the Vendor must provide all documents as necessary for an independent auditor to conduct the SFA's single audit. The Vendor shall maintain such records as the SFA will need to support its Claims for Reimbursement. Such records shall be made available to the SFA upon request (7 CFR, Section 210.16[c][1]).

B. Both parties shall make all accounts and records pertaining to the nonprofit food service program available to the CDE, USDA FNS, and Office of Inspector General for audit or review at a reasonable time and place. Records shall be retained for three (3) years after the date of the final Claim for Reimbursement for the fiscal year in which this Agreement terminates, unless audit findings remain unresolved, in which case records shall be retained until resolution (7 CFR, Section 210.9[b][17]).

C. The Vendor shall not remove state or federally required records from the SFA premises upon contract termination.

D. The USDA, Inspector General, the Comptroller of the United States, and the CDE shall have right of access to any documents, papers, or records of the Vendor and SFA pertinent to the federal award (2 CFR, Section 200.336[a]).

ARTICLE X. MONITORING AND COMPLIANCE

A. The Vendor shall monitor the food service operation through periodic on-site visits to develop recommendations for improvement.

B. The Vendor warrants and certifies that it will comply with all applicable statutes, rules, regulations, and orders of the United States and the State of California.

C. The SFA shall establish internal controls that ensure the accuracy of meal counts prior to submission of the monthly Claim for Reimbursement (7 CFR, Section 210.8[a]).

ARTICLE XI. EQUIPMENT, FACILITIES, INVENTORY, AND STORAGE

A. The SFA will make available to the Vendor, without cost or charge, area(s) of the premises agreeable to both parties. The SFA shall provide local telephone service. The SFA shall not be responsible for loss or damage to equipment owned by the Vendor and located on the SFA's premises.

B. The Vendor shall notify the SFA of any equipment belonging to the Vendor on the SFA's premises within ten (10) days of its placement.

C. The SFA shall have access, with or without notice, to all of the SFA's facilities used by the Vendor for purposes of inspection and audit.

D. Ownership of the beginning inventory of food and supplies shall remain with the SFA.

E. Ownership of all nonexpendable supplies and capital equipment shall remain with the SFA. The Vendor must take reasonable measures for protection against loss, pilferage, and/or destruction.

ARTICLE XII. CERTIFICATIONS

A. The Vendor warrants compliance with CDE and USDA rules and regulations, including 2 CFR, parts 200 and 400, and 7 CFR, parts 210, 215, 220, 245, and 250. The Vendor agrees to indemnify the SFA and the CDE against any loss, cost, damage, or liability by reason of the Vendor's violation of this provision.

B. Both parties shall comply with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, Title IX of the Education Amendments, Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, and all applicable nondiscrimination statutes and regulations.

C. For contracts in excess of \$150,000, both parties shall comply with the Clean Air Act (42 U.S.C. Sections 7401 et seq.) and the Federal Water Pollution Control Act (33 U.S.C. Section 1251), as amended (Appendix II to 2 CFR, Part 200).

D. Neither party shall enter into contracts with parties listed on the General Services Administration's List of Parties Excluded from Federal Procurement or Nonprocurement programs (Executive Orders 12549 and 12689; 2 CFR, Part 200, Appendix II).

E. The Certification Regarding Lobbying and Disclosure of Lobbying Activities form (2 CFR, Section 418) must accompany each subsequent Renewal Term. Renewals without this certification will not be accepted (Appendix II to 2 CFR, Part 200, Section [I]).

ARTICLE XIII. INSURANCE

A. Workers' Compensation Insurance. Each party shall maintain Workers' Compensation Insurance coverage as required by state law, and Employers' Liability in the amount of One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000.00) for each accident covering all employees employed in connection with child nutrition program operations.

B. Comprehensive or Commercial Insurance. The Vendor shall maintain during the term of this Agreement, for protection of both the SFA and the Vendor, Comprehensive or Commercial General Bodily Injury and Property Damage Liability Insurance with a Combined Single Limit of not less than Five Million Dollars (\$5,000,000.00) for each occurrence, including Personal Injury Liability, Broad Form Property Damage Liability, Blanket Contractual Liability, and Products Liability, covering the operations and activities of the Vendor under this Agreement. Upon request, the Vendor shall provide the SFA with a certificate evidencing such policies. The insurance policies shall contain covenants that the policies shall not be canceled without thirty (30) days' prior written notice to the SFA. With the exception of Workers' Compensation Insurance, the SFA shall be named as an additional insured under the Vendor's policies to the extent the SFA is indemnified pursuant to this Agreement.

