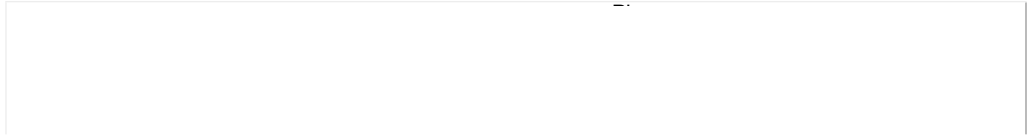

We have a full time Exceptional Learners Director who works closely with our 5 EL teachers to provide services supplemental to the core instruction such as push in, pull out and professional development and training for staff to strengthen language acquisition, strengthen direct instructional support, instructional materials, curriculum resources, and software aligned with Missouri Learning Standards and WIDA.

Describe how the LEA will promote parental and community engagement/participation in programs for English learners.

Our Exceptional Learners Director works closely with our EL families to help them become or continue to be engaged in the school community. The EL staff work to ensure all documents such as but no limited to event flyers are translated for EL Students and families to promote engagement. CCS also has a "new comer class" for EL students and their families to help students better adapt to, not only the CCS culture, but also learning in the United States. Each EL Teachers also takes their EL group on their caseload along with their families on a field experience (field Trip) that promotes community engagement.

We have 5 EL teachers that provide co-teaching, push-in, and pull out services for identified students. Title III funds are included in School Wide Pool funding and will be use toward a portion of their salary. The EL teachers use WIDA to help identify the best resources and course of action for each individual student.

Student academic achievement;

Title III funds are included in School Wide Pool funding and will be use toward a portion of their salary. The EL teachers develop annual plans with goals and outcomes that are reviewed with the student, families and teachers to ensure consistent and continued growth. The Exceptional Learners Director implements testing resources to assist with tracking plan development/growth/goals/outcomes.

Our Exceptional Learners Director will be providing ongoing professional development to all staff along with contracting with outside vendors to assist in the area of best EL practices. Our Exceptional Learners Director also provides researched based strategies, tools and resources to all staff to assist with monitoring English learner progress toward English language proficiency and grade-level academic achievement

effective in increasing children’s English language proficiency or substantially increasing the subject matter knowledge, teaching knowledge, and teaching skills of such teachers; and

Our Exceptional Learners Director will also purchase bilingual dictionaries, leveled readers, or EL-specific digital learning platforms that are not part of the general curriculum to enhance growth across reading, writing, speaking, and listening based on need.

