The Consolidated Application (ConApp) is used by the California Department of Education (CDE) to distribute categorical funds from various federal programs to county offices, school districts, and direct-funded charter schools throughout California.

Annually, from mid-May to the end of June, each local educational agency (LEA), using the Consolidated Application and Reporting System (CARS), submits the spring release of the ConApp. The spring release documents participation in these programs and provides assurances that the LEA will comply with the legal requirements of each program. Program entitlements are determined by formulas contained in the laws that created the programs. The winter release of the ConApp is submitted via CARS from mid-January to the end of

The winter release of the ConApp is submitted via CARS from mid-January to the end of February each year and contains the LEA entitlements for each funded program. For each federal program entitlement, LEAs allocate funds for the program as indicated by the program requirements.

TES – Expense

- Certificated Salaries decrease of \$104K is due to \$123k decrease in Certificate Salaried with the removal of 1 budgeted Certificated Teacher from forecast due to non hire, also split salary of 2 teachers who were budgeted at full salary. Projected bonus \$16K included for certificated teachers not included in original budget
- Classified Salaries increased \$21K is due to projected classified staff bonus projected at \$11.5K as well as combined \$18K increase in other classified/clerical staff for addition of part-time staff.
- Benefits decrease of \$39K is mainly due to \$15K decrease in STRS as per decrease in Certificated Salaries~\$20K projected decrease in Health and Benefits benefit as rates are adjusted as per enrollment and participation
- Books and Supplies increase of \$167K is mainly due to projected- Textbooks increase of \$22K-School Supplies increase of \$53K increase for Meet the Masters purchase and Delta Education ~ Projected increase in Software of \$36K for purchases of software licenses (TCI and Ellavation). ~ \$64K increase in Non-Cap equipment for purchase of furniture-books and supplies expense are offset by PCSGP Revenue-see above.



TES – Expense



- Subagreement Services increase of \$38K is mainly due to projected increase of \$29K for substitute teacher as prior months' invoices are averaging higher than budgeted amounts~ Security projected to increase by \$18K for increase in services
- Facilities decrease of \$141K is mainly due to projected w/o of \$231K deferred revenue for Red Hook lease in April 2020 when new Wooten Lease begins.
- Professional/Consulting Services decrease of \$89K due to projected decrease in Managements Fee (\$62K) and SPED Encroachment fees(\$21K) as per decrease in revenue

Audit approach

Our audit is performed in the five phases depicted in the graphic to the right.

When the audit is complete, we issue our opinion on the financial statements, required communication and internal control findings to the audit committees. As part of that process, at the conclusion of the audit, we will also provide management with a letter including observations and recommendations on areas that we believe need to be reviewed or areas where increased efficiency may be gained.



Phase I: Continuous Communications

The continuous communication phase of our engagement with TEACH starts when our engagement letters are issued and continues until the completion of the engagement. We believe effective communication with TEACH leaders is the key to a successful engagement. This communication includes the exchange of ideas and advice as changes are considered or implemented by TEACH or the accounting industry.

Phase II: Planning and Strategy

The planning phase will lay the foundation for a successful audit of TEACH.

- Conduct meetings with TEACH's management We will meet with TEACH's personnel to agree on an outline of responsibilities, timeframes and deadlines. The agenda would include but not be limited to:
 - Establishing an audit approach and schedule,
 - Outlining assistance required of TEACH's personnel,
 - Determining proper application of generally accepted accounting principles,
 - Reviewing prior year adjustments and control findings,
 - Considering initial audit concerns,
 - Discussing concerns of TEACH's management,
 - Establishing report parameters and deadlines,

- Communication with the audit committee and those charged with governance. As TEACH's independent auditors, CLA works for and reports to TEACH's board through its audit committee-period. While we seek a friendly and professional relationship management, we never lose sight of the volunteer leadership and organization stakeholders that we serve through our independent examination. Accordingly, we plan for and conduct planning discussions with those charged with governance over the audit to provide a full airing of risks to inform our approach as well as on-going two-way communication throughout our engagement as warranted and full reporting of our findings and their implications at the conclusion of our engagement.
- Understanding of TEACH Prior to any evaluation or testing, our engagement team will gain an understanding of the design of the internal control systems. An important part of this planning work is to determine the nature and usefulness of data (such as accounting and computer manuals, flow charts,



- budgets, etc.), so that our understanding and related documentation of accounting procedures and internal controls is accurate and can serve as a basis for setting our audit testing.
- Perform analytical reviews We will review current and historical financial and statistical data, as well as budgeted data to identify trends, fluctuations, and relationships that inform our audit risk analysis and areas of emphasis.

Focus on Areas of Importance

We have identified areas which may have a significant impact on the timing and completion of the audit or that may be of special concern to management and those charged with governance. We will review such areas indepth and propose strategies. Then we will finalize our approach so TEACH will have sufficient time to compile the data necessary for completion of the audit with minimum disruption.

Phase III: Systems Evaluation

Having established the audit framework in the planning phase, we then determine the extent to which we can rely on existing internal controls and accounting systems to produce reliable and timely financial information. There are four key steps involved in this process:

- Review internal control systems We will document or utilize internal audit documentation of the accounting systems of all key departments within TEACH. We will then confirm our understanding of the major transaction cycles (e.g. contributions, payroll, disbursements, program and grant expenses, investments, cash receipts, etc.), and prepare documentation of accounting cycles with the aid of TEACH's personnel. We will then identify strengths and weaknesses that have an impact on audit objectives and risk and determine the relative emphasis to be placed on controls for audit sampling and testing.
- Assessing the potential for fraud Audits performed under Generally Accepted Auditing Standards are designed to consider the potential for fraud but cannot be relied upon to guarantee that such instances will not occur and go undetected. At CLA, we understand the devastating impact that fraud can have on nonprofit organizations in terms of both financial loss and reputation. Accordingly, in our assessment of the internal controls at TEACH, we will perform a broad array of inquiry and testing procedures to consider the risk of fraud and actively pursue and communicate to the appropriate parties any such actual or potential instances we uncover. We routinely use "data analytics" to test for improper payments made by an organization and for fraud detection which will be included in the TEACH audit.
- Tailored audit programs Utilizing our proprietary audit program guides, our understanding of the internal control systems and our nonprofit team's extensive industry experience, we will prepare tailored programs for conducting TEACH's audit that are responsive to the identified audit risks.
- Review IT hardware and application controls We will review the general and specific application controls at TEACH including those associated with your applications inclusive of your customized wish accounting module. In addition, we will plan the appropriate usage of our data analytics software (IDEA) for efficiency and effectiveness in our population testing approach.

Phase IV: Testing and Analysis

Our audit tests will involve:

Compliance testing – The purpose of compliance tests will be to verify that significant internal control reliance noted in the systems evaluation phase are functioning as described. We will utilize sampling techniques as deemed appropriate to select transactions to be tested, to determine the characteristics of the data being examined, and to select the appropriate number of transactions that will permit us to formulate reliable conclusions.