C. Property Insurance. The SFA shall maintain, or cause to be maintained, a system of coverage to keep the buildings, premises, and all property contained therein insured against loss or damage by fire, explosion, or other cause normally covered by standard broad form property insurance.

ARTICLE XIV. TERMINATION

A. Termination for Cause. Either party may terminate this Agreement for cause upon sixty (60) days' written notice if the other party breaches a material provision of this Agreement (7 CFR, Sections 210.16[d] and 250.12[f][9]). The non-breaching party shall first give the breaching party written notice of such cause. If the cause is not remedied within ten (10) days of such notice, the non-breaching party may give a sixty (60)-day notice of its intent to terminate this Agreement upon expiration of such period.

B. Termination for Convenience. This Agreement may be terminated, in whole or in part, for convenience by the SFA with the 30 days notice or by the Vendor upon written notification to the SFA setting forth the reasons for such termination and the effective date. In each case, the two parties shall agree upon the termination conditions, including the effective date and, in the case of partial termination, the portion to be terminated (2 CFR, Section 200.339[a][3]-[4]). In the case of a partial termination by the Vendor, if the SFA determines that the remaining portion of the Agreement will not accomplish the purposes for which it was made, the SFA may terminate the Agreement in its entirety.

C. Effect of Termination. Upon termination, the SFA shall pay the Vendor for all Services satisfactorily performed through the effective date of termination. The Vendor shall cooperate in good faith with any transition to a successor food service provider.

D. Remedies. The rights of termination referred to herein are not intended to be exclusive and are in addition to any other rights or remedies available to either party at law or in equity.

EXHIBIT A: SCOPE OF WORK

1. Overview of Food Service Program

- A. Scale. The SFA currently employs 2 persons who provide food service to approximately 1,280 children at 2 school sites in Tulare, California.
- B. Financial Goals. The SFA is looking for a Food Vendor that can provide high-quality meals at a reasonable price.
- C. Food Service Office and Staff. The food service office is located at 1314 W. 12th Street, Los Angeles, CA 90015 and is under the direction of Jesse Gutierrez, Director of Kitchen Operations.
- D. Programs. National School Lunch Program (NSLP), School Breakfast Program (SBP), CACFP (snack and lunch during intersession), and Seamless Summer Option (SSO).
- E. Hot breakfast meals, daily vegetarian meals, and cut fruit options are preferred.
- F. The Vendor must have the ability to provide special meals for students with medical conditions requiring food modifications or accommodations.
- G. Per meal pricing shall include napkins, utensils, condiments, and plates/trays.
- H. The SFA adopts an Offer vs. Serve service model at all of its school sites.

5. Vendor Responsibilities

A. Purchasing. The Vendor shall be responsible for purchasing standards and specifications resulting in the best quality of products and services at the lowest price, in compliance with all applicable statutes and regulations. All transactions shall be conducted in a manner to provide maximum open and free competition.

B. Contracting with Small and Minority Businesses. The Vendor shall comply with 2 CFR, Section 200.321, as applicable.

C. Facility/Site Operations. The Vendor shall recommend: safety programs; sanitation standards for housekeeping, preparation, storage, and equipment; a Food Safety Plan; methods to increase participation and improve food quality; and appropriate staffing hours and positions at each site.

D. Menus. The Vendor shall adhere to the 21-day cycle menu for the first 21 days of meal service; thereafter, the Vendor may only make changes with the SFA's approval (7 CFR, Sections 210.10, 210.16[b][1], and 220.8). The Vendor shall provide menu recommendations that comply with all applicable regulations and accommodate special dietary needs.

E. Quality Control. The Vendor shall establish a formal structure to routinely gather input from students, staff, parents, and food service employees to ensure effective and efficient operations.

F. Records. The Vendor shall maintain full and complete financial, inventory, and employment records sufficient to meet federal and state requirements and in accordance with generally accepted accounting procedures.