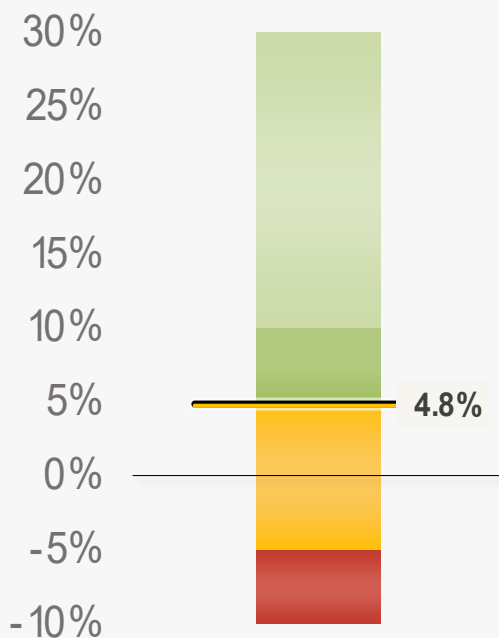

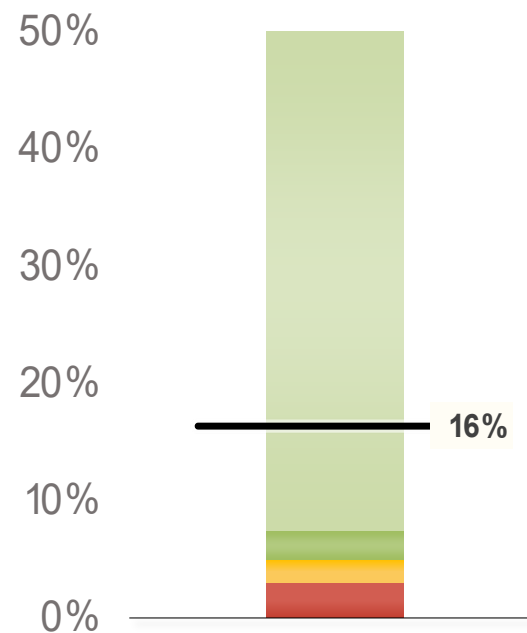

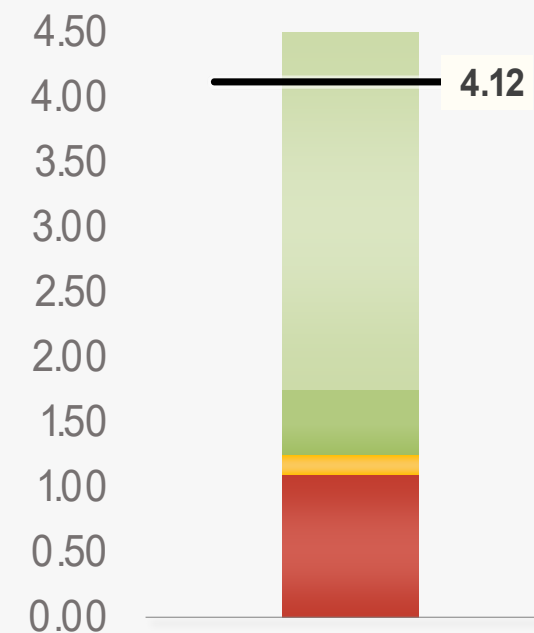

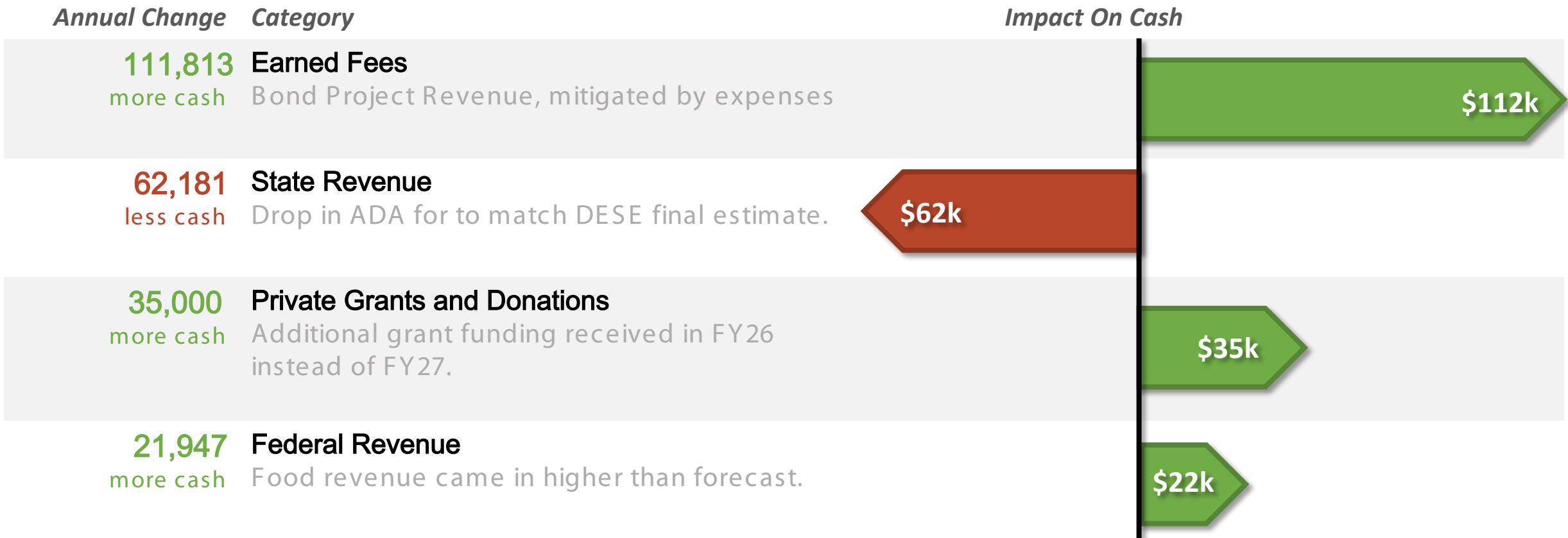

- State Aid has been projected at \$14,900 per Combined WAM_WADA (CWW). This projection is based on one number we know is true, Local Aid, and one number, which we are less sure of, KCPS WAM WADA. Based on data submitted by KCPS to DESE, this projection appears conservative and allows room for a prior year correction.
- To insulate operations, Crossroads is maintaining a deliberately conservative baseline with the Combined WAM WADA metrics. This cautious approach proactively builds a buffer to absorb any potential prior year corrections and local tax clawbacks without disrupting the classroom.
- There is opportunity for improvement in state aid revenue. Depending on the final state aid funding allocations, any positive variances realized will be strategically directed toward expanding capacity to serve more students and deepening instructional impact.

FY27 Budget Summary (continued)

Expense Outlook and Budget Variances

Overall, total expenses are projected to increase by a modest 1.81% compared to the FY26 May Forecast, driven by strategic adjustments in core operational areas. Due to deliberate and careful planning, the vast majority of our standard operation expense categories have been maintained within a tight variance of 5% or less.

However, two primary structural shifts drive the notable deviations in this budget:

- **Benefits and Taxes (+13.37%)**: reflects an increase of \$379,063, driven by anticipated rate adjustments and structural updates to the compensation.
- **Occupancy Services (-25.26%)**: reflects substantial cost reduction of \$390,863, capturing realized efficiencies and realigned service agreements for the upcoming year.