Substantive testing – Substantive testing differs from compliance procedures in that its objective is to provide reasonable assurances of the accuracy of the financial data included in the financial statements. The nature and extent of the substantive procedures to be employed is dependent on a number of different factors, including the nature of the amount under audit, the volume and relative size of the transactions underlying the amount being audited, the effectiveness of the internal controls surrounding the processing stream, and the efficiency of the audit procedures applied. We also rely heavily on direct confirmations with third parties to test areas such as cash, investments, receivables, and various revenue streams. Analytical techniques and confirmations will be used in a number of audit areas where reliable, independent data can be used to verify recorded balances in order to limit where appropriate detailed testing in these areas.

Phase V: Reporting and Follow-Up

Our independent auditors' report, communication with governance, single audit report, and legal compliance questionnaire will be issued promptly after the completion of our fieldwork. We plan to communicate with management and the board as deemed appropriate to review the highlights of the audit and the comments and recommendations contained in our management letter before they are finalized. If necessary, CLA will present the final audit report to the audit and/or finance committee and governing board as well as address any questions they may have.

Use of technology in the audit

- FX Engagement FX Engagement is our "paperless" audit product. This product allows us to file and save all of our audit workpapers in an electronic storage capacity; allowing our firm to save time and resources associated with maintaining and storing paper files. FX Engagement also boasts a trial balance software program, which is utilized to produce financial statements, lead schedules, and allows us to perform trend analysis utilizing our clients' trial balances.
- Audit Program Generator (APG) In order to provide a uniform approach to all engagements, the firm requires the use of APG, a software program custom-written for CLA. We are pleased to confirm our understanding of the terms and objectives of our engagement and the nature and limitations of the audit services CliftonLarsonAllen LLP ("CLA," "we," "us," and "our") will provide for Teach, Inc. ("you," "your," or "the Organization") for the year ended June 30, 2020.

- Reporting on internal control over compliance related to major programs and expressing an opinion (or disclaimer of opinion) on compliance with federal statutes, regulations, and the terms and conditions of federal awards that could have a direct and material effect on each major program in accordance with the Uniform Guidance.
- Reporting on compliance related to state programs and expressing an opinion (or disclaimer of opinion) on compliance with the laws and regulations of the state programs in accordance with the requirements of the 2019-20 Guide for Annual Audits of K-12 Local Education Agencies and State Compliance Reporting.

The Government Auditing Standards report on internal control over financial reporting and on compliance and other matters will include a paragraph that states (1) that the purpose of the report is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control and compliance and the result of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control or on compliance, and (2) that the report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with Government Auditing Standards in considering the entity's internal control and compliance. The Uniform Guidance report on internal control over compliance will include a paragraph that states that the purpose of the report on internal control over compliance is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over compliance and the result of that testing based on the requirements of the Uniform Guidance. Both reports will state that the report is not suitable for any other purpose.

We will issue written reports upon completion of our audit of your financial statements and compliance with requirements applicable to major programs. We cannot provide assurance that unmodified opinions will be expressed. Circumstances may arise in which it is necessary for us to modify our opinions, add an emphasis-of-matter or other-matter paragraph(s), or withdraw from the engagement. If our opinion on the financial statements or the single audit compliance opinion is other than unmodified, we will discuss the reasons with you in advance. If circumstances occur related to the condition of your records, the availability of sufficient, appropriate audit evidence, or the existence of a significant risk of material misstatement of the financial statements or material noncompliance caused by error, fraudulent financial reporting, or misappropriation of assets, which in our professional judgment prevent us from completing the audit or forming an opinion on the financial statements or an opinion on compliance, we retain the

right to take any course of action permitted by professional standards, including declining to express opinions or issue reports, or withdrawing from the engagement.

Auditor responsibilities, procedures, and limitations

We will conduct our audit in accordance with U.S. GAAS and the standards for financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error. An audit involves performing procedures to obtain sufficient appropriate audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditors' judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

There is an unavoidable risk, because of the inherent limitations of an audit, together with the inherent limitations of internal control, that some material misstatements or noncompliance may not be detected, even though the audit is properly planned and performed in accordance with U.S. GAAS, *Government Auditing Standards*, and the Uniform Guidance. Because we will not perform a detailed examination of all transactions, material misstatements, whether from (1) errors, (2) fraudulent financial reporting, (3) misappropriation of assets, or (4) violations of laws or governmental regulations that are attributable to the entity or to acts by management or employees acting on behalf of the entity, may not be detected. Because the determination of abuse is subjective, *Government Auditing Standards* do not expect auditors to provide reasonable assurance of detecting abuse.

In addition, an audit is not designed to detect immaterial misstatements or violations of laws or governmental regulations that do not have a direct and material effect on the financial statements or on major programs. However, we will inform the appropriate level of management and those charged with governance of any material errors, fraudulent financial reporting, or misappropriation of assets that come to our attention. We will also inform the appropriate level of management and those charged with governance of any violations of laws or governmental regulations that come to our attention, unless clearly inconsequential, and of any material abuse that comes to our attention. We will include such matters in the reports required for a single audit.

In making our risk assessments, we consider internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements and compliance in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Tests of controls may be performed to test the effectiveness of certain controls that we consider relevant to preventing and detecting fraud or errors that are material to the financial statements and to preventing and detecting misstatements resulting from noncompliance with provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements that have a material effect on the financial statements. Our tests, if performed, will be less in scope than would be necessary to render an opinion on internal control and, accordingly, no opinion will be expressed in our report on internal control issued pursuant to *Government Auditing Standards*.

As required by the Uniform Guidance, we will perform tests of controls over compliance to evaluate the effectiveness of the design and operation of controls that we consider relevant to preventing or detecting

material noncompliance with the direct and material compliance requirements applicable to each major federal award program. However, our tests will be less in scope than would be necessary to render an opinion on those controls and, accordingly, no opinion will be expressed in our report on internal control issued pursuant to the Uniform Guidance.

An audit is not designed to provide assurance on internal control or to identify deficiencies, significant deficiencies, or material weaknesses in internal control. However, we will communicate to you in writing significant deficiencies or material weaknesses in internal control relevant to the audit of the financial statements that we identify during the audit that are required to be communicated under AICPA professional standards, *Government Auditing Standards*, and the Uniform Guidance.

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement, we will perform tests of the entity's compliance with the provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements that have a material effect on the financial statements. However, the objective of our audit will not be to provide an opinion on overall compliance and we will not express such an opinion in our report on compliance issued pursuant to *Government Auditing Standards*.

We will include in our report on internal control over financial reporting and on compliance relevant information about any fraud; noncompliance with provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, or grant agreements; or abuse that may have occurred that are required to be communicated under *Government Auditing Standards*.