G. Education. The Vendor shall recommend actions to promote nutrition education and cooperate with efforts to merge these actions with classroom instruction.

H. Reports. The Vendor shall collect and provide, in the required format, information necessary for school food service claims for reimbursement and shall submit monthly meal counts to the SFA contact on or before the 5th of each month (7 CFR, Section 210.16[c][1]). The Vendor shall provide monthly operating statements as determined by the SFA.

EXHIBIT B: SCHEDULE OF FEES

The costs included in the table below comprise the fixed price per meal. The fees are agreed upon by both parties and represent allowable food service costs in accordance with 2 CFR, Part 200.

All costs are based on average daily participation of 840 meals served on 180 school days. Prices must not include values for donated foods, and must include all meal programs applicable.

General:

- The Agency and Vendor agree to operate in accordance with the Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP) regulations set forth in Title 7, Code of Federal Regulations (7 CFR), Part 226.
- The Agency will monitor for compliance with the terms of this agreement, including the review of the Vendor's meal documentation, as specified above, to assure that the provided meals meet the CACFP meal pattern requirements prior to submitting the request for CACFP meal reimbursements in the Child Nutrition Information and Payment System (CNIPS).
- The Agency agrees to pay for the number of meals ordered for the amount specified within this agreement, unless otherwise negotiated and agreed upon with the Vendor. The Agency agrees that any adjustments to the number of meals ordered must be communicated to the vendor within the agreed upon timeframe, as specified in this agreement.
- The Agency will notify the vendor, of any meal modification(s) necessary within their CNP, at least 24 hours hours/days (e.g., 48 hours) prior to the delivery of the meal **or** when the agency receives notification of the required meal modification(s). [ADA Amendments Act of 2008]
- The Agency shall provide the food service management company with a list of the State agency approved child care centers, day care homes, adult day care centers, and outside-school-hours care centers to be furnished meals by the food service management company, and the number of meals, by type, to be delivered to each location; 7 CFR 226.6(i)(1).

 - Product information for combination foods that contain more than one food component (e.g., meat and grain), child nutrition labels or product formulation statements for commercially prepared items (e.g., chicken nuggets, fish sticks, ravioli, meatballs, etc.), and standardized recipes for in-house prepared dishes (e.g., chicken noodle casserole).

Termination [2 CFR Appendix II to Part 200]:

- The Agreement may be terminated without cause by the Agency upon written notice to the Vendor, thirty days (30 days) prior to the date of termination.
- The Agency may terminate this Agreement should the Vendor fail to perform the requirements of this Agreement at the time and in the manner herein provided.
- Upon termination of the Agreement prior to the end of the contract period, the Agency will pay Vendor for all meals and snacks provided up to the effective date of termination. The Vendor shall submit all required documentation and other information.

Contract Management [7 CFR 226.22(l)] and [2 CFR 200.318(i)]:

- Agency shall maintain a contract administration system ensuring that contractors perform in accordance with the terms, conditions, and specifications of their contracts or purchase orders.
- The Agency must maintain records sufficient to detail the history of procurement. These records will include, but are not necessarily limited to, the following: Rationale for the method of procurement, selection of contract type, contractor selection or rejection, and the basis for the contract price.

Compliance [7 CFR 226.22(l)] and 2 CFR Appendix II to Part 200:

