Academic Report

Academic Program

• Our MAP scores were finalized mid-November and we are pleased with the progress we made from 2016! Crossroads Academy-Central Street had great improvement in scores: ELA scores increased from 58% proficient/advanced in 2016 to 68% in 2017, Math scores increased from 39% proficient/advanced in 2016 to 48% in 2017, and Science scores increased from 37% proficient/advanced in 2016 to 51% in 2017. Crossroads Academy-Quality Hill scores were 54% proficient/advanced in ELA and 24% proficient/advanced in Math, which is typical of a brand new school. Our District ELA scores are 64% in ELA, 42% in Math, and 51% in Science. Even though our test scores improved, our APR decreased. This is due to three reasons. First, the state's formula for calculating APR is based off a three year comparison. Since our 2017 scores were lower than our 2015 scores we did not receive any progress or growth points. Second, we were not able to count any of our 8th grade Algebra scores because the state's test was deemed invalid. Third, we added a new school and were expecting the students to score lower than students who have been with us for multiple years. Our 2017 APR is 87% which DESE categorizes are "fully accredited", but it is a drop from our 2016 APR of 98.6% which DESE categorizes as "accredited with distinction".








Recruiting Top Talent







Kansas City Charter Public Schools Early Childhood Mill Levy Proposal November 7, 2017 Confidential – For Charter School LEA Leaders and Boards

Would your charter school board and leadership support:

- KCPSD's 'enabling' legislative language excluding funds designated by taxpayers in an
 urban district containing most or all of a city with a population greater than three
 hundred fifty thousand inhabitants as early childhood education funds from the local tax
 revenue calculation used to provide funding to charter schools that declared themselves
 as a local education agency*;
- A KCPSD mill levy ballot asking residents to approve an increase of \$1.04 with 50% of the funding for early childhood education and 50% for K12 operating support;
- The determination of a third-party organization outside of the Kansas City Public School District to manage the distribution of early childhood education funds.
- The Kansas City Chamber of Commerce's assistance in remedying:
 - o The potential funding gap due to charter school enrollment;
 - The two-year lag in charter school receipt of increased local funding.

*The definition "urban district containing most or all of a city with a population greater than three hundred fifty thousand inhabitants" mirrors the charter school statutory language describing Kansas City.

Kansas City Charter Schools Donation Reporting on the ASBR

Question: This year (2017), for the first time, Kansas City charter schools reporting donations in the yearly financial report(ASBR), received an edit letter requesting the school provide specific donor detail for any significant gift. The question to Missouri Charter Public School Association's legal counsel, Stinson Leonard Street LLP was whether the Missouri Department of Elementary and Secondary Education has the legal authority to require this information. In short, the answer is no.

Rationale:

We start with 160.405.4(3)" Except as provided in sections 160.400 to 160.425 and as specifically provided in other sections, [charter schools **shall**] **be exempt from all laws and rules relating to schools, governing boards and school districts."**

160.405.4(4) requires charter schools to "as required in [their] charter" "publish audit reports and annual financial reports as provided in chapter 165."

Chapter 165 arguably doesn't require charter schools to file annual reports, because it refers to "each school district" (which charter schools are not).

165.012 <u>ONLY requires</u> a reporting of 1) unrestricted fund balance in the incidental and teacher fund 2) amount of tax anticipated borrowed funds 3) net transfer from the incidental fund to the capital projects fund.

The ASBR about which DESE seeks more information, is found in 162.281. <u>That section does not apply to charter schools</u>. In fact, that section puts requirements on "the district secretary" which makes clear it was not applicable to charter schools. In short, legal counsel is not convinced charter schools have to submit ASBR's at all.

However, even if this did apply, <u>nothing in the statute requires an explanation of donations or what makes up totals</u>. The Department's letter doesn't site any authority for them to require explanation. In review of the DESE website discussion about ASBR's there is no citation of any authority for requiring explanation nor do the DESE regulations discuss ASBR's.

The opinion of legal counsel is that this request does not need to be accommodated. A school may provide the information in the interest of good relations with DESE however the request is, in legal counsel's opinion, someone exceeding their authority.

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