The Uniform Guidance requires that we also plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the auditee has complied with federal statutes, regulations, and the terms and conditions of federal awards that may have a direct and material effect on each of the entity's major programs. Our procedures will consist of tests of transactions and other applicable procedures described in the "OMB Compliance Supplement" for the types of compliance requirements that could have a direct and material effect on each of the entity's major programs. The purpose of these procedures will be to express an opinion on the entity's compliance with requirements applicable to each of its major programs in our report on compliance issued pursuant to the Uniform Guidance.

We will evaluate the presentation of the schedule of expenditures of federal awards accompanying the financial statements in relation to the financial statements as a whole. We will make certain inquiries of management and evaluate the form, content, and methods of preparing the schedule to determine whether the information complies with U.S. GAAP and the Uniform Guidance, the method of preparing it has not changed from the prior period, and the information is appropriate and complete in relation to our audit of the financial statements. We will compare and reconcile the schedule to the underlying accounting records and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves.

Our responsibility as auditors is limited to the period covered by our audit and does not extend to any later periods for which we are not engaged as auditors.

Management responsibilities

Our audit will be conducted on the basis that you (management and, when appropriate, those charged with governance) acknowledge and understand that you have certain responsibilities that are fundamental to the conduct of an audit.

You are responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements and the schedule of expenditures of federal awards in accordance with U.S. GAAP. Management is also responsible for identifying all federal awards received, understanding and complying with the compliance requirements, and for the preparation of the schedule of expenditures of federal awards (including notes and noncash assistance received) in accordance with the requirements of the Uniform Guidance.

Management's responsibilities include the selection and application of accounting principles; recording and reflecting all transactions in the financial statements; determining the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates included in the financial statements; adjusting the financial statements to correct material misstatements; and confirming to us in the management representation letter that the effects of any uncorrected misstatements aggregated by us during the current engagement and pertaining to the latest period presented are immaterial, both individually and in the aggregate, to the financial statements taken as a whole. Management is responsible for compliance with applicable laws and regulations and the provisions of contracts and grant agreements, including compliance with federal statutes, regulations, and the terms and conditions of federal awards applicable to the entity's federal programs. Additionally, as required by the Uniform Guidance, it is management's responsibility to evaluate and monitor noncompliance with federal statutes, regulations, and the terms and conditions of federal awards; take prompt action when instances of noncompliance are identified, including noncompliance identified in audit findings; and to follow up and take prompt corrective action on reported audit findings and to prepare a summary schedule of prior audit findings and a corrective action plan.

You are responsible for ensuring that management is reliable and for providing us with (1) access to all information of which you are aware that is relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements, such as records, documentation, and other matters, and for the accuracy and completeness of that information, and for ensuring the information is reliable and properly reported; (2) access to personnel, accounts, books, records, supporting documentation, and other information as needed to perform an audit under the Uniform Guidance; (3) additional information that we may request for the purpose of the audit; and (4) unrestricted access to persons within the entity from whom we determine it necessary to obtain audit evidence. You agree to inform us of events occurring or facts discovered subsequent to the date of the financial statements that may affect the financial statements.

You agree to include our report on the schedule of expenditures of federal awards in any document that contains and indicates that we have reported on the schedule of expenditures of federal awards. You also agree to include the audited financial statements with any presentation of the schedule of expenditures of federal awards that includes our report thereon or make the audited financial statements readily available to intended users of the schedule of expenditures of federal awards no later than the date the schedule of expenditures of federal awards is issued with our report thereon. Your responsibilities include acknowledging to us in the representation letter that (1) you are responsible for presentation of the schedule of expenditures of federal awards in accordance with the Uniform Guidance; (2) you believe the schedule of expenditures of federal awards, including its form and content, is fairly presented in accordance with the Uniform Guidance; (3) the methods of measurement or presentation have not changed from those used in the prior period (or, if they have changed, the reasons for such changes); and (4) you have disclosed to us any significant assumptions or interpretations underlying the measurement or presentation of the schedule of expenditures of federal awards.

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of other supplementary information in accordance with U.S. GAAP. You agree to include our report on the supplementary information in any document that contains, and indicates that we have reported on, the supplementary information. You also agree to include the audited financial statements with any presentation of the supplementary information that includes our report thereon or make the audited financial statements readily available to users of the supplementary information no later than the date the supplementary information is issued with our report thereon. You agree to provide us written representations related to the presentation of the supplementary information.

Management is responsible for providing us with a written confirmation concerning representations made by you and your staff to us in connection with the audit. During our engagement, we will request information and explanations from you regarding, among other matters, the entity's activities, internal control, future plans, specific transactions, and accounting systems and procedures. The procedures we will perform during our engagement and the conclusions we reach as a basis for our report will be heavily influenced by the representations that we receive in the representation letter and otherwise from you. Accordingly, inaccurate, incomplete, or false representations could cause us to expend unnecessary effort or could cause a material fraud or error to go undetected by our procedures. In view of the foregoing, you agree that we shall not be responsible for any misstatements in the entity's financial statements that we may fail to detect as a result of misrepresentations made to us by you.

Management is responsible for establishing and maintaining a process for tracking the status of audit findings and recommendations. Management is also responsible for identifying and providing report copies to us of previous financial audits, attestation engagements, performance audits, or other studies

related to the objectives discussed in the "Audit objectives" section of this letter. This responsibility includes relaying to us corrective actions taken to address significant findings and recommendations resulting from those audits, attestation engagements, performance audits, or other engagements or studies. You are also responsible for providing management's views on our current findings, conclusions, and recommendations, as well as your planned corrective actions for the report, and for the timing and format for providing that information.

Responsibilities and limitations related to nonaudit services

For all nonaudit services we may provide to you, management agrees to assume all management responsibilities; oversee the services by designating an individual, preferably within senior management, who possesses suitable skill, knowledge, and/or experience to understand and oversee the services; evaluate the adequacy and results of the services; and accept responsibility for the results of the services.

The responsibilities and limitations related to the nonaudit services performed as part of this engagement are as follows:

- We will prepare a draft of your financial statements, schedule of expenditures of federal awards, and related notes in conformity with U.S. GAAP and the Uniform Guidance based on information provided by you. Since the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements and schedule of expenditures of federal awards is your responsibility, you will be required to acknowledge in the representation letter our assistance with preparation of the financial statements and schedule of expenditures of federal awards and that you have reviewed and approved the financial statements, schedule of expenditures of federal awards, and related notes prior to their issuance and have accepted responsibility for them. You have a responsibility to be in a position in fact and appearance to make an informed judgment on those financial statements and schedule of expenditures of federal awards.
- We will propose adjusting journal entries as needed. You will be required to review and approve those entries and to understand the nature of the changes and their impact on the financial statements.
- We will prepare the organization's federal Form 990 and applicable state filings in accordance with the applicable tax laws. We will use our judgment in resolving questions where the law is unclear, and where there is reasonable authority, we will resolve questions in your favor whenever possible. We will not audit or independently verify the accuracy or completeness of the information we receive from you for the preparation of the returns and filings, and our engagement cannot be relied upon to uncover errors or irregularities in the underlying information.