- All contracts awarded in excess of \$10,000 by institutions and their contractors shall contain a provision requiring compliance with Executive Order 11246, entitled "Equal Employment Opportunity," as amended by Executive Order 11375, and as supplemented in Department of Labor regulations (41 CFR part 60). 7 CFR 226.22(l)(3).
- For Agreements over \$100,000, Vendor agrees to comply with all applicable standards, orders, or requirements issued under section 306 of the Clean Air Act (42 U.S.C. 1837(h)), section 508 of the Clean Water Act (33 U.S.C. 1368), Executive Order 11738, and Environmental Protection Agency regulations (40 CFR part 15), which prohibit the use under nonexempt Federal contracts, grants or loans of facilities included on the EPA List of Violating Facilities. Vendor shall report any violations to FNS and to the U.S. EPA Assistant Administrator for Enforcement (EN-329). 7 CFR 226.22(l)(6).
- Byrd Anti-Lobbying Amendment (31 U.S.C. 1352) - Contractors that apply or bid for an award exceeding \$100,000 must file the required certification. Each tier certifies to the tier above that it will not and has not used Federal appropriated funds to pay any person or organization for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a member of Congress, officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a member of Congress in connection with obtaining any Federal contract, grant or any other award covered by 31 U.S.C. 1352. Each tier must also disclose any lobbying with non-Federal funds that takes place in connection with obtaining any Federal award. Such disclosures are forwarded from tier to tier up to the non-Federal award. 2 CFR Appendix II to Part 200.
- Debarment and Suspension (Executive Orders 12549 and 12689) - A contract award (see 2 CFR 180.220) must not be made to parties listed on the government-wide exclusions in the System for Award Management (SAM), in accordance with the OMB guidelines at 2 CFR 180 that implement Executive Orders 12549 (3 CFR part 1986 Comp., p. 189) and 12689 (3 CFR part 1989 Comp., p. 235), "Debarment and Suspension." SAM Exclusions contains the names of parties debarred, suspended, or otherwise excluded by agencies, as well as parties declared ineligible under statutory or regulatory authority other than Executive Order 12549. 2 CFR Appendix II to Part 200.
- Vendor shall comply with mandatory standards and policies relating to energy efficiency which are contained in the State energy efficiency conservation plan issued in compliance with the Energy Policy and Conservation Act (Pub. L. 94-163). 7 CFR 226.22(l)(7).

Force Majeure

1. Neither party shall be liable to the other for delay in, or failure of, performance nor shall any such delay in, or failure of, performance constitute default if such delay or failure is caused by force majeure. Force majeure means an occurrence that is beyond the control of the party affected and occurs without its fault or negligence. Force majeure may include, but is not restricted to, acts of God, the public enemy, acts of the state in its sovereign capacity, fires, floods, power failure, disabling strikes, epidemics, quarantine restrictions, and freight embargoes.
2. Force majeure does not include any of the following occurrences:
 - Late delivery of meals caused by congestion at a manufacturer's plant or elsewhere, or an oversold condition of the market.
 - Late performance by a Vendor unless the delay arises out of a force majeure occurrence.
 - Inability of either the Vendor to acquire or maintain any required insurance, bonds, licenses, or permits.
3. If either party is delayed at any time in the progress of work by force majeure, the delayed party shall notify the other party in writing of such delay, as soon as practicable and no later than the following workday or the commencement thereof, and shall specify the causes of such delay. Such notice shall be delivered by hand, sent by postal mail with a certified return receipt requested, or sent electronically and shall make a specific reference to this article, thereby invoking its provisions. The delayed party shall cause such delay to cease as soon as practicable and shall notify the other party in writing when it has done so. The time for completion shall not extend the total contract period beyond one year.
4. Any delay or failure in performance by either party caused by force majeure shall not constitute default, nor give rise to any claim for damages or loss of anticipated profits.

The Americans with Disability Act Amendments Act of 2008

The American with Disability Act (ADA) Amendments Act (ADAAA) of 2008 was signed into law in September 2008 and became effective on January 1, 2009. The detailed guidance is referenced in Public Law, Sections 110-325, ADAAA.

Title II of the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 and the ADAAA prohibits discrimination based on disability by state and local governments. The ADA and Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 address issues pertaining to both physical access and program access.

Per the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Policy Memo, CACFP 14-2017: Modifications to Accommodate Disabilities in the Child and Adult Care Food Program; program operators must ensure that breakfast, lunch, snack, or milk (meals) offered through the CACFP meet the respective meal pattern requirements established in the program regulations. Federal law and USDA regulations further require program operators to make reasonable modifications to accommodate participants with disability, which includes providing special meals, at no extra charge, to participants with a disability that restricts the participant's diet.

Program operators must accommodate meal modifications within the Child Nutrition Programs (CNP). The program operator (agency) will notify the vendor, of any meal modification(s) necessary within their CNP, at least 24 hours hours/days (e.g., 48 hours) prior to the delivery of the meal **or** when the agency receives notification of the required meal modification(s).