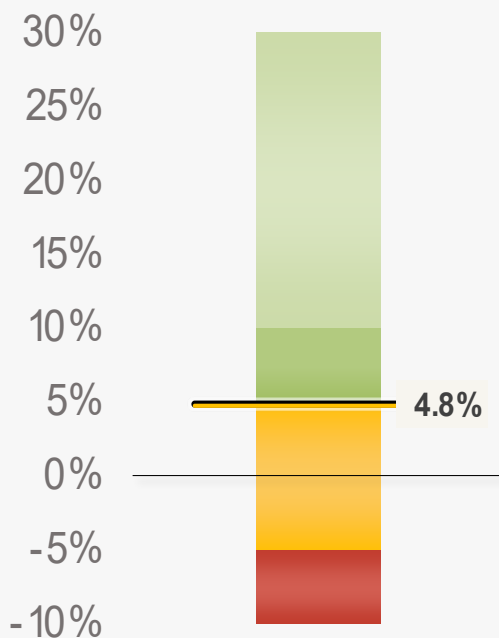

FY27 Budget Summary

- State Aid has been projected at \$14,900 per Combined WAM_WADA (CWW). This projection is based on one number we know is true, Local Aid, and one number, which we are less sure of, KCPS WAM WADA. Based on data submitted by KCPS to DESE, this projection appears conservative and allows room for a prior year correction.
- To insulate operations, Crossroads is maintaining a deliberately conservative baseline with the Combined WAM WADA metrics. This cautious approach proactively builds a buffer to absorb any potential prior year corrections and local tax clawbacks without disrupting the classroom.
- There is opportunity for improvement in state aid revenue. Depending on the final state aid funding allocations, any positive variances realized will be strategically directed toward expanding capacity to serve more students and deepening instructional impact.

FY27 Budget Summary (continued)

Expense Outlook and Budget Variances

Overall, total expenses are projected to increase by a modest 1.81% compared to the FY26 May Forecast, driven by strategic adjustments in core operational areas. Due to deliberate and careful planning, the vast majority of our standard operation expense categories have been maintained within a tight variance of 5% or less.

However, two primary structural shifts drive the notable deviations in this budget:

- **Benefits and Taxes (+13.37%)**: reflects an increase of \$379,063, driven by anticipated rate adjustments and structural updates to the compensation.
- **Occupancy Services (-25.26%)**: reflects substantial cost reduction of \$390,863, capturing realized efficiencies and realigned service agreements for the upcoming year.