These nonaudit services do not constitute an audit under *Government Auditing Standards* and such services will not be conducted in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*.

Use of financial statements

Should you decide to include or incorporate by reference these financial statements and our auditors' report(s) thereon in a future private placement or other offering of equity or debt securities, you agree that we are under no obligation to re-issue our report or provide consent for the use of our report in such a registration or offering document. We will determine, at our sole discretion, whether we will re-issue

our report or provide consent for the use of our report only after we have performed the procedures we consider necessary in the circumstances. If we decide to re-issue our report or consent to the use of our report, we will be required to perform certain procedures including, but not limited to, (a) reading other information incorporated by reference in the registration statement or other offering document and (b) subsequent event procedures. These procedures will be considered an engagement separate and distinct from our audit engagement, and we will bill you separately. If we decide to re-issue our report or consent to the use of our report, you agree that we will be included on each distribution of draft offering materials and we will receive a complete set of final documents. We may issue preliminary draft financial statements to you for your review. Any preliminary draft financial statements should not be relied on or distributed.

Engagement administration and other matters

We expect to begin our audit on approximately April 2020.

We understand that your employees will prepare all confirmations, account analyses, and audit schedules we request and will locate any documents or invoices selected by us for testing. A list of information we expect to need for our audit and the dates required will be provided in a separate communication.

At the conclusion of the engagement, we will complete the auditor sections of the electronic Data Collection Form SF-SAC and perform the steps to certify the Form SF-SAC and single audit reporting package. It is management's responsibility to complete the auditee sections of the Data Collection Form. We will create the single audit reporting package PDF file for submission; however, it is management's responsibility to review for completeness and accuracy and electronically submit the reporting package (including financial statements, schedule of expenditures of federal awards, summary schedule of prior audit findings, auditors' reports, and corrective action plan) along with the Data Collection Form to the federal audit clearinghouse and, if appropriate, to pass-through entities. The Data Collection Form and

the reporting package must be electronically submitted within the earlier of 30 calendar days after receipt of the auditors' reports or nine months after the end of the audit period.

We will provide copies of our reports to the entity; however, management is responsible for distribution of the reports and the financial statements. Unless restricted by law or regulation, or containing privileged and confidential information, copies of our reports are to be made available for public inspection.

We are available to perform additional procedures with regard to fraud detection and prevention, at your request, as a separate engagement, subject to completion of our normal engagement acceptance procedures. The terms and fees of such an engagement would be documented in a separate engagement letter.

The audit documentation for this engagement is the sole and exclusive property of CLA and constitutes confidential and proprietary information. Except as permitted by the "Consent" section of this agreement, CLA will not disclose any confidential, proprietary, or privileged information of the entity to any persons without the authorization of entity management or unless required by law. This confidentiality provision does not prohibit us from disclosing your information to one or more of our affiliated companies in order to provide services that you have requested from us or from any such affiliated company. Any such affiliated company shall be subject to the same restrictions on the use and disclosure of your information as apply to us.

Professional standards require us to be independent with respect to you in the performance of these services. Any discussion that you have with our personnel regarding potential employment with you could impair our independence with respect to this engagement. Therefore, we request that you inform us prior to any such discussions so that we can implement appropriate safeguards to maintain our independence and objectivity. to any governmental agency, or any other form, return, or report or for providing advice or any other service not specifically recited in this letter.

Our engagement and responsibility end on delivery of our signed report. Any additional services that might be requested will be a separate, new engagement. The terms and conditions of that new engagement will be governed by a new, specific engagement letter for that service.

Government Auditing Standards require that we make our most recent external peer review report publicly available. The report is posted on our website at www.CLAconnect.com/Aboutus/.

Mediation

Any disagreement, controversy, or claim ("Dispute") that may arise out of any aspect of our services or relationship with you, including this engagement, shall be submitted to non-binding mediation by written notice ("Mediation Notice") to the other party. In mediation, we will work with you to resolve any differences voluntarily with the aid of an impartial mediator.

The mediation will be conducted as specified by the mediator and agreed upon by the parties. The parties agree to discuss their differences in good faith and to attempt, with the assistance of the mediator, to reach an amicable resolution of the Dispute.

Each party will bear its own costs in the mediation. The fees and expenses of the mediator will be shared equally by the parties.

Any Dispute will be governed by the laws of the state of Minnesota, without giving effect to choice of law principles.

Time limitation

The nature of our services makes it difficult, with the passage of time, to gather and present evidence that fully and fairly establishes the facts underlying any Dispute that may arise between the parties. The parties agree that, notwithstanding any statute or law of limitations that might otherwise apply to a Dispute, including one arising out of this agreement or the services performed under this agreement, for breach of contract or fiduciary duty, tort, fraud, misrepresentation or any other cause of action or remedy, any action or legal proceeding by you against us must be commenced within twenty-four (24) months ("Limitation Period") after the date when we deliver our final audit report under this agreement to you, regardless of whether we do other services for you relating to the audit report, or you shall be forever barred from commencing a lawsuit or obtaining any legal or equitable relief or recovery.

The Limitation Period applies and begins to run even if you have not suffered any damage or loss, or have not become aware of the existence or possible existence of a Dispute.

Price Estimate

The price estimate is based on anticipated cooperation from your personnel and their assistance with preparing confirmations and requested schedules. If the requested items are not available on the dates required or are not accurate, the estimated price for services will likely be higher. If unexpected circumstances require significant additional time, we will advise you before undertaking work that would require a substantial increase in the fee estimate. Our invoices for our services will be rendered each month as work progresses and are payable on presentation. In accordance with our firm policies, work may be suspended if your account becomes 60 days or more overdue and will not be resumed until your account is paid in full. If we elect to terminate our services for nonpayment, our engagement will be deemed to have been completed even if we have not issued our reports. You will be obligated to compensate us for all time expended and to reimburse us for all out-of-pocket expenditures through the date of termination. There is a ten percent withholding clause per Education Code 14505.

Technology Support Fee

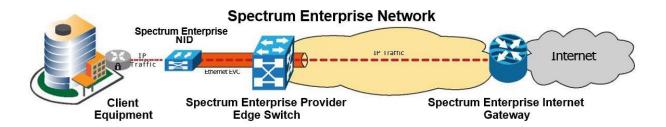

Notwithstanding anything herein to the contrary, Customer's obligations under this Service Order shall remain in full force and effect in the event Customer withdraws or is removed f rom the E - Rate program, receives E-Rate program funding that is less than Customer's requested funding amount, or is denied E- Rate program funding for any Service described in this Service Order. For the avoidance of doubt, Customer is solely responsible for all Service Charges, as described in this Service Order, that were installed prior to the E- Rate program funding year start date.

Spectrum will provide discounts via the Service Provider Invoice (SPI) Form 474 as long as the customer has been funded through the E - rate program, in which case discounts will be applied to the billing account via credit adjustments. The District may also choose to file a form 472, the Billed Entity Applicant Reimbursement (BEAR) Form. E-rate Requirements

The Telecommunications Act of 1996 established a fund by which Schools and Libraries across the Country could access discounts on eligible telecommunications products and services. The program is commonly known as the E-rate Program. The eligibility for discounts on internet access, telecommunications products and services, internal connection products, services and maintenance is determined by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC). Funding is made available upon application approval by the Schools and Libraries Division (SLD) of the Universal Service Administrative Company (USAC), which was established by the Act. 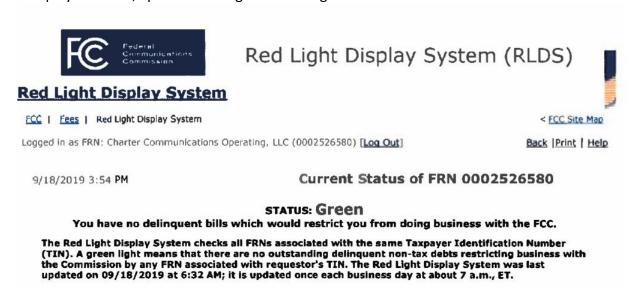

b. All Service Provider invoicing to USAC must be completed within 120 days from the last day of service. Should the Service Provider fail to invoice USAC in a timely manner, the District will only be responsible for paying its non-discounted share.

Charges. Spectrum invoices for monthly recurring charges specific to the Service(s) ("MRCs"), plus applicable taxes, fees, and surcharges, in advance on a monthly basis. Spectrum invoices for non-recurring, one-time charges ("OTCs") for construction or installation charge safter the Billing Start Date or as specified in the Service Order. The District shall not enter into a separate Agreement for said goods or services. Respondents must state in their proposal that they acknowledge, accept and are in agreement with coterminous expiration conditions.

Customer shall have the option to add Services and increase speed and bandwidth during the term of the Service Agreement. 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FIBER INTERNET ACCESS SERVICE LEVEL AGREEMENT

This document outlines the Service Level Agreement ("SLA") for Fiber Internet Access ("FIA") fiber-based service (the "Service").

This SLA is a part of, and hereby incorporated by reference into the Spectrum Enterprise Service Agreement (including the terms and conditions, attachments, and Service Orders described therein, the "Agreement"). To the extent any provision of this SLA conflicts with the Agreement, this SLA shall control. All SLA Targets in the table below are measured from Customer's Service Location to the location where Spectrum Enterprise has local access to the Internet (the Spectrum Enterprise "Point of Presence" or "POP") at the individual circuit or service level, and any applicable credits are issued only for the affected FIA circuit or service (the "Affected Service"). Capitalized words used, but not defined herein, shall have the meanings given to them in the Agreement.

I. SLA Targets for FIA Services:

II. Priority Classification:

A "Service Disruption" is defined as an outage, disruption, or severe degradation, other than an Excluded Disruption, that interferes with the ability of a Spectrum Enterprise network hub to: (i) transmit and receive network traffic on Customer's dedicated access port at the Spectrum Enterprise network hub; or (ii) exchange network traffic with another Spectrum Enterprise network hub. The Service Disruption period begins when Customer reports a Service Disruption using Spectrum Enterprise's trouble ticketing system by contacting Customer Care, Spectrum Enterprise acknowledges receipt of such trouble ticket, Spectrum Enterprise validates that the Service is affected, and Customer releases the Service for testing. The Service Disruption ends when the affected Service has been restored.

"Service Degradation" means a degradation of the Service that is not a Service Disruption or a result of an Excluded Disruption, such as failure of the Service to achieve the SLA Targets for Latency / Frame Delay, Jitter / Frame Delay Variation, or Packet / Frame Loss.

"Excluded Disruptions" means (i) planned outages, (ii) routine or urgent maintenance, (iii) time when Spectrum Enterprise is unable to gain access to Customer's Service Location, if necessary, (iv) service issues arising from acts of omissions of Customer or Customer's representatives or agents, (v) Customer equipment failures, (vi) Customer is not prepared to release the Service for testing, and (vii) Force Majeure Events.



Spectrum Enterprise will classify Service problems as follows:

Priority	Criteria
Priority 1	Each a "Priority 1 Outage": Service Disruption resulting in a total loss of Service; or Service Degradation to the point where Customer is unable to use the Service and is prepared to release it for immediate testing
Priority 2	Service Degradation where Customer is able to use the Service and is not prepared to release it for immediate testing.
Priority 3	 A service problem that does not impact the Service; or A single non-circuit specific quality of Service inquiry.

III. Service Availability

"Service Availability" is calculated as the total number of minutes in a calendar month less the number of minutes that the FIA Service is unavailable due to a Priority 1 Outage ("Downtime"), divided by the total number of minutes in a calendar month.

The following table contains examples of the percentage of Service Availability translated into minutes of Downtime for the 99.99% Service Availability Target:

IV. Mean Time to Restore ("MTTR")

The MTTR measurement for Priority 1 Outages is the average time to restore Priority 1 Outages during a calendar month calculated as the cumulative length of time it takes Spectrum Enterprise to restore an FIA Service following a Priority 1 Outage in a calendar month divided by the corresponding number of trouble tickets for Priority 1 Outages opened during the calendar month for the FIA Service.

MTTR per calendar month is calculated as follows:

Cumulative length of time to restore Priority 1 Outage(s) per FIA Service

Total number of Priority 1 Outage trouble tickets per FIA Service

V. Latency / Frame Delay

Latency or Frame Delay is the average roundtrip network delay, measured every 5 minutes during a calendar month, unless measurement is not possible as a result of an Excluded Disruption, to adequately determine a consistent average monthly performance level for frame delay for each FIA Service. The roundtrip delay is expressed in milliseconds (ms).



Latency is calculated as follows:

Latency/Frame Delay = Sum of the roundtrip delay measurements for an FIA Service

Total # of measurements for an FIA Service

VI. Packet Loss / Frame Loss Ratio

Packet Loss or Frame Loss Ratio is defined as the percentage of frames that are not successfully received compared to the total frames that are sent in a calendar month, except where any packet or frame loss is the result of an Excluded Disruption. The percentage calculation is based on frames that are transmitted from a network origination point and received at a network destination point.

Packet Loss / Frame Loss Ratio is calculated as follows:

VII. Jitter / Frame Delay Variation

Jitter or Frame Delay Variation is defined as the variation in delay for two consecutive frames that are transmitted (one-way) from a network origination point and received at a network destination point. Spectrum Enterprise measures a sample set of frames every 5 minutes during a calendar month, unless measurement is not possible as a result of an Excluded Disruption, and determines the average delay between consecutive frames within each sample set. The monthly Jitter / Frame Delay Variation is calculated as the average of all of the frame delay variation measurements during such calendar month and is expressed in milliseconds (ms).

Jitter / Frame Delay Variation is calculated as follows:



VIII. Network Maintenance

Maintenance Notice:

Customer understands that from time to time, Spectrum Enterprise will perform network maintenance for network improvements and preventive maintenance. In some cases, Spectrum Enterprise will need to perform urgent network maintenance, which will usually be conducted within the routine maintenance windows. Spectrum Enterprise will use reasonable efforts to provide advance notice of the approximate time, duration, and reason for any urgent maintenance outside of the routine maintenance windows.

Maintenance Windows:

Routine maintenance may be performed Monday — Friday 12 a.m. — 6 a.m. Local Time.



IX. Remedies

Service Credits:

If the actual performance of an FIA Service during any calendar month is less than the SLA Targets and Customer is in compliance with the terms of the Agreement and this SLA, then Customer may request credit equal to the corresponding percentage of monthly recurring charges for the Affected Service as set forth in the table below. Any credit to be applied will be off-set against amounts due from Customer to Spectrum Enterprise in the billing cycle following the date Spectrum Enterprise makes its credit determination. Credit requests must be submitted to Spectrum Enterprise within thirty (30) days of the calendar month in which the SLA Target was missed. Spectrum Enterprise will exercise commercially reasonable efforts to respond to such credit requests within thirty (30) days of receipt thereof.

All SLA Targets are monthly measurements, and Customer may request only one credit per SLA Target per month for the Affected Service. Should one event impact more than one SLA hereunder, Customer shall receive the single highest of the qualifying credits only. Except as set forth below, the credits described in this SLA shall constitute Customer's sole and exclusive remedy, and Spectrum Enterprise's sole and exclusive liability, with respect to any missed SLA Targets. Service Credits hereunder shall not be cumulative per Service.

Chronic Priority 1 Outages:

If Customer experiences and reports three (3) separate Priority 1 Outages where the Downtime exceeds four (4) hours during each Priority 1 Outage within three (3) consecutive calendar months, then Customer may terminate the Affected Service without charge or liability by providing at least thirty (30) days written notice to Spectrum Enterprise; provided, however, that (i) Customer may only terminate the Affected Service; (ii) Customer must exercise its right to terminate the Affected Service by providing written notice to Spectrum Enterprise within thirty (30) days after the event giving rise to Customer's termination right; (iii) Customer shall have paid Spectrum Enterprise all amounts due at the time of such termination for all Services provided by Spectrum Enterprise pursuant to the Agreement, and (iv) the foregoing termination right provides the sole and exclusive remedy of Customer and the sole and exclusive liability of Spectrum Enterprise for chronic Priority 1 Outages and Customer shall not be eligible for any additional credits. Termination will be effective forty-five (45) days after Spectrum Enterprise's receipt of such written notice of termination.

The Telecommunications Act of 1996 established a fund by which Schools and Libraries across the Country could access discounts on eligible telecommunications products and services. The program is commonly known as the E-rate Program. The School (or "Applicant") shall not enter into a separate Agreement for said goods or services. Respondents must state in their proposal that they acknowledge, accept and agree with coterminous expiration conditions.

Academic Excellence Committee

Duties

The main purpose of the Academic Excellence Committee is to measure the academic results of the organization against the goals laid out in the organization's charter, accountability plan, and annual goals. In one sense, the Academic Excellence Committee is similar to the Finance Committee: both exist to monitor performance against stated goals. For the Finance Committee, this means measuring financial results against the budgeted goals. For the Academic Excellence Committee, this means measuring organizational outcomes against stated goals for metrics such as:

- Performance on state tests
- Performance on normed standardized tests (e.g., ACT, SAT, NWEA, UCLA MDTP, AP Exams)
- A-G Completion and college application/acceptance
- Attendance
- · Surveys of family, student or staff satisfaction
- Student and staff retention
 - The overall role of the Academic Excellence Committee is to ensure that:
- The board, CEO/Superintendent and TEACH Leadership have a clear and shared definition of "academic excellence" for the organization. (It should be written down and understood by all trustees.)
- The board, CEO/Superintendent and TEACH Leadership have a clear and shared sense of how well the organization is currently performing in reaching that definition of excellence.
- The board, CEO/Superintendent and TEACH leadership agree on

- what the next steps the organization will take in order to reach that goal of excellence.
- All trustees understand the promises in the charter and accountability plan and understand how well the organization is currently performing against those promises.
- All trustees understand what standardized assessments the school administers, what each one assesses, when each one is administered, and how the data from each is used to inform teaching and programmatic changes.
- The board, CEO/Superintendent and TEACH leadership have a clear and structured process for updating the board on the organization's performance on key academic outcomes on a regular basis (at least four times per year).
- When academic-outcome data is presented to the board, it is presented in a comparative context (e.g., against comparables of how the organization has performed in the past, how other schools in the area have performed, and how other high performing schools have performed) so that trustees can assess the organization's overall strength of performance meaningfully.
- Work with CEO/Superintendent to provide board training, as necessary, to understand how the organization is achieving the board approved goals.

What the Academic Excellence Committee Should Not Do

One of the biggest pitfalls for Academic Excellence Committees is to engage over *inputs*—the means by which the organization pursues its mission—rather than *outcomes*—the objective data used to assess how well the organization is meeting its mission. Inputs are management level issues, which should be handled by the CEO/Superintendent. Outcomes are what the board should be focused on and governing towards. The best Academic Excellence Committees help CEO/SUPERINTENDENTs set clear goals for the year of outcomes that are related to the mission and then set up checkpoints throughout the year at which they meet with the CEO/Superintendent to monitor progress towards those goals.

Other activities Academic Excellence Committees should NOT be involved in:

- Evaluating teachers
- Selecting, designing, or reviewing the quality of curricula
- Planning professional development for teachers
- Interacting with teachers or other staff members on a regular basis (i.e., daily or weekly)
- Interacting with families or students on a regular basis (i.e., daily or weekly)
- Presenting themselves as an outlet for staff, family, or student complaints or concerns that have not first been formally addressed to the CEO/Superintendent

Committee Membership

While it can be useful for some members of the Academic Excellence Committee to have a background in education, it is by no means necessary in order to be an effective committee member. Many effective Academic Excellence Committees do not have educators on the committee. We find that the key functions of the committee—helping the CEO/Superintendent to set ambitious goals and then monitoring data to assess progress towards those goals—are often well met by people with strong analytical skills; these people need not be educators.

What questions should the committee be asking?

- What is the ultimate goal of our organization? (must be measurable)
- How we will know, on an annual basis, that our students are making progress towards this goal?
- How will we know during the course of the year that our students are making progress towards our annual goals?
- When will the board receive updates on students' academic progress this year?
- What data will the board receive at each of these check-in points?
- What results does the CEO/Superintendent expect to see at each check-in point that would tell us we are on track to meet our annual

goals?

• Is there an evaluation/feedback process in place for all staff members under which they receive a formal written evaluation,

Finance Committee

General Purpose

The finance committee is commissioned by and responsible to the Board of Trustees. It has the responsibility for working with the CEO and Chief Financial Officer (CFO) to create the upcoming fiscal year budget; presenting budget recommendations to the Board; monitoring implementation of the approved budget on a regular basis and recommending proposed budget revisions; recommending to the Board appropriate policies for the management of TEACH Public Schools assets. The finance committee shall be assisted by the CEO and CFO.

Appointments and Composition

- The members of the finance committee shall be the treasurer of the Board who shall serve
 as chair, the Chair who shall serve as an ex-officio member, together with other trustees
 appointed by the Chair with the advice and consent of the Board in accordance with the
 bylaws.
- 2. Both the CEO and the CFO will be members of the finance committee.
- 3. Additional committee members may be appointed and need not be members of the Board of Trustees.

Responsibilities

- 1. Prepare an annual budget for the organization in collaboration with the CEO and CFO.
- 2. Also in collaboration with the CEO and CFO, develop and annually revise a five-year financial forecast and develop long-range financial plans based on the forecast.
- 3. Arrange for an annual audit to be provided to the Board of Trustees.
- 4. Provide oversight of the procurement process.
- 5. Review monthly financial statements and variances from budget, and recommend action to the Board, as appropriate.
- 6. Create specific measurable board-level goals for the year as part of the full board planning process.
- 7. Develop and implement a board-level training program to ensure that all trustees (especially those without a financial background) can be effective stewards of the organization's financial resources.
- 8. Report to the Board of Trustees at regular meetings of the Board in a manner determined by the Board.
- 9. Annually evaluate its work as a committee and the objectives it has committed itself to and report on same to the Board of Trustees.

What the Finance Committee Should Not Do

- Formally adopting budgets, LCAP or fiscal policies, this is the responsibility of the TEACH Board of Directors.
- Interacting with families or students on a regular basis (i.e., daily or weekly)

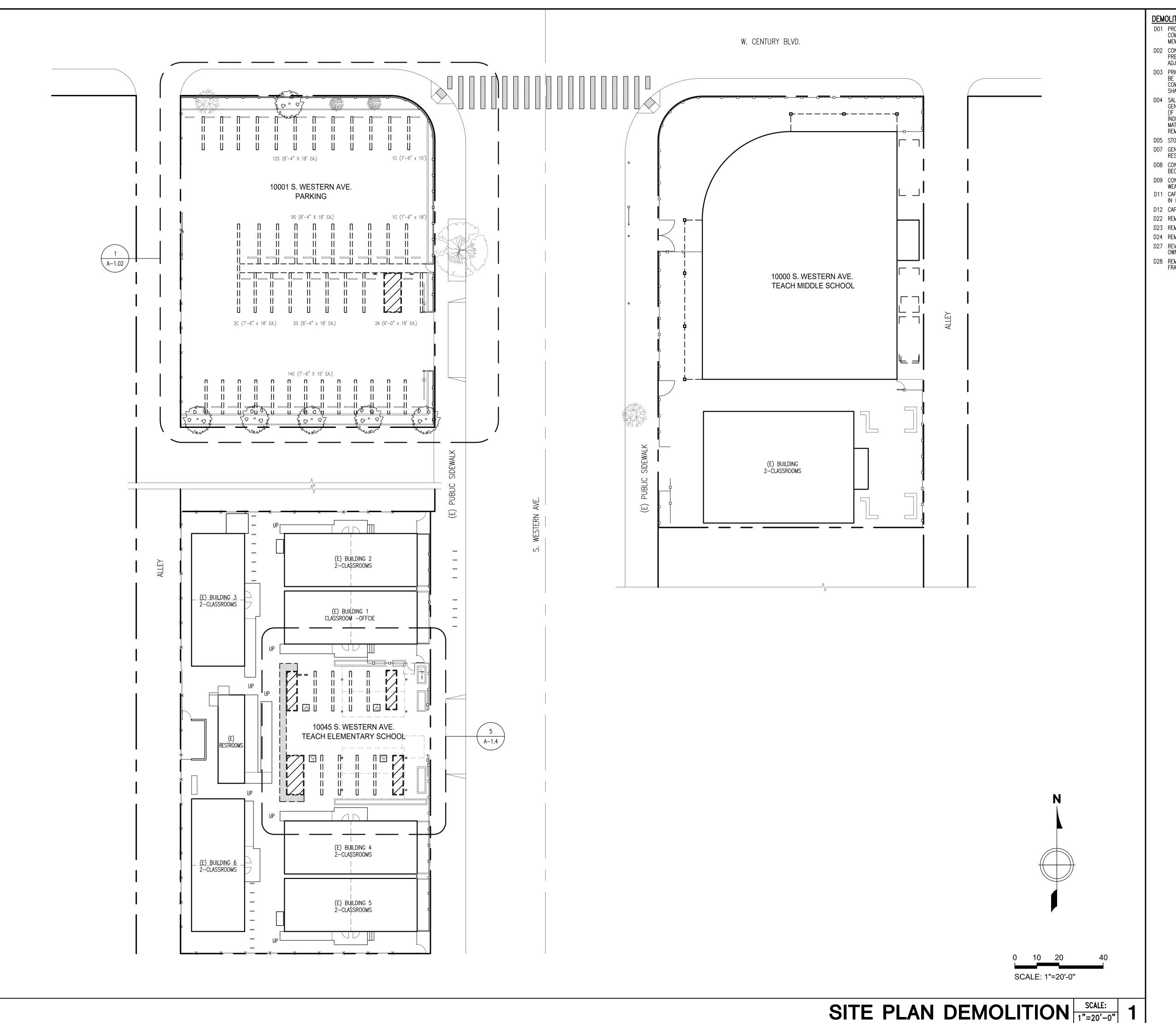

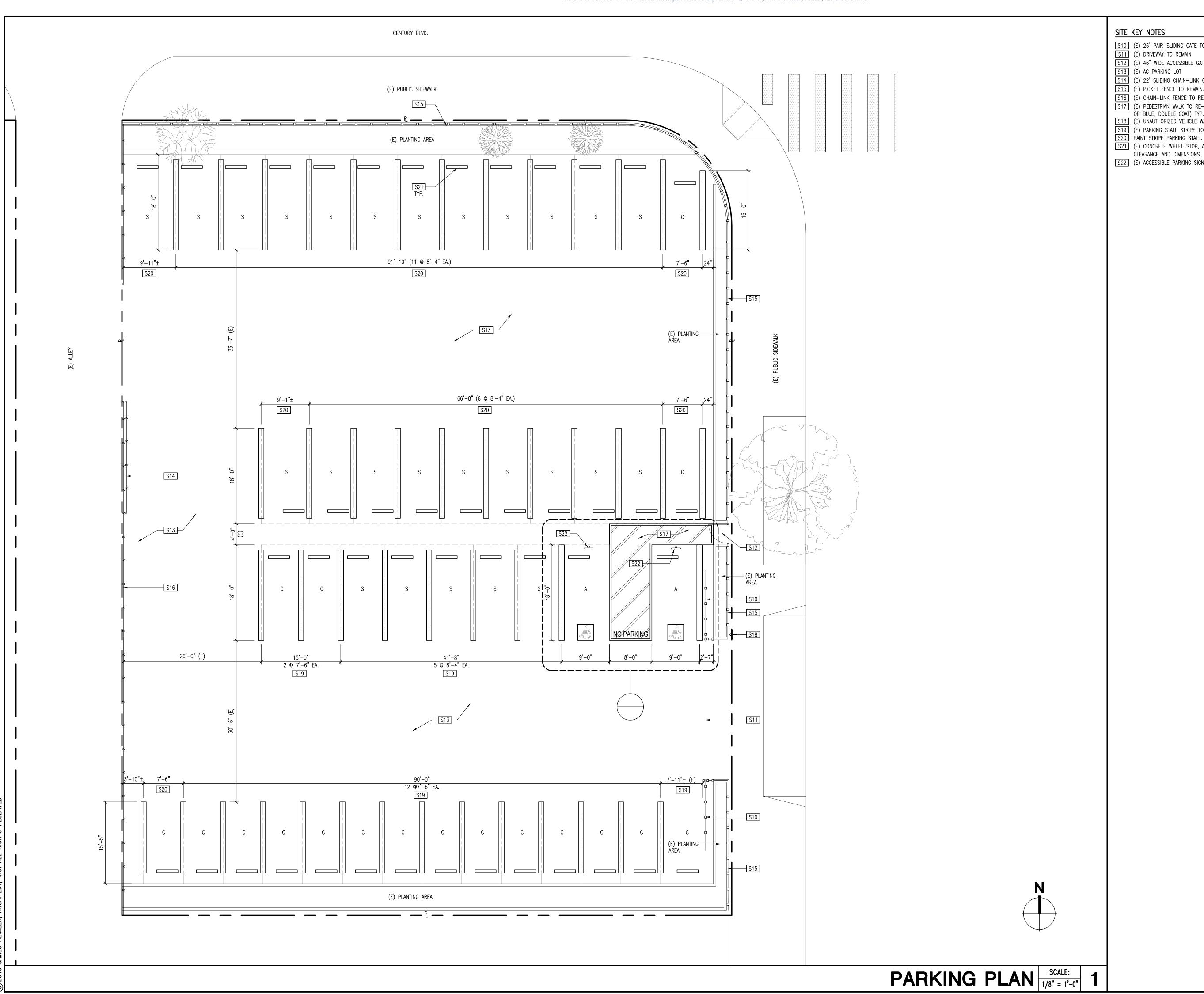
SITE PLAN EMOLITION

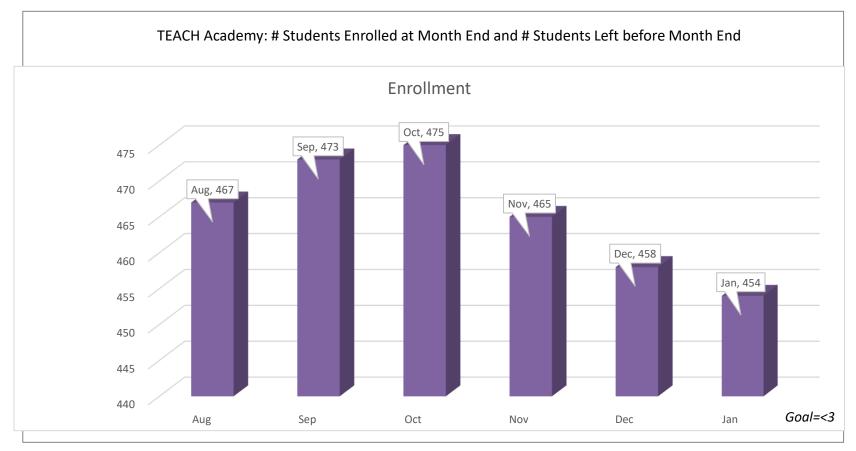

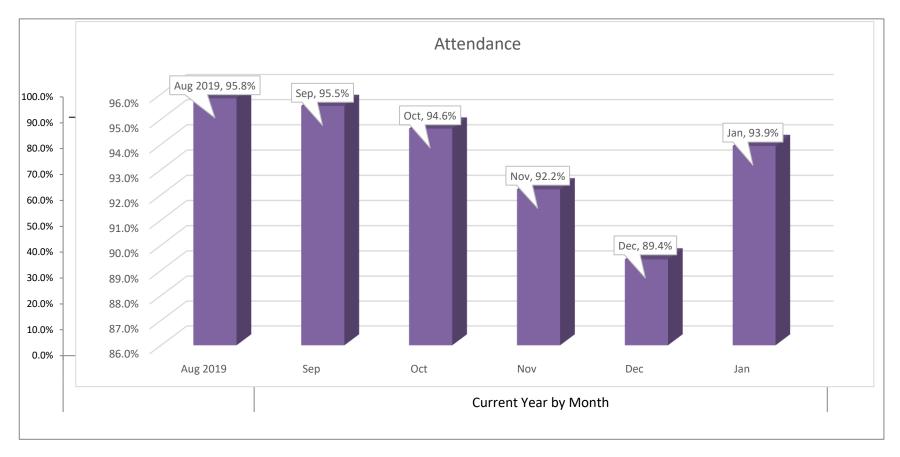

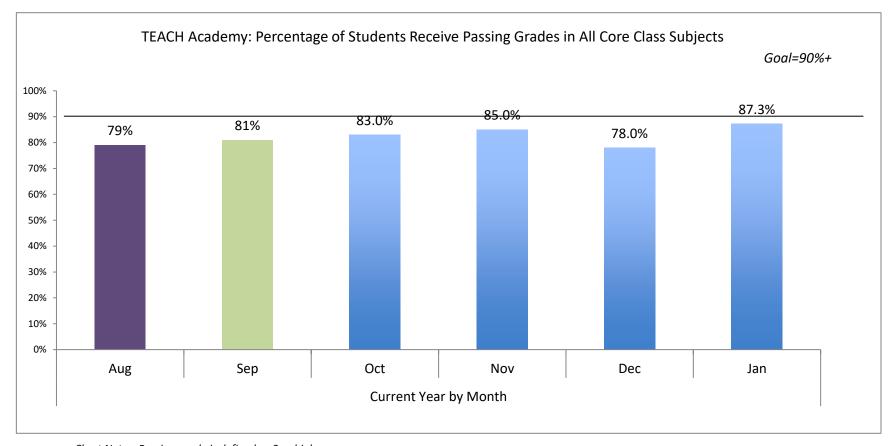
